## Burleson Named on Budget Committee

The Democratic Caucus of the U. S. House of Representatives today voted Congressman Omar Burleson (D) of Texas to a second term on the Budget Committee. Burleson was elected to serve on the Budget Committee as a representative of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Terms to the House Budget Committee are normally limited to one session of Congress. Although Burleson has already served for one Congress (the 94th Congress, 1975-76) he was one of seven Members of Congress designated for consideration to serve on the Committee for four years to maintain continuity.

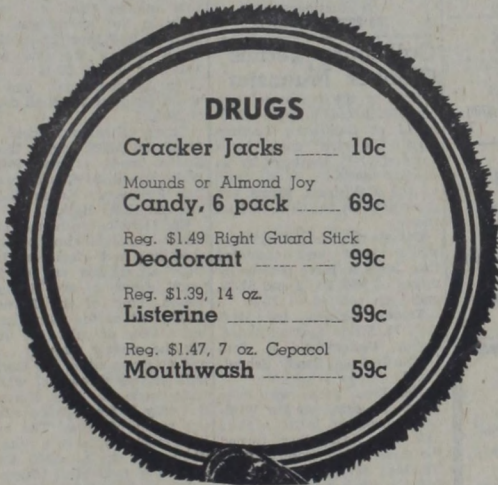

The project was carried out to aid in beautification of the SH campus and to grow in appreciation of the benefits provided by trees.

### Keep CB Antenna From Power Lines

"Beware of nearby power lines!" That was the word of warning issued today by officials of Texas Power & Light Company to customers who may be planning do-it-yourself installation of base station citizen band radio antennas.

Heavy sales of CB equipment have been reported in recent months, especially with introduction of 40-channel CBs, January 1.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission recently reported 92 deaths and another 156 injuries associated with CB antennas mounted alongside private dwellings on masts or towers. Most of the accidents occurred when the antenna, while being installed or removed, came in contact with power lines.

TP&L officials urge that these safety measures be taken when installation is being made:

- 1) Avoid situating antennas anywhere near power lines.
  - 2) Tie-off the antenna with a rope so that in the event it should fall during installation or removal it will not come in contact with power lines.
- TP&L officials suggest that the inexperienced consult with a company representative before attempting installation.

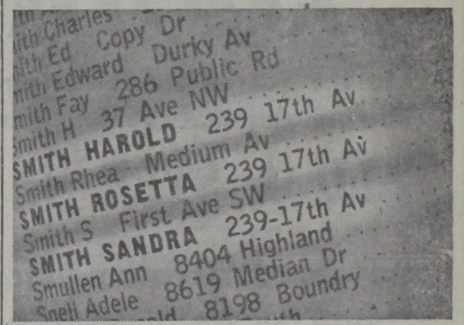

Commonly called the FDIC, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was created by Congress in the Bank Act of 1933, and became effective on the first of January, 1934, during the depths of the Great Depression.

Deposits in virtually all banks in the country are insured up to \$40,000 by this agency of the federal government. Coverage extends to bank checking accounts, savings accounts and certificates of deposit.

Increases in the amount of the insurance stand as something of a yardstick to measure the affluence and savings habits of Americans. When the FDIC first began insuring accounts the limit was \$2,500. That amount has steadily increased up to the present level which went into effect on November 27, 1974.

Contrary to some misconceptions, this valuable service is not financed by the government, but rather by the banks themselves. Presently, banks are assessed one-half of one percent of their year-end deposits.

**Pate Museum Will Salute Air Force**

"A Salute to the U. S. Air Force" will be the theme at the Pate Museum of Transportation during February and March. Special exhibits will feature historic photographs and motion pictures showing the history of the U. S. Air Force and the Strategic Air Command. Airmen from Carswell Air Force Base will demonstrate Life Support Systems used aboard aircraft. On display will be eight Air Force aircraft and three missiles.

A moving picture show featuring "The Thirty Year Professionals: The History of SAC" and "The Giant Step: The History of Aviation and the U. S. Air Force" will be shown every Saturday and Sunday from 2:30 to 3:30. The exhibits and aircraft will be on display to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily except Monday.

Historic Air Force aircraft and missiles on display will include a C-47 "Gooney Bird", C-119 "Flying Boxcar", CH-21B "Flying Banana" helicopter, F-84 "Thunderflash" jet, F-86 "Sabre" jet, T-33 "Shooting Star" jet, F-101 "Voodoo" jet, HU-16B "Albatross", Quail Missile, Bomarc Missile and Houng Dog Missile.

Perhaps the most famous aircraft on display is the C-47, nicknamed "Gooney Bird". It was built by Douglas Aircraft Corp. and used as a 21-passenger troop carrier and also functioned as a cargo transport. The C-47 was used both militarily and commercially. The commercial version was the DC-3. Powered by two Pratt & Whitney R-1930-92 engines, it has a wing span of 95', is 64'4" long, 16'10" high and operates at a maximum speed of 230 mph. Maximum weight 33,000 lbs., empty weight 18,135 lbs. This airplane was flown to the Pate Museum of Transportation from MacArthur Field, Long Island, New York.

The Pate Museum of Transportation is located on U. S. Highway 377 between Fort Worth and Cresson, Texas. Admission is free.

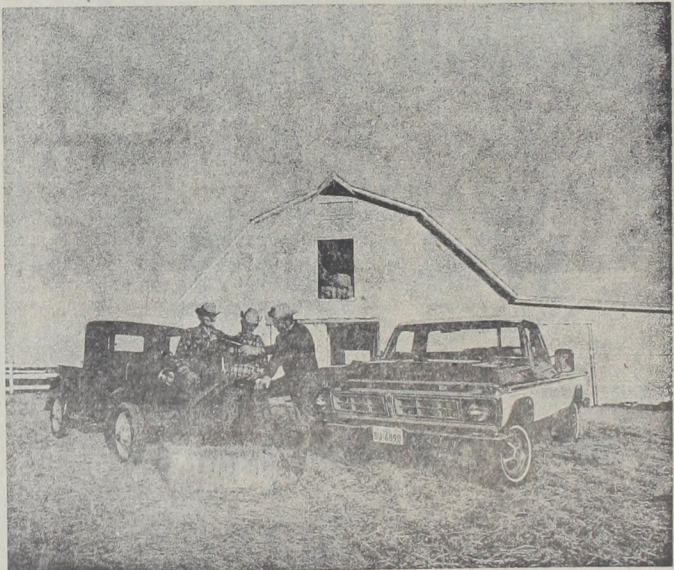
