"Kind of my passion has always been family violence," said Ginger Johnson. "Try-ing to help women and men to break out of that cycle of violence because it does perpetuate itself. The children, that's their normal. They see that happening and then when they grow up, their normal with their spouses and their children ends up being the same way. Getting in there and breaking that cycle has always been something that I really pushed for.'

Abigail's Arms Cooke County Crisis Center recently hired Ginger as their victims services/SART manager.

Ginger worked for the Denton Police Department for 23 years. After doing

about 10 years as a patrol officer, she served as the training and personnel officer for about five years. She then Ginger felt it would be a returned to patrol for a few years. For the last couple of years, she served as their family violence investigator. As a child, Ginger said she

wanted to be a policeman, but was told that's what little boys grow up to be. When said Ginger. she was older and returned encouragement from her brother. "I am really looking forward to getting the shelter open and being able to offer a complete package of services to victims in Cooke County. We have the same problem with the domestic violence that we do with the SANE. If we have a victim of domestic violence that doesn't have anywhere to stay, the only way we can help them is to send them to Denton or to Sherman.

When you try to deal with the dynamics of them having a job, their children going to school, rearranging their whole life, it's bad enough they've been through that trauma, and then to have to send them completely out of the city in order to provide them with just a roof over their head, a lot of times they can't cope with that. It's easier to just go back home than to have to uproot everything that they know. So, being able to offer that in Cooke County is a very good thing.'

Ginger recalled when she was investigating in Denton, she would sit down and do an interview post-filing the report to get more details. She would speak with the victims about the cycle of violence and going through different steps and how it affected their children. Most didn't feel that it affected the children. She said that you could see this lightbulb go on and knew that they were understanding it.

When talking to victims of domestic violence, Ginger would tell them that their children grow up seeing their spouse treat them like that and the children will either grow up and treat their spouse like that or be treated like that. 
Ms. Wheelchair Texas 1999 hosts current titleholders at State Capitol

On Feb. 28, Rep. Drew Springer of Muenster, House District 68, met with Mariah Kilbourne, current Ms. Wheelchair America; Lana Little, current Little Ms. Wheelchair Texas, representing girls under age $1\overline{2}$; and the current state titleholder Tina Williams.

Springer introduced the titleholders to his wife Lydia, Ms. Wheelchair Texas 1992. They spoke about the issues facing individuals with disabilities around the state of Texas.

Before becoming a Texas Springer representative, was an executive at a railcar company. "I had 1,000 people who worked for me—yet it's what we do from the neck up that makes us important, he said.

Springer's wife Lydia was involved in a diving accident a week after her 21st birthday and has used a wheel-

Raising and showing this animal becomes a year-long project as the scrambler sees to the grooming, feeding, and care of the animal. The students are required to submit monthly reports and to maintain a detailed record book that is submitted to the livestock show. They are also required to do two essays, one on why they chose the breed of animal they purchased and another describing their year experience in the calf scramble program. The exhibitor returns to the Houston Livestock Show the following year for a special competition. Calf Scramble exhibitors receive a \$250 bonus when they return to compete with their heifer or steer, totaling their certificate to \$1,500.

Proceeds are used to fund a scholarship for a senior high school student who will be attending college in the fall. Additional funds are also used to help with operating expenses for the Art Council groups.





Turkey hunters can focus to Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists.

Rio Grande spring turkey hunting season in the 54-county South Zone runs March 16 - April 28. In the 101 counties comprising the North Zone, the season opens March 30 and runs through May 12. A special one-gobbler limit season opens April 1 and continues through April 30 in Bastrop, Caldwell, Colorado, Fayette, Jackson, Lavaca, Lee, and Milam counties.

"We had phenomenal production in 2010, which means there should be good hunting opportunities this spring for big old gobblers," said Jason Hardin, turkey program co-ordinator for TPWD,

'Going into last year, many of these hens put forth tremendous nesting effort following a mild winter and late winter-early spring rains," he added. "This led to average to above average production, so there will also be a large number of jakes on the landscape this spring.

The drought of 2011 wreaked havoc on wild turkey production," Hardin continued. "There was almost zero nesting effort and the handful of hens attempting a nest were almost all unsuccessful. This will be obvious this spring with almost no two-year-old gobblers across Texas' Rio Grande turkey range."

Eastern spring turkey hunting in the 28 counties having an open season runs April 15 - May 14.

According to Hardin, the Eastern turkey population remains stable, but is not expanding to the degree that biologists have hoped.

"Easterns across most of Texas have not shown much growth outside of a few areas stocked in 2007-08," he said. "Those stocked sites were part of a research project examining a new stocking strategy known as super stocking.

This method calls for flooding the best available habitat with 80 turkeys (60 females and 20 males). The old stocking method only placed 15-20 birds per site. Following the positive results of this "super stocking" research, TPWD is now looking for large, high quality sites to be evaluated as potential future release sites. These sites can be single ownership or a cooperative on private or public lands.

Hunters are reminded all harvested Eastern turkeys must be taken to a check station within 24 hours. To find the check station nearest you, contact a TPWD field office or call (800) 792-1112.

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

New interstate tagging rules now in effect

Texas farmers and ranchers who plan on selling cattle outside of the Lone Star State now have additional standards to meet. On Mon-day, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) animal disease traceability final rule took effect.

Tracy Tomascik, associate director of commodity and regulatory activities at the Texas Farm Bureau (TFB), says the rule only affects cattle raisers selling cows or bulls over 28 months of age interstate.

They'll need to have a permanent identification number on them whether they're beef cattle or bison, Tomascik said. "In addition to that, they'll need a certificate of veterinarian inspection which is a health paper."

Texas House committee continues discussion of State Water Plan

The Texas House of Representatives Committee on Natural Resources has voted favorably on a bill that would create the State Water Implementation Fund to finance loans through the Texas Water Plan.

The committee's substitute to House Bill 4, proposed by Allan Ritter of Nederland, creates the implementation fund to finance revolving loan programs for water infrastructure and conservation programs.

The bill, as voted on favorably by the committee, requires the 16 regional water planning groups to prioritize water projects in their regional plans. The Texas Water Development Board will then rank projects based on a point system that places the highest priority on projects that serve large populations, provide assistance to a diverse urban and rural population, or on those that provide regionalization.

The committee's substitutions to the bill also call on the Texas Water Development Board to take into consideration several factors, like the amount of local contribution to finance a project, when awarding points to projects.

HB 4 also asks that at least 10% of the fund be used for projects designed to serve rural areas. It also requires that 20%of projects be dedicated to water conservation and reuse.

• Maintain as much carryover forage on the ground as possible.

• Keep the herd composition flexible.
