Two die in FM 922 accident Monday

DPS Trooper Mark Tack-ett with the Texas Highway Patrol reported that at 4:11 p.m. on Monday, March 19, the Cooke County Sheriff's Office dispatched DPS troopers and Cooke County EMS to a three vehicle crash on FM 922 near Rosston.

The DPS report stated that a 2002 Peterbilt with trailer was traveling east on FM 922 driven by Jason Evans of Chico. Chance Waldrop of Hazel was traveling west in a 2006 Ford pickup followed by Gregory Devin of Breckenridge in a 2006 Chevrolet pickup. As Evans entered a curve, he crossed into the west bound lane striking Waldrop. Waldrop's vehi-cle entered the north ditch and overturned. The truck continued to slide east on

Devin and passenger Scott Ognowski, 33 year old from Breckenridge, were pro-nounced dead at the scence by Justice of the Peace Jason Brinkley. Both were transported to the medical examiner's office in Dallas. Devin's second passenger, Adrian Trejo of Breckenridge, age 21, was transported to Denton Regional by Cooke County EMS with head injuries. Devin and Ognowski were

not wearing their seatbelts. Trooper Tackett noted, "At the time of the crash, Cooke County was experiencing severe thunderstorms with heavy rain and hail. Kennedy-Reiter opens Muenster counseling office

A new service is being offered in Muenster by Kerri Kennedy-Reiter, M.Ed.;LPC. This week, she opened an office in the Muenster Family Medical Clinic. She provides counseling for three-year olds to adults. That includes individual counseling, family, and marriage.

Kerri explained that for the children she offers what is called play therapy. "I treat issues like anxiety, depression, abuse issues, past abuse issues, children's behavior dis-orders, Attention Deficit Activity Disorder (ADAD), and grief. I do a little bit of chemical dependency issues. In a rural communi-ty, you treat all ages and different issues. We help them develop the coping skills to deal with whatever."

From the University of North Texas, Kerri earned a Masters degree in Education specializing in Marriage and Family Counseling. She has been in private practice for 16 years. She has owned and operated A Better Tomorrow since 1998. She has an office in Gainesville and will now be there on Mondays only. Another counselor, Michaele Ann Bryson will see patients in the Gainesville office Tuesday through Friday.

Of her job as a counselor, Kerri said, "I feel that basically, people have the skills within them to deal with their issues, but my job is to help them find their strength and their support system and coping skills in order to help them deal whether it be a chronic disorder or a life issue that's come up. My job is to help them find those skills to deal with those things."

Kerri has always liked helping people. Of her career choice she remarked, "I thought at one time that I wanted to be a teacher.

I wanted to work with children, but then I realized that I really enjoyed working with them more one on one and felt like I could make more of a difference that way. I started out being interested in children, but it's developed into helping all ages."

Kerri and her husband Marc Reiter have been married for 17 years. They live in Lind-say and have two daughters, Madison, age eight, and Kortnie, age six.

Hobbies that Kerri enjoys include singing, exercise, playing with her kids, and scrapbooking.

"I'm just excited to be here in Muenster," Kerri said. "We have a lot of people who did come from Nocona and Saint Jo, so it will be nice to have this service a little closer for those folks. They've been good to drive all the way to Gainesville. They've been great here about referring to me. They're very holistic health, they believe in not just the medicine, but dealing with issues, not just giving out medication.

In the last five to 10 years, Kerri said she has seen a big change in the local community. "They are more willing to get help. That it doesn't have the stigma that it used to. I've been so impressed that just over the last several years, I feel that the community is very willing to get help for themselves or for their children. They are not in denial. We could all use counseling at some time or another and it's not a bad thing. It's a good thing. I've seen a lot of growth in that area - a lot of open mindedness."

All things are kept confidential, stressed Kerri.

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

Today, there are 10 Cooke County children who have entered the Child Welfare system who do not have the protective advocacy of a CASA volunteer. These most vulnerable children have come into the custody of the State (foster care) through no fault of their own due to abuse or neglect. CASA has seen an increase in the number of children coming into foster care. Since March, 2011, the number of Cooke County children in foster care has risen over 40%.

According to CASA's Executive Director Vicki Robertson, these children have been taken from everything they've known into a system that can be (in spite of the best of intentions on the part of both State officials and the utmost in dedication of local workers) overwhelming to the child. "State workers are extremely overloaded and cannot focus what is needed for every child under their watch at all times. "But that's where CASA comes in. CASA volunteers are people who get involved with only one case. Because they have only one case, they can take the time to



Michael Gruber was born in Albany, Georgia on Nov. 26, 1913, the second son of Fred J. and Clara Schmidlkofer Gruber. He attended school in Albany and Leesburg, Georgia before moving with his family to Lindsay in 1921. He attended Van Slyke country school northwest of Lindsay near Wolf Ridge and later graduated with an eighth-grade education from St. Peter's School in Lindsay. There was no high school in Lindsay at the time and he did not want to walk to Myra, so as a young man he worked on the familv farm west of Lindsay. He earned a certificate of business in 1935 at St. Mary's Business School in Gainesville. During the late 1930s, he worked at the courthouse in the Cooke County Clerk's office. From 1940 to 1958, he was employed as a bookkeeper at the Rural Electric Authority in Muenster.

On Aug. 13, 1960, he married Marian Starke, daugh-ter of Joseph and Anna Starke, in Sacred Heart Church in Muenster. That same month, after returning from their honeymoon in







Watch for Armyworms! Large numbers of moths (millers) are being reported in Cooke County and in the rest of Texas. Dr. Allen Knutson, Extension entomologist, has caught many of these. The ones he has inspected are believed to be the adult version of the True Armyworm. However, it is possible that those in Cooke County could also be the adult Fall Armyworm. In either case, it is important to monitor the situation closely. Dr. Knutson states, "These

insects overwinter along the Gulf Coast, and the moths are now migrating north. The locally cool, wet weather conditions are favorable for an armyworm outbreak, so I would advise growers to inspect small grains and pastures closely during the next few weeks for potential



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
