Court addresses Groundwater Conservation District business

Cooke County Commissioners Court went through the formalities of joining a groundwater conservation district at the Aug. 10 meeting. The meeting was held on the second floor of the Prosperity Bank building where it will be held until renovations are completed in the Cooke County Courthouse.

County Judge John Roane explained, "The way this has to work according to the rules - first of all we have to appoint temporary directors. Then, you have to have a hearing. Then we have to vote for inclusion into a district because the district does not exist until at least two counties vote for inclusion into the district. Our directors are temporary until we become a district, then they become permanent directors."

A public hearing was opened and those attending invited to speak on Cooke County becoming a part of the North Texas Groundwater Conservation District. With nobody doing so, the hearing was closed.

Commissioners then took a vote on becoming a part of the North Texas Groundwater Conservation District (NTGCD). The vote of 5-0 was unanimous to become a member of the District which will include Cooke, Collin, and Denton counties. Denton was voting that following day, and Collin also voted on Monday.

The Court also unanimously approved a resolution confirming the inclusion of Cooke County in the NTGCD. Senate Bill 2497, which was passed by the

81st Texas Legislature and signed by the governor on May 27, 2009, created the North Texas Groundwater Conservation District.

Commissioners Court appointed three temporary directors to serve on the NTGCD Board.

Applicants for the position of at large director were Byron Berry, Kenneth Klement, and Wayne Becker. A letter went out to the public asking that any interested party contact the County Judge or member of the Commissioners Court.

Kenneth Klement was the Commissioners' choice for the at-large director position. The vote for Klement was 4-0-1 with Commissioner Leon Klement abstaining.

The City of Gainesville, as the largest municipal

groundwater provider, submitted Ron Sellman as their nomination for NTGCD director. Commissioners Court approved Sellman with a 5-0 vote.

The third director was selected from nominees submitted by the Cooke County groundwater producers. The nominees were Ronnie Young, Wayne Becker, and Billy Ward Cunningham. Each water producer nominated a candidate. The number of votes each of the three received was Young nine, Becker two, and Cunningham two. Commissioners appointed Young with a 5-0 vote.

The appointees were sworn in Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 12 by Judge Roane. Directors' terms will be staggered. Lots will be drawn to determine which of the directors will get one, two, or three year terms. Commissioners Court will be in charge of appointing replacements as terms expire.

Peggy Shelley with the Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG) 9-1-1 Program explained that there has been an interlocal agreement in place for a number of years that was self renewing. It expires Aug. 31. Due to some strategy changes from their state agency the Commission On State Emergency Communications, new interlocal agreements are being required.

Shelley noted that the new agreement would begin Sept. 11, 2009 and end Aug. 31, 2011. She said it has no changes as far as who does what or how it is funded. According to Shelley, the paragraphs and references to addressing and maintenance and those functions are the main things missing. Those are being separated out because the State of Texas is now fully addressed in rural areas and funding was only for counties to arrive at that

point. Maintenance now becomes the responsibility of counties. Commissioners approved the new interlocal agreement.

Bottled water has been supplied for the office of the Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 for the past 15 years. This is due to health concerns that might be caused by lead pipes in that building. Previously, the funding came out of the technology budget.

Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Jason Brinkley said he was there to get the item taken out of the technology budget and put in an appropriate place. He requested that the County contract for the service for a cost of about \$50 a year.

Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell suggested having the pipes repaired. He said that it is only \$50 a year, but could lead to much more if other offices make the same request. The request for bottled water service was approved 4-1 with Commissioner Hollowell casting the nay vote.

A similar request for bottled water service came from the County Court At Law. There was nobody present to explain why the request was made. No action was taken.

In other business, Commissioner Court:

- Held a public hearing regarding a re-zone from ag-

ricultural to light industrial and a specific use permit for 5.0 acres in the Bradley ED Survey, Abstract 0033 located off of I-35 and Elm Grove Road. With no opinions voiced, the hearing closed and Commissioners voted 5-0 to approve the rezoning.

- Rescinded Resolution No. 06-22-09.01 regarding the District Attorney's Trial Expense Project from the office of the Governor, Criminal Justice Division.

- Approved a Resolution regarding the District Attorney's Trial Expense Project Funding from the office of the Governor, Criminal Justice Division. This takes the responsibility of funding from the Auditor and places it with the County Judge.

- Approved building survey of Cooke County Courthouse at 100 S. Dixon by King Consultants. The company did an asbestos rebate in 1995 and will return to reconfirm it at a cost of \$600. The cost to monitor air quality while removal is being done is \$600 per day with a time period of 20 days anticipated. Commissioners added not to exceed \$13,850 to the contract.

- Approved final plat for Olmstead Subdivision, lots

1-4, located off of Oakview Road in Precinct #4.

- Approved advertising for bids for Bid No. FY09-0014, Courthouse Annex vending services to begin on Sept. 15.

- Approved Cooke County EMS Department to place an order for a new ambulance to be delivered in March 2010 to be paid from funds in the 2010 budget.

Fix a party blunder

A drink glass leaves a white ring on wood furniture.

Solution: White rings on furniture normally appear from moisture trapped beneath the surface. Sometimes as the absorbed moisture evaporates, the white mark or ring will disappear. Therefore, wait at least 24 hours before treating the watermark. If the watermark remains, use Weiman Lemon Polish with 0000 steel wool and rub the stained area to remove the mark. Always rub in the direction of the wood grain. Contact a refinisher if your wood finish has gray or dark rings. The darker the color is, the deeper the damage.

New traffic, criminal laws go into effect Sept. 1

HB 2730 is the DPS's Sunset Legislation, and many of the DPS-related bills this session were included in HB 2730. Notable traffic and criminal laws that go into effect on Sept. 1 (unless otherwise indicated):

Seatbelts
HB 537 requires all occupants of a vehicle, no matter their age, to be secured by a safety belt, no matter where they are seated in the vehicle; changes the definition of a passenger vehicle to include a passenger van designed to transport 15 or fewer passengers including the driver; removes the current exemption for third-party Medicaid transportation provisions regarding the use of child passenger safety seats; and prohibits a motorcycle operator from carrying a passenger under the age of 5 unless the child is seated in a sidecar attached to the motorcycle.

SB 61 amends the existing statute regarding child passenger safety seats. The bill requires that any child younger than eight years of age be restrained in an approved child passenger safety seat unless the child is at least 4 feet, 9 inches in height. The fine is no more than \$25 for a first offense and \$250 for a second offense. The law also creates a new court cost for conviction of an offense under this section to be collected and used by TxDOT to buy safety seats for low income families. The law becomes effective on Sept. 1, 2009, but tickets for this offense cannot be issued until June 1, 2010. Police officers are allowed to issue a warning before that date.

Driving
HB 55 makes it illegal to use a wireless communication device in a school zone unless the vehicle is stopped or a hands-free device is used. Cities or counties wanting to enforce this law

must post a sign at the beginning of each school zone to inform drivers that using a wireless communications device is prohibited and the operator is subject to a fine. It is a defense to prosecution if the operator was making an emergency call.

HB 2730 increases the penalties for driving while intoxicated with a child passenger by adding an automatic driver license suspension period for first-time offenders and an increased suspension period for repeat offenders. The driver license re-instatement fee for completing an education program will rise from \$50 to \$100. Closes a loophole so a person who commits an offense as a minor cannot circumvent the driver license penalty if the person turns 21 before their court date.

HB 2730 allows a new Texas resident to operate a vehicle without a Texas license for 90 days instead of the current 30. (This provision went into effect on June 19, 2009.)

HB 2012 creates two new punishment enhancements: a Class B misdemeanor if a person drives with a suspended license and without insurance; and a class A misdemeanor if the person driving without insurance or a valid driver license has an accident and someone is seriously injured or dies as a result of that accident.

SB 129 authorizes neighborhood electric vehicles (NEVs) to be operated on roads with a posted speed limit of 45 miles per hour or less. The bill authorizes driver license holders to operate NEVs without having a motorcycle endorsement, clarifies that drivers and passengers in such vehicles are not required to wear helmets, and specifies that enclosed three-wheeled vehicles as described in the bill are authorized to operate in preferential lanes.

Concealed handgun
HB 2730 amends numerous provisions regarding concealed handgun licenses (CHLs), including eliminating student loan defaults as a disqualifier, to clarify that DPS must suspend or revoke a license when the licensee becomes ineligible, and mandating that a magistrate suspend a CHL held by the subject of an emergency pro-

tective order.
HB 2664 provides a defense to prosecution if a concealed handgun license holder carries a concealed handgun into an establishment that gets 51% or more of its income from the sale of alcoholic beverages, but has failed to post the statutorily required notice that it derives 51% or more of its income from the sale of alcoholic beverages. (Under current law, a concealed handgun licensee can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor for doing this.)

HB 2730 removes DPS authority to suspend a CHL for the holder's failure to display the CHL to a peace officer on demand. It removes associated penalties and suspensions for the failure to display.

Driver license
HB 2730 requires that all applicants under the age of 18 take the driving skills exam to receive a driver license. The law also requires that a provisional driver license (under 18) or instruction permit expire on an individual's 18th birthday, removes the requirement that a provisional driver license or instruction permit be renewed annually, and increases the fee for those licenses from \$5 to \$15. It also extends the current phase-two restrictions for holders of a graduated driver license from six months to one year. These restrictions include limited night driving, prohibited use of wireless communication devices, and a limited number of passengers.

HB 339 increases the total hours of behind-the-wheel driving instruction a teen receives from 14 to 34 and creates an adult driver education requirement for applicants older than 18 and younger than 21.

SB 1317 creates a six-hour driver education course required for driver license applicants 18 years of age or older. It also mandates that applicants 25 or under must submit to an approved driver education course. (Goes into effect March 1, 2010.)

SB 328 gives DPS the power to suspend a minor's driver license if they fail a breath or blood alcohol test while operating a watercraft. Chapter 524 of the

Last-minute tips for college success

You're about to leave the nest bound for a grand new adventure—college. Whether you're the first, second, or fifth generation to attend, there are some simple steps you can take to ensure the transition is as seamless as possible. These steps will also help your parents rest easier at night.

After all, your parents have always been available to encourage and help you. College may be the first time you've been away from home for an extended period. While heady, independence can be abused. Before you leave, talk with your folks about safety expectations while you're away. No, they can no longer enforce a curfew! But they can help you learn how to stay healthy and strong.

One good first step is to get to know your resident assistant (R.A.) and dorm director. These staff members were hired to support you with academic, social and safety programs. They are surrogates for your parents while you're at college; ditto for campus security, student health services, and other support staff.

Feeling safe and welcome is the first step in adjusting to college life. Socializing is another aspect. So make friends, join groups, and get to know others. But remember that schoolwork should always come first.

Time management is a large part of college academic success. During high school, your parents, teachers and counselors may have helped you map out your activities. Your parents may even have kept track of your due dates and prodded you to study. Not so in college.

Students are often surprised to learn there is a lot of unstructured, unscheduled time in college. That's what our ACT bloggers and podcasters tell us. Conversely, when it's busy in college, it's very busy. Classes may take up only a fraction of your time, but you've got to learn to stay on track. That way, on the day two term papers come due and

your group presentation is scheduled, you'll be ready—without having Mom or Dad there to nag!

You will also need to master study skills. In fact, according to ACT data from the 2008 graduating class, nearly 20% of high school students reported that they needed help with study skills. Nineteen percent said they needed assistance with math skills. And more than 19% reported they needed help with reading and comprehension.

If you find yourself struggling, tap into as many university resources as needed right away. These services are usually included in tuition and fees, so there are no extra charges. Remember that you shouldn't have to go it alone. Most professors and teaching assistants are happy to spend time outside of class if you need a little extra help. Academic advisors, tutors, and writing center staff can help teach or hone other needed skills. Counselors and R.A.s can help you with homesickness, depression, roommate problems, or other concerns. And your parents are always available to listen.

As a freshman, you may not know what to study and what career to pursue. According to ACT research, nearly 21% of the 2008 graduating seniors requested assistance with educational and occupational planning. Most college career and placement centers offer group sessions or one-on-one career counseling—again, at little or no extra charge. College internships and jobs are two great ways to discover what you like, and equally as important, what you don't like to do. Be patient as you navigate careers and majors. You'll soon discover your passion. Oh, and it wouldn't hurt to give Mom and Dad a call once in a while!

Transportation Code also clearly defines the suspension period for an individual who was under the age of 21 at the time when the offense of boating under the influence or driving under the influence of alcohol occurred. The law also increases the reinstatement fee for a license suspended under sections 49.04-49.08, Penal Code from \$50 to \$100.

HB 2730 increases the driver license sanction from a one-year CDL license disqualification to a lifetime disqualification if a person uses a motor vehicle to transport, conceal, or harbor an alien. If a child is engaged in conduct involving a severe form of trafficking persons, a judge at a juvenile hearing is required to order the juvenile's driver license or permit to be suspended.

HB 2730 prohibits DPS from issuing a driver license or identification card to a person who has not established a domicile in Texas. The law specifies that an applicant may receive a driver license at a post office box only if the applicant's residence address has also been provided, with some exceptions.

Crime
 HB 558 allows minors to

be charged with public intoxication.

HB 2386 allows courts to immediately seal juvenile criminal records if the juvenile successfully completes a drug court program, or another special program ordered by the court.

HB 1282 makes it a Class B misdemeanor to steal a driver license, commercial driver license or personal identification.

SB 554 makes it illegal to own or possess dog-fighting equipment and establishes that such equipment and property where dogs are found to be engaged in dog fighting is contraband and is subject to forfeiture. The law also makes dog-fighting subject to the elevated penalties authorized in the Texas Penal Code, Section 71.02(a), in an effort to deter organized criminal activity.

HB 1813 makes it a third-degree felony to tamper with forensic, medical, chemical, toxicological, and ballistic reports, as well as reports of certification, inspection, or maintenance of instruments used to examine or test physical evidence. (Currently, someone who does this can only be charged with a state jail felony.)

HB 358 allows law enforcement authorities to store only a small part of gambling machines that have been seized, instead of storing the whole machine. They would be able to remove and store just the computer chips in gambling machines.

Registered sex offenders
 SB 689 restricts Internet usage by certain registered sex offenders, and requires registered sex offenders to provide information about their e-mail addresses when

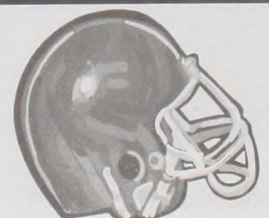

White-eyed cattle really are wild

We spend a lot of time discussing animal traits that lead to better beef cattle production, but not much on a trait that gets more cattle culled than any other - that is temperament. There may be something to the old adage "That one's crazy - you can see it in her eye!"

This is according to a recent study that was reported in the *Journal of Animal Science* and passed on by the Extension Animal Science Department.

The study reports animal behavior by assessing the relationship of percentage of eye white compared to chute escape velocity and chute behavior. They found that the relationship between more eye white and wild behavior was highest with heifers, but also significant in bulls and steers. Next time you are thinking about purchasing or retaining replacement cattle, you can feel justified in passing over some of the good ones just because you don't like "the look in her eye!"

Searching for a good legume for overseeding

Overseeding bermudagrass pasture with legumes should serve as a means of extending the length of grazing season, increasing the nutritional plane of grazing livestock, and/or reducing the amount of nitrogen fertilizer required in a forage production program. However, there are several management factors that make the practice difficult to utilize. The most important of these may be establishment! I have seen information that suggests legumes (mainly clover) should be a viable option for Cooke County, with successful establishment occurring 80% of the time - depending on the weather. Three of the last four years I have tried to establish a legume variety trial here with no success.

occurring. If the rule about an 80% success rate is true, we are due for a legume crop soon!

During the course of the legume trials, I have noticed some noticeable variety differences. I must admit that no legume has been able to produce acceptably in our result demonstration in 2006, 2008, or 2009.

However, the following three have at least been present in the field in at least one of the trials.

Hairy Vetch

Hairy vetch is a dependable, widely adapted, cool-season annual legume used throughout Texas. The plant has a large seed that allows seedlings to emerge through a thatch of three to four inches to reach sunlight. Hairy vetch is fairly tolerant of acid soils, but soils should be well drained.

Austrian Winter Peas

Austrian winter peas may produce a moderate amount of dry matter used for grazing, as a hay crop, or as a green manure. Winter peas are often used as companion crops with cereal grains and are high in nutritive value. They make good silage and are relished by cattle and white-tailed deer.

Annual medics

This group of cool-season annual forages consists of several different species. In general, they look like clovers but are actually closely related to alfalfa. Bur clover, which grows wild in most pasture situations, is actually a medic. Other, improved varieties are available and should be adaptable to the county. In general they can make a small, but significant, contribution to forage production programs.

This information is merely a report on legume production experiences I have had over the past four years. Producers are encouraged to continue to use clovers and other legume species that are adapted to the region.

TDA market Tractor sales down recap

For the week ending Aug. 8, feeder cattle price trends at Texas auctions were mixed, from \$4 lower per hundredweight to \$4 higher compared to a week earlier. Fed cattle prices were \$1 lower on a decline in beef prices and a growing backlog of available cattle in feedlots.

Grain prices ended the week lower due to a stronger dollar, lower crude oil prices, and favorable growing weather in the Midwest.

As for futures markets, cotton and lumber were higher, while feeder cattle, finished cattle, wheat, and corn were lower.

Central and South Texas received little or no rainfall again last week, while other areas of the state recorded up to three inches of rain.

Corn is 48% harvested, well ahead of the normal 30% by this date. Grain sorghum harvest is also ahead of normal at 53% complete. Wheat field preparations are underway in many areas.

Pasture conditions are highly variable depending on rainfall received with ratings from very poor to good. Topsoil moisture was rated short to adequate in many areas, but was mostly very short in the Upper Coast, South-Central, and South Texas regions.

Tractor sales in the U.S. are down 19% from a year ago and nearly 22% year-to-date, according to the Association of Equipment Manufacturers.

Compared to June 2008, the sale of four-wheel drive tractors is down 4.4% while two-wheel drive sales are off 19%. However, combine sales are up 20%.

Total retail sales reported are significantly lower than the five-year average.

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Nation's farm land values fall in 2008

Farm real estate values, a measurement of the value of all land and buildings on farms, averaged \$2,100 per acre on Jan. 1, 2009, down 3.2% from 2008. The 3.2% decrease from 2008 is the first decline in farm real estate value since 1987. Regional changes in the average value of farm real estate ranged from virtually no change in the Northern and Southern Plains regions to an 11% decline in the Mountain region. The highest farm real estate values remained in the Northeast region at \$4,830 per acre. The Mountain region had the lowest farm real estate value, \$922 per acre.

Both cropland and pasture values are also down from the previous year. Cropland values declined by \$110 per acre (3.9%) to \$2,650 per acre. In the Cornbelt region, the average cropland value decreased 4.0% from the previous year, to \$3,870 per acre. However, in the Northern Plains and Delta regions, cropland values rose 1.6% and 0.6%, respectively.

Pasture value declined by \$20 per acre (1.8%) from 2008 to \$1,070 per acre. The Mountain region had the largest percentage decrease in pasture value, 16% below 2008.

The contraction in the overall economy has caused less commercial and residential development in many regions. Livestock and crop commodity prices have declined from a year earlier, thus producers and investors are less optimistic than a year ago. A decrease in the demand for recreational land has also contributed to the overall decrease in land values.
