Foggy crash kills two

Foggy conditions on the evening of Thursday, Jan. 9 led to tragedy for two area women.

According to DPS media representative Trooper Mark Tackett, at 7:15 p.m. Patrice Wynn, 61-year-old from Saint Jo, was west-bound in a 1999 Buick when she was struck head-on by a 2001 Mazda driving east in the west-bound lanes. The Mazda was driven by Knola Dietz, an 80-year-old Myra resident.

Conditions were heavy fog and wet roadway.

Both drivers died from injuries sustained in the crash.

Judge Dorothy Lewis, Justice of the Peace for Pct. 1, pronounced Dietz dead at the accident scene. Winn was taken to North Texas Medical Center where she died. Judge Lewis noted that the accident occurred at the 600 mile marker on Hwy. 82, just east of the Myra cutoff.

"It was very sad," commented Judge Lewis.

Working the accident was a DPS officer, two Cooke County Sheriff's deputies, Cooke County EMS, and the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department.

County to fund Warrant Round Up

If you are one of the people procrastinating payment of fines owed in Cooke County, you may want to make paying them a priority. The time is coming when County officials and local municipalities will join forces and issue warrants for those who have not paid.

At the Monday, Jan. 13 meeting of Cooke County Commissioners Court, Cooke County Justices of the Peace Dorothy Lewis, Pct. 1, and Jason Brinkley, Pct. 4, requested that the Court approve additional funding to their budgets to cover \$7,414 in additional over-time salaries and advertising. Judge Brinkley said, "We'll run a few ads in some of the local papers to give the wanted persons a warning that we're gonna come round them up."

The County holds a Warrant Round Up every two years. The exact date of the Warrant Round Up is not announced.

Commissioners discussed including the additional expense for the Round Up in the budgets of the two JP offices. It was agreed this would be helpful since the Round Up is held regularly every two years now.

The additional funding was unanimously approved to be divided between the JP precincts.

Maintenance Supervisor Rick Kerr reported that the roof of the DPS building is scheduled for repair. There has been a delay with the contractor due to bad weather in parts of the country where they are working on a project.

The new EMS station in Gainesville has a leak in the training room. EMS Director Kevin Grant stated that it is being investigated. Most of the punch list is now complete. The generator is installed and working.

Change order #15 for the EMS Station Project in the amount of \$640.36 credit for utilities was approved.

CCSO investigates drug operations

In their continuing effort to fight illegal drug trafficking in the County, the Cooke County Sheriff's Office made multiple arrests last week.

On Friday, Jan. 4, the Cooke County Sheriff Office (CCSO) Drug Enforcement Unit assisted by CCSO Criminal Investigations, CCSO Patrol, Gainesville Police Department Patrol, and Child Protective Services dismantled an organized marijuana distribution operation that was spearheaded by members of the Gangster Disciples Criminal Street Gang. Two search and arrest warrants were executed in conclusion of a two-and-a-half months-long investigation into the organization's local operation.

The first of the two search and arrest warrants was executed at the Bella Vista Apartments located at 1000 Bella Vista Drive in Gainesville. Dterruss Jeron Goree, a 26 year old black male, and Konica Amber Hennessey, a 23 year old black female, were arrested for one count of Possession of Marijuana less than two ounces, and one count of Endangering a Child.

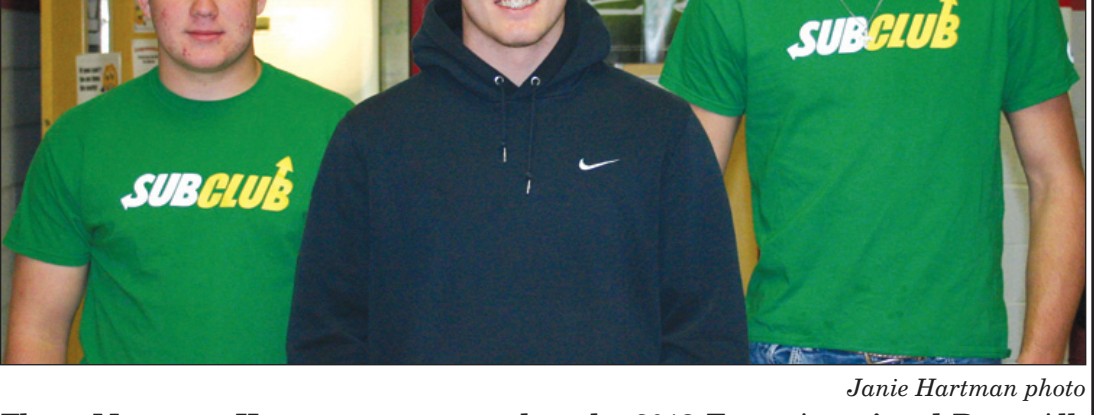
The second of the two search and arrest warrants was executed in the 1300 block of Hillcrest Boulevard in Gainesville. Cody Dewayne Walters, a 26 year old black male, Richie Deon Coleman, a 45 year old black male, Accalca Cerra Sherrer, a 19 year old black female, and Christopher Jordan Williams, a 21 year old black male, were arrested on a charge of Possession of Marijuana more than four ounces but less than five pounds, as well as Endangering a Child. Approximately four pounds of Marijuana with an estimated street value of \$4,000, approximately \$6,900 of U.S. currency, three handguns, and one 1991 Lincoln were seized by the Cooke Sheriff Office. The two endangered children were referred to Child Protective Services.

Behold! The Emerald Ash Borer cometh!

A scourge is nigh upon us, brethren! Creeping across our lands like a pestilent fog, a fiendish devil brings wrath of biblical proportions! So say your prayers, for the Emerald Ash Borer is at hand!

Taking ash trees like first-born children, the merciless Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has been on the rise ever since it's U.S. discovery in the Great Lakes region in 2002. It has since spread its wrath through much of the Middle West, Canada, and despite control efforts, is showing up in more states each year.

Adorned in an incrustated emerald-like, metallic green cloak, this invasive exotic insect hails from the land of China. It resembles a small click bug... small enough to sit nicely within the face of a dime. But don't let its small size deceive you! Like the ninjas who roam the forests alongside it in its native homeland, the EAB is a small package that packs a BIG punch... as in millions of ash trees, BILLIONS of dollars, and ZILLIONS of future baseball bats lost so far in the U.S.!

This apocalyptic critter is suspected to have hitched a ride over to the U.S. while gnawing around inside some wooden shipping pallets... cunningly slipping right past customs. Slow to spread in nature, human transport of firewood has been the leading cause of EAB dispersal in the U.S. This is not surprising since ash makes some of the best firewood out there and is one of the few wood types that can be burned green. No wonder it was known in medieval times as "the firewood of the kings."

The Texas Forest Service began a trapping program in early 2013, but to date has not confirmed EAB in the Lone Star State. Whew!!! That's good for us Texans! Yee haw! But... it has shown up in some not-so-far-off states in recent years, including Colorado, Tennessee, Kansas, and Georgia. So, it's slowly closing in on us, folks.

Control methods include insecticidal sprays, removal of infested ash trees, and quarantining of infestation areas. Always burn local firewood. Don't haul it in from out of state. If you have an ash tree, keep an eye on it for classic borer sign. That includes small holes in the trunk, seepage of sap, sawdust (known as frass) around the base of the tree or on the bark, and stress of the canopy. If you suspect the ash borer, you can call a certified arborist for confirmation and possible remedies.

Because of EAB, we arborists suggest shying away from the choice of Ash as a tree to plant. And we wait in joyful hope that some Divine miracle (and the diligent efforts of scientists, government, and community) will save our Ashes, and that this green devil will merely "Passover" the Great State of Texas.

Charles "Chas" Bayer 1942 - 2014

Mass of Christian Burial for Charles Joseph Bayer, age 71 of Muenster, was held at 10 a.m., Tuesday, Jan. 14 at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Muenster. A Rosary/vigil was held at 5:30 p.m., Monday, Jan. 13, also at Sacred Heart Church. Services were officiated by Rev. Ken Robinson and directed by McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster. Charles, better known as Chas, died Friday, Jan. 10, 2014 in Muenster following a courageous battle with cancer.

Chas was born March 1, 1942 during a terrible snowstorm to John H. and Adelaide Walterscheid Bayer. He attended Sacred Heart School, graduating in 1960, and then attended St. Edwards University.

On June 23, 1962, Chas married his high school sweetheart Carolyn Rae Swirczynski at Sacred Heart Church. They are the parents of five children, and grandparents of seven.

In 1965, Johnny Bayer along with his five sons formed J.H. Bayer & Sons, Inc., which they built and have continued to grow over the years into a very large farming and ranching corporation. Chas and Carolyn purchased Ray's Drive-In Grocery in 1978 from Carolyn's father Ray Swirczynski, changed the name to Bayer's Kolonialwaren und Backerei, and grew this convenience store and bakery for 16 years before selling it in 1993. Remaining a partner in the farm and ranch corporation, Chas then returned

to farming and ranching with his four brothers.

Always known for his generous spirit, Chas was involved in nearly all organizations in the community and was instrumental in either the building of, or the success of, many of these organizations throughout his life. He took much pride in his community and always strived to make it better, be it through the Sacred Heart Alumni, the Muenster Jaycees, the Muenster Chamber of Commerce, the Sacred Heart Trust Fund, the Muenster Industrial Foundation, the Germanfest Heritage Park, the Sacred Heart Church Building & Maintenance Board, and the Upper Elm Red Soil & Water Conservation District Board, just to name a few. Chas was proud of the fact that he announced almost all of the Sacred Heart Tiger football games for 40 years and was often called the voice of Sacred Heart.

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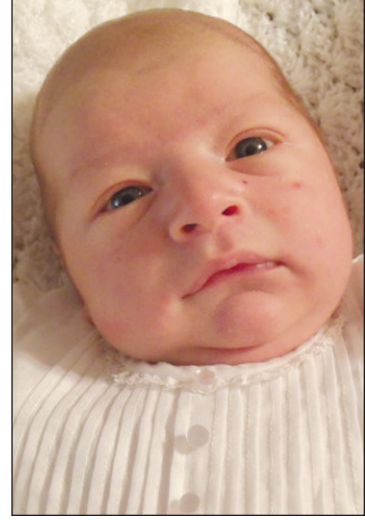

Weather Whys - Cold fronts

Q: What causes cold fronts?
A: The simple explanation is that the leading edge of a cold air mass is moving into an area previously occupied by a warmer air mass, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "The air mass behind the cold front is noticeably colder and it pushes out the warmer air," McRoberts explains. "As a cold front moves into an area, the heavier, colder air lifts the warmer, lighter air upward. If the warm air is humid enough, water vapor in it will condense and rain can occur. A greater contrast in temperatures between the two air masses will lead to stronger upward motion, which is why strong cold fronts often trigger thunderstorms."

MISD students compete in Congress Debate at State Meet

Austin Creswell placed 5th at the Inaugural State Congressional Debate on Wednesday, Jan. 8 in the Texas State Capitol in Austin. Lyndon Cook placed in the top 20 debaters in 1A.

Congress is an individual contest in a large group setting. It models the legislative process of democracy, specifically, the United States Congress. Within this mock legislative assembly competition, contestants draft legislation (proposed laws and position statements) submitted to the tournament, and they research the docket of bills and resolutions dealing with real-world social and political policies prior to the contest to prepare their speeches. At the tournament, students caucus in committees, deliver formal discourse on the merits and disadvantages of each piece of legislation, and vote to pass or defeat the measures they have examined. Parliamentary procedure forms structure for the discourse, and students extemporaneously respond to others' arguments over the course of a session.

The two-day event consisted of 16 hours of debate. Austin and Lyndon debated over 30 pieces of proposed legislation. The preliminary round resolutions included the abolishment of preemptive energy, the elimination of agriculture subsidies, restricting the sale of meat treated with antibiotics, and corporate responsibilities for pension benefits. Both debaters were prepared to debate either for or against the legislation.

After breaking into finals, the final 15 pieces of legislation were debated. Each debater spoke for three minutes and then was questioned for a one minute period. The final round consisted of resolutions concerning the Acceptance of the American Care Act, discontinuing NAFTA, the increase of nuclear energy, Internet protection from Data-Mining, and funding to monitor the Texas border. Again, both Austin and Lyndon were prepared

to debate in affirmation or negation of each resolution. Austin had the privilege of serving as presiding officer during the first round of finals. He was elected by the chamber members and was responsible for introducing the docket as well as monitoring voting procedures in the chamber.

The debates were televised live from chambers into the

congressional offices. Several Texas congressmen and TEA representatives were present for the medal ceremony Wednesday evening.

Austin, a senior at MISD, is the son of Eddy and Nadine Creswell. He will be attending Sante Fe University of Art and Design in New Mexico this fall. Lyndon, a junior at MISD, is the son of Lynn and Carol Cook.

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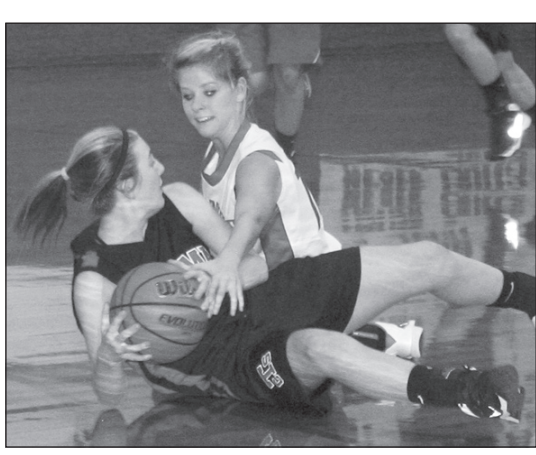

Economist: Beef cattle prices poised to continue record run

For beef cattle prices to continue their record run, the 2014 U.S. corn crop will have to produce record yields, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service economist.

That aside, the 2014 beef cattle market outlook is positive for another historic run as lack of supply will continue to fetch strong bids on calves.

"Look for continued high prices," said Dr. David Anderson at the recent Central Texas Cow-Calf Clinic at the Milano Livestock Exchange. "Tight supplies are underpinning the market. I think we are going to have higher calf prices than we did in 2013 and higher prices in 2015 than we did in 2014."

Fewer cows and calves will lead to less beef production over the next couple of years, Anderson said. Cattle on feed numbers as well as slaughter and beef production are down from levels a year ago, signaling less supply.

Anderson said the biggest threat to future high calf prices is feed prices.

"If the nation's corn crop comes up short, that could drive up prices putting downward bid prices on the calves," he said.

Fed cattle set new record prices the week of Jan. 1-3. In 2013, Anderson said there were as many beef cows slaughtered for the year as there were in 2012, as a percentage of the herd.

"We kept culling, which is

why I think we will continue to have tighter supplies going forward," Anderson said.

He predicts beef production to be down 6% for 2014 and another 4% for 2015.

"I think we will have higher prices whether it is retail or cattle prices," he said. "I don't think we are there yet as far as herd expansion."

The only concern ahead is the 2014 corn crop. Anderson said corn prices today "are darn near half of what they were in 2012. In 2013, the opposite happened. We had a record corn crop and corn prices went down, while calf prices took off. Going forward, to maintain these high calf prices we've got to have a record corn crop."

Anderson there will be fewer acres of corn planted this year as some farmers shift to soybeans to take advantage of potential price runs.

Demand remains strong for beef despite record-high beef prices, Anderson said.

"The question I get all of the time is when are people going to quit eating beef in reaction to record-high beef prices?" he said. "It hasn't happened yet. We've had record prices for months and months, and I think they are going to continue to go up. We've seen a shift in the kind of beef we eat, but haven't seen people giving up their hamburgers for pork or chicken. We continue to have slowly growing beef demand with a slowly growing economy. We could see it pick up for beef demand as the economy grows in the latter half of 2014. If you put tighter supplies with growing demand, I think we will be talking about higher prices in the years ahead."

Anderson said there have been reports of declining beef consumption, but said the



real result is a reduction in beef production.

"I think as we produce more cattle, consumption will go up."

Looking ahead, Anderson said he predicts higher calf prices for 2014 than levels hit in 2013. For 500-pound to 600-pound steers, he sees prices of \$178 per hundredweight and \$184 per hundredweight for the first quarter of the year. By the first quarter of 2015, those prices could reach the \$189 per hundredweight mark for number one steers.

For now, Anderson said there has been a tendency for packers to overpay for cattle, which continues to pressure bids for feeder cattle as there are fewer to be sold. That's led to imbalances and packers losing money as the competition heats up to purchase a shrinking inventory.

Agriculture Market Summary

Texas Department of Agriculture



For the week ending Jan. 11, Texas feeder cattle auction prices through mid-week were mostly \$3 to \$15 higher per hundredweight (cwt) compared to their last sales prior to the holidays, with a few as much as \$25 higher. Auctions later in the week were steady to \$3 higher compared to the previous week. Texas direct feeder cattle prices were steady to \$2 higher compared to a week ago.

Market fundamentals remain bullish as tight supplies, record high fed cattle prices, and grain prices much lower than they were at this time last year continue to support feeder prices. Fed cattle cash prices were up \$2.47 from the previous week, which brought a new record high of \$138.99 per cwt. Wholesale beef values also reached record-high prices. Beef export sales totaled 5,800 metric tons, with Hong Kong and Japan as the leading buyers.

Corn and grain sorghum

prices ended the week higher after USDA reports showed lower than expected U.S. production and Jan. 1 stocks on hand. However, this year's U.S. corn crop was still a record-large 13.9 billion bushels, which will likely limit price gains. Corn export sales for the week were up 1% from the previous week, but down 79% from the four-week average. Japan and Mexico were the leading buyers. Shipments were down 29% from a week earlier and 34% below the average.

Wheat prices were lower. USDA reported winter wheat seedings for harvest in 2014 at 41.9 million acres, down 3% from a year ago and much lower than expected. However, U.S. and world projected ending supplies were higher, and those large supplies continued to pressure the market. U.S. wheat export sales for the week were down 55% from the previous week and 76% lower than the prior four-week average.

USDA extends deadline for Conservation Stewardship applications

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has extended the deadline for new enrollments in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) for fiscal year 2014. Producers interested in participating in the program can submit applications to NRCS through Feb. 7, 2014.

"Extending the enrollment deadline will make it possible for more to apply for this important Farm Bill conservation program," NRCS Chief Jason Weller said. "Through their conservation actions, these good stewards are ensuring that their operations are more productive and sustainable over the long run and CSP can help them take their operations to the next level of natural resource management."

Weller said the announcement is another example of USDA's comprehensive focus on promoting environmental conservation and strengthening the rural economy, and it is a reminder that a new Food, Farm and Jobs Bill is pivotal to continue these efforts.

The program emphasizes conservation

performance — producers earn higher payments for higher performance. In CSP, producers install conservation enhancements to make positive changes in soil quality, soil erosion, water quality, water quantity, air quality, plant resources, animal resources and energy use.

Eligible landowners and operators in all states and territories can enroll in CSP through Feb. 7 to be eligible during fiscal 2014. While local NRCS offices accept CSP applications year round, NRCS evaluates applications during announced ranking periods. To be eligible for this year's enrollment, producers must have their applications submitted to NRCS by the closing date.

A CSP self-screening checklist is available to help producers determine if the program is suitable for their operation. The checklist highlights basic information about CSP eligibility requirements, stewardship threshold requirements, and payment types.

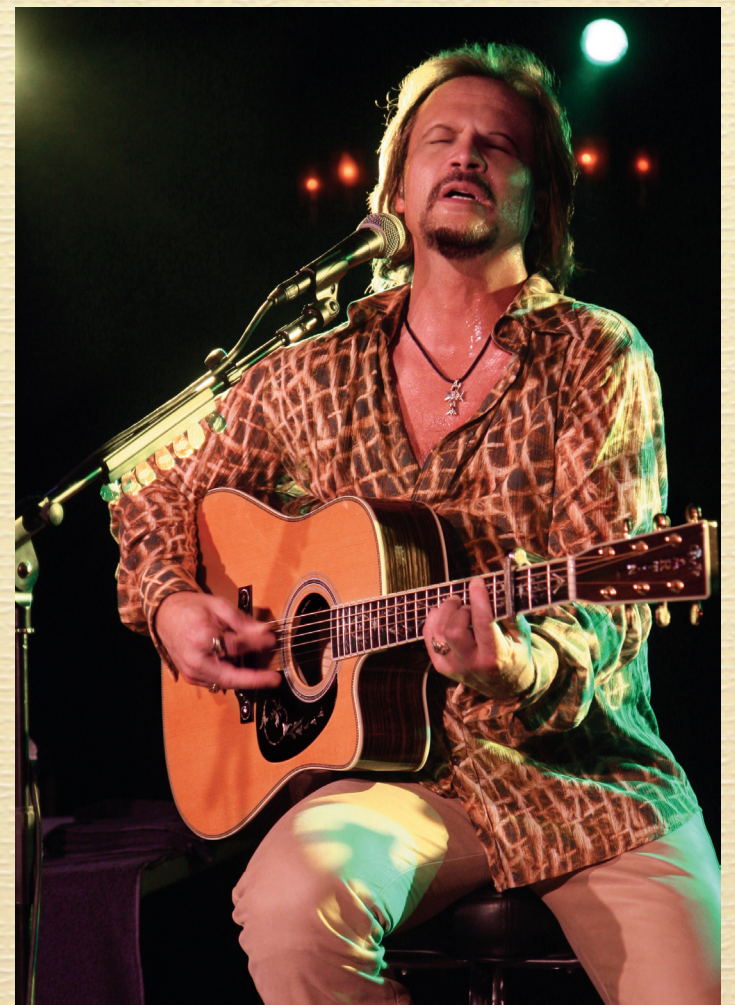
