

## Co. Commissioners submit road reports

Commissioners from all four precincts submitted their annual Road Reports. All were approved.

On the condition of each road, culvert, and bridge in Precinct #4, Commissioner Leon Klement reported, "We had just recovered from the flood of 2006 when we experienced another flood in May of 2009. There was considerable road and bridge damage, some severe. Several bridge approaches and culverts were washed away. Some roads were severely damaged with loss of gravel, deep ditches, etc. To the best of my knowledge, all roads and bridges are in fairly good condition again, but there is still quite a lot of repair to be done."

Klement reported that about 60 to 70% of the traffic control devices (signs) in Precinct #4 were defaced, torn down, or vandalized. He noted that he is still attempting right-of-way acquisition and re-routing of CR 413 and construction of new bridge. He said of the flood damage, "An accurate dollar amount is difficult to determine at this time, but repair costs will surely take a large portion of the road improvement budget."

The amount of money Klement feels is necessary for maintenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year is \$1,371,292. He estimates that CR 413 will cost \$45,000, CR 403 \$48,000, and CR 404 \$54,000 to resurface. Availability of materials will limit the amount of work.

Remaining budgeted dollars are for continual general improvements and maintenance of all Precinct 4 county roads and will be utilized as traffic, weather, hazards, or conditions dictate.

Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith reported, "To the best of my knowledge each road, bridge, and culvert are in good condition."

The amount of money necessary for maintenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year is \$1,348,500. Smith noted the number of traffic control devices in the precinct defaced or torn down was 54 road number signs and 16 traffic control signs which have been replaced. No new roads are planned.

According to Smith, "All major bridges and culverts have been inspected by TxDOT Wichita Falls District and are in good condition. Remaining budgeted dollars will be utilized for continual improvements of Precinct 3 that are damaged and in need of repair as traffic, weather, and hazards dictate."

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell reported, "We were just recovering from the 2006 floods and beginning to see significant improvements throughout the precinct when we experienced another flood in May 2009. The roads were damaged considerably, mirroring the 2006 floods with bridge approaches and culverts washed away. Water cut the roads and created hazards. To the best of my knowledge the roads, bridges, culverts, and parts therein, are in reasonably good condition and we will once again work to make them better."

He estimated the amount of money necessary for maintenance of the precinct roads during the next fiscal year at \$1,336,529.

Hollowell noted that the number of traffic control devices in the precinct defaced or torn down varies daily and replacement is ongoing. "We continue to have a problem with theft and vandalism," he said.

No new roads are planned. Hollowell said, "As a result of the recent flood, several culverts and bridge approaches were undermined. We are still identifying problems, weeks later, as sink holes appear. We will strive daily to keep the roads in good condition and address hazards; however, it would be difficult to place a cost estimate on repairs or improvements at this time. Repair cost will certainly consume a large portion of any monies budgeted toward improvements."

Precinct #2's report was not available as of press time. Commissioner Klement was appointed to the Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson County Juvenile Detention Board.

Jason Brinkley, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 4 was appointed to the Cooke County Sick Leave Pool Administrative Committee.

June 24 was proclaimed Cooke County United Way's Day of Caring. Its purpose is to promote volunteerism in the County and to help people become more aware of the good works done by groups in the County.

During Public Comments, Dick Sparkman, a resident in Precinct #4, asked Commissioners Court to consider using sales tax money from unincorporated areas of the County to establish a library district in unincorporated areas of the County. There are a number of such districts established in Texas, he said.

- In other business, Commissioners Court:
- Approved road reports for FY 2008-09 for Precincts 1, 2, 3, and 4.
  - Approved Cooke County Appraisal District (CCAD) budget for FY 2009-10 by a vote of 4-1. The budget included 5% raises for employees both on the appraisal and collection side. Commissioner Gary Hollowell voted against the budget. See ROADS, pg. 5

## Lindsay Board prepares for 2009-10 year

On June 15, the Lindsay Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a regular called meeting to conduct business for the school district. Several items concerning the 2009-10 school year was discussed.

Tom Zimmerer, business consultant for the District, discussed the summary of finances and the effects of the recently closed legislative session. He recommended that a budget workshop be scheduled with the Board in early July for the 2009-10 budget year.

Superintendent Dennis Holt presented information to the Board as it related to repairs that will need to be made to the classrooms in the west wing of the High School.

Superintendent Holt presented bids on repairs to the football field parking lot and sealing the parking lot at the high school gym. He will seek proposals to include work on the parking lot between the ag building and old gym, the football field parking lot, and sealing the new gym parking lot. These bids will be presented at the July meeting.

After reconvening from an executive session, the Board voted to hire Darrel Westbrook as the new high school math teacher. They also accepted the resignation of Elementary Principal Kim Otto.

## MM Hospital Board selects insurance plan for employees

With the time to sign up for another year of insurance coverage looming, the Muenster Hospital District Board of Directors had to make some prudent decisions. For several years, the Hospital has used a self-insurance plan to cover the medical needs of its employees. When it was initiated, it seemed to be the most financially wise choice. More expensive insurance claims over the past year or two shifted things and self insurance has become a big expense to the District.

At the Tuesday, June 16 meeting of the Board of Directors, the insurance choices were discussed. Their three choices were self-funded, health savings account, and a fully insured plan.

As Heller explained, the savings plan would almost be like the employee not hav-

ing insurance. It would save a lot for the Hospital.

Aetna's fully insured plan was Heller's recommendation. "This is an opportunity to move to the fully insured and get away from the self-funded," Heller noted.

Currently the employees pay \$36 per pay period toward their insurance, with the Hospital covering the remainder. With the fully insured plan, Administrator Heller recommended waiving the premium cost to the employee, a savings to each of about \$1,000 a year. Also, the deductible is waived when an employee sees a doctor at the MMH Health Clinic. He suggested collecting the co-pay since the employees would have the amount saved by not paying the \$36 each pay period toward the insurance. It was a unanimous vote

by the Board to contract with Aetna, to waive the premium charge to the employees, and to begin charging the co-pay at the Clinic, as recommended.

A report was given on a meeting held with the Facilities Committee and architect, engineer, and draftsman regarding the Phase III Hospital Improvements. They are preparing the final drawings, cost quotes, etc. in order to get the project to the bid stages with the Board's approval.

The proposed 2009-10 budget was approved. Heller reported that the Hospital District now has a mailbox across the street from the Hospital. This was done because any mail sent to the street address instead of the P.O. address is returned to the sender. This occurred

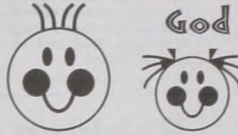

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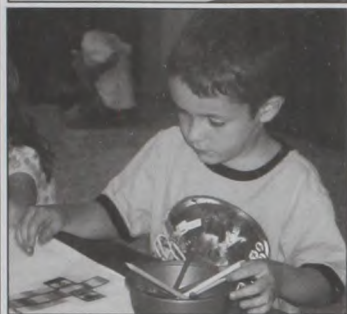
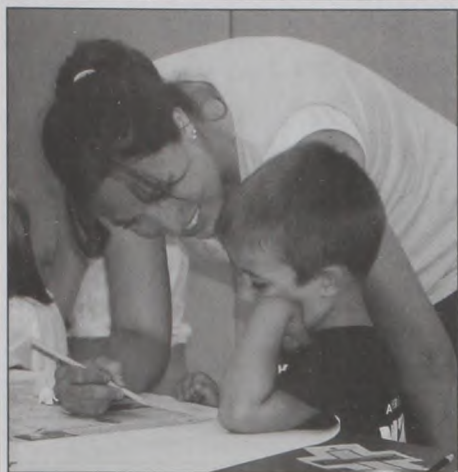

Financial statistics for May showed a net revenue of \$791,128 with operating expenses of \$562,600 for a net operating revenue of \$228,528. Revenues from ad valorem taxes in the amount of \$3,763 were collected in May and the SRV lease revenue of \$2,295 produced an excess of revenues over expenses in the amount of \$234,586 for May.

Percent of occupancy was 70.79% during May. The combined average daily census was 12.74 and the combined average length of stay was 3.14.

Bad Debt write offs totaling \$28,251.98 were approved.

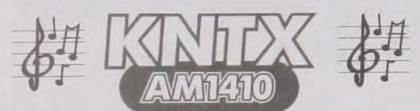

## Campbell makes his 09 picks

Dave Campbell's 2009 Texas Football, with their Golden Anniversary celebration continuing, hit the newsstands last week. Known as the Southwest's leading football source, Campbell's covers pros, college, and 1300 Texas high schools.

In the private and parochial schools of Texas, Sacred Heart Catholic School Tigers got a mention along with the three other teams in Division IV, District 1.

Coach Dale Schilling has seven returning starters from his 2008 Semi-Finalist team. Players to watch include wide receivers John Krawietz and Kyle Knabe, and defensive linemen Josiah Yosten and Gene Yosten. Top juniors are quarterback Matt Hesse and linebacker Alex Turner, and top sophomore is back Josh Biffle.

"The Tigers could again experience success because QB Hesse returns to lead the offense and will have two able targets in Krawietz and Knabe," notes the magazine. On defense, six starters return, including Yosten, Yosten, Turner, and Hesse.

The Tigers finished the season with a 9-4 record, 4-0 in district play.

Also in TAPPS District 1 are the Amarillo Arbor Christian Lions, with a winless district and one victory season last year. This will be the Lions second year in 11 man football, with many of last year's players returning.

Fort Worth Lake Country Christian Eagles finished 2-2 in district in '08. "More players and more experience should lead to more wins," notes the article. All-State kicker/punter Kevin Gonzalez returns to the Eagles special teams.

The Watauga Harvest Christian Saints have 16 returning starters, so "this could be a year of improvement." The Saints won only two games last season.

Shifting to UIL, District 13A, Collinsville, Muenster, and Lindsay are the three predicted playoff teams. Era and Blue Ridge finish up the District.

Preseason Offensive MVP is Muenster Hornet quarterback Levi Trubenbach,

with Robert Arend of Lindsay chosen Defensive MVP. Key game for the season is in Week 10, Collinsville at Lindsay.

The Hornets of Muenster finished with a 6-6 record, 2-2 in District, as Division II Area Finalist. Players to watch include quarterback Levi Trubenbach, wide receiver Eric Hellman, defensive end Corey Sicking, lineman Jeremy Lutkenhaus, and defensive back T.J. Acuna. Top juniors are Garrett Walterscheid and Jason Luke. Top sophomore is Dalton Koelzer. Other prospects listed were Steven Valliere, Aaron Flusche, and Dillon Bayer.

"The Hornets made a huge jump from 1-9 in '07 to 6-6 and the playoffs." Trubenbach is credited for 1,652 yards, 16 passing TDs, and 10 rushing TDs. Hellman "is a huge target on offense and a big obstacle on defense for the Hornets," and Walterscheid is "another dual threat." Luke makes it a trio of "top targets on a potentially explosive offensive unit."

The Lindsay Knights finished last season as a Regional Semi-Finalist, with a 3-1 district record. Players to watch are Ross Jones, Ryan Haverkamp, Robert Arend, and Madison Parkhill, with other prospects Dax Fleitman, Frank Cornett, Greg Luttmer, and Blake Hunter.

"Playing in a brutal district helped prepare the Knights for a long playoff run," the magazine states. "Lindsay has the weapons to play at least 13 games again this season, including an abundance of talent on special teams with kicker Jones and punter Haverkamp, who can hurt teams with his legs in more ways than one." Arend led the team with 96 tackles.

The Hornets of Era have seven starters returning from a 2-2 district finish. "The Hornets return good numbers from a team that did everything but make the playoffs a year ago." Quarterback Nathan Metzler and receiver Trey Dunn "have the potential to be a dangerous combination through the air."

The Collinsville Pirates, Division 1 representative, return a good number of starters from a Bi-District Finalist team, but the coach will be "relying on inexperienced players in most key positions." Sophomore Chase Medler is a solid prospect after earning the District's Newcomer of the Year award. Collinsville will enter the season as the No. 22 team.

The Tigers of Blue Ridge dropped in classification a year ago, and won two games after going 0-10 in '07, but finished the District 0-4. Quarterback Jace Koonce, along with Brennan Smith, Dylan Dyer, and Zach Rainwater highlight the team. Also in District 9, Muenster is one of five dark horses, a team that did not earn preseason ranking, but should not be ignored.

Knight Ross Jones was picked as the preseason All-State kicker, while Ryan Haverkamp is a "money player."

In other local teams, the Forestburg Longhorns young team returns only two starters to the District 10 6-man, Div. 2 team. Texas Football sees the District playing out with Fannindel in the lead, followed by Gold-Burg, Forestburg, and Byers.

Saint Jo is picked the leader of District 11 6-man, Div. 1 over Greenville Phoenix and Irving Universal. Returning four starters, "the Panthers will likely rule the weakest district in the state again." Joey Lindenborn was named preseason Defensive MVP.

The Callisburg Wildcats went three rounds into the playoffs. "With 23 seniors back, there's no reason to believe they can't at least match that finish." Members of District 10 2A, the 'Cats will compete against Pilot Point, Aubrey, Pottsboro, Valley View, and S&S.

Gainesville and Whitesboro are at the bottom of District 9, 3A. The Leopards were winless in district play last year (only two wins all season). Celina, Prosper, and Argyle led the District, with Sanger, the largest student count school, falling into 4th place.

## Look for changes in 2010 realignment

## A few beef export markets remain strong, but total exports expected to fall in 2009

U.S. beef exports are expected to decline about 8% in 2009 to 1.744 billion pounds. Although affected by weak foreign demand overall and a stronger U.S. dollar compared with last year, some export markets have experienced growth so far this year. Exports to Japan have increased 19% year-to-date through April and continued to be higher than last year through May, according to FAS Export Sales reports. The Japanese yen has strengthened against the U.S. dollar compared with last year, unlike most other trading partners' currencies, which has kept U.S. beef more affordable in Japan. Exports to Vietnam have also increased by 74%

## TDA market report

For the week ending June 20, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$3 lower per hundredweight, with a few areas \$2 higher. Recent declines in finished cattle prices and ongoing losses by cattle feeders continue to pressure the market. Fed cattle prices were near unchanged from a week ago.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, and lumber were higher, while wheat, corn, and cotton were lower.

Most areas of the state reported only scattered showers during the week, while parts of Central Texas recorded up to eight inches of rain. Topsoil moisture was rated mostly short to adequate statewide.

Wheat harvest is up to 53% harvested. Cotton planting was 95% complete and 15% of the acreage is squaring. Grain sorghum planting was nearing completion on the High Plains, while the South Texas crop is nearing maturity.

Pastures were reported to be in mostly fair to good condition and needing rain in many areas.

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## Commodity Focus: Texas Grains

Grains play an important role in Texas' growing agriculture industry. Grains such as corn, wheat, and sorghum rank third among Texas' top agricultural commodities with a combined annual production value of \$2.7 billion.

The 271 million bushels of corn produced in Texas in 2008 are enough to make 14 billion boxes of corn flakes, while the 99 million bushels of wheat harvested account for six billion loaves of bread. Grains are not only essential to keeping people fed - they are also used to make feed for animals in Texas' productive livestock industry, which brings in about \$11.4 billion in sales annually.

Texas grains are now playing an increasing role in the fuel industry. The primary source of renewable fuel is grain-based ethanol, with one bushel of corn producing 2.8 gallons of ethanol.

Drought conditions over the winter will likely reduce the size of the upcoming 2009 wheat crop in some parts of Texas. Topsoil moisture levels have been low during the fall and winter, making it difficult for wheat plants to establish a root system and develop normally.

But Texas crops may receive some much-needed relief soon. Spring is normally a wet time of year in most parts of Texas. Also, the weather pattern causing the drought, La Niña, is weakening and could possibly mean more rain during the remainder of 2009.

through April.

However, some of the United States' largest export markets remain well below last year. Mexico and Canada, which accounted for 55% of U.S. exports in 2008, have been down 19% and 15%, respectively. Exports to South Korea have continued to decline from the beginning of the year. Retail sales of American beef in South Korean supermarkets increased when several of the major retailers started stocking their shelves with U.S. beef in late 2008, but have fallen substantially since the beginning of the calendar year. Declining South Korean imports of beef from Australia and New Zealand, the largest foreign suppliers in 2008, suggest a general weakening demand for imported beef in the country.

The U.S. dollar continues to weaken in the second quarter, after sharply strengthening in late 2008 and into the first few months of 2009. While weak foreign demand for U.S. beef remains a major hurdle in many regions of the world, continuing weakness in the U.S. dollar would help U.S. beef exports. In 2010, exports are expected to increase just over 9%, to 1.905 billion pounds, as foreign demand will likely improve as the global economy recovers from the current recession.

Lawn fertilization program.

The best way to determine whether your lawn requires additional plant nutrients is to have the soil tested. Soil tests are easy and inexpensive. Forms and instructions are available through your county Extension office or on the Texas A&M Soil Testing Laboratory's Web site (<http://soiltesting.tamu.edu>).

Soil tests determine the amount of nutrients that are available in the soil for plant use. The soil test also determines soil pH (whether the soil is acid or alkaline), which can affect soil nutrient availability.

A soil test report will help you understand which nutrients your soil lacks and which are present in adequate amounts. The test results will include recommendations on the amounts of plant nutrients that would benefit your lawn. The soil test will not provide an annual recommendation for nitrogen, which is the nutrient used in the greatest amount by lawn grasses. Your management style will have more bearing on the amount of nitrogen you wish to apply.

Once you know what your soil lacks, it is important to know the size of your lawn so that you can apply the correct amount of fertilizer, successfully avoiding both under-fertilization and over-fertilization.

Lawn care products are often recommended in amounts to apply per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Once you know what your soil needs and how big your lawn is, you can select a fertilizer that will give the grass the nutrients it requires and calculate the amount of that fertilizer to buy.

Some grass species do well with only low to moderate amounts of applied nitrogen. Other grass species, such as the hybrid bermudagrasses, often require moderate to high levels for acceptable quality. In general, Texas lawns usually need a low rate of nitrogen applied once in the spring and, if needed, once again in the fall no later than six weeks before the expected first frost. It's best to split the fertilizer into two smaller applications rather than make one heavy application.

If your lawn management level is moderate or high, you will probably need to make additional nitrogen applications each year.

It is best to fertilize grass when it is actively growing and able to take up the fertilizer. Bermudagrass needs between two and five lbs of nitrogen fertilizer per 1000 square feet of lawn depending on the intensity of your lawn management. St. Augustine needs between one and four pounds, with less being needed in shady areas.

Timing and number of nitrogen applications for lawns depends on the management level.

Low management - Apply nitrogen during the spring and/or late growing season. This program works where one or two applications are adequate.

Moderate management - In addition to the low-level program applications, make one additional supplemental summer application to enhance turf density and overall quality.

High management - In addition to the low-level program applications, make two to three supplemental summer applications to enhance quality as needed.

Proper lawn fertilization will help to make the grass healthy and lush.

Care must be taken to eliminate excess fertilization because it leads to runoff. This not only wastes money, but is a source of environmental damage because of excessive algal growth in downstream, urban water sources and/or eutrophication of ponds and creeks.
