# Cooke County credited with lots of good dads

Kim Cook, executive director of Abigail's Arms Crisis Center, praised Cooke County dads. She feels good dads are the answer to fighting domestic violence. She spoke at Cooke County Commissioners Court on Tuesday, May 28 during the public agenda.

Since June is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Cook gave some statistics including: Domestic violence doesn't just affect women. She said, "Domestic violence is felt for generations of men as well. It is an epidemic. In our country today, about 80% of 21 year olds who were abused as children met the criteria for at least one physiological disorder. Seventy-four percent of all Texans indicate a family member, friend, or co-worker had experienced some form of domestic violence whether sexual or other.



# Decline in motorcycle deaths noted

Texas roadways become increasingly crowded, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is asking drivers to Share the Road and Look Twice during National Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month. The campaign is aimed at car and truck drivers who often report a lack of visibility as For infants, toddlers, and children up to age 11, the the reason for crashes and theme is "Dig Into Reading!" "Safety should be everyone's primary concern when sharing the road with other drivers," said Phil Wilson, TxDOT executive director. "Motorcyclists are not only some of our most vulnerable drivers, but they often can be more difficult to see than other vehicles. We ask that car and truck drivers always pay extra attention to their mirrors and blind spots, use signals when changing lanes, and give plenty of space to motorcyclists.

Last year, 460 people died on Texas roadways while riding motorcycles and scooters. In 2011, that number was 488. The 6.1% decrease

may be attributed to an increase in helmet use and heightened awareness by other motorists through Tx-DOT-lead campaigns, such as Share the Road.

"The numbers are trending in the right direction, yet we still have more work to do to save more lives in 2013,' reiterated Wilson.

According to a survey conducted by Texas A&M Transportation Institute, more than half of motorcycle crashes last year involved another driver who report-

edly never saw the motorcy-

cycle crashes resulted in the death or injury of the motorcyclist.

• In 2012, 53% of motorcyclists killed in traffic crashes were not wearing helmets. • In 2012, Texas motor-

cycle deaths were higher in urban areas than rural ones. In fact, 44% of motorcyclists who lost their lives were riding in rural areas, while 56% died in cities.

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

Q: You hear a lot about sandstorms lately. What causes sandstorms?

A. Sandstorms are caused by strong winds that occur in desert or semi-arid regions, and they carry thick clouds of dust and sand, often reducing visibility to near zero in many cases, said John Nielsen-Gammon of Texas A&M University. In many parts of the world, such as the deserts of the Southwest U.S. or in Africa or the Middle East, sandstorms can create havoc with man and machine. "A sandstorm can last for several hours to a full day," says Nielsen-Gammon. "Most of the time. sandstorms affect only the air from about 1-3 miles high, so airplanes flying above that range are okay. But on the ground, sand moving at about 50 miles an hour can be a real nightmare. It can clog up just about anything that is mechanical, from a soldier's rifle to a car or an army tank. Once the sandstorm has passed, a thorough cleaning of just about anything is required."

A: There are two types of sandstorms, says Nielsen-Gammon. "The first kind is the result of a severe thunderstorm that creates strong winds. This kind is called a 'haboob,' which is an Arabic word for blowing dust. The second type is the one most Americans are familiar with. It's caused by a curving of the jet stream which brings strong winds to the surface. Sandstorms tend to be worse during the daytime because the ground is heated up by the sun and the dust can be carried greater distances. That's why breathing can become a real problem, and some type of mask is often required. Probably the worst sandstorms occur in China and Mongolia. The sand blows so hard that there is a 'yellow rain' effect. So much sand is in the air that it changes the color of raindrops, and there appears to be a yellow rain falling from the sky.' Today, visitors can catch a glimpse of Molly Good-night's life in various exhibits at the Armstrong County Museum in Claude, Texas. The museum is also working to restore the Goodnight home, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, and develop the Charles Goodnight Historical Center. #### Wildlife in Spring: frequently asked questions

Like Texas bluebonnets, some questions arise every Spring among those who watch and care about wildlife. Here are four perennial Qs and As to help you help

I found a baby bird on the ground. What should *I do?* Watch baby birds from a safe distance. Baby birds will often leave the nest (fledge) before they have all their feathers and before they are strong flyers. Keep pets inside to allow the fledgling to find safety off the ground. If you find one that is truly orphaned or injured, contact a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. (See next question.)

This critter looks hurt. Who can I call? Bookmark this list of wildlife rehabilitators. Since rehabbers are mostly volunteers with day jobs and limited facilities, they may not be available

What can I plant to benefit wildlife? Wildscaping can turn your city lawn or rural front yard into a beautiful home for wildlife. Get some tips about planting for wildlife in "Growing Native" from Texas Parks & Wildlife magazine. Watch this video about urban, suburban, and rural wildscaping. A whopping 32 million acres of land (a lawn larger than the state of Mississippi) is devoted to the growth of manicured, watered, and fertilized grass across the nation. Fish stocking, wildlife management, habitat restoration, land conservation, and Texas Game Wardens are just some of the initiatives funded in part by your license fees. #### Hunting and Fishing Licenses on sale Aug. 15

Current year Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) expire Aug. 31, and new licenses for 2012-13 will go on sale Wednesday, Aug. 15. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about

2.1 million hunting and fishing licenses annually through the Agency's 28 field offices, more than 58 state parks, and at over 1,600 retailers across Texas. Licenses may also be purchased online through the TPWD Web site at www.tpwd. state.tx.us/buy or by phone (800-895-4248) with a \$5 convenience fee required for each transaction. Call center hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday — Friday. The online transaction system is available 24/7. A transaction receipt may be printed at the time of purchase for online and a confirmation number is provided for phone orders, and the physical license is mailed separately. Confirmation numbers will verify that a license has been purchased, which is sufficient for dove hunting, but will not allow hunters to take fish or wildlife that require a tag.

#### Dove hunting requirements

In addition to a hunting license, all wing shooters will need to purchase a game bird stamp. To hunt dove or teal in September, a Migratory Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required. Duck hunters also need to purchase a Federal Duck Stamp and receive HIP (Harvest Information Program) certification. HIP certification involves a brief survey of previous year's hunting success and is conducted at the time licenses are purchased. Certification will be printed on the license. Lifetime license holders must also be HIPcertified and purchase the Federal Duck Stamp to hunt migratory birds. All other state stamp endorsements are included with a lifetime license.

There are other mandatory endorsements to consider at the time of purchase, too. An Upland Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required to hunt all non-migratory game birds, including turkey, quail,

pheasant and chachalaca. Of course, anyone who purchases the Super Combo license package, the best bang for the buck at \$68, automatically gets these needed stamps.



## Ten political issues facing agriculture

Former Deputy Ag Secretary Kathleen Merrigan highlights the top non-farmbill issues that are currently impacting agriculture, excluding the farm bill.

Here's her top 10:

1. Immigration Reform. We may be on the cusp of immigration reform, Merrigan said, noting an immigration bill was passed out of com-

2. Tax Reform. Sen. Max Baucus (D-Mont.), who recently announced that he will retire in 2014, wants to pass a tax reform bill before he leaves office. In the meantime, she said, the public appears to be irritated by large companies, such as Apple, avoiding U.S. taxes by managing their finances through other countries. "All this adds up to a lot of energy

Merrigan, who also worked on Capitol Hill, said agriculture might be able to secure a new approach to estate taxes. She noted that any startup farmer coming from other industries will need a lot of capital. She held out the possibility of treating "sweat equity" differently for estate

3. Food safety. FDA's pending food safety regulations are "big" and likely to change agriculture "more than you might imagine." But Merrigan, who met with FDA officials on the proposed regulations, indicated the proposal will likely be revised before it's finalized. "My view has always been: no one gets a pass on food safety.

4. Foreign-Trade Agreements. Developing a freetrade agreement with the European Union will be tough, she said, but it could create big opportunities for U.S. producers. A trade agree-

> Treatment for this viral disease is symptomatic and involves the use of anti-inflammatory agents and other methods to reduce the brain inflammation. Fluids and nutritional supportive care may also be required in certain cases. Neurologically impaired animals should be handled carefully to prevent injuring themselves and their owners. Even when clinically ill, horses have recovered from West Nile. Some horses may have residual gait abnormalities or demonstrate a change in their temperament

and behavior. Prevention and control of West Nile evolves around the reduction and elimination of mosquito populations.
