

## Firefighters battle rash of wildfires in area

Low humidity and high winds challenged the endurance of firefighters, many of whom battled long hours with little sleep, as they fought wildfires beginning Sunday, April 5. Fires were not totally extinguished until the area was blessed with rainfalls that began Saturday night, April 11 and ended that next evening.

According to Muenster Volunteer Fire Chief Herbie Knabe, the Muenster VFD responded to 14 calls during that period. He commented, "As everyone knows, was the worst fire week of the year with the high winds and the humidity dropped to about 4%. When humidity drops this low, anything can burn at any time."

The April 5 fire broke out in extremely brushy area at CR 459 and FM 2382 and is referred to as the Bluff Fire. Chief Knabe said, "We had a hard time on the Bluff Fire because of the steep hills and many places we could not get at because of the hills, so we would work other areas of the fire and come back later as they burned up the hill." Knabe noted that in some places there were drop-offs of 100 or more feet and the brush was so thick that it was almost impenetrable. At times, he said you couldn't get more than 300 feet in and the hoses were difficult to manage there.

Cooke County Precinct #4 Foreman Billy Poyner brought the Precinct's dozer to the scene. Other Precinct #4 employees helped as well. Knabe credits them with helping the firefighters out a lot in fighting and containing the fire.

On Tuesday evening, the fire crossed FM 2382, endangering a home. Knabe said that along with Muenster and Myra VFDs, there were five departments from Montague County fighting the

fire. He said their assistance ended abruptly as fire broke out in Montague County and they were called to battle fires there.

The volunteer firefighters from Muenster, Myra, and Saint Jo remained with the Bluff Fire through the night to keep it in check. They were constantly putting out hot spots, according to Knabe.

The Texas Forest Service did a fly over on Thursday to assess the possibility of giving air support, but Chief Knabe said they were put way down on the list as other areas in the State were in more dire need of the assistance.

According to Cooke County Emergency Management Coordinator/County Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher, an abandoned RV and camper as well as a pick up were destroyed in the Bluff Fire (off of CR 459 and FM 2382). Otherwise no structures sustained damage nor were there any injuries reported in Cooke County.

A second fire was reported on Wednesday and Thursday near CR 433. It was called the Breaks Fire. It also burned on a hillside that was difficult for firefighters to work.

Thursday's weather included low humidity and winds that gusted up to 60 m.p.h. Media attention was on Montague and Cooke counties as television and radio coverage reported evacuations of homes, towns, nursing homes, schools, etc. Some were accurate, but others not so.

In Muenster, residents of Saint Richards Villa were transported to the Muenster Hospital or their homes as a precaution. Residents of western Cooke County were warned that they might be required to evacuate. Some residents in the Saint Jo area were temporarily evacuated. The Red Cross, with assistance from the Muenster Jaycees, set up a shelter for them in the Muenster Junior High gymnasium and a few did come until the fire danger passed.

Fire swept through the small towns of Sunset and Stoneburg in Montague County leaving homes in piles of rubble and ashes. According to news reports, former WFAA TV reporter Matt Quinn and his wife Cathy died Thursday in rural Montague County as fire blazed through their property. Cattle could be seen lying dead along the roadsides having lost their lives to either fire or smoke.

"Thursday proved to be very challenging because we had two fires going at one time," reported Chief Knabe. "This was the day that weather played a large part in all the fires in Cooke and Montague counties," he said.

About Thursday, Fletcher reported, "We had eight wildfires in Cooke County. A couple were carry over fires from earlier in the week that re-ignited and the rest new. We had approximately 1,500 acres burned, but fortunately didn't have any structures damaged or injuries reported. All fire departments in Cooke County assisted with the response and did a great job under very difficult conditions! We also had a task force from Grayson County come over to assist and they ended up in Montague County. We also used the CodeRed System to notify residents in the central west side of the County to prepare for a possible evacuation because of a fire burning into Cooke County and Montague County."

According to Chief Knabe, the closest the fires came to Muenster was about eight miles. The air carried a choking smoky smell for a couple of those days, especially on Thursday and Friday.

Myra, Moss Lake, Lindsay, and Callisburg assisted at times during this period of fire fighting, Knabe noted. "At least three or four times during this we had two or

## Muenster launches 34th Annual Germanfest celebration on April 24

Since 1976, Muenster has been celebrating its German heritage with an annual event - Germanfest. This festival, has grown in size and variety from a small beginning on the grounds of Sacred Heart Parish to a large three-day event held in the Muenster City Park.

This year, Germanfest will be Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, April 24, 25, and 26. Entertainment will be staged from three main areas, MSB Texas Stage, Tanze Halle, and Children's Stage. Opening ceremonies are set for Friday at 6 p.m. in the Tanze Halle.

Featured Friday night in the Tanze Halle will be Alpenfest, a Germanfest favorite. The group has performed at festivals in Minnesota, Texas, and Wisconsin, and been on tour in Bavaria and Austria. On the MSB Texas Stage that evening will be Roger & Bill, Happy Wanderers, Alley Kat, and Ida Road.

Saturday's list of entertainers for the Texas Stage includes Brave Combo, Valina Polka, Willey Kicket, Mike Valliere, Shayne Wimmer & the Bois D'Arcs, Hard Nights Day, and to close the evening Reckless Kelly.

Featured in the Tanze Halle on Saturday are Happy Wanderers, Alpenfest, Rockin Red River Cloggers, Valina Polka, The Polka Kings, and closing Alpenmusikanten.

Side Street Circus will be bringing their magic, mime, music, and juggling to delight the crowds at the Children's Stage on both Saturday and Sunday. Track and Friends joins the entertainment lineup Saturday and Baloonytik Betty is slated for Sunday. Also in the children's area will be a rock climbing wall, balloon sculpture, face painting, sand art, and more. Carnival rides, sponsored by the Muenster Kiwanis organization, roll all week-end.

Tanze Halle entertainment on Sunday includes Alpenfest, Valina Polka, and Side Street Circus.

Texas Stage entertainment slated for Sunday includes Brave Combo, Valina Polka, Mark David Manders, Vince Vance and the Valiants, and Alley Kat.

Besides the assortment of entertainment, visitors to Germanfest can choose between culinary treats that range from simple and delicious American fare to German menus that include sausage, sauerkraut, and German potato salad, and stru-

rels. The Lone Star Barbecue Association presents a sanctioned Barbecue Cook-Off, sponsored by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce. It takes place on grounds adjoining the west end of the park. On Saturday, the Sacred Heart School Alumni and Supporters sponsor the 29th Annual Metric Century Bicycle rally. It begins at 11 a.m. and offers courses that wind through the wildflower speckled hills of areas around Muenster.

The 34th Annual German Fun Run takes place on Sunday and offers a 5K or 15K run. Both begin at noon

Admission is \$6 per person on Friday and Sunday and \$10 on Saturday. Anyone in complete German costume is admitted free to Germanfest.

Germanfest hours are Friday 4 p.m. to midnight; Saturday 11 a.m. to midnight; and Sunday 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.

three incidents going at one time," he remarked. "Thanks to our 29 membership, we had the personnel and equipment to keep going."

"It took all VFDs, Cooke County Precinct #4 equipment (maintainer, dozer, and track loader), County employees running equipment, and at one time Precinct #1 brought a large tanker to assist. Thanks to Commissioner (Leon) Klement we also had fuel for the trucks when we needed it." At one point, there were 24 of the 29 members on calls.

Wind blew embers about 1/2 mile east of the Bluff Fire igniting a third fire on property owned by Adam Wolf.

The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department logged 661 hours on all calls from April 5 to 11. Those hours were actual on the scene hours. They do not include time spent at the fire station doing repairs on the trucks and equipment to be ready for the next call.

Commissioner Klement reported that the Precinct #4 County employees spent 106.5 hours working at the fires in western Cooke County. He called his employees first on Sunday, April 5 to assist with fires deep inside the brushy areas at the Bluff Fire (CR 429 and FM 2382). They were also asked to assist at the Break Fire (CR 461 and FM 2382). Time is recorded in hopes that there may be some reimbursement by FEMA.

Total equipment time logged for Precinct #4 was 30 hours with a truck and 500 gallon tanker with pump hauling water to load trucks as needed; 35.5 hours with pickups for supervisor for hauling fuel and assisting with traffic control; and 41 hours with graders and bulldozers pushing fire breaks and fire lines in an attempt to stop the blaze.

Klement remarked, "I'm very proud of the way the guys worked. All were willing to help. The firemen did a great job. We should all be real appreciative of the work they do. Precinct #4 was glad to be able to assist at the fires. I'm really proud of how they all worked together. The firemen did most of the work. My group was happy to assist."

On April 10, Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell also came to the aid of firefighters in western Cooke County. He sent an 8,000 gallon semi-trailer tank to Bulcher to fill water tanks and a 3,000 gallon tanker in Muenster. Each piece of equipment had a Precinct #1 employee sent to operate it. Commissioner Hollowell

himself used a pickup providing gasoline when needed to keep the pumper engines, ATVs and other equipment running.

Commissioner Hollowell said that he and his employees were happy to be able to support the folks in Precinct #4.

Precinct #3 was busy assisting with a fire in that part of Cooke County and they were assisted by Precinct #2.

Fletcher remarked, "Several structures were threatened and saved throughout the days of highest fire activity. All four precincts aided with equipment, fuel, or water tankers, and a task force of Cooke County VFDs went to Forestburg on Friday to assist in containment efforts."

Chief Knabe said that there were a lot of individuals to be thankful to as they provided assistance of various kinds from providing

equipment to supplying food and drink to the tired and hungry firefighters. At the peak time, he estimates between 40 and 50 firefighters fighting the tenacious blaze.

Red Cross and a group of people from Saint Jo provided drinks and sandwiches to the firefighters, he said.

All involved expressed great relief that the fires were extinguished. The needed rain came just in time to get the volunteers back to their families to celebrate Easter, but not without interruption. The Muenster Fire Department was called out twice to weather spot.

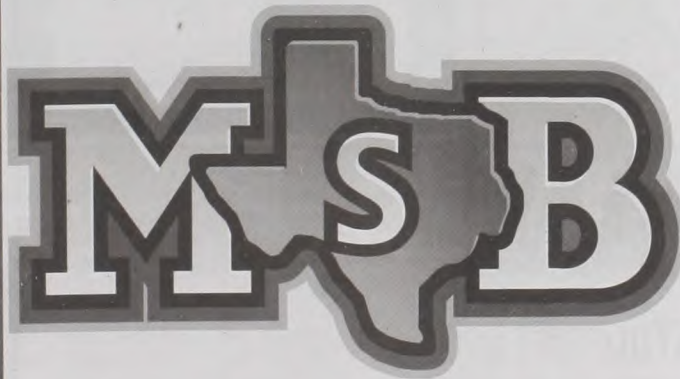

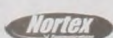

## Farm Bureau members to help guide state highway planning

Several members of Texas Farm Bureau, including Kenneth Sicking of Cooke County FB, will assist in the planning of future state highway projects following their selection to serve on the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) segment committees for the I-35 and I-69 highway corridors.

"Having a seat at the table of state highway planning projects will carry tremendous importance as our state's population continues to grow," said Kenneth Dierschke, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. "These two highway corridors, in particular, were major battlegrounds in the past as TxDOT advanced its agenda for the ill-conceived Trans-Texas Corridor. Having our members in place will help ensure property owners and rural Texans have a voice in the process."

Texas Farm Bureau has conducted a major effort since last summer to have TxDOT recognize the need to include "the very people who stand to lose property from highway expansion," Dierschke said.

The segment committees—

## TDA MARKET RECAP

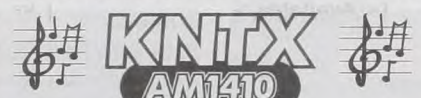
For the week ending April 11, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$4 higher per hundredweight, with some as much as \$10 higher. Fed cattle prices also increased in response to higher beef prices.

Wheat prices declined under pressure from large global supplies and a strong U.S. dollar. As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, and cotton ended the week higher, while wheat, and corn were lower.

The wheat crop remains in mostly very poor to poor condition, with 33% of the acreage now headed. Corn planting progressed to 59% complete, slightly behind the normal pace, and grain sorghum was 52% planted.

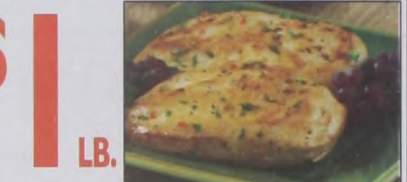
