

## Fair weather draws large crowd to Christkindlmarkt

Sunshine, warm temperatures, and light wind provided a perfect day for Muenster's Annual Christmas Parade and Christkindlmarkt on Saturday. There were more than 50 entries in the Parade. Many carried out the Parade theme "A Frontier Christmas."  
Muenster Chamber of Commerce Secretary Margie Starke said it was one of the biggest parades ever in Muenster and it had a very large audience lining the sidewalks of Muenster's Main Street.

## Muenster native meets Pope

"It was a very enlightening experience and a spiritual experience as well," remarked Sr. Francesca Walterscheid of her trip to Italy. "It was great meeting all the people of the Diocese."

The Muenster Native was among 525 people from the Fort Worth Diocese who accompanied Bishop Kevin Vann to Italy from Nov. 9-16. It was made in celebration of the 40th anniversary of the foundation of the Fort Worth Diocese.

An audience with Pope Benedict XVI at the Vatican yielded the highlight of the trip. The entire group was present for the Pope's talk, but about 20 from the group were selected by Bishop Vann to sit in an area near the Pope. From that group, Bishop Vann invited two people to go up and personally greet the Pope. Sr. Francesca and Monsignor Charles King, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church in Denton, were the two chosen to represent the group.

"I never expected this," Sr. Francesca said of the opportunity to meet the Pope. "It just happened I guess you'd say. It was quite an experience I must say."  
Sister said that she was very calm. "Two by two, we'd go up these steps and they (the people) were from different countries," Sr. Francesca recalled. "I guess it is hard for the Pope to change languages I would think."

Each pair had only a few seconds with the Pope, said Sister. "It was just a greeting," she noted. "I told him my name. Msgr. King said he was Msgr. King with the Fort Worth Diocese with the pilgrimage for our 40th anniversary. He said that spiel, so I said in German, 'Mein namen iz Walterscheid von Munster, Texas wir liben sie. I said it in a German accent because he speaks German. He's from Germany.' The brief conversation and shaking hands was all that there was time for during that meeting.

During the two-hour event, the Pope spoke to the audience in seven languages. He

spoke to each country represented in its language. Sr. Francesca wasn't sure what the Pope said because with a crowd of 9,000 present, there was some noise. Msgr. King told her that Pope Benedict thanked them and greeted them.

Born and raised in Muenster, Sr. Francesca is the daughter of August and Anna Hesse Walterscheid. Her mother was the first baby born in the new town of Muenster. She attended Sacred Heart School, graduating in 1946. That fall, she entered the convent of Our Lady of Victory in Fort Worth. She went to Our Lady of Victory College and then began teaching mostly primary grades. Her teaching career spanned 23 years. Sr. Francesca was then called to

administration for 24 years. She worked with the sick in the infirmary area. "I'm here just helping out in the retirement center," remarked the spry octogenarian.

Sr. Francesca has many nieces and nephews and a sister-in-law in Muenster. Excitement for Sister's meeting with Pope Benedict spread quickly through Muenster as relatives and friends heard and shared her happy news.

Sr. Francesca visited Italy 43 years ago. "Our mother house is in Belgium and it wasn't that far," she said. "I went with a few other sisters. I was much younger." Sr. Francesca turned 82 on Dec. 4.

## Locals make pilgrimage to Rome

A group from Muenster joined more than 500 others from the Diocese of Fort Worth on a pilgrimage to Rome to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Diocese. Laura Stoffels, Pat Wimmer, Peggy Gobble, Sug Bindel, Shirley Grewing, Amber Parsons, Charlotte Hermes, Connie Filloon, Lisa Schilling, Donna Biffle, Cliff and

Cathy Sicking, Judith Hess, Ramona Felderhoff, Peggy Walterscheid, and Kay Pagel departed on Friday, Nov. 6, and landed in Milan. From there they went to Padua where they visited the Basilica of St. Anthony, where the saint is buried. Next was Venice. Unfortunately water didn't just fill the canals; it poured that

day and they had to walk through knee-deep water at one point.

The following day, they went to Florence and visited the beautiful Basilica of San Lorenzo. From there they departed for Rome. That evening, the group went for Mass at St. Paul Outside the Walls where the apostle Paul is buried. The inside of the church has portraits of the Popes throughout the ages. Those of us who arrived that Tuesday, Nov. 10, did not make it to the Mass, but did get to see the church. Those arriving with me were my sister Elizabeth "Betty" Baker and Gary, Mary, and Lisa Endres.

The following day, we all went to a papal audience where Pope Benedict XVI spoke about St. Martin of Tours whose feast it was that day. Each group was introduced to the Pope, including the group of 500 from the Diocese of Fort Worth. We went through the Vatican museum and were awed by sculptures, tapestries, architecture, and the Sistine Chapel. Some of us also went through the basement at St. Peter's Basilica and saw the tombs of St. Peter, Pope John Paul VI, and other popes. That evening, we went to Mass at St. Peter's at the altar of the Chair of St. Peter. The chair that St. Peter used to teach from is bronzed and situated above the altar.

The next day, we took a scenic ride by motor coach to Assisi to visit the Church of St. Claire and the Basilica of St. Francis. At the Church of St. Claire, we saw the incorrupt body of Saint Claire. We attended Mass at the Basilica of St. Francis that

contains frescoes depicting the life of St. Francis. His remains are kept on the lower level of the Basilica. It also contains the habit worn by St. Francis and articles he used during his life. Afterward, we went to the Basilica of St. Mary of the Angels built over the place where St. Francis died.

The following morning, we attended Mass at the Jubilee Church which is built in the form of a ship. The roof looks like giant sails. After Mass, we toured St. John Lateran Church. It was one of the first churches in Rome and was built at the beginning of the 4th century over property belonging to the Laterani family. Across the street from the church are the "Holy Stairs" - 28 steps from Pontius Pilate's praetorium brought to Italy by St. Helena. Most of us took advantage of the chance to go up stairs prayerfully on our knees. It wasn't as difficult as it sounds - the original stairs are covered with wood.

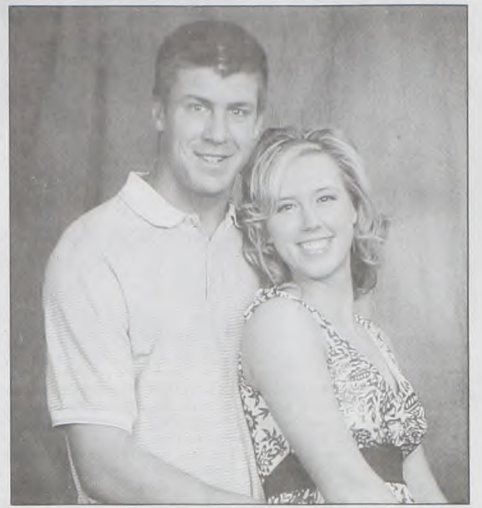
From there we went to the catacombs. The catacombs are actually burial grounds for many Christians also met there for Mass during times of persecution.

The next day, we traveled to churches in the towns of Orvieto and Bolsena. Both are related to a Eucharistic miracle that occurred at Bolsena when a priest was consecrating a host and it began bleeding. The stained corporal is in a chapel in the celebrated church at Orvieto. The beautiful church there took 200 years to build. St. Christina's Church at Bolsena contains sections of the floor that were stained by the blood from the miracle of the Eucharist. The church is also built over the remains of the martyr St. Christina.

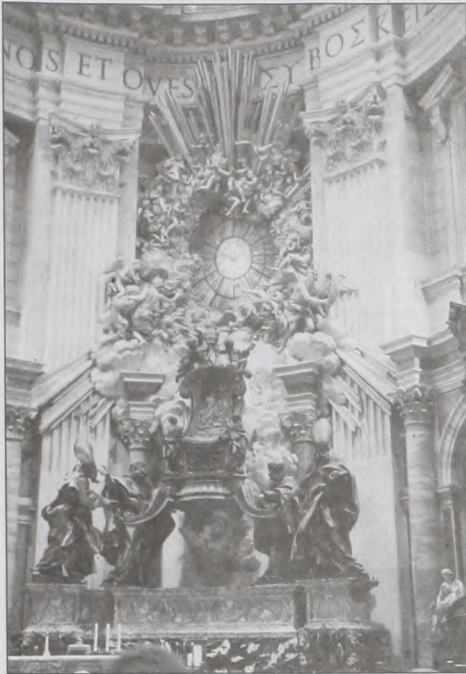
On the last day of our stay in Italy, we had several options. Some of the Muenster group went to Pompeii to view the well-preserved ruins left behind when Mount Vesuvius erupted. Some went to Montecassino where St. Benedict began a monastery and wrote his famous rule. It was destroyed by bombing during World War II, but has been rebuilt by using the old plans. That evening, we had a closing Mass at St. Mary Maggiori's church followed by an evening tour of Rome.

The next day, we returned to Texas after this "once in a lifetime experience."

Besides, all of the regular therapy groups at Doc's have had a miraculous recovery and are no longer in need of their regularly scheduled sessions. If in the future any of the groups have a relapse, then perhaps Doc's will again be "just what the doctor ordered".

Welcome to the fifth article chronicling the Centennial Celebration of the Muenster Knights of Columbus Council #1459 (1910-2010). Remember that Jan. 16, 2010 starts off a year of celebrations, beginning with the Mass and Centennial banquet. Many other events will take place throughout 2010 that will be fun and exciting for the community.

In continuing with the decade of the '40s, I'll mention briefly some of the history of the Council that may be of interest. Roy R. Endres, (1915-61) was born in Iowa and served his country in WWII. After the war, he farmed for a short time in Muenster until he began working at the local Farmers Market Association, advancing to the top job as manager. In 1939, he purchased a part of the Muenster Milling Company where he was the manager until a heart attack in 1946 sidelined him.

Joe Fisher was the next Grand Knight. Many of you probably remember Joe from Fischer's Market. He and his brother John started the meat market in 1927 where the present AMPI building sits today. Born and raised here in Muenster, Joe was very active in all community activities and also played minor league baseball in the Texas/Oklahoma Baseball League.

Nick Miller also served Council #1459 as Grand Knight. Nick was very active in the Fourth Degree Knights. I can still see him (he was the Boy Scout Scout Master) in his full regalia at church functions. That long sword kept my attention, as I was never one of his favorite Scouts!

Closing out the decade, L.J. Baumhart (GK 1949-50) led the local council. Mr. Baumhart lived in Muenster only a few years. His son and I were in the same grade in elementary school and were close buddies, but I lost contact after the family moved to the Metroplex.

Enough history! Now let's talk 2010. Most everyone in Muenster has received their invitation to the big celebration on Jan. 16 at Sacred

Heart Church and concluding with a formal banquet and program at Winstar World Casino. The event should be a great evening for all.
