

County to change precinct boundaries

Commissioners Court convened for a special called meeting at 3 p.m. on Tues-day, April 19. The focus was on the results of the 2010 census and how it will affect the County's precinct boundaries.

Attorney Bob Bass serves as the County's legal council regarding the changes that will be required due to the 2010 census information. Bass noted, "Redistricting is a Constitutional-based concept... after each census conducted every 10 years, the Congress would be reapportioned so that each vote cast by a representative has roughly the same weight in terms of the population electing that representative. That weighted concept has been handed down to lower levels of government." Since 1972, Texas Commissioners Courts have been obligated to redraw their boundaries after each census.

Bass reported, "Your de-viation based on that standard is just barely over the maximum allowed. You are at 10.53, less than half a percentage point from the legal cutoff.

Moving of boundaries in various ways was discussed. Commissioners voted to redistrict. A preliminary draft was drawn up, but no final decision was made as to where the boundaries would shift to more equalize the population in all four precincts.

Wild winds whip Montague area fires

Instead of spring showers, the norm this April is high wind and low humidity. This creates hazardous conditions for wild fires.

Muenster Volunteer Fire Department was called out several times over the last several days. At 1 p.m. on Thursday, April 14, they were called to Muenster Memorial Hospital to assist with the decontamination of a patient. The patient was covered with a material that had to be safely removed before bringing him or her into the Hospital for treatment. They left the scene at 2:14 p.m.

On Friday, north to northwesterly wind gusts to over 50 mph challenged firefighters in their efforts to contain several fires. Humidity was less than 10%. The first call was at 10:42 a.m. when the Muenster firefighters were dispatched to FM 373 and FM 677 to assist Saint Jo VFD and Nocona VFD who were battling a large brush and grass fire on the east side of FM 677. Muenster VFD arrived on the scene at 11:05 a.m. About 25 acres burned and no buildings were involved. Muenster responded with six trucks and 14 men. They clocked back into the Muenster Fire Station at 1:50 p.m. from the Ivins fire.

Another call to assist in Montague County went out at 3:12 p.m. and Muenster VFD went to Stanford Road and FM 677 where the Montague fire departments were fighting a large grass and brush fire on the east side

of FM 677. No structures were threatened. Some of the Muenster firefighters, a grass truck, and the new engine tanker remained in Muenster in case of a fire in the Muenster area. About 35 acres were burned in this fire dubbed the Stanford fire. Those responding to the Stanford fire clocked back in Muenster at 6:49 p.m.

Muenster again got a fire call at 4:42 p.m. and were dispatched to a grain field fire at Fifth and Ash streets in Muenster. The two remaining trucks responded dousing the fire that burned only about half an acre.

Saturday's weather was calm with little wind, giving area firefighters a break from gusty winds.

By Sunday, windy conditions again prevailed, blowing from the south. Muenster received a call to return to the Stanford fire at FM 677 and Stanford Road where fire was burning in trees. Muenster arrived at 2:36 p.m. Saint Jo VFD was already working a fire about two miles south of the Stanford fire.

According to Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe, "There was still a lot of smoke coming from the brush. Checked the north side of the fire scene (same fire as on Friday, but the wind changed directions and was coming from the south) and doused smoldering debris on the northeast corner of the fire, then checked the remaining of the area.'

As Muenster sped to the Stanford fire, Nocona VFD

Muenster ISD Board raises prices of 2011-12 school meals

Possibly raising the price of school lunches was one of many topics covered by the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees at the regular monthly meeting held Tues-day, April 12. The current price is: Pre K - 6th Grade \$1.25 for breakfast and \$1.75 for lunch: Grades 7th - 12th \$1.50 for breakfast

Milk or juice costs 35¢. The proposal was to increase all lunches Bert Walterscheid did not by 25¢ except that of visiting adults. That price remained prices remained the same, but would increase for staff and visiting adults by 25¢. Milk or juice would cost 50¢. These proposed changes were unanimously approved by the Board.

Tuition is currently charged for Pre Kindergarten at a rate of \$13 per day. It was proposed to increase the tuition to \$17 per day, which would be a cost increase of \$720 per year. The Board did not approve the proposed tuition change.

With Budget time approaching, the Board set a workshop for May 18 at 6 p.m. prior to the May 18 Board meeting which was set for 7 p.m. Votes from the May 14 Bond election will be canvassed at 6:30 that evening also prior to the regular meeting. New trustees will be installed at the meeting and new officers elected at that time.

Carol Klement was appointed to serve as early voting judge for the Bond Election. Early voting begins on May 2 and ends on May 10. Superintendent Clay Richerson was given authority by the Board to sign an agreement with Cooke County for use of its electronic voting machine.

received a call to a fire on Old Bonita Road.

After finishing the Stanford fire call, Muenster was headed for home. They received a call to a fire south of Illinois Bend. An investigation revealed no fire. They clocked back into the local fire house at 3:22p.m.

Cooke County no longer has a ban on outdoor burning, but the continued unpredictable wind conditions and lack of moisture call for residents to heed weather conditions before deciding to burn. Also, all are asked to report controlled burns to the Sheriff's dispatcher before instigating the burn.

Dear Editor,

With the May 14th MISD bond election approaching many people are asking WHY NOŴ? Ĥere are just a few reasons why we should pass the MISD bond now and not wait: 1.) Interest rates are at historic low. 2.) Construction cost will only increase, the longer we wait the more expensive it will cost. Right now, due to the economy, construction prices are very competitive. 3.) The windmills are valued at 32% of the total assessed value of the District. Each year, the windmills value will decrease. The sooner we pass this bond, the more the windmills will pay in school taxes and less the residents of the MISD school district will pay! The next question is WHO will pay for this bond: 1.) In 2011, the windmills will pay 32% of the cost. 2.) A homeowner of a \$150,000 house will see an increase in taxes of only \$170. 3.) Taxpayers over the age of 65 will pay nothing. The elementary and junior high buildings are unsafe. The elementary building was built in 1966. This building has major electrical problems and a poor heating and cooling system. Accord-ing to the TEA, room sizes should be 800 square feet, the MISD elementary room sizes are 400 square feet with no storage. On rainy or extreme weather days, 121 elementary students line the one hall in the elementary building to watch a movie because there is nowhere else to go. The junior high building was built in 1949. This building has asbestos throughout the building, the roof leaks, and has major plumbing and mold issues. In case of a tornado

there is not a safe place for the elementary and junior high students to go. The old gym is unsafe, the floor has moved away from the wall leaving a gap along the edge of the gym floor.

We can choose to pass the bond now when the interest rates are low and we have the high valuation of the windmills or we can wait until the State comes in and condemns our buildings and the cost will be more on the individual taxpayer! 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

Yosten celebrates 90th





Texas wildfires turn hopes and dreams into ashes N.L. Winter has lived over a century, but he has never seen nything like the Texas wildfires that rolled over his ranch north of Abilene last week. Known as "Boss," Mr. Winter lost the home he was born in, the two-room house his father built in 1910, and the house where he and his late wife, Leta, raised their three children. Much of his 1,400 acre ranch is charred.

"It's the worst fire I've ever seen," the 106-year-old cowboy told the Abilene Reporter-News.

Mr. Winter is just one of many whose dreams, hopes, and livelihoods have turned to ashes this spring. Texas is burning. Wildfires have ravaged over 1.5 million acres since the first of the year. That's equivalent to 2,000 square miles.

It's not supposed to be this way. The calendar puts us on the back side of April. March rains should have replenished the soil. March rains should have nourished life. But they didn't fall. The only clouds this spring are billows of dense smoke

Agriculture has been hit hard by drought, as my blogging partner Gene Hall documented last week. March was the driest month on record. Most of the state is officially classified in drought. Some of it is extreme. Much of it is severe. Crops wither in the field, if they've been planted at all. Pastures provide little grazing.

Mother Nature adds insult to injury, sucker-punching many who have been stretched thin by the dry weather. It may be the final bout for some. Plentiful rains last year built an understory of brush and grasses. A hard winter set the stage. Lack of rain prevented green-up. High winds and low humidity have been prevalent. The result is wildfire.

The numbers are startling. No corner of the state is left untouched. 252 Texas counties out of 254 have been affected. As of today, 244 homes have been destroyed. 8,514 homes have been threatened. 7,807 fires have been fought by a acres due to an increase in brave, thin line of volunteer firefighters, Texas Forest Service crews. and teams from the National Forest Service.

As I look out my window while writing this post, I see high winds once again shaking the trees. It's hot outside. I wonder whose land is burning today. I wonder who will lose their homes. One more is too many. But the forecast calls for manv more.

There are ways you can help. Make a donation to your local volunteer fire department. They are the front line troops in this vast effort. They need your support, both financial and spiritual.

There are many relief efforts, both local and statewide. Support locally when you can. But don't forget worthy relief efforts such as Texas CattleWomen for feed and fencing and the Texas Department of Agriculture's State of Texas Agriculture Relief (STAR) fund to restore operations and rebuild fencing. Also, if you can help out and have land where cattle can be relocated, please let us know!

USDA projects more grain, cotton acreage

Higher commodity prices and increasing global demand are two factors raising the expected cropland acreage for certain crops this year, according to recent survey results from the U.S. Department of Agriculture USDA).

The survey shows that there could be 3.99 million more acres of corn, 3.89 million more acres of wheat, and 12.6 million more cotton acres after a year of record prices for all three major commodities.

"Despite increased plantings for most major field crops as reported in today's Prospective Plantings report, the March 1 Grain Stocks report indicates continued strong demand and usage for these commodities. This suggests the current tight supply situation will continue into 2011 and 2012," said USDA Chief Economist Joseph Glauber in an agency statement.

Texas farmers are exchanging corn for cotton this year. as the Lone Star State had the largest decrease in planted corn acreage—down 150,000 cotton acreage.

Texas leads the nation in the largest increase in wheat acres, however, with 548,000 more acres expected.

Corn growers intend to plant 92.2 million acres of corn for all purposes in 2011, up 5% from last year and 7% higher than in 2009. If realized, this will be the second highest planted acreage in the United States since 1944, behind only the 93.5 million acres planted in 2007.

Acreage increases of 250,000 or more are expected in Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, and South Dakota. The largest decrease is expected in Texas, down 150,000 acres.

Soybean planted area for 2011 is estimated at 76.6 million acres, down 1% from last year. If realized, the United States planted area will be the third largest on record. Compared with last year, planted acreage declines of 100,000 acres or more are expected in Iowa, Kansas, Mississippi, Nebraska, and Ohio. If realized, the planted area in New York and North Dakota will be the largest on record.

All wheat planted area is estimated at 58.0 million acres, up 8% from last year. The 2011 winter wheat planted area, at 41.2 million acres, is 10% above last year and up 1% from the previous estimate. Of this total, about 29.4 million acres are Hard Red Winter, 8.2 million acres are Soft Red Winter, and 3.7 million are White Winter. Area planted to other spring wheat for 2011 is estimated at 14.4 million acres, up 5% from 2010. Of this total, about 13.6 million acres are Hard Red Spring wheat.

Durum planted area for 2011 is estimated at 2.37 million acres, down 8% from 2010.

County Agent's Report

Bermudagrass

The following information by Dr. Gerald W. Evers, Extension researcher in Overton Texas was adapted from a news letter from the Texas Forage and Grassland Council.

Bermudagrass is the most widely grown warm-season perennial grass in the southeastern US. Its popularity is due to adaptability to a wide range of soil types, drought tolerance, and persistence under intensive grazing. The most productive varieties have been hybrids that produce little viable seed and must be established vegetatively by sprigs (portions of shoot, crown, roots, rhizomes, and stolons) or with tops (6 to 8 week old top growth) for Jiggs and Tifton 85. Recommended planting rate is from 20 to 40 bu./acre. A bushel equals 1.25 cu. ft. and contains about 100 sprigs.

Establishment costs including land preparation, sprigs or tops, planting, fertilizer, and weed control range from \$150 to \$250 per acre depending on variety. Tifton 85 is considered the best variety because of its higher productivity and nutritive value.

Seeded Bermudagrasses

There has been a great deal of interest in using bermudagrasses that can be established from seed as opposed to sprigs. In addition to being less expensive and not as burdensome as sprigging, seeded bermudagrasses can be used on small acreages that are not economical to sprig and on steep slopes and cut-over timberland where good seedbed preparation necessary for sprigging is not feasible.

Most seeded bermudagrasses on the market are blends that contain two to four lines that frequently contain Giant and common. Common bermudagrass is well adapted to all soils. Because common is a good seed producer, seed is less expensive (about \$3.00-4.00/lb) than other seeded bermudagrasses. Giant is used in blends because it has rapid establishment and good early growth. However, it will not persist for more than two or three years in the eastern half of Texas. As Giant bermudagrass goes out, the other bermudagrass lines in the mixture fill in. Giant has persisted in drier climates in the western half of Texas under irrigation. Seed of Giant bermudagrass is more expensive (\$8-10/lb) because it is a poor seed producer.

Comparing varieties

A three-year study of bermudagrass varieties provides results supporting the belief that Tifton 85 is the most productive bermudagrass across the southeastern United States. The study also shows that the seeded bermudagrasses, for the most part, are equal to, or better than Coastal. These studies were carried out at moderate nitrogen fertilizer levels (128 to 300 lbs. of actual N/acre, depending on the site and the year). One would expect differences among entries to be less at lower nitrogen rates (75-100 lb/acre) and greater at higher nitrogen rates (300 lb/acre). Tifton 85 has superior drought tolerance and higher nutritive value than Coastal and seeded bermudagrasses. Tifton 85 has fewer ether bonds (ether bonds in the lignin cannot be broken by rumen bacteria) than Coastal.For more information, visit: http:// varietytesting.tamu.edu/.


