

The award exists to recognize outstanding achievement by rural and community hospital administrators for their leadership and dedication to the profession. Gordon Russell, the award's namesake, was the administrator of Hi-Plains Hospital for over 40 years and a former mayor of Hale Center,

Endres is currently approaching his fourth year as administrator of ETMC Jacksonville. He has 20 years experience in hospital administration and another six years practicing law in Dallas. Before taking the position in Jacksonville, Jack was associate administrator of ETMC Athens for six years and CEO at Muenster Hospital District for the first 10 years of his health care career.



In other action at Monday's meeting, Regents approved a resolution to provide notice of intent to approve a leasepurchase contract for the NCTC Flower Mound campus located at 1200 Parker Square in Flower Mound.

Currently, the College leases the facility from Eagle Equity, who plans to sell the property to National Campus and Community Development Corporation. The current lease of the 32,000 square foot facility is for 10 years with options to extend the lease four times at fiveyear intervals, for a total of 30 years. The College currently has the option to purchase the facility at five-year intervals beginning in December 2015.

Craig Cunningham, an inrestment banker with Wells Nelson & Associates, briefed the Board on the proposal to amend the lease and the

NCTC appoints new regent

For example, under the current lease, the College would pay \$747,000 in rental expense in 2013. Under the amended lease-purchase agreement, the total amended lease expense would be \$569,118. The College would also have the option of purchasing the facility beginning in 2022. If they wait until the lease-purchase agreement expires in 2032, the College could buy the facility for \$1.

Cunningham explained that the College would see projected savings of more than \$3 million over the term of the agreement. Regents called the agreement a "winwin" for the College and voted unanimously to approve the resolution.

The College will now publish notice of that intent in local newspapers to summarize the major provisions of the proposed contract.

No ad valorem taxes will be used for the payment of this agreement. The College will fund the expenses of the agreement from its operation budget with revenue from tuition and fees, as they have since the campus opened in January of 2011.

Regents also voted unanimously to approve a tax abatement application from BMCA Gainesville LLC. The company, which manufactures roofing materials, plans to expand with a \$26 million investment and hopes to increase their workforce by at least 18 employees.

Regents approved tuition and tuition-related fees effective Fall 2012.

Under the new fee schedule, tuition and fees for indistrict students would increase by \$2 per credit hour.

would see an increase of \$3 per credit hour, while outof-state students would see an increase of \$10 per credit

Currently, NCTC posts the third-lowest in-district rate among the 50 Texas community colleges, the 14th lowest for out-of-district rates, and the 16th lowest for out-of-

state rates.

Discounted rates would still be offered for dual credit students. In-district dual credit students will see an increase of \$2 per credit hour for a proposed rate of \$37, which is \$14 lower than the regular tuition and fee rate. Out-of-district students and out-of-state dual credit students will see a significant decrease in tuition and fees. The out-of-district dual credit students currently pay \$82, but that fee will drop to \$72 under the new rates. Out-of-state dual credit students will also pay \$72 instead of the \$140 they are currently paying.

The discounted rates will make NCTC more competitive with area community colleges that offer dual credit courses in close proximity.

Board members also heard a first reading of proposed revisions to Board policy regarding student rights and responsibilities for student conduct, specifically scholastic dishonesty.

The Board approved administrative and professional contracts for 2012-13 and voted to hire Brandy Fausel as a Matrix Grant Specialist. They also accepted the resignation of Fran Perdue, an Associate degree nursing instructor.

The Board voted to schedule their next regular meeting for 4 p.m. on May 10 before graduation.

Cooke County has two Justice of the Peace precincts and each of those precincts are served by a constable. Constable for Pct. 1 is currently held by Terry Gilbert who is now running for the Sheriff's job. Carl F. Rickert, Jr. of Gainesville and Chris Watson of Gainesville both filed as candidates for that position. R.M. "Dick" Roth of Valley View is the constable for Pct. 4 and seeks re-election. Vying for that position is Russ Harper of Era.

Each candidate was asked to provide written responses to three questions. Their answers and personal informa-

Watson and his wife Marv Lee have seven children and 12 grandchildren. He is a retired police officer with the State of Texas Highway Patrol. Chris enjoys playing golf and spending time with

Roth is married to Cynthia, his high school sweetheart. He is a professional peace officer and Cooke County Pct. 4 constable. His hobbies are music, science, reading, and education.

Harper and his wife Dixie have been married 23 years. She is the school nurse at Era ISD. His family includes son and daughter-in-law, Rvan and Rachel Musser, daughter, son-in-law, and grandson, Nicole, Jay, and Corbin Miller, daughter, Kassidy Harper, son Kody Harper. He has 18 years experience in law enforcement and has been a deputy sheriff at Cooke County Sheriff's department for the past eight years. What do you perceive to be the responsibilities of a County Constable?

Rickert - The responsibile ities of a County Constable are many. In my opinion, I will not only be responsible for civil duties such as serving civil processes, such as subpoenas, eviction notices, warrants, any of a number of criminal processes, and writs, all of which I have ficers are sworn to serve and done assisting the Sher- protect and this includes the drug and burglary arrests, iff's Departments as a New Hampshire State Trooper. I, as constable will have this authority in Cooke County and contiguous counties. I shall provide patrol, investigative, and security services throughout the county as needed, arrests, if needed, without warrant, and Bailiff duties when needed. I have provided Bailiff services as a state trooper. I also feel that my responsibilities include answering to the County Commissioners AND to the CITIZENS of Pct. 1. I believe that I have the responsibility of providing a safe living environment to the rural areas of the county as well as the non-rural areas. In speaking with Cooke County residents of Pct. 1, I have learned that they are extremely concerned in the areas of burglary and drugs. Along with issues like school absenteeism and school zone enforcement, I will aggressively address these issues by employing the use of patrol, informants, citizen input, and cooperation with any law enforcement agency that requests my assistance. I shall utilize all legal and ethical resources that I deem necessary to do my part to fulfill my promise to the citizens of Pct. 1. I shall provide, to the best of my ability, a safe environment in which to live and raise a family.

Watson - The constable's main responsibilities are to serve as bailiff for the Justice of the Peace Court. The constable is the law enforcement arm of the justice of the peace court. He would protect the judge and her supporting staff and the citizens who have business with the Court. The constable would serve all civil court orders that come from the court and any other court. These come in the order of writs, citations, warrants, subpoenas, and eviction notices just to mention a few. Bailiff and civil serving are the two

form as an elected constable. When the court business is finished, constables have a lot of freedom to perform other duties, those things that promote public safety in the precinct and county he is elected. Constables are peace officers and elected to a four year term by Texas statute. Constables have to be self starters. They are responsible for the budget and staying within the budget. They should work hand in hand with all law enforcement agencies in the County and assist whenever and where ever they are needed. Constables do work with the judge and educational system on truancy and unexcused absence.

Constables have to get out and meet the people. Find out what their concerns are. Constables should be pro active in the community, not re

Roth - The constable is the oldest and second most powerful peace officer in the state, second only to a game warden. Commissioned in 1823 in the Stephen F. Austin colony, the constables were the ranging peace officers of the courts. Today, the constable's jurisdiction is their immediate county and all surrounding counties, which allows the constable serving warrants to go to an adjacent county, arrest offenders, and bring them before the court without magistration. Constables have all the powers and responsibilities of regular peace officers to deal with criminal law, but as officers of the courts they must also deal with the civil laws.

Now, the constable is required by law to have all the qualifications of a peace officer to deal with criminal law enforcement like any police officer or sheriff. But, because constables are officers of the court, they are also required to be educated in civil law, which is not a qualification of the normal law enforcement professional. A constable is required to have twice the education and keep up twice the continuing education units of a regular peace officer. A constable serves warrants and all the papers of the courts, deals with truancy, and patrols in addition to routine peace officer duties.

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

Q: What causes fog? **A:** Fog - and mist - aresimply clouds that form immediately above the ground, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Fog can occur at different times for different reasons," he explains. "The most common form is radiation fog, usually called ground fog. If the air near the ground is cooled sufficiently, it becomes saturated and fog can develop. This often occurs at night and this time of year. The longer nights allow the ground more time to grow cold enough to condense water vapor into the air, resulting in fog.'

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
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Sacred Heart teams District Track Championships


