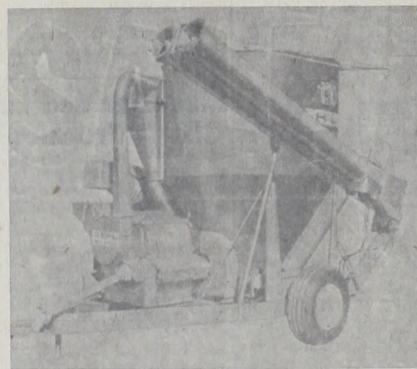

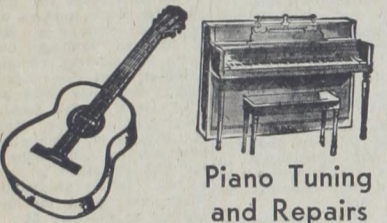

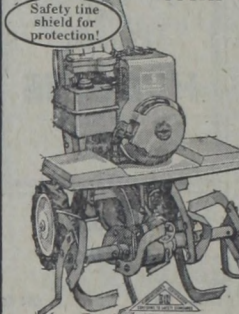

TP&L Sends Gas To Eastern States
Texas Utilities Fuel Company, an affiliate of Texas Power & Light Company and subsidiary of Texas Utilities Company, announced that it is making available 50 million cubic feet of natural gas per day to the interstate pipeline system in cooperation with

the Federal Power Commission efforts to relocate natural gas to the eastern part of the United States. "We will implement a procedure that we have studied for some weeks of our ability to transmit gas through the interstate system," J. F. Skelton, president of Texas Power & Light Company, said. "Our offer to assist in

making our gas available is dependent on no further curtailment by our present gas suppliers and the continued availability of other fuels. Our offer is on a day-to-day basis. Fuel oil reserves will be used as the substitute boiler fuel. "We must maintain the integrity of the TP&L system in supplying the electric en-

ergy needs of about 600,000 customers to one-fifth of the State of Texas. We will continue to offer natural gas as long as it is needed, based upon our ability to deliver it." Customers of TP&L and its affiliate companies, Dallas Power & Light, and Texas Electric Service Company, will not be affected either through

the availability of electric energy or in the price of electricity. Company officials expect to implement the program immediately. Skelton further noted that the offer to assist is only a temporary answer to an emergency situation existing today, but that the long-range problem must be met by the development of a National

Energy Policy to include the full utilization of coal and nuclear energy. Skelton noted that other states must be willing to assist the nation in developing their full energy resources. Nobody knows the exact age of the human race, but everybody agrees that it is old enough to know better.

Enrollment in the Kindergarten is down two. George Hensley, has moved to Gainesville and Jewel Hacker has moved to California.

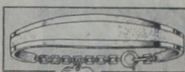
