## City residents protest rezoning Pine Street property to a B2

Comments of concern buzzed at Monday night's City Council meeting. Residents were there to protest the rezoning of property owned by John Pagel located in block 55 off Pine Street behind the A-OK Motel. Currently the property is zoned R1 Residential. Pagel sought its rezoning to B2 General Business.

A meeting of the City's Planning and Zoning Commission was held prior to the City Council meeting. Residents came to voice their concern to the change. They had heard rumors that it was either going to be sold for building a motel or apartments.

Since Pagel is mayor and the property owner, he turned the hearing over to Mayor Pro Tem Joey Anderson. Anderson explained that a B2 General Business district classification includes many types of businesses such as stores, bus stations, gas stations, hotels, motels, etc., but not including industrial.

City Administrator Stan Endres explained, "The part on Hwy. 82 is all commercial. The part John is talking about is residential, and Tom Hesse's house south of it is residential. Everything to the East including Knabe's office and the rest of the land is B1."

Pagel noted that it is a 157' property on the street side. It had mobile homes on it for many years, but is now a vacant lot. "Being zoned as residential, I just don't feel like that is the best use for the property, and since the mobile homes are off of it now I felt like it was time to change it to what it should be," Pagel remarked. "I do not have any intended use for it. There's not anybody standing in line to buy it."

City Councilwoman Jewel Otto said she didn't think it would be a proper place to put a residence. Endres said that if it went to B1 like the Knabe property nearby, it would be for offices and retail stores. B2 allows more things.

Magdalen Yosten, a resident of Cross Street, stated that she had no problem with duplexes built there, but did not like the idea of apartments because it would mean too many families.

Lou Ann Spaeth, owner of the home at 204 South Pine, said, "You have to be very careful. That is a small short street." She said it is a high use road and always has been. There would not be enough safe parking or enough grassy area behind it, especially if there are children, she said.

"We all lived with those trailer houses for so many years that we don't want

anything like that back there again, whether it is a permanent building or whatever," Spaeth added.

Kristi Schneider, a 17 year resident of Pine Street, said that motel wasn't a good idea and she saw no reason that it couldn't be a nice residential lot.

Tom Hesse noted that when he built his house, that block was set up to be residential and feels it should remain residential. Noel Henry said she grew up on Pine Street and saw what the trailer houses could bring through. "Some were fine, but you never knew what you were going to get," she remarked. "That's what you are going to get with the apartments. It's not good for the neighborhood. It's not necessarily good for the kids growing up in the neighborhood. I don't think you would want an apartment complex next door to you. That's why we live in Muenster."

Glenda Cler who lives across the street from the area in question said, "We've had to put up with so much over the years with those trailers. If you bring in apartments, it's just going to be the same thing only more people. I don't know why it can't be residential. There's houses all around it, so why not residential? We've had to call the police many times just to get some peace and quiet around there."

Pagel said the residential zoning limits his possibilities. "To me it is not residential property. It's surrounded by storage buildings, motel, service station, and that sort of thing," Pagel commented. He again noted that the property is not committed to anything.

"What is an investment to you, is my life and their life," noted Schneider.

As time neared to close the hearing, Anderson commented, "As councilmen, we are tasked with the best for the community as a whole while considering the people involved. We take this very seriously."

In the regular meeting, Councilman Pat Stelzer asked if Pine Street were wide enough to handle commercial traffic. Spaeth said, "No, it is a small residential dead end street that ends behind the motel. The only thing on the street are houses except John's property."

Endres agreed that it is the smallest street in town. Where most are about 80' wide, Pine is about 45' wide.

After more discussion, the Council voted 5-0 to decline the request to rezone the property. They would reconsider when a purpose is

## Dr. Knight does not seek re-election

There will be at least one new face at the Muenster Hospital District Board table in May. Dr. Walter Knight confirmed at the Feb. 17 Board meeting that he has decided not to seek a third term on the Hospital District's Board of Directors. He has served on the Board since May 2003. The other two members, Kenny Klement and Ronnie Weinzapfel, with expiring terms have signed up seeking another three year term.

The Board voted to order an election on May 9 for three places, each for a three year term, on the Board of Directors. Sign up time is now until Monday, March 9 at 5 p.m. Applications for the Board positions may be picked up during business hours at the Administration office in the Hospital's south wing. Administrator/CEO Lynn Heller was appointed early voting judge. Early voting ballots can be cast from April 27 through May 1.

At the February Medical Staff meeting, Dr. James Stephen Jones was elected chief of staff.

Financial reports in January showed net revenue of \$603,316, operating expenses of \$574,070 for a net operating revenue of \$29,246. Other revenue (ad valorem taxes and SRV lease) added \$155,093 to make an excess of revenues over expenses of \$184,339.

In January there were 285 patient days; 105 ER visits; 394 outpatient visits; 476

Clinic visits; and 727 Home Health visits.

In other business, the MMH Board:

- Approved application of Capital Improvement Grant to ORCA (Office of Rural

Community Affairs) for \$50,000 with \$5,000 match from MMH to be used for new beds, computers, and generator.

- Approved write off of Bad Debts totaling \$48,633.55.

## Report on Commissioners' Austin meeting

On March 3, Commissioners Leon Klement and Gary Hollowell met with Rep. Hardcastle and Lewis Simmons, Sen. Estes' chief of staff. They presented the Cooke County Commissioners' Court Resolution requesting they support the Court's position to create a single county GCD.

Both representatives were supportive, but both less than optimistic the bill would pass. Both shared their concerns based on their years of combined experience, conversations, and interaction with fellow legislators. There is strong opposition to create any additional single county water districts in the State of Texas.

Many of us had heard that the single county legislation wouldn't get out of the Natural Resource Committee, so Klement and Hollowell went by to follow up with Rep. Averitt, the Committee Chair.

They learned from Tulsie Reddy, one of Rep. Averitt's aides, that he would entertain any proposal. They learned that he didn't have enough influence and authority to block the single county GCD legislation single handedly, but indeed the Committee Chair with several other committee members opposed to the single county GCD legislation.

Tulsie stressed Averitt's opposition by

## County commits to TAC employee Program

Cooke County employees now have the opportunity to enter a 10-week program that offers benefits and a healthier body. Texas Association of Counties (TAC) has partnered with Cooke County to offer employees the innovative wellness program with the goal of reducing health care costs by making a healthier lifestyle a habit.

A report, *Counting Costs and Calories*, released by the State Comptroller's Office, shows that at least 50%

of health care expenditures are lifestyle related and potentially preventable. Statistically, employees who offer wellness programs see a decrease in absenteeism, fewer workers' compensation claims, higher productivity, increased morale, and a reduction in the amount of health care claims.


According to HR Director Jennifer Eberle, employees taking part in the wellness program are eligible for rewards and special incentives including gift cards and

prizes, and employees who enroll in condition management will receive reduced copays on certain medications for chronic conditions.


Commissioners Court approved a resolution supporting the TAC program at their regular meeting held Monday, Feb. 23. Eberle is serving as the program coordinator, which will start the first week of April. It will start with a kick-off brunch. TAC is funding the program.

known to require a change, they noted.

Councilman Greg Bohl reported on the last Commissioners Court meeting. He spoke to the Court offering Muenster's support of a single-county Groundwater Conservation District (GCD). The Court did vote 4-1 to seek a single-county GCD designation. Bohl urged the City to contact their Representatives in Austin to ask them to support the single-county GCD. He said that as of Monday, there was less than 10 days to take action since the Legislative Session ends then and will not meet again for two years. Rick Hardcastle and Craig Estes are the two to contact.

Curbing on Fourth Street from Mesquite Street to Magnolia Streets was discussed. Businesses are located in that area, and according to Endres all owners favor the curbing. Magnolia is a gravel street west of Klement Ford.

The owners requested lower curbing rather than raised curbing to allow them

to drive in at any point. Endres explained, "If you decide to go ahead with the curbing, the expense is all on the property owners. The City would have to spend money in the area where there is a 20' alley on both sides of that street. We would stake and try to make sure it was up to grade and we would advertise for bids."

The Council voted unanimously to go forward with the curbing by having Endres write up bid requests.

The City Administrator reported:

- Recycling program was discussed. It is costing about \$425 every two weeks to haul off the recycled products. The expense concerned some of the Council, who thought perhaps it should be dropped until there is a return to offset the cost. Mayor Pagel said it had not been long enough to know if the project was successful or not and to discuss it again around budget time.

County Compliance Officer, requested that the County enter into a contract with Net-Data/GHS for the collection of District and County Court fines and fees. "It would help us tremendously on the backlog of cases that we have," she said. "I did a report this morning and it showed that we have 1,350 cases that were past due today, which those are mainly older cases."

These 1,350 cases are only from the County Court and do not include those from the District Court. Net-Data sends out collection notices. Cases 61 days old would automatically download to Net-Data's system. A 30% charge is tacked on to the overdue fine to cover Net-Data's cost. Feb. 22-28 is Severe Weather Awareness Week.

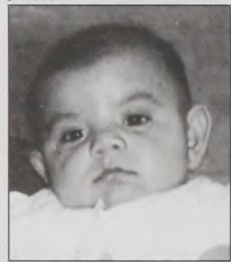

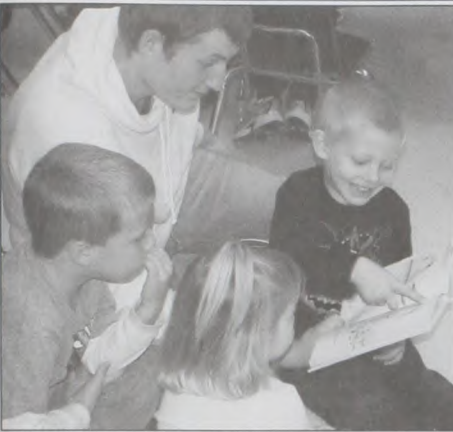

telling us during the last legislative session that two single county GCDs were formed within Rep. Averitt's own district, but both were created under the "Sunset Rule" which means they have two years to join another district or be subject to the state's discretion.

Rep. Hardcastle plans to support our efforts and sponsor Cooke County's legislation to form a single county GCD.

In addition, discussions are taking place between representatives of Cooke, Denton, and Collin to create a multi-county district as a fallback position to the single county GCD.

These discussions have been cordial and progres-

sive, allowing for more equal representation of the entities involved.

Due to the short window of opportunity to file and process legislation and to ensure Cooke County has some control of our own destiny, Sen. Estes' office has offered to help draft and sponsor the bill combining Cooke, Denton, and Collin once the counties agree on the terms. The bills will run simultaneously through the houses; should the single county bill fail, our legislators have some confidence the multi-county bill will pass.

We collectively need to contact our representatives and show our support.

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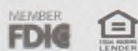

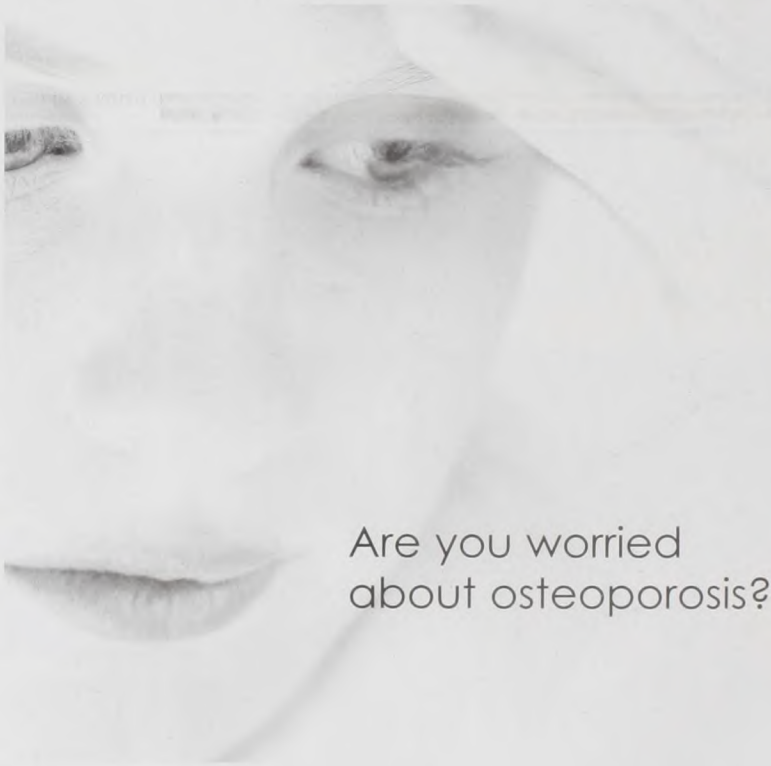

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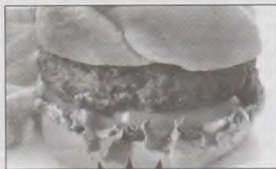

Hole three at Buncombe Creek is a 141-yard drive and, according to course officials, Brunson landed the mark with a pitching wedge.

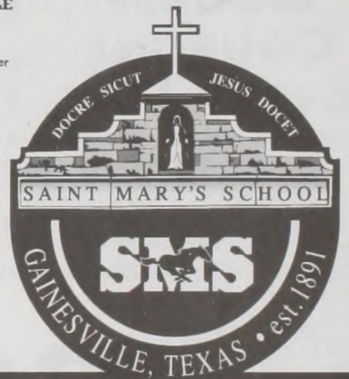

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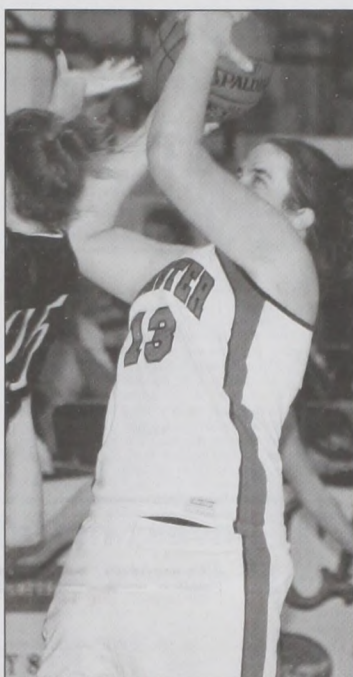

# COUNTY AGENT REPORT

## AgriLife Extension specialist: Don't wait too late to use prescribed burning as tool

"Plans" for prescribed burns need to be turned into "actions" before a wildfire occurs, said a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

"I believe that we often plan in our minds to make proper preparations, but these planned thoughts never seem to materialize until the crisis arrives, and then we are forced to hastily make decisions and preparations after the fact," said J.F. Cadenhead, AgriLife Extension rangeland specialist in Vernon.

When utilizing prescribed burning as a tool to mitigate the negative effects of wildfire, landowners should not wait until the wildfire is bearing down upon them before they hastily begin removing the fuel load by burning blacklines and backfires, Cadenhead said.

It was well known following the massive wildfire of 1988 (around 360,000 acres burned in numerous counties), that if substantial acres had not already been burned in Shackelford County with 'prescribed fire' during the few months leading up to that fateful March, many more acres, structures, livestock, and possibly human lives would have been lost, he said.

"Fortunately, the fuel load (grasses and other vegetation) had already been reduced through prescribed burning on various ranches across the county that the wildfire's advance was often impeded in just the nick of time," Cadenhead said.

The main objective of using prescribed fire on rangeland is to safely and effectively apply fire under a prescribed set of conditions to accomplish certain goals for the landscape, he said. This prescription and goals should be written down in a fire plan that is followed by the actual burn.

"The prescription not only...

varies according to the landowner's goals and objectives, but can be highly variable according to the type and makeup of the vegetation as well as topography of the landscape," Cadenhead said. An important and often overlooked goal should be to reduce the potential of a wildfire. Prescribed burning can and should be utilized more often with the simple goal of reducing hazardous fuel loads, he said. These heavy amounts of vegetation dry out and become a wildfire hazard.

"Whether you are burning for range management purposes or burning to reduce wildfire hazards, proper and advanced planning is required for safe and effective burns to occur," Cadenhead said.

He provided some tips for landowners planning a prescribed burn on larger scale ranches, adding that many of these same principles can be applicable to smaller properties as well.

- Get professional help to design and develop a fire plan. Determine goals for the burn with advice from a knowledgeable person to see if they are realistic.

- Check on fire liability riders for the property's insurance policy. It may need updating.

- Plan early enough to acquire needed equipment (sprayers, drip torches, two-way radios, weather monitoring instruments, etc.) and accomplish heavy equipment work (bulldozers or maintainers) for cutting fireguards or re-cutting roads.

- Plan early enough to allow for deferral of grazing so that enough grass to carry a good flame front is available by burn date. That may require a full growing season or more, depending on the rainfall.

- Try to participate in several prescribed burns before

scheduling one.

- Locate some skilled help with experience in prescribed burning or send someone to burn schools or workshops. This may require a lot of advanced planning and dollars.

- As the burn date nears, follow the fire plan in securing help and in notification of neighbors, emergency personnel such as local and county fire departments, county sheriff's offices, highway patrol, oil and gas leases, grazing lessees, and hunters.

"Obviously, if one is simply trying to reduce wildfire potential around a homestead or smaller home site adjacent to rural areas, you do not need the enormity of preparation required for burning rangeland and large landscapes," Cadenhead said.

Some potential problems and safety tips that small landowners should consider, preferably before the vegetation begins to completely dry out, are:

- Contact neighbors in the subdivision, the local subdivision authorities, and local law enforcement authorities, secure the proper permission, and plan how to work cooperatively to reduce the wildfire hazards threatening the area.

- Examine all structures around the home and out-buildings for vegetation buildup. Grass is the main fuel for fire, but dried weeds can also burn. Closely shred or mow areas leading up to structures or to other fuel loads, and possibly consider plowing or burning some areas to make a fireguard. The taller the grass, the wider the fireguard needs to be. A rule of thumb is to make the fireguard approximately four to five times wider than the vegetation is tall.

- Avoid driving and parking equipment and vehicles in tall, dry grass. Move equipment to a safe area and/or closely mow the parking area or ranch roads. If needed, closely shred ditches along ranch roads and camping areas prior to hunter access.

- Watch for sparks from rocks when shredding or mowing. If needed, wet down

the area before mowing.

- Maintain adequate pasture fireguards, especially those along public roads.

- Be aware of county burn bans.

- Maintain spray equipment and keep the water tank full and sprayer ready for emergencies. Check for a good battery and full fuel tank.

- Be sure the 9-1-1 address is clearly visible from the road.

Cadenhead said most rural fire departments are familiar with the concepts of prescribed burning. They had much rather see the smoke from a well-planned prescribed burn than be called out to extinguish a poorly planned controlled burn that got out of control.

"Let's be responsible citizens," he said. "We must take the necessary time, do the proper planning, acquire the proper help and often permission, and then be willing to follow the 'prescription' and proper conditions when we do burn."

"If the fire plan is designed and conducted correctly, then the chances of accomplishing a safe and effective burn are greatly enhanced," Cadenhead said. "We owe it to our firefighters and to our neighbors."

### Preparing for summer weeds in lawns

We know that we will have weeds in our lawn this summer; the big question is how to control them. Pre-emergent herbicides can work well for many weeds, and post-emergent herbicides work on others.

Generally, we have until the middle of March to make herbicide applications to control Summer annual weeds here in Cooke County. Pre-emergent herbicides only work if they are applied to your lawn before the weed's growth period. But if applied too early, weather will dilute the herbicide and the weed will still grow.

If you are planning to apply a pre-emergent, it is important to realize that you will only be able to control annual weeds. Weeds can be grouped according to their life span - annual or perennial. Annual weeds germinate from seed each year, mature in one growing season, and die in less than 12 months. Crabgrass and henbit are examples of annual weeds - crabgrass being a summer annual and henbit being a winter annual.

Perennial weeds live more than one year, and recover or regrow from dormant stolons, rhizomes, or tubers as well as from seed. Control of perennial weeds requires a postemergent herbicide during its season of active growth.

Effective chemical weed control requires identification of the weeds as to their classification (grass, broad-

leaf, sedge, etc.), life span (annual or perennial), and season of active growth (cool season or warm season). Effective chemical control also requires accurate timing of applications, proper rate of application, and uniformity of application.

Always follow label directions for a product, and observe all warnings and precautions relative to safety of the application. Herbicide labels should be carefully reviewed for additional details on specific uses of each product.

### TDA market recap

For the week ending Feb. 28, feeder cattle price trends at Texas auctions were mixed, from \$4 lower to \$5 higher per hundredweight. Fed cattle prices were \$2 higher.

Corn and grain sorghum prices were higher as gains early in the week more than offset later declines.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, corn, and lumber ended the week higher, while cotton and wheat were lower.

Little or no rain was recorded statewide. Topsoil moisture remains in mostly short to very short supply and pastures are very dry and in need of rain.

Corn and grain sorghum planting are underway in many areas. The wheat crop was reported to be in very poor to fair condition in most areas.

## Grain prices impact entire livestock production cycle

Manufacturers make decisions on the amount and timing of production based on input costs and the expected product price. Manufacturers may react to a significant increase in the price of a variable input, such as energy, by reducing production. As energy prices decline, manufacturers may respond in the short run by boosting output.

Biology, however, prevents livestock producers from instantly responding to price changes. The timeline for meat production—from farm to retail—ranges from two months for poultry meat to two years for beef. From the time a female is bred, it takes about nine to 10 months to

expand milk production, 30 months to produce a steak, 10 months for a pork roast, and 10 weeks for a chicken breast from when incentives to do so appear.

Livestock production's varying timeframes make it difficult to change the direction of output quickly. Producers make decisions to expand or contract production before feed and product prices are known. Biological lags mean that animal products consumed today are based on production decisions made up to two years ago.

Record-high grain, oilseed, and energy prices between 2006 and 2008 increased the costs of producing and marketing meat and dairy products. Expecting feed and energy costs to remain high, livestock producers began to cut back on animal and dairy production. But just as producers were making their livestock-production decisions for 2009, feed prices began to decline. The dollar strengthened, which lowered exports, and worldwide economic growth began to slow.
