County seeks aid for damaged roads

Some roads in Cooke County suffer a beating daily from heavy oilfield truck traffic. Commissioners hope to find some financial assistance with the constant needed repairs to those roads. A good part of that traffic occurs in Precinct #3.

At Monday, May 14 meeting, Commissioners Court considered a resolution for a County Road Repair Pro-

Entities report election results

Voters went to the polls on Saturday, May 12 to fill board seats or vote in special elections. Only a small percentage of voters took time to cast votes in any of the elections concerning Muen-

The City of Muenster asked voters to approve or disapprove of alcohol sales in recently annexed areas of the City. With 139 votes cast, 96 were for and 43 against. The City has 1,080 registered voters. Results were reported by Election Judge Brenda Simpson and are unofficial until the City Council meets on May 16 to canvass the votes.

Muenster Hospital Board had three three-year term positions expiring. All three incumbents - Aaron Hess, Kenny Klement, and Ronnie Weinzapfel filed for another term. Also filing were Bob Ambrose, Mary Del Olmo, and Steven Fisher.

The three candidates receiving the most votes will serve on the Board. Results reported by the Hospital District are Ronnie Weinzapfel 215, Mary Del Olmo my Bezner, and Vicki Thur-153, Bob Ambrose 135, Aaron Hess 98, Kenny Klement 97, and Steven Fisher 69.

Votes will be canvassed on Friday, May 18. Weinzapfel, Del Olmo, and Ambrose will be sworn in at the May 22 meeting of the Hospital

Lindsay ISD sought voter support for a \$7.9 million bond. The bond proposal included a new Ag Science facility, a 12,865 square foot high school classroom addition, library and media addition, locker room for the gym, administration building, new cafetorium, new playground, and ADA updates.

Voters strongly opposed the bond with 147 voting for and 465 against.

There were two trustee positions up for election on the Lindsay ISD Board. Chris Hundt and Jenny Corcoran won the seats. Voters cast 334 votes for Hundt, 299 for Corcoran, 206 for Phil Metzler, 180 for Regi Kle-ment, 150 for Andy Popp, 57 for Herbie Price, and 48 for Marilyn Sebade.

Current Board members are Bruce Bezner, Tommy Haverkamp, Jill Fuhrmann, Jim Ott, Lloyd Reiter, Tamman. Bezner and Reiter did not seek election and will be replaced by Hundt and Cor-



rently serves as the County's tax assessor/collector. This job title is a bit misleading since that office does not assess the value of property nor does it any longer send out tax statements or collect the taxes for the various entities. That is the job of the Cooke County Appraisal District now. They do receive monthly reports from the CCAD which the Tax Assessor Office breaks down. They receive a check once a week on County taxes paid. These are taken to the County Auditor and a copy to the County Treasurer.

Knight said the Constitution set up the office, but in 1981, the voters changed it into the Appraisal District.

The Tax Assessor Collector's office did not make the move back into the newly renovated Courthouse. There was not sufficient space in that building after remodeling to its original floor plan. The space for that County office will remain at 212 East California Street until the Courthouse Annex building is remodeled to accommodate the Tax Assessor/Collector's Office needs. Knight

According to Knight, each county is a little different in the services they offer.

That office has a number of responsibilities. One is the overseeing of elections. They are the voter registrar (lists by voting precinct) and also register voters. Knight explained, "We do the voter side. We encode all of the information. We build the elections and then the County Clerk is responsible for the actual election." They are online with the Secretary of the State with voter registration.

Knight's office is the place to go for vehicle and boat registration, voter registration, and licensing and permits for alcoholic beverage permits in the County. Not all counties do boat registra-

Norbert Flusche, Sr. 1919 - 2012

Mass of Christian Burial for Norbert Leonard Flusche. Sr., age 92 of Saint Jo, was held at 2 p.m., Wednesday, May 16, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Muenster. Burial was in Hood Cemetery, Hood community south of Muenster. A Rosary/ Vigil was held at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, May 15 at McCoy Funeral Home in Saint Jo, followed by visitation. Services were officiated by Rev. Ken Robinson and directed by McCoy Funeral Home, Saint Jo.

Mr. Flusche died at 6:17 p.m., Sunday, May 13, 2012 at Muenster Health and Re-


Norbert was born on June 1919 in Cooke County, Texas, to Otto Stephen and Lillian Goike Flusche. He was raised in the Gainesville/Lindsay area and attended St. Mary's Catholic School in Gainesville. While growing up and until entering the Army Air Corp, Norbert worked with his family doing all sorts of farm and ranch work. He worked for some time at the produce house in Gainesville, and hauled hay and wood while at home working with and for his future father-in-law, Bob Swindle. Norbert married Wilma Swindle on Nov. 6, 1941 at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Gainesville. On Dec. 1, 1941, Norbert

was drafted into the Army Air Corps, serving until Aug. 29, 1945. His duties were mainly mechanic work. He qualified as a marksman in rifle firing and had even jumped from aircraft a few

After his service, he and Wilma moved to the Saint Jo area in 1945. He again worked with his father-inlaw trucking, hay hauling, and at the Swindle Feed Store. Upon the death of his father-in-law, Norbert took possession of the feed store which he renamed Flusche Feed Store in 1958. He owned and operated the feed store for several years, then transferred ownership to his son Norbert, Jr. in 1978. He then was involved in horse and cattle trading and hauling. He did this the remainder of his active life.

Norbert was a member of Sacred Heart Parish, the Knights of Columbus, the Saint Jo City Council from and wife Lina Jo of Saint Jo; 1959 until 1968, was appointed mayor of Saint Jo in 1968 and elected mayor in 1969. He served on the Saint Jo ISD Board for several years and was a charter member of the Saint Jo Riding Club which originated in 1957. He served a lengthy period as vice president and had devoted numerous hours of labor in the construction of the rodeo arena in 1960. He also hauled riding club horses to various rodeos and parades. His ingenuity in developing a portable chute for loading/unloading horses anywhere proved to be invaluable. A great family man, Norbert enjoyed being with his wife and children and many friends. A special group was the Dairy Queen bunch at the Cowboy Cor-

New regulations to affect boaters, anglers on Texoma and Red River

Recent changes mean that boaters and be allowed to collect shad for bait in Texoma anglers who take steps designed to prevent the spread of invasive species such as zebra mussels, silver carp, and bighead carp won't have to worry about being in violation of state laws prohibiting the possession of certain exotic species. These changes take

"Boaters and anglers on Lake Texoma, Lake Lavon, and the Red River and its tributaries are being asked to take proactive steps toward being good stewards of the state's aquatic resources by draining all water from their watercraft before leaving a boat ramp and hitting the road," said Brian Van Zee, regional inland fisheries director for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

Zebra mussels have become well established in Lake Texoma, and they can be spread to other waters by boats. Boaters are already prohibited from transporting exotic species that are visible to the naked eye, such as adult zebra mussels.

The new regulation is intended to prevent the spread of zebra mussel larvae, or veligers, which are so tiny they cannot be seen without a microscope. Veligers can survive for days in water trapped in a boat. Boaters on Lakes Texoma and Lavon who drain all bait buckets, livewells, bilges and any other systems or receptacles that could contain water prior to traveling on a public roadway will not be considered to be in possession of zebra mussels in violation of state law, with certain

"The regulation does allow persons to travel from one boat ramp to another on the same water body without draining water," said Ken Kurzawski, regulations and information director for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division. and then go below the dam to fish without draining water.'

In short, all water will need to be removed from a boat before leaving Lakes Texoma or Lavon for another lake, the boater's home or other destination. The regulation applies to the Red River from the I-44 bridge in Wichita County downstream to the Arkansas border. including all Texas waters of Lake Texoma

A second regulation designed to prevent the spread of silver and bighead carp also takes effect May 17. This regulation primarily affects anglers who collect live bait; it prohibits the transport of live non-game fish from waters known to be inhabited by the two species of carp. Waters affected are the Red River below Lake Texoma downstream to the Arkansas border, Big Cypress Bayou downstream of Ferrell's Bridge Dam on Lake O'the Pines (including the Texas waters of Caddo Lake), and the Sulphur River downstream of the Lake Wright Patman Dam.

"Collection and use of non-game fishes for bait on those water bodies will still be legal," said Kurzawski. "The regulation prohibits the moving of live bait fish from one water body to another. Young silver and bighead carp can easily be confused with native bait fish such as gizzard and threadfin shad. Anglers need to note that while it will be legal to take shad from Lake Texoma to below Denison Dam on the Red River, it will not be legal to take live bait from the Red River below the dam back to Lake Texoma or any other water body."

The new regulations are one part of the next phase of a continuing effort to protect the waters of Texas from invasive species. In late May, TPWD will launch a public information campaign aimed at getting boaters to Clean, Drain, and Dry their boats in order to help stop the spread of zebra mussels and other invasives. The campaign will use billboards, to take out at one ramp and go to another banners, signage at area businesses, buoys for weigh-in. Guides and anglers will also at boat ramps, and radio public service an-

sage across.

potential to hinder the water supply of communities throughout North Texas by damaging water treatment plants and clogging water supply pipelines. Once they have become established in a reservoir, there is no known way to get rid of them. Zebra mussels were brought to Lake Texoma on boats trailered in from other states with infected lakes. Stopping their transport from one water body to another by boats appears to be the only way to prevent their spread.






















New bill would preserve Clean Water Act

The American Farm Bueau Federation asked members of Congress to support H.R. 4965, a bill that would preserve existing U.S. water rights and responsibilities to the Clean Water Act. The bipartisan bill was introduced by Reps. John Mica (R-Fla.), Nick Rahall (D-W.Va.), Frank Lucas (R-Okla.), Collin Peterson (D-Minn.), and Bob Gibbs

According to AFBF, H.R. 4965 does not alter the Clean Water Act, but it merely reaffirms longstanding provisions in the law. It would prevent the Environmental Protection Agency and the Army Corps of Engineers from pursuing the agencies' proposed Final Guidance on Identifying Waters Protected by the Clean Water Act and from using it as a basis for regulation.

"In Farm Bureau's view, the agencies' proposal improperly changes the law of the land," said AFBF President Bob Stallman in a letter to House members. "The Guidance effectively eliminates the term 'navigable' from the Clean Water Act. It dramatically expands the scope of federal jurisdiction under the act and virtually eliminates a central precept of the act, which reserves certain waters to the exclusive jurisdiction of the

TDA market recap

For the week ending May beef prices were lower. 12, feeder cattle prices at the Texas Panhandle auctions covered by USDA Market News were mixed from \$2 lower to \$3 higher per hundredweight (cwt), depending on location, weight, and quality of the offerings. The Texas direct feeder cattle trade was mostly steady to \$4 higher on offerings weighing less than 800 pounds, while heavier weights were weak to \$3 lower. The Oklahoma City auction on Monday was \$1 to \$3 higher. Fed cattle cash prices were near unchanged from the previous week and

Corn and grain sorghum prices were higher at the beginning of the week because of tight current supplies, but then fell after USDA released projections for record-high U.S. and world production. Wheat prices were lower on projections for a larger U.S.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, wheat, and corn were lower, while lumber was

higher. Winter wheat was rated in mostly fair to good condition with 98% of the acreage headed and harvest underway in many areas. On the High Plains, irrigated wheat was in good condition while dryland acres needed rain. Rain delayed harvest in parts of North Texas. Corn was 93% planted and 80% was emerged, both ahead of normal progress, with condition rated mostly good to fair. Grain sorghum planting was ahead of normal at 88% complete and 16% of the crop was headed. Cotton planting was 35% complete, ahead of the normal 31%. Pastures were rated in mostly fair to good condition thanks to recent rains, but remain dry in areas of the Plains.

County Agent's Report

Establishing bermudagrass pasture begins with early planning

As summer nears, establishing pastures is not one of the subjects that is on top of the "to do" list for most people in Cooke County. However, if establishing a new pasture is going to become a priority for you in the near future, making plans now will greatly improve your chances of succeeding. New grass establishment needs to begin the year prior to actual pasture planting. The rest of this article

will focus on sprigging bermudagrass. Other improved grasses and native grasses are gaining popularity and all certainly have a niche which suits their specific characteristics. They should be considered as viable alternatives to Bermuda. Still, bermudagrass establishment is a priority for many Cooke County pasture managers. The costs for successful establishment vary with numerous factors and conditions, but under any circumstance, it will be relatively expensive.

Site preparation. A welldrained site should be prepared via disking, etc. as a clean-tilled area that would be suitable for planting a grain or fiber crop. If perennial forage is already growing on the site, it should be killed using glyphosate prior to the end of the growing season the fall prior to planting. A soil test is mandatory prior to establishing to allow for proper fertilizer and/or lime applications. If soil type is sandy or sandy loam, the site should be roller-packed prior to establishment to conserve

Weed control. The first 'weed" that can cause eventual failure is the presence of common bermudagrass or any other sodforming grass. Prior to site preparation, all other bermudagrasses should be eradicated using herbicides such as Roundup or similar action product. The next weed problems are usually those of crabgrass and

grasses, as well as broadleaf plants. A pre-emergence herbicide such as Direx 4L or Diuron 4L should be used before establishment.

Planting. Coastal bermudagrass is the standard in the industry, since 1944. It remains a very good cultivar to consider planting. Tifton 85 is the cultivar that has more recently come to the top of the recommended list because of drought tolerance, productivity, and nutrient content. It may be planted using sprigs (roots) or top growth. Establishment should be delayed until Tifton 85 has broken dormancy and is actively growing. In general, the more bushels per acre of sprigs used the less risk of stand failure and the faster the cover of soil surface. A recommended rate is 20 to 40 bushels/acre. If vegetative, top growth is used, the best planting material has stolons with at least four nodes. Rooting initiates from these nodes, or joints, that connects the internodes (stems). A variety of techniques may be employed to place the nodes via disking, etc. at about one to two inches deep. Sprigs or nodes placed deeper than four inches or so have less opportunity for

survival. Fertilizer. Fertilize according to soil test recommendations. It's important for NP 2O5-K2O to be present in adequate quantities to initiate growth. Once bermudagrass initiates growth and begins to cover the soil (4 to 8 weeks), then an application of N may be appropriate to stimulate forage production for a potential hay harvest prior to fall.

The Aggie-Horticulture website (aggie-horticulture. tamu.edu) reminds those seeking carefree landscaping not to create "THE BIG UGLY" while attempting to save a little perspiration. Here are some do's and don'ts to consider in establishing a minimum maintenance landscape:

Do avoid a scattered arrangement of flower beds and shrubs. A cluttered yard with many beds and shrubs will require a lot of hand edging and clipping. That in itself can become a maintenance nightmare. Don't try to grow grass

in areas too shady, too dry, too wet, or too steep to be mowed safely. Use ground cover plants in these areas; there are many good ones to select from. Don't line walks and driveways with unnecessary

plantings or place foundation plants so close to the house that they can't be main-Do select plants carefully,

considering their ultimate size (height and width). Don't use fast growing

plants which will require constant pruning.

Do use mowing strips or edges along walks, flower beds, and around trees and shrubs. These will reduce mowing and edging problems and create a much neater

And last but not least, don't confuse low maintenance with no maintenance. Plants will sooner or later need water, fertilizer, and care, and the grass must be mowed. The idea is to find the easiest way to do the maintenance jobs which must be done. TxWRAP is a free online tool aimed to help homeowners and city officials plan for and mitigate wildfire risk. The tool identifies threats for particular areas of the state based on landscape characteristics, historical fire occurrence, weather conditions, terrain, and potential fire behavior.

"This can and should be a 'game changer' for Texans as they learn what their risks are and how to mitigate them," said Texas Forest Service Director Tom Boggus. "It is a tool that neighbor can pass on to neighbor, making
