

## Candidates announced for May elections

Monday's deadline to file as a candidate in local elections passed with at least enough candidates to fill all positions and in some cases produced contested races. There is still time to file as a write in candidate. That deadline is Monday, March 16.

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees drew the most interest. There are three places with expiring terms. Place 5 is held by Jim Endres who chose not to seek another term. Filing for that seat are Richard Dangelmayr and Doug Hermes. Place 6 incumbent Ronnie Felderhoff filed for another term and is opposed by Kimberly Hess Walterscheid. Place 7 incumbent Steve Trubenbach has no opponent and he filed for another term.

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## County to purchase radios with Homeland Security funds

Cooke County will soon have the benefit of more new radios. Commissioners approved a fund transfer that will make the purchase possible.

"We've got the opportunity to go back in with Grayson and Fannin counties and make a large purchase of radios for all three counties and get a lot better deal if we all go together," explained County Judge Bill Freeman at the Monday, March 9 Commissioners Court meeting.

The amount of \$2,227.11 will be transferred from Cooke County's 2006 Homeland Security Grant back to Grayson County through TCOG (Texoma Council of Governments) to make the

purchase. Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher explained that the hand-held radios and chargers will be kept at the Emergency Management Command Center. They will be available when needed, especially in emergency situations when outside assistance is needed and their radio frequencies don't work with those in Cooke County. He expects to get four to six radios.

Fletcher said that the 2006 money being put into the pool is left over and uncommitted. He noted that we will be getting equipment valued at more than the amount of money being spent by the

## Muenster, Germanfest featured in Texas Highways

Germanfest and Muenster are among the topics featured in the April 2009 issue of *Texas Highways* magazine. The stories, written by Ray Blockus, part-time resident of Muenster, appear in the publication's "Weekender" department.

Blockus, a retired newspaper editor who continues his lifelong avocation as a free-lance writer, said he was inspired to write about Germanfest after attending the event in 2005.

Following acceptance of

his story, *Texas Highways* suggested that he write a companion article about Muenster itself.

The Germanfest story tells of the fun and attractions that have entertained thousands of people over the years, while the Muenster article tells of the town's ambience, German food availability, and other attractions.

"Muenster has much to be proud of," said Blockus, who added that the town's adherence to its German heri-

tage is a classic example of what makes life in America's smaller towns special and desirable.

Blockus added that few towns the size of Muenster can boast a museum such as the very well furnished and maintained Muenster Museum. More impressive, he said, is that the facility is the result of overwhelming generosity from its artifacts to the very site it occupies.

"That place is an absolute treasure," he said. "One could spend hours, days, and

weeks going through it carefully. Its very existence demonstrates how deeply the town cherishes its roots. And the fact that it is staffed by volunteers adds to that truisim."

Asked what he might write about next, Blockus, a Pennsylvanian married to Muenster native Betty Ann Hoenig Blockus, said, "I'm not quite sure yet, but a few ideas are already in the works. Texas has so much going for it that I could cover a topic a week."

## Paul Trayler 1923 - 2009

Funeral services for Paul E. Trayler of Forestburg were held Saturday, March 7 at the United Methodist Church in Forestburg with Rev. Sam Campbell and Steve Sandusky officiating. Burial followed in Perryman Cemetery in Forestburg. Services were directed by McCoy Funeral Home of Saint Jo. Visitation was held at the funeral home Friday, March 6. Mr. Trayler died at the age of 85 at 12 a.m. on Thursday, March 5, 2009 in Nocona.

Born in Forestburg on May 7, 1923, to Roy "Pat" and Gertie Batts Trayler, Paul grew up in Forestburg where he attended school. Shortly before graduating, he was drafted and inducted into the U.S. Army where he served during World War II. While in the service, he was engaged in heavy combat, a portion of which was in Okinawa. He received two purple hearts along with other medals for his time and efforts during the war.

Most of Paul's civilian occupation was associated with the oil industry. Starting as a roughneck, then a driller, Paul became a tool-pusher. He worked for several years for Crawford Drilling Company. He retired from the oil industry in 1985. At age 80, Paul crossed the stage at high school graduation in Forestburg, where he was presented his high school diploma, a moment that was cherished by him and his family. After retirement, Paul really enjoyed his family including his wife of almost 59 years, six children, his many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and his many friends.

Paul spent much of his retired life enjoying the outdoors. He loved watching the birds, rabbits, and other animals, and enjoyed gardening, watching sports (especially baseball - Texas Rangers), and caring for his family and visiting with friends.

Survivors include his wife Betty Trayler of Forestburg; daughters Gayla

## Muenster designated Tree City USA again

Stick Lamar received confirmation last week that Muenster has for the seventh consecutive year been named a Tree City USA. Muenster is among only 65 Tree City USAs in Texas.

The Tree City USA® program, sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation with the U.S.D.A. Forest Service, and the National Association of State Foresters, provides direction, technical assistance, public attention, and national recognition for urban and community forestry programs in thousands of towns and cities across the country.

In order to qualify for Tree City USA, a town or city must meet four standards established by The Arbor Day Foundation and the National Association of State Foresters. They must: 1. establish a Tree Board or Department; 2. adopt a Tree

Care Ordinance; 3. set up a Community Forestry Program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita; and 4. have an Arbor Day Observance and Proclamation.

Muenster observes Arbor Day each year during the opening ceremonies of the Muenster Germanfest.

has three terms open. Those are that of mayor held by John Pagel, Place 3 Jack Flusche, and Place 5 Joey Anderson. All incumbents filed for re-election and have no opposition unless a write in candidate files.

Muenster Hospital District's Board of Directors has three three-year terms expiring. Incumbents are Kenny Klement, Ronnie Weinzapfel, and Dr. Walter Knight. Dr. Knight is the only incumbent who chose

not to seek another term. Aaron Hess has filed for the Hospital Board.

Lindsay's City Council has three positions open and so far three candidates have filed. They are Don Metzler, incumbent, Jeff Neu, incumbent, and Robert Sharp. David Spaeth is not seeking another term.

Lindsay ISD's Board of Trustees has two open positions. Incumbents Lloyd Reiter and Bruce Bezner both seek an additional term.

## Cooke County roads to reap benefit of Stimulus money

The Texas Transportation Commission gave the go ahead to \$500 million in Stimulus projects throughout the state. This \$500 million of the \$2.2 billion given to Texas will pay for maintenance and preservation projects.

There are two pots of stimulus money left. There is another \$500 million to be spent by Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO's) and \$1.2 billion for mobility projects that add capacity.

Included in Feb. 26th's approved \$500 million is \$11.7

million to pay for four projects in the Wichita Falls District:

**COOKE County** \$2,377,539 Widen Roadway FM 2071 FM 372 TO FM 922

These projects are ready for bids and will be let in April and May.

DPS troopers in the coastal areas of Texas will have stepped-up enforcement in March looking for speeders, drunk drivers, and seat-belt violators.

On Friday, March 6, the catechumens, candidates, sponsors, and family mem-

bers went to the combined Rite of Election (for catechumens) and Call to Continuing Conversion (for baptized candidates) at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Denton. Bishop Kevin Vann presided at this liturgy of the word. It included songs, Scripture readings, and a homily. Then each parish presented their catechumens. Godparents were asked about their readiness for the sacraments. The Bishop then told the catechumens that they would now be called "the elect" since they have been chosen or "elected" for the sacraments. Then the Bishop signed the "book of the elect" from each parish. After that, each parish presented its candidates and their sponsors vouched for their readiness for the sacraments. Then both the "elect" and the candidates were introduced individually to Bishop Vann. Afterward, both the elect and candidates knelt and their sponsors placed their hands on their shoulders as the intercessions were read.

During Lent, the elect and the candidates will prepare in a more intense way for the sacraments of initiation they will receive at the Easter Vigil service and on Palm Sunday.

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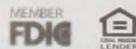

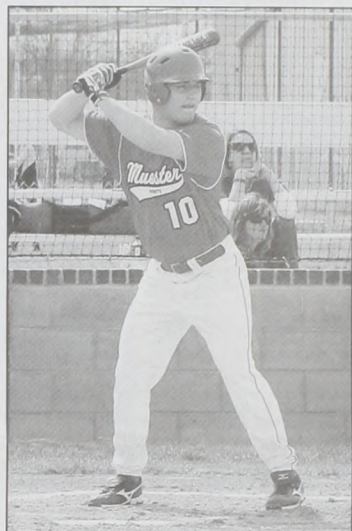

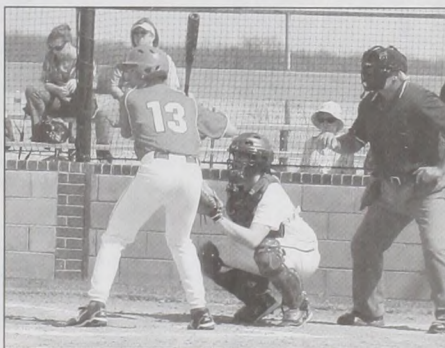

Commissioners agreed to contract with First Southwest Asset Management, Inc. for Arbitrage Rebate Compliance Service. Cost should be \$2,000 since most of the (Jail Bond) funds are already spent. Completing the parking lot and some landscaping are all that remains to be done, according to Judge Freeman.

County Auditor Shelley Saunders explained, "Any time a government entity issues any kind of bonds, the IRS has what is called Arbitrage. Every five years you need to take a look at your bonds and how much interest you've earned off of it. In the '80s, there were some government entities that were selling bonds and holding on to the money and making a profit off of the money without doing the project. Now, if you earn more interest than you sell the bonds for, you pay the IRS that difference." The County's 2004 General Obligation Bond is about to hit its five-year mark.

Commissioners Court issued a proclamation declaring March 15-21 as Poison Prevention Week in Cooke County. Poison Prevention Week has been observed in this nation for the past 45 years to call attention to the hazards of household products, medicines, and substances that can be hazardous if not used properly.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORT

### Don't become complacent around livestock

Livestock are a key cause of agricultural-related injuries. Farmers and ranchers who work with livestock need to stay vigilant around those animals.

"Most ranchers and farmers who have cattle and horses like working with animals and interacting with them," North Dakota State University Extension Service veterinarian Charlie Stoltenow says. "The more they work with cattle and horses, the more comfortable they become around the animals. And with that comfort, producers sometimes take their animals for granted. This is a serious and dangerous mistake. Worker safety around cattle and horses requires respect for the animals and concentrating on the task at hand."

Data collected in Colorado from 1997 to 2006 indicated that riding horses, sorting/

penning cattle, and using livestock-handling equipment resulted in the highest rates of injury among cattle/livestock producers and cattle dealers.

Livestock was responsible for the highest percentage of nonfatal agricultural injury claims, the study found. Livestock were responsible for 27% of cattle dealers' injury claims and 22% of claims from cattle/livestock producers.

Livestock injuries represented the highest proportion of high-cost injuries (\$5,000 or more) and the highest proportion of high-severity claims (28 or more days of paid disability). Of those, horses were involved in 38% of injuries for cattle/livestock producers and 27% of injuries for cattle dealers.

A 2002 Kentucky Department of Health Services study indicated that 50%

of cattle-related injuries involved cattle confined for medical procedures or for loading and transport.

Livestock-related injuries do not happen only to adults, Stoltenow says. A study published in 2003 from the University of Kentucky indicated that the injury rate for farm children age 18 or older was 2.8 per 100 children. Boys ages 16 to 18 had an injury rate of 9.2 per 100 children. Cattle and horses were one of the primary external causes of nonfatal farm work injuries in children, the study shows.

The most common types of livestock-related injuries involve animals: stepping on the handler, slipping and falling on the handler, pinning or squeezing the handler against a barrier, and kicking the handler.

Veterinarians are not immune to livestock-related injuries, either, Stoltenow says. A 1998 study based on survey results from 995 veterinarians in Minnesota and Wisconsin indicated that 65% had sustained a major animal-related injury during their career and 17% of these required hospitalization within the past year, with 25% of these requiring surgery. Fifty-two percent of the veterinarians surveyed reported hand injuries, while 28% reported trauma to the arms and 21% reported trauma to the head.

Fatalities related to livestock also are all too common, according to Stoltenow. Information from Oregon State University indicates that bulls are responsible for more than half of all fatalities related to livestock. Three fatalities related to bulls were described in the February 2009 issue of Bovine Veterinarian. A common thread among the cases was lack of respect for the power and speed of the animal, lack of safety precautions, and lack of concentration concerning the task at hand. Bulls account for about 3%

of the cattle population but about 15% of cattle-related injuries.

Recommendations for handling livestock include:

Teaching proper animal-handling techniques based upon animal behavior;

Attending a course in low-stress handling of livestock;

Using well-designed confinement facilities and equipment;

Reducing noise and stress when working with animals;

Making sure only family members of an appropriate age and physical ability undertake livestock-handling tasks.

"Working with livestock should be an enjoyable experience," Stoltenow says. "Think ahead and be prepared. Invest a little money in quality livestock handling equipment. Safety is not an area where a person should try to cut corners. It is too late after a livestock-related injury or death to start thinking about safety."

### Feeding strategies for drought

Drought-stressed pastures are an all-too-common sight right now. Extension Specialists remind us that conservative stocking rates are the most important management practice to implement during these stressful times. With careful management, drought stressed pastures can still be productive. Proper stocking rates and proper nutritional management make getting every pound of production possible from marginal fields.

Bruce Carpenter, Texas AgriLife Extension livestock specialist in Fort Stockton tells us that getting the forage digested during these drought situations is also an important consideration for cattlemen. A minimum of 7% dietary crude protein (CP) is needed for dry cows and about 12% for lactating. This will ensure rumen microbial populations remain high enough to maintain healthy microflora, which promotes forage digestion. If the CP can't be provided by the forage, then a supplement is needed.

When choosing a supple-

ment, a rancher should consider both the amount of protein provided and the amount of starch. While starch increases energy, too much starch can interfere with digestion of roughage.

Supplementation of starch should be done in small amounts on a daily basis. On the other hand, supplementation of protein can be done more infrequently. High-protein supplements of 30% CP or higher can be delivered just one or two times per week. Feeding a 20% cube should involve daily feedings but a 40% cube could be fed as infrequently as once a week at rates as high as 8.75 lbs./head without interfering with forage intake.

### Drought and economy causing decline in cattle numbers

The USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service has released the 2007 Census of Agriculture. Compared to the 2002 Census, number of beef cattle operations declined 4% (dairy operations declined 24%) and the number of beef cows went down 2%.

Average number of beef cows per operation was 42.9 in 2007 and 41.9 in 2002. There were 79% of the beef cow operations with less than 50 cows, containing 29% of the total cow numbers. Texas had over 16% of the beef cows in the U.S. followed by Oklahoma with 6% and no other state with over 2%. (USDA-NASS)

### TDA market recap

For the week ending March 7, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were again uneven and up and down the board, from \$4 lower to mostly steady to \$7 higher. Fed cattle cash prices were near unchanged. Uncertainties about future beef demand and volatile grain prices pressured cattle markets.

Grain prices ended the week modestly higher. Stock markets and crude oil prices continue to be the primary drivers behind fluctuating grain markets.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, and cotton were lower, while wheat, corn, and lumber were higher.

The entire state is in abnormally dry to exceptional drought conditions and topsoil moisture was reported in mostly very short to short supply statewide. Spring fieldwork continued with field preparations and planting underway in many areas. However, dry conditions have slowed progress.

### Agriculture - one of few bright spots in today's economy

Agriculture is one of the few bright spots in today's struggling economy, but that does not mean there aren't challenges, according to some of the leading minds in agricultural policy.

"Agriculture is the kid in school who hasn't got the flu yet," said Dr. David Kohl, professor emeritus of Department of Agriculture and Applied Economics at Virginia Tech, speaking at the Bayer Crop Science Ag Issues Forum held in Grapevine.

While agriculture has tremendous room for growth with food, fiber, and fuel, the current economic volatility—the drastic ups and downs of late—will likely be the new norm, Dr. Kohl said.

Producers will need to think globally and act locally, he added, and the country will need to get back to making ag products in the United States.

Still, farmers and ranchers are poised to make the most of the leanest times, said Murray Wise, another forum speaker and CEO of the Westchester Group Inc., a leading agriculture assets manager.

Wise said farmers are in much better shape to handle the economic downturn than many in other professions. The biggest reason is that most people don't save their money. Farmers do.

In fact, farmers are saving more today than ever. In 1980, producers had \$22 of debt for every \$100 in assets, Wise said. Today, that figure is \$9 debt for every \$100.

Combine that savings figure with the falling land values and the increased need for worldwide food supplies, and farmers should do well in the coming months, he said.
