Church of-ficials reported the break in at 7 a.m. Monday morning. According to Muenster Chief of Police Bob Stovall, the perpetrator(s) climbed a wooden fence to get to a southeast door which was accessed. Locks on two doors were forced to gain entry. A drill was used on the cen-ter of the locks and then the door forced open, causing damage.

Chief Stovall commented that it appears that the location of the keys and the safe were known by the perpetrator(s). Nothing was ransacked. An unsuccessful attempt was made to drill into the safe.

Although nothing was taken from the safe, approxi-mately \$30 was stolen from the candle money. The mon-ey box there was broken into by breaking off a hinge. An estimate on property damaged during the bur-glary is not yet available.

Management Coordinator/ Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher said that the green-up now occurring helps to reduce the fire danger on days with high wind and low humidity, but when there is a fire, it is difficult for the fire trucks to get around in muddy fields. "It's never a good idea to" burn on a very windy day."

"It's never a good idea to burn on a very windy day," cautioned Fletcher. "Not only could the embers blow out into a grassy area and start a wildland fire, they could also blow onto a roof or against a building and start a structure fire! With winds


in the 20s and 30s, embers could be blown 50+ feet, and it's hard to control a fire do-Firefighters ask that you

Tricfighters ask that you move any fire fuel away from your home and out build-ings. Keep grass and weeds mowed and trimmed to keep fire from spreading. Remember to call the Cooke County Sheriff's dis-part of any control burn or burning a large brush pile. This is a courtesy to your local firefighters so that they are not answering calls when someone reports your control burn as a fire.

Stripe rust becoming evi-

Stripe rust becoming evi-dent in Texas wheat According to Dr. Ron French, Extension, small grains pathologist, stripe rust has been observed around the State. Heavy lev-els have been reported in the College Station area, while trace to low levels have been diagnosed in around Abilene, Chillicothe, Rockwall Coun-ty, and Grayson County. Stripe rust develops in early spring favored by cool emperatures and high hu-midity. Primary symptoms consist of narrow orange-yellow stripes on leaves, whet the sume and hurmed


midity. Primary symptoms consist of narrow orange-yellow stripes on leaves, sheaths, awns, and glumes. Severe infections affect yield by reducing kernel numbers, weight, and overall quality. Infections are initiated from wind-borne spores car-ried either from long dis-tances or from nearby alive hosts. Spores germinate at temperatures between 37°F and 59°F, and infection is fa-vored by free moisture (rain or dew) and temperatures between 50°F and 59°F. Pathogens may be found in "hot spots" in a field, so good monitoring is essential. For infection to occur, leaves need prolonged wetness, es-

pecially overnight, and tem-peratures must be favorable for spore germination and fungal activity. Wield potential, price, wather, variety resistance, and fungicide costs need to also be taken into account prior to making treatment decisions. Generally, treat-ment is warranted when the rust level in crop gets to 1% leaf coverage but before it covers 5% of leaf area. TDA market recap

For the week ending March 27, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$3 higher per hundredweight. Demand remains strong, especially for lighter-weight stockers for grazing. Fed cattle prices were lower in spite of higher wholesale beef prices. Totto and grain markets ended the week lower as weak export sales, a stronger dollar, and ample global supplies pressured prices. As for futures markets, feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, wheat, and corn were lower, while lumber was higher. Much of the state received rain last week with amounts ranging from a trace to 1.5 inches. Topsoil moisture sup-ply was reported in mostly adequate to surplus except for short conditions in parts of the High Plains, Trans-Pecos, Edwards Plateau, and South Texas. Winter wheat progressed well with 4% of the acreage headed compared to 7% on average by this date. Corn planting was again delayed by wet fields, especially in the Blacklands region. The crop is now 39% planted compared to 50% on average, with 11% of the acreage emerged. Grain sorghum planting advanced to 26% complete, also well behind the normal pace. Pastures were reported in mostly good to fair condition.


