ife Research photo by Blair Fannin). "We're seeing consumers increasing purchases of mid-dle cuts of beef, so we're see-ing a trading up of purchas-ing," he said. "I think that's an indication that consum-ers may be starting to feel somewhat more comfortable when it comes to grocery purchases, and so far that seems to be sustaining from what we're seeing with the wholesale market activity." On the supply side, cattle producers have been reduc-ing cow herds as a result of sharp input increases and the Texas drought. "Texas especially cut cow

numbers due to the drought," Anderson said. "What we can expect is to see some produc-ers think about restocking herds as there is more talk about a rally in the calf mar-

herds as there is more talk about a rally in the calf mar-ket." Texas cattle auctions have seen an upswing in prices recently. The 500-pound to 600-pound steer prices have been as high as \$1.20 per pound. "Higher calf prices encour-age people to reinvest in their operations. However, we continue to cull cows at a fast clip. Why? There's been so much demand on the con-sumer side for ground beef purchases that the cull cow market has been very attrac-tive."

market has been very attrac-tive." The biggest risk in the current market is the future of calf prices and prices paid for corn. If ample rains hit the corn-growing regions of the U.S., supplies will be ample to fulfill both livestock and ethanol demands. "We need good timely rains to produce a good crop." he said. "For several years now, we ve had good growing con-ditions. Another thing is we need the economy to con-tinue to recover to keep beef demand going up."

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#### Ag from the past

In 1919, tobacco was grown in 42 states, on 448,572 farms, n 1,951,000 acres of land, with 183,565 persons employed.

Oats in the United States have increased rapidly and onsistently since estimates became available in 1866. The eak production occurred in 1918 when 44,349,000 acres ere harvested.

In 1907 and 1910, outbreaks of green bugs caused abanonment of at least 50% of the acreage in severely affected





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on, and fumber were higher while corn and wheat were lower. Most areas of the state recorded rainfall during the week ranging from a trace to as much as four inches, with the heaviest amounts falling on the Northern Low Plains. Rains and wet fields delayed planting in parts of the High and Low Plains. The rains helped wheat make good progress with 35% of the acreage headed compared to 43% on average by this date. The crop was reported in mostly good to fair condition. Com planting advanced to 61% complete, behind the normal 71%, and was in mostly good to fair condition.

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
