Muenster grows by 92 acres

With a stamp of approval from the City Council, Muenster increased its size by some 92 acres. Germanfest Inc. and Muenster Industrial Foundation Property peti-tioned the City to have their 28 and 64.625 acre tracts of land included in the City limits of Muenster.

Muenster Mayor John Pagel commented, "I'm not sure what's going to happen from here on, but I'm sure that we'll get a plan. According to the ordinances, we are obligated to furnish City services at some point.'

Attending the meeting were Stephanie Davidson C.J. Durbinhiggins with Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG). They worked with the Muenster City Council in developing a Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan is currently at FEMA awaiting

approval.
"Once this plan is approved, it will open the door for Muenster and other jurisdictions in Cooke County to go after mitigation grants," Durbinhiggins explained. "Most of those are FEMA. There are a few that are from within the State of Texas." She said that they plan to do some workshops here to make the Council aware of what the mitigation grants are about and what is avail-

The Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan is a 269 page document addressing all of the natural disasters that might befall this area and also a few of the potential man-made disasters. It covers flood, tornado, drought, severe ice storm,

Alderman Pat Stelzer noted that when he reviewed the original plan it stated that the Muenster dam was completed in 1963 and was a high hazard dam. It was not completed until 2007. He said he'd made them aware of it and wondered if it had been corrected.

Dog attacks walker

On Tuesday, June 8, a pregnant female walking near the Sylvan Walterscheid Trailer Park in Muenster was bitten in her left calf by a brown dog.

Muenster Police Chief Bob

Stovall received a report of the incident at 8:10 a.m. A search ensued for a brown dog. Chief Stovall was assisted by several City employees. They captured four brown dogs, one of which was identified by the bite victim.

That dog was taken to Refinery Road Veterinary Clinic in Gainesville where it will be observed for 10 days for signs of rabies. The owner did not have proof of the animal having a current rabies vaccination. If proof of vaccination isn't given at the end of the 10 day period, the animal will be vaccinated at the owner's expense.

The owner must also pay the boarding fee during the observation period.

At the end of the 10 day period, Muenster Police Department will be notified of the status of the dog's health, and they in turn will notify the bite victim.

Chief Stovall said that a citation was issued to the owner for violation of the City's dog leash law. All dogs must be on a leash or penned in the City limits. Dogs should not be allowed to roam freely within the City limits. The fine can be up to \$500. The other three brown dogs picked up by the City were placed in the City dog pound.

Dog owners should be sure to keep their canines in compliance with the law by getting shots, and keeping them penned, chained, or on

Raymond Sicking 1924 - 2010



last report, presently listed in critical but stable condition at Parkland Hospital. It has been determined that a natural gas explosion oc-

curred within the building. All of the injured were believed to have been inside the building at the time of the explosion. The explosion did occur in the kitchen. It was reported that the explosion was a flash explosion, resulting in very minimal fire after the initial explosion,

which was promptly extinguished by Gainesville Fire Res-The restaurant received major damage as a result of the

explosion. Windows were blown out and debris was scattered throughout the area of the building onto adjoining

There were no damages to any other properties or buildings observed or reported.

Investigation into the incident is still underway. Texas Railroad Commission was on scene Tuesday morning performing safety tests and inspections with Atmos Energy of-

There is no cause for alarm or fear at any other area properties at this time.
