

DALLAS, Texas, May 29—(P)—Formal filling of the appeal of John W. Brady, former high court judge, who was convicted of murder without malice and sentenced to three years imprisonment here May 17, is expected next week.

Brady was convicted of slaying Miss Lehlia Highsmith, stenographer, in Austin last November 9. His defense was insanity.

John Bond, court reporter, has been working day and night transcribing the record in the case. He estimated it would include nearly 1,000,000 words.

It likely will be three months or longer before the appellate court will act on the appeal. Meanwhile, Brady is at liberty under 25,000 bond.
