

Gainesville, died at the Gainesville Health & Rehab. Center on Thursday, May 20, 2010. A celebration of her life was held on Saturday, May 22, at 10 a.m. in the First United Methodist Church. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery. Services were directed by Geo. J. Carroll & Son Funeral Home.

Golda Elaine Smith was born April 23, 1927 in Avery, Red River County, Texas to Herman and Christine Smith. She graduated as Valedictorian from Avery High School and attended Draughons Business College in Dallas. On July 11, 1946, Golda married her high school boyfriend James Earl Pirkey while he was on leave from the service. After the war, Golda and James Earl moved to Sulphur Springs for James Earl to attend Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. Golda substituted at the Sulphur Springs schools and they celebrated the birth of their son Gary.

In 1952, the family moved to Littlefield where James taught Vocational Ag, and later became high school principal. They celebrated the birth of their daughter, Kathy. When both kids were in school, Golda went to work in the school cafeteria

She even led the residence exercise class from her wheelchair. Golda moved to the Gainesville Health & Rehab in September 2009. Golda had a strong faith in God and loved her family and friends, the students and faculty she met at GHS, and her church family.

Boating deaths decline in Texas

cidents on Texas public waters decreased last year comand Texas game wardens, boater education proponents, and others hope to keep the numbers trending downward. The decrease in 2009 came after an unprecedented spike in boating accident deaths in 2008, the highest in more than 10 years.

Statistics compiled by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department show that 207 boating accidents on Texas

Deaths from boating ac-dents on Texas public wa-public waters in 2009 led to 139 injuries and 38 deaths, compared with 272 accipared with the year before dents, 175 injuries, and 62 deaths in 2008. Of the fatalities last year, 25 of the deaths occurred in open motorboats. Only one death was attributed to a personal watercraft.

Last year, in the course of 192,882 boating compliance vessel checks, game wardens issued 9,705 citations and 9,928 warnings. The most common violation was not having a sufficient number of life vests available. Wardens issued 2,488 citations for that offense. Additionally, they arrested 220 persons for boating while intoxicated.

One trend that continues to worry those in marine law enforcement is that most water deaths are connected to one-boat accidents - capsizing, running aground, collisions with fixed or floating objects, or falls overboard.

Staying safe while boating is simple as one, two, three. Wear a personal flotation device. The new inflatable jackets are lightweight and comfortable, and they save lives. Second, don't drink and boat. Third, take a boater education course."

For the week ending May 22, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$5 lower per hundredweight with a few to \$5 higher compared to a week ago. Fed cattle prices were \$2.70 lower per hundredweight. Cattle prices normally decline in the late spring and early summer. Lower wholesale beef prices and concerns that a slower economic recovery may reduce future beef demand were also factors in the decline.

Better than expected export demand boosted grain pric-

As for futures markets, cotton, wheat, and corn were higher while feeder cattle, fed cattle, and lumber were lower. Many areas of the state received rainfall last week with

amounts ranging from a trace to as much as five inches. Topsoil moisture was reported in mostly adequate to short supply with much of East Texas short to very short.

The state's wheat crop is 95% headed and 2% of the acreage has been harvested. Cotton is 48% planted, slightly behind the normal pace, and 7% of the acreage is squaring. Rice planting is nearing completion. Corn was 96% planted and 15% of the crop is silking, both slightly behind average. Grain sorghum, peanut, and soybean planting were also active and ahead of the normal pace. Most crops and pastures were reported in good to fair condition, while rice was good to excellent.
