

## M. Burgess to speak at CCRW meeting

Congressman Michael C. Burgess, M.D. will be the featured speaker at the Cooke County Republican Women's meeting at 7 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 2, at the First Christian Church, 401 N. Dixon in Gainesville.

Congressman Burgess spent nearly three decades practicing medicine as an OB/Gyn in North Texas before being elected to Congress in 2002. During his time on Capitol Hill, he has earned a reputation as a problem-solver who seeks sensible solutions to the challenges Americans face.

Dr. Burgess serves on the prestigious House Energy and Commerce Committee and is the top Republican on the Oversight and Investigations

## WHAT DOES A TRAFFIC FINE COST IN MUENSTER?

Muenster seems to carry a reputation for drivers doing what they please and changing some traffic rules to suit their convenience. This includes illegal U-turns to park on the street opposite of the direction one is traveling and cruising through streets, without yielding when traveling north and south and yielding even when you have the right-of-way when traveling east and west. Out-of towners beware!

Despite these unconventional practices, Muenster does have traffic laws and consequences when law enforcement tickets the offender. Traffic court is held on the first Saturday of the month. The Honorable Dorthy Lewis presides over Muenster Municipal Court, hearing appeals and doling out sentences.

In some instances, a person may choose not to appear in court for the ticket. If you wish to plead not guilty, you must go to court. By pleading nolo contendere (no wish to contend) or guilty, a court appearance can be waived. In this case, the fine must be paid. If you fail to appear or fail to enter a plea of nolo contendere or not guilty, an additional charge of Violate Promise to Appear will be charged and a warrant will be issued against you.

In some cases, the charge may be dismissed by successfully completing a driving safety course or motorcycle training course.

Minors ticketed with a violation of the law cannot waive a court appearance. Juveniles 17 and under

must appear in court with a parent, guardian, or proof of marriage.

For all moving offenses which occur in a work zone with workers present, the fine will be double. Also, violations in school zones may incur a different fine.

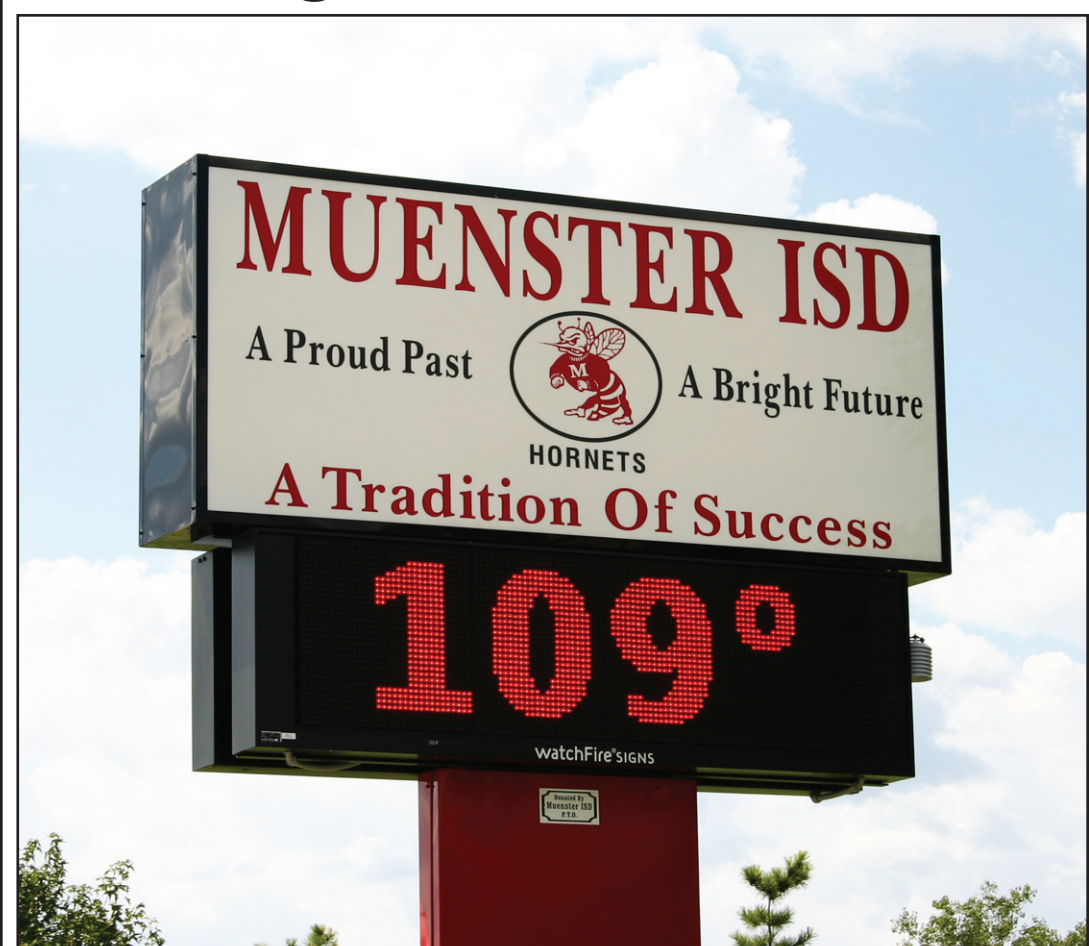

## County imposes lower speed limit on Fisher Road/CR 302

Concern over excessive speed on County Road 302 in Precinct #3 prompted residents to compile a petition which they signed and submitted to Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith. They asked that the speed be reduced to 35 mph.

Smith explained, "CR 302 is commonly known in the local area as Fisher's Road. It is a paved road that does have, by count, somewhere around 22 children of school age - very young children. The speeds are excessive on it, the citizens noted and so we are going to take the action to reduce the speed to 35 mph and see if we can get people to adhere to it." The Court supported the request.

County Clerk Rebecca Lawson requested approval for the consolidation of voting precincts for the November 2010 general election to save the County money.

Commissioner Smith said that there are a lot of consolidations proposed for his precinct and he is not in favor of consolidation for a general election.

Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement said he's been approached by several people who indicated that when voting precincts are combined, they drive 25 to 30 miles compared to four or five miles.

Commissioner Steve Key added that it causes confusion at the polls.

Due to the confusion, added travel, and some people not voting when polls are consolidated, Commissioners agreed not to consolidate the November election and no action took place. Approving the list of election judges was tabled until the next meeting since more would be required.

Cooke County Sheriff Mike Compton approached Commissioners for approval of setting rates for rabies testing and control. The

Cooke County Sheriff was approved as the local rabies control authority in 1998. He asked approval to fund reimbursement of charges to the local veterinarian from the Sheriff's existing budget for 2009-10 and 2010-11.

The Sheriff clarified, "We only pay these charges when the people who bring in the animal cannot pay or if they left the dog and then were able to get out of the County without us catching them. We make them pay including for removing the head, and the boosters, etc. They are the ones who got bitten."

There is only one veterinarian in the County who does the procedure and according to County Judge John Roane, the only one approved to do the procedures.

Fees in question are rabies observation and quarantine \$20 per day; rabies booster \$17; euthanasia of the dog \$32; shipping of head for testing \$87.50; cremation of carcass is according to size.

Judge Roane stressed that these are things that have to be done according to Health and Safety Code.

Sheriff Compton was asked by Commissioner Smith if there were any prisoners from Wichita County being housed in the jail. He said there were 65. They are here while the Wichita County jail is undergoing renovations, and there had been a jail break.

Cooke County Emergency Coordinator/Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher did not recommend instating a burn ban in the County at this time.

"There is probably some confusion out there because people are going to the website," he said. "The KBDI, the drought index, is a number that we use to help us realize when it is getting closer to base time (burn ban). We also base it on fire behavior and fire occurrence - how often are they happening and how hard are they to control."

The weekend of Aug. 5-6, the radar from which KBDI numbers are derived, was down for five days. Rainfall of 4-5" that weekend was not recorded for the KBDI index report. He feels that the numbers are actually 100 to 150 points lower than indicated. With this information, no action was taken.

Commissioner Klement reported on progress of the Courthouse restoration. "Things are starting to take off," he said. "There's quite a bit going on."

All the old tile on the bathroom floors has been removed. The drain in the floor is now the highest point in the room in most of the bathrooms. Also, the walls are not level with the floor. Things have sagged over the years causing problems with the levelness.

X-raying of beams is being done this week to avoid drilling holes through structural steel in reinforcement bars. The holes are needed to install chiller pipes and water lines.

A public hearing was held on the proposed closing of the 1/10 mile end portion of Reason Jones Road in Precinct #2. Terry Como, property owner on both sides, made the request due to trash being dumped on his property and experiencing some break-ins. He agreed to relocate the cul de sac.

Notices of the proposed closing and the hearing were posted on both ends of the roads. Property owners within 200 feet were notified and none made objections. With no objections, the closing request received approval.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Approved auction proceeds from the sale of various surplus office equipment and computers, and surplus equipment from Road & Bridge Precinct #4.
- Approved as surplus four Motorola M1225 VHF radios

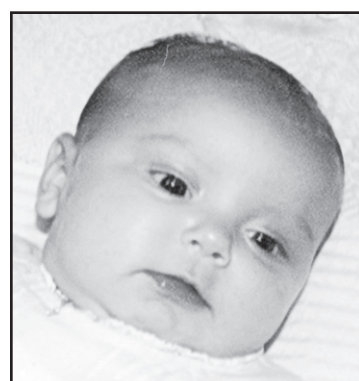

## MISD charts progress through ACT tests

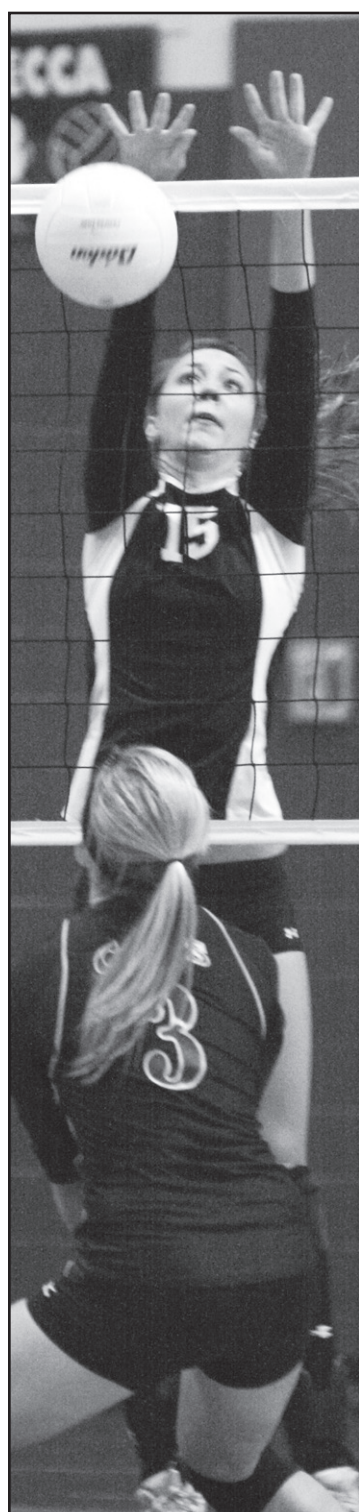

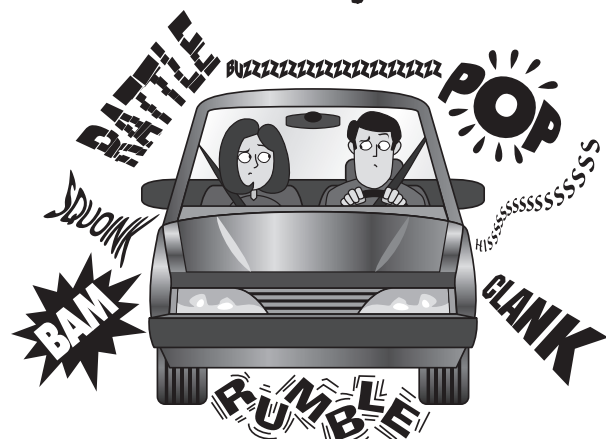



## GRAZING SYSTEM SEMINAR AND RANCH TOUR SCHEDULED

If so, then you'll definitely want to check out Texas Farm Bureau's newest edition of Texas Ag Stats, found online on the Bureau's main homepage at www.txfb.org. To access, click the "Ag Stats" link that appears on the dropdown menu of the Education button found on the organization's top toolbar.

Texas Ag Stats begins with a listing of the top 15 commercial commodities in the state of Texas, including the information about what that crop or livestock means

financially each year to the state's producers and how that compares nationally to other states.

Using the most recent data from the National Agricultural Statistic Service, Texas Department of Agriculture, and Texas Farm Bureau's www.BeAgSmart.com website, Texas Ag Stats provides a by-the-numbers view most of the major crops and livestock grown in Texas, including specific crop data, top production counties, and other items of interest specific to each category.

"While hardly a complete view of all the products grown in Texas, this is an encyclopedic look at most of the major money makers in the state's second largest industry," said Gene Hall,

public relations director for the Texas Farm Bureau. "It's perfect for those who need a ready reference of production numbers in the Lone Star State, or those who are just curious about how we rate nationally in some specific crop category."

In addition to the latest version of Texas Ag Stats, there is also a handy reference chart depicting the breakdown of a consumer's food dollar, showing how money is doled out each step of the way, from farm gate to our home pantries. There is also a ready reference source showing how Texas farm land is used, by percentages.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORT

### Where have the fire ants gone?

Recently, several people have mentioned to me that it seems that the fire ant population has been reduced. With the summer heat, fire ant mounds seem to disappear. Unfortunately, this really is not the case.

Dr. Mike Merchant, Extension urban entomologist, has recently assured me that we have not seen a reduction in fire ant numbers. Fire ants are normally down during mid-summer. Some of this is die-off from very hot temps, but a lot of it is just reduced daytime ant activity and cessation of mound-building. Mounds are not needed for soil warming in the summer and only appear after heavy

rains when soil is waterlogged.

He also mentioned that there was a period about eight to 10 years ago when fire ant numbers were significantly lower than normal during an extended drought, but this was a temporary reduction. He believes this year's fluctuation in numbers will be temporary also.

I am sure that many of you are still seeing signs of fire ants even though you are not seeing mounds. In cases like this, if you want to use a bait, then you want to treat in the evening when the dew has burned off the grass and it is cooler, so fire ants should be out foraging. Always use fresh bait and read and follow label instructions. Make sure that you water in a product if you the label instructs you to do so. Many times people do not achieve the control they want because they forgot to water in the product. Watch out! When the temperatures recede and adequate moisture returns you can expect fire ants to be as prevalent as ever.

## Vitamin B6, found in meat, linked to lower lung cancer risk

Vitamin B6, found in meat and poultry in plentiful amounts, is being linked to a lower risk of developing lung cancer, according to a new study appearing this week in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

The European study, led by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) and funded by the World Cancer Research Fund (WCRF), followed 520,000 participants from 10 countries between 1992 and 2000. Blood samples taken at the start of the study were measured for four B-vitamins (B2, B6, folate (B9), and B12), as well as methionine and homocysteine.

Overall, the study found that people with above average levels of B6 and methionine had less than half the

risk of developing lung cancer than those with below average levels. A lower risk was also seen with higher levels of folate consumption. The results were the same for smokers, for people who had never smoked, and those who had quit smoking prior to the start of the study. The lower risk was also observed regardless of time interval since blood collection, indicating the results were not explained by the early stages of the disease.

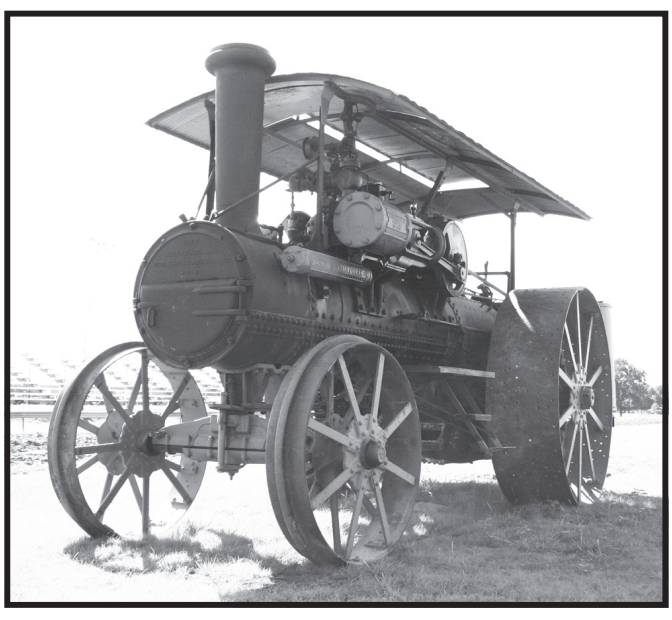
