

Two die in FM 922 accident Monday

DPS Trooper Mark Tackett with the Texas Highway Patrol reported that at 4:11 p.m. on Monday, March 19, the Cooke County Sheriff's Office dispatched DPS troopers and Cooke County EMS to a three vehicle crash on FM 922 near Rosston.

The DPS report stated that a 2002 Peterbilt with trailer was traveling east on FM 922 driven by Jason Evans of Chico. Chance Waldrop of Hazel was traveling west in a 2006 Ford pickup followed by Gregory Devin of Breckenridge in a 2006 Chevrolet pickup. As Evans entered a curve, he crossed into the west bound lane striking Waldrop. Waldrop's vehicle entered the north ditch and overturned. The truck and trailer jackknifed and continued to slide east on F.M. 922. The trailer struck Devin's vehicle forcing it into the north ditch facing south.

Devin and passenger Scott Ognowski, 33 year old from Breckenridge, were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Jason Brinkley. Both were transported to the medical examiner's office in Dallas. Devin's second passenger, Adrian Trejo of Breckenridge, age 21, was transported to Denton Regional by Cooke County EMS with head injuries. Devin and Ognowski were not wearing their seatbelts.

Trooper Tackett noted, "At the time of the crash, Cooke County was experiencing severe thunderstorms with heavy rain and hail. When driving in adverse weather conditions with reduced visibility, you should always reduce your speed for safety and be on alert. It is also important that any time you are in a moving vehicle, you must wear your seatbelt as required by law."

County EMS nominated for 2012 Support Freedom Award

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR), a Department of Defense agency, announced 225 Texas Guard and Reserve members nominated their employers for the 2012 Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom Award. Cooke County EMS was among the nominees. They were nominated by Robert Cates of Forney, a lieutenant with the County EMS.

Staff Sergeant Robert Cates, U.S. Army Reserve, is soon to be deployed for the third time in the past 12 years.

Cooke County EMS Director Kevin Grant remarked of the EMS support, "We at EMS are like family anyway. We do anything we can to support him and his family." Grant said they told Robert and Chrissy that they are willing to help in any way they can while he is performing his military duties. Grant noted, "We are very proud of him!"

Cates and his wife Chrissy and two young sons Grayson and Pearson were honored guests at the March 12 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court.

A proclamation was read and adopted at the meeting honoring Cates. It said in part, "Cooke County recognizes the importance of our

employees and citizens serving in the military, whether full-time or reserves.

"We understand the hardship that is placed on the family of our military personnel and we support the families left behind.

"Residents benefit daily from the knowledge and skills of these highly trained individuals and their unselfish dedication to the United States of America."

Grant said this has not been done before for employees who must take a leave of absence to serve in the military. He feels it is deserved recognition.

Semifinalists for the 2012 Freedom Award will be announced later next month.

A press release said, "The ESGR received 3,236 nominations nationwide. The Freedom Award is the Department of Defense's highest recognition for employers supporting members of the Guard and Reserve. Up to 15 recipients will be announced this summer and honored in Washington, D.C. on Sept. 20 at the 17th annual Freedom Award Ceremony."

"Guard and Reserve members, or family members acting on their behalf, nominated their civilian employers for the Freedom Award during the 12-week nomination season. Guard

and Reserve members, who stand ready to serve whenever our Nation needs them, often put their civilian lives on hold when they answer the call to duty. Supportive employers provide a tremendous amount of stability and peace of mind to these Citizen Warriors and their families, enabling them to continue their dedicated service to our country.

"Guardsmen and Reservists continue to receive outstanding support from their employers," said ESGR National Chair James G. Rebolz. "America's employers have not wavered in their commitment to these Citizen Warriors."

"Almost one-half of the U.S. military is comprised of the Guard and Reserve, and while most employers proudly support their military employees, Freedom Award recipients go

above and beyond what is required by law. Last year's recipients were nominated for superior acts of support including driving a deployed employee's children to school, replacing a military employee's broken family refrigerator while he was serving abroad, and working overtime to cover a service member's shifts so he could take part in military training.

"The Freedom Award was instituted in 1996 under the auspices of ESGR to recognize exceptional support from the employer community. In the years since, 160 employers have been honored with the award.

"Paramount to ESGR's mission is encouraging employment of Guardsmen and Reservists who bring integrity, global perspective, and proven leadership to the civilian workforce."



Kennedy-Reiter opens Muenster counseling office

A new service is being offered in Muenster by Kerri Kennedy-Reiter, M.Ed.;LPC. This week, she opened an office in the Muenster Family Medical Clinic. She provides counseling for three-year olds to adults. That includes individual counseling, family, and marriage.

Kerri explained that for the children she offers what is called play therapy. "I treat issues like anxiety, depression, abuse issues, past abuse issues, children's behavior disorders, Attention Deficit Activity Disorder (ADAD), and grief. I do a little bit of chemical dependency issues. In a rural community, you treat all ages and different issues. We help them develop the coping skills to deal with whatever."

From the University of North Texas, Kerri earned a Masters degree in Education specializing in Marriage and Family Counseling. She has been in private practice for 16 years. She has owned and operated A Better Tomorrow since 1998. She has an office in Gainesville and will now be there on Mondays only. Another counselor, Michaele Ann Bryson will see patients in the Gainesville office Tuesday through Friday.

Of her job as a counselor, Kerri said, "I feel that basically, people have the skills within them to deal with their issues, but my job is to help them find their strength and their support system and coping skills in order to help them deal whether it be a chronic disorder or a life issue that's come up. My job is to help them find those skills to deal with those things."

Kerri has always liked helping people. Of her career choice she remarked, "I thought at one time that I wanted to be a teacher.

I wanted to work with children, but then I realized that I really enjoyed working with them more one on one and felt like I could make more of a difference that way. I started out being interested in children, but it's developed into helping all ages."

Kerri and her husband Marc Reiter have been married for 17 years. They live in Lindsay and have two daughters, Madison, age eight, and Kortnie, age six.

Hobbies that Kerri enjoys include singing, exercise, playing with her kids, and scrapbooking.

"I'm just excited to be here in Muenster," Kerri said. "We have a lot of people who did come from Nocona and Saint Jo, so it will be nice to have this service a little closer for those folks. They've been good to drive all the way to Gainesville. They've been great here about referring to me. They're very holistic health, they believe in not just the medicine, but dealing with issues, not just giving out medication."

In the last five to 10 years, Kerri said she has seen a big change in the local community. "They are more willing to get help. That it doesn't have the stigma that it used to. I've been so impressed that just over the last several years, I feel that the community is very willing to get help for themselves or for their children. They are not in denial. We could all use counseling at some time or another and it's not a bad thing. It's a good thing. I've seen a lot of growth in that area - a lot of open mindedness."

All things are kept confidential, stressed Kerri.

CCAD reminds businesses to render their taxable property by April 16

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, then a rendition must be filed with the Cooke County Appraisal District by April 16. A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. Property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or an agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

"The appraisal district may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values," said Doug Smithson. "If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each

appraisal district office." You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the district of significant depreciation of your property. "For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood, or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2012," said Smithson.

The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 16. If a rendition is filed late, incomplete, or not at all, a 10 or 50% penalty may be imposed. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on

10 County children need a CASA advocate

Today, there are 10 Cooke County children who have entered the Child Welfare system who do not have the protective advocacy of a CASA volunteer. These most vulnerable children have come into the custody of the State (foster care) through no fault of their own due to abuse or neglect. CASA has seen an increase in the number of children coming into foster care. Since March, 2011, the number of Cooke County children in foster care has risen over 40%.

According to CASA's Executive Director Vicki Robertson, these children have been taken from everything they've known into a system that can be (in spite of the best of intentions on the part of both State officials and the utmost in dedication of local workers) overwhelming to the child. "State workers are extremely overloaded and cannot focus what is needed for every child under their watch at all times.

"But that's where CASA comes in. CASA volunteers are people who get involved with only one case. Because they have only one case, they can take the time to

get to know the child and his or her individual needs. This knowledge allows the CASA volunteer to speak up for what is best for the child, particularly when CASA reports these findings back to the District Judge, who has the tremendous responsibility of making decisions that affect the very lives of these vulnerable little ones," said Robertson.

CASA is conducting new advocate training this spring, with the first such training to begin in mid-March. In order to become a CASA volunteer, an individual must have a passion for the futures of our county's most vulnerable

children, have an average of 10 to 15 hours per month to dedicate for the children, pass background checks including CPS and criminal history checks (which must be clear), have good references and be over the age of 21. Individuals must then complete 33 hours of training provided by CASA before they are approved to serve as advocates for a child.

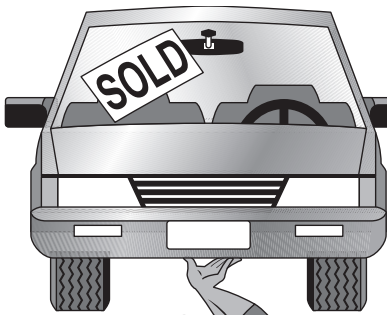

At the end of five weeks, they experienced a 10% drop in LDL (or "bad") cholesterol, and a drop in total cholesterol levels. The BOLD results were comparable to the gold standard of heart-healthy diets, the DASH diet (Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension) which was also consumed by study participants for comparison. Many of the BOLD menus incorporated recipes from the checkoff-funded Healthy Beef Cookbook.

Checkoff dollars were allocated to study the impact of lean beef on heart risk factors when red meat, including lean beef, became increasingly restricted in dietary recommendations for heart health. Previous checkoff-funded nutrition research suggested DASH unnecessarily restricted lean beef, according to Shalene McNeill, PhD, RD, executive director of human nutrition research for NCBA, which contracts to manage checkoff programs.

"However, until the checkoff-funded the BOLD work, we didn't have a comprehensive study that would validate the benefits of adding

more lean beef to the DASH diet and other diets like it that were being recommended most often to maintain or improve heart health," McNeill added.

The BOLD study is a prime example of how checkoff research works to help drive beef demand by pursuing and publishing the scientific evidence that ultimately persuades consumers and influencers that lean beef is not only good, but good for you.

"The checkoff is the only research initiative focused solely on establishing and communicating the beneficial role of beef in the diet and addressing nutrition misperceptions," Peeler explained. Unlike the research conducted by many private industries, the ultimate goal of checkoff research is to publish results in peer-reviewed scientific journals, thus creating a public record of the results.

By early January 2012, positive news about the BOLD study had appeared in more than 60 state/national media outlets.

The BOLD study results appear in the January 2012 issue of the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, published by the Society for Nutrition Science. The study is available online at <http://bit.ly/BOLDAJCN>.

County Agent's Report

Watch for Armyworms!

Large numbers of moths (millers) are being reported in Cooke County and in the rest of Texas. Dr. Allen Knutson, Extension entomologist, has caught many of these. The ones he has inspected are believed to be the adult version of the True Armyworm. However, it is possible that those in Cooke County could also be the adult Fall Armyworm. In either case, it is important to monitor the situation closely.

Dr. Knutson states, "These insects overwinter along the Gulf Coast, and the moths are now migrating north. The locally cool, wet weather conditions are favorable for an armyworm outbreak, so I would advise growers to inspect small grains and pastures closely during the next few weeks for potential

armyworm infestations." Homeowners should also be aware of the potential for armyworm infestations in their lawn and ornamental plants.

While it is possible that migrating moths will not result in a huge worm population; the favorable weather and large number of moths, make an armyworm outbreak a good possibility this spring. Although, a variety of natural enemies keep fall armyworm larvae down to moderate numbers.

Early detection of larvae is the best management tool and is achieved by frequent, thorough inspection of plants. Dr. Knutson estimates that it takes five days for eggs to hatch at this time of year. The hatching larvae are very small, so it might take a week of growing before one could find them. Therefore, producers are encouraged to begin scouting for small armyworms about 10 days to two weeks after first seeing moths in the fields.

When scouting, you should know armyworms feed any

time of the day or night, but are most active early in the morning or late in the evening. The first sign of armyworm feeding is noticed where the small larvae eat away the green tissue, leaving the leaf veins. This is called a "window pane" feeding effect. They begin feeding on lower leaves and then move up the plant. Once the larvae get larger, about 1/4 inch, they begin eating notches out of the leaves, veins and all. The larvae feed for about 25 days, depending on temperature.

To my knowledge, no outbreaks of armyworms have been noticed ...yet. Not a occurrences of armyworm larvae warrant control. Armyworms only require control when they occur in large numbers or plant damage is becoming excessive. At that time, there are many insecticide options for homeowners and agricultural producers to choose from.
