TDA market recap

For the week ending Aug. 29, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were steady to \$4 lower per hundredweight, with some to \$6 lower. Fed cattle prices were \$1.50 higher than a week earlier. Meat ended the week slightly higher, grain sorghum was unchanged, and corn prices were slightly lower. As for futures markets, wheat closed the week higher, while feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, corn, and lumber were lower. Topsoil moisture was rated in mostly short to very short. Only Northeast Texas and the Northern High Plans reported mostly adequate moisture supplies. Tatewide, corn harvest is 66% complete. Grain sorghum matured rapidly due to the hot, dry conditions with 61% of the acreage harvested. Field preparations for winter wheat seedings continued, with some producers delaying plant-ing in hopes of receiving moisture. Pastures were rated in mostly fair to very poor condition.

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
