NRCS grant funds awarded to Cooke County Precinct 4 and 2

Darnell Williams of the
USDA Natural Resources
Conservation Services spoke
to Commissioners Court at
its regular meeting on Monday, March 22 in regard to
funding approved for Cooke
County through the Emergency Watershed Protection Program. Williams explained that NRCS pays 75%
of the cost to install protective measures to reduce the
threat of future damages to
roads, bridges, property, and
other local infrastructure.
"This request was made
after Cooke County received
a tremendous amount of rain
and heavy flooding in May of
2009," said Williams. "Our local NRCS staff made assessments of 30 of the sites. We
only found eight sites that
we thought would be eligible
for this program. Hats off to
the commissioners for doing
a very good job of taking care
of their own roads and using
their own resources to get
this done."

The total cost for the eight
sites is \$341,000. NRCS's
part is estimated at \$251,000
and the County's portion is
about \$85,000. Williams noted that this program had not
been used by commissioners
in Cooke County in the past
to get federal money to fund
such projects.

that the biggest project is on
Johnson Lake dam where the
auxiliary spillway has mostly washed away. Another is
on CR 411 where a portion of

What this Health Care Bill means for you

Health care reform has now passed. The path it took has really been extraordinary. It started with an issue that touches every single American and represents one-sixth of the U.S. economy. Then came 2,000 plus page bills to overhaul the system and give vast new powers to federal regulators. That led to public outrage and concern and to increased political interest and activism throughout the country. It all culminated in the use of unusual procedures to limit debate and prevent amendments. And now it has passed, despite the clear opposition of a majority of the American people. It would be hard to find another example of legislation this significant which has become law in spite of the clear objection of the American people. No Member of Congress could have failed to hear the concerns that people had. Those who voted for the bill simply chose to ignore them.

My view is that we need reform. But Congress has a better chance of getting it right and of maintaining the trust of the American people if it takes reform in bite-sized chunks, starting with one or two reforms and building on them. That was not the path chosen by President Obama and the Democratic leadership of the Congress. They chose to do it all at once.

What does it all mean for you?

What does it all mean for you?

Some of the consequences are clear from the words of the bill. Every person in the country will be required to have health insurance. If you do not have it, you will be fined. Every employer who has at least 50 employees will have to provide health insurance to its employees or pay fines.

The government will create "health exchanges" from which people can buy insurance. There are tax credits and other subsidies to help some people buy insurance through the exchanges.

Medicare spending will be reduced by \$500 billion, much of it from the Medicare Advantage programs which serve about one-fourth of Medicare beneficiaries.

Tax increases of about \$569 billion will be imposed, making job creation even more difficult.

Other consequences are just as clear to those who have studied the bill. Those who currently have health insurance will pay more. One study estimated that premiums will be 10% to 15% more than they would have been without this bill because of the new mandates, regulations, and taxes on insurance companies.

The national debt will rise even higher. The new programs and benefits will cost more money, not less. The cost estimate provided by the Congressional Budget Office considers 10 years of tax increases and Medicare cuts but only six years of benefits. If we look at an equal amount of time for revenue and benefits, the bill will undoubtedly increase debt and put an even greater strain on Medicare, a program already in financial trouble.

The federal government will be more intimately involved in decisions that are made on your health. The bill creates a number of new offices and commissions with powers to affect and even regulate some part of your health care.

We are guaranteed to face constant political battles over health care.



Distractions help children overcome needle nervousness

Distractions can be a powerful ally for the guardian of a child about to get poked with a needle for school shots, flu vaccinations, and blood tests, said Dr. Deborah Wiebe, professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

"Tell a child to count backward as fast as they can," she says. "Or have him or her blow soap bubbles."

Adults, however, have to be careful of one distraction in particular that could turn negative: displaying fear themselves.

"For children, having parents there for support and distraction usually helps," Dr. Wiebe said. "That holds true as long as the adults are not modeling fear."

Negative experiences with needles or shots can lead to needle phobia, which is a much less common and more severe problem. Needle phobia can require a more systematic intervention by a behavioral specialist.

"Luckily, most kids won't ever reach this phase of needle fear," Dr. Wiebe said.

County Agent's Report Wayne Becker

Will parasites be a prob-lem this year?
Dr. Thomas Craig, Pro-fessor of Veterinary Pathol-ogy has recently sited some reasons for cattlemen to be especially vigilant in their efforts to protect cattle from parasites this year. He states that there are two basic reasons to administer a dewormer to your cattle.

basic reasons to administer a dewormer to your cattle. One is to aid an animal by increasing production of meat, milk or reproductive capabilities. The other is to lessen numbers of parasites in the environment to reduce exposure of "at risk" cattle. With the dry weather conditions during the spring and summer of 2009 followed by a wet fall and winter of 2009, 2010 could increase both the susceptibility of cattle to worms and could increase the quantity of worms in the environment. First, many of you know that parasites thrive in cool, wet weather. The current conditions look to be favoring parasite survival. Also, cattle being nutritionally stressed can cause moderate numbers of parasites to cause problems. Further, cattle were less likely to ingest worms last year with the drier weather. Especially for younger cattle, this could be a concern. Cattle that have previously been exposed to a moderate pesticide load tend to develop some resistance. The lack of parasites because of dry conditions in 2009 may have allowed younger cattle to mature without the "opportunity" to develop this resistance.

Because of the increased potential for parasite, problems this year, Dr. Craig has recommended that producers may wish to deworm cattle earlier in the season this year (late March or early April), especially yearlings and two-year olds. General recommendations for deworming are late spring to early summer.

Use caution when applying "Weed and Feeds" to lawns
Although most herbicides are formulated with reliable safety factors, application rates higher than those

recommended may cause injury to turf and ornamental plants. Many people overapply herbicides, especially when using fertilizer-herbicide combinations. The user needs to follow instructions on containers carefully to avoid overdoses.

Fertilizer-herbicide combinations are extremely popular because they combinations with preemergence chemicals are generally effective since both fertilizer and herbicide action are dependent on contact with the soil (requiring rainfall or irrigation).

Postemergence herbicide action depends more on absorption by leaves, and granules in such combinations do not adhere well to smoothsurfaced leaves. They will stick better if applied when weed leaves are damp, perhaps with morning dew. "Weed and feed" materials present a conflict in desirable actions. Proper time for weed control often does not coincide with the most desirable time and rates for fertilizing, if used for follow-up fertilizations, there is danger of herbicide overdose.
