The students are in German Folk Dance at Whitney High School. According to their sponsor Lisa Mays, this year marks their 10th year to participate in German Folk Dancing. She added, "It is also the first year that we have been able to offer German Folk Dance as an actual fine arts class. We have 16 students enrolled in the class and about four to six more that come to early morning dance rehearsals. We participate each year in the Regional (Plano) and State (Austin) German competitions, where we received 2nd place last year. At the State level of the Texas German competition, schools from all over Texas come to compete and only the top 15 German Folk Dance groups are invited to compete. We do a number of dances that include lifts and even 'Schuh-plattlers' (a type of dancing done by the males that includes stomping and slapping the feet and thighs). All of the dance moves are strictly proscribed and have traditionally been danced in the same manner for up to a hundred years or more. Often the steps are influ-



#### 2011 Texas wheat outlook bullish

for Texas wheat has placed the outlook for the commodity as a whole on the bright side, said a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist.

Dr. Rob Duncan, AgriLife Extension small grains specialist, said 2010 was a strong year for the state's wheat producers. He said one of the reasons is that Texas wheat producers are utilizing more research and educational information to make their operations more profitable and take advantage of high prices over the past two years.

"Approximately 80% of Texas wheat producers incorporate research results and demonstration efforts in making variety choices for crops," he said.

Variety selection has become more critical in wheat planting statewide due to increased fluctuations in weather patterns over the past decade and to achieve

higher yields to meet greater

demand worldwide. "One of the most important decisions a wheat grower makes is the selection of a variety well-adapted to his or her specific growing region," Duncan said. "If you look over the past decade. increased periods of drought or mild-drought conditions have caused many producers to give a closer look at the varieties they choose to

This is the eighth year Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Cooke, Montague, and Grayson counties will team up to offer five CEUs for those needing continuing education for their Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide licenses. The program will provide useful information for anyone managing rural property; you do not need to have a pesticide license to attend. If you are interested in CEUs, the program will provide five hours. This represents 1/3 of the hours private applicators need for a five year period, and all of the hours a commercial or non-commercial applicator would need for a year. Categories for the CEUs will include one "Laws and Regulations," one 'IPM," and three "General."

We have an excellent group of speakers this year. Dr. Ron Gill, Extension beef specialist, will begin the day with 'Preventing Chemical Residues in Beef"; Mike Porter, Noble Foundation wildlife specialist, will discuss "Pros and Cons for Prescribed Burning"; Bob Lusk, wildlife and fisheries consultant, will talk about "Pond Management"; Henry Krusekopf, TDA field inspector, will give us an update on pesticide "Laws and Regulations"; and finally, Dr. Twain Butler, Noble Foundation agronomy research leader, will talk about "Grazing Systems for Improved Grasses."

Note that the program will be held at North Central Texas College's Field House, not the Little Theater this year. The Field House is the gymnasium which is located immediately to the South of the tennis courts, near the back end of campus. Participants are encouraged to take Bonner Road West, off of Hwy. 51 and use the parking lot on the south side of the road after they pass the residence hall. North Central Texas College is located at 1525 West California St. in Gainesville. The program times are 8:15 until 3:15. There is a \$10 fee; lunch will be provided. Lawn tips for winter

Many of us would like to look out the window and see an even, brown, dormant lawn at this time of year. However, we often see many annual grasses instead. Bluegrass, downy brome, ryegrass, and other winter annual weeds can also be controlled with applications of Glyphosate on fully dormant bermudagrass in December, January, and early February.

Glyphosate is a chemical found in many nonselective herbicides. Nonselective means they will kill almost any growing plant – use caution around actively growing plants like pansies or other winter annual flowers. Apply to actively growing weed. This means homeowners should watch the weather. To be effective, plants need to be photosynthesizing, which will require several days in which the temperature rises above 50°F. Glyphosate will not damage dormant bermudagrass, but do not make applications after bermudagrass begins to green-up, and always make applications at the label rate.




