## Bishop Olson welcomed by Fort Worth Diocese

Approximately 8,500 people from across North Texas and beyond traveled to the Fort Worth Convention Center Jan. 29 to watch Monsignor Michael Fors Olson become the fourth bishop of the Diocese of Fort Worth during an ordination Mass steeped in tradition, ritual, and majesty.

Thunderous applause erupted from the audience, as the newly ordained bishop circled the Convention Center arena to greet the assembly at the close of the three-hour ceremony. Some journeyed by bus from as

far away as Muenster, Pilot Point, and Wichita Falls to meet the new leader of their diocese.

“Being here today shows that we’re part of something bigger than just our little community,” said Bailey Walterscheid, who waited with eager anticipation for the liturgical procession of honor guards, papal orders, and clergy to begin. The Muenster resident and Sacred Heart High School senior had never witnessed an ordination before but met the new bishop through her uncle, Father Kyle Walterscheid, pastor of Bl. John Paul II Parish in Denton.

“He’s a nice man, and I

think he’ll be a good bishop and role model,” she said.

Archbishop Gustavo Garcia-Siller of San Antonio served as principal consecrator when he performed the Sacred Rite of Ordination. In his remarks, he advised the 47-year-old bishop-elect to exercise his ministry effectively by “getting close to people”—especially the lowly, the broken-hearted, the imprisoned, and those who mourn.

“Be close so you can touch them with the healing power that can only come from God,” he said. “No matter how confusing, messy, or bewildering life may seem,

## Walterscheid is new fire chief

After serving the Muenster community as chief of the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department since 1983, Herbie Knabe decided to relinquish that role. He also served as chief from 1972-78 for a total of 33 years as fire chief. Knabe plans to remain a member of the department and will serve in an advisory position.

MVFD’s new chief as of Jan. 1 is Bert Walterscheid. Chief Walterscheid has been a member of the MVFD for 28 years. For about the last 15 years, he’s been the assistant fire chief.

Chief Walterscheid has some plans in the works for the department. He said that they are developing a website that will be used to keep the public informed of things such as burn bans and reminders to change batteries

in smoke detectors, etc. He hopes to have it up and running by March.

Although he doesn’t expect to see it happen while he is chief, Walterscheid would like to see land acquired to build a new fire station or perhaps a new city hall and fire station combination. “We’re out of room. We’ve got to do something,” he explained. “We’re packed in there like sardines. We remodeled and added on two bays since I’ve been there. We’re out of adding on room.” There are 32 firefighters and when 20 respond to a call, they are bumping into one another when they go to the station to put on their gear.

Walterscheid is encouraging business owners to install rapid entry systems. This is a four inch plate steel box with a key to the building inside. The fire department holds the key to these boxes. When they respond

to a call, they use the key to open the secure box, get the business key, and enter through a door rather than breaking windows or doors. These are available to home owners also. The cost is \$295 for the box and shipping is \$50 regardless of whether one or 15 boxes are ordered at a time.

This would be helpful at homes when the fire department is called to assist with a medical call. If the home is locked, they spend time checking doors and windows to try to gain entry. If these are all locked, then they must break a window to get inside to render aid.

He noted, “It causes down time when you have to check every window. Sometimes seconds mean life or death, you don’t know. They’ve been using these things for years and they work.”

## City calls election for 3 Council places

Mayor Pro Tem Jewel Otto conducted the regular meeting of Muenster’s City Council on Monday, Feb. 3. Mayor Joey Anderson and Aldermen Greg Bohl and Pat Stelzer were absent. Otto and Aldermen Jack Flusche and Tim Felderhoff made the quorum.

An election for three Council positions was called by Mayor Pro Tem Otto. Places with terms expiring in May are Place 1 held by Jewel Otto, Place 2 held by Greg Bohl, and Place 4 held by Pat Stelzer. Anyone wishing to seek election to one of these positions must do so at City Hall by 5 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 28. The sign up period has already begun.

Auditor Rod Abbot gave the 2012-13 audit presentation. He noted, “Once again, the City of Muenster is receiving an unmodified opinion which is a good opinion saying that we believe all the balances herein are materially correct.”

After hearing Abbot’s report, the Council unanimously approved the audit report.

Mayor Pro Tem Otto said that Muenster Memorial Hospital will be celebrating its 50th anniversary this month.

## Hospital to celebrate 50 years of caring service

For decades, residents of the Muenster community nurtured a dream of the town having its own hospital. Resident John Kreitz died and left a fund for that or another charitable purpose. This inspired the Muenster City Council to create the Muenster Hospital Authority in 1958. For two years, no action was taken. The Hospital Authority found an architect and the long, tedious process of drawing and approving plans and procuring funding began.

Construction of the facility began on Aug. 15, 1962. The building was finished enough to hold an open house on Jan. 19, 1964 and they opened the door for patients on Feb. 3.

Residents of Muenster were very proud of their new hospital and the fact that they could get medical care in their own community.

There have been many ups and down as the years progressed for the Hospital, but through the efforts of caring staff and community volunteers it has stood the storms and kept on course in fair weather. Services offered have been expanded and/or adjusted as medical needs and government regulations changed.

On Saturday, Feb. 15, the Hospital District will celebrate its 50 years with a dinner and dance in

the Muenster VFW Hall. The event begins at 6:30 p.m. with a social hour. A meal and program follow at 7:30 p.m. Guests will be treated to a history of the Hospital presented by Nicholas Taylor and a slide show filled with many pho-

tos taken through the decades. Former administrators and many long-time past employees will be guests of honor. To conclude the evening, Andy Serna and the Forever Young Band will provide dance music.

Everyone is welcome to attend this event and help celebrate the culmination of a community’s dream that still thrives 50 years later. Ticket sales are limited, so those who wish to attend are encouraged to purchase tickets soon. Cost is \$10 per person. I am writing this letter to let you know what is happening with the Muenster Volunteer Fire Dept. as of Jan. 1. I took over the helm of the Department, with Mitch Creed as my assistant chief. We have some very big shoes to fill. After more than 25 years as chief, Herbie Knabe has decided to step down. We should all give him a pat on the back for all his time he has given to this community. Good job Herbie!!

We have a few things to inform the community about. First, we are in the process of developing a website. This will help the area be more informed of what's happening within the Department and the area. Such as burn bans and reminders of planned events for the Department. Also we would like to encourage everyone to have a planned escape route in your homes and replace smoke detector batteries.

Recently we are now registered with KnoxBox.com. This company developed the rapid entry system. You can go to their website and order one of these boxes. We get an email to approve or disapprove the purchase. These boxes are only available for people in the Muenster fire district. The boxes that have been ordered for the new public school and Heritage Park are surface-mounted and are about 4"X6". After the boxes are installed, the owner puts a key to the business or residence. If a fire occurs, the fire department has a key to get into the box to gain access to the facility. This is a VERY secure system with the fire department having the only key to open the Knox Box. I would encourage anybody who is interested to contact myself or Mitch for more information.

Our new rescue truck should be complete and in service within the next 60 days. We are still a ways from a 'burn ban' but if you do want to burn anything, please call the county to let them know you are having a controlled burn. Their number is 665-3471. Please pay attention to the wind and humidity before lighting any fires. Our Department is committed to keeping our community safe.

## New culvert should be BIG help to drivers



**Cooke County Precinct #4 recently replaced a 45 foot long culvert on County Road 415 north of Myra. The new culvert is 12 feet in circumference and 60 feet long - big enough to drive a vehicle through. with the local schools is on the new fire chief's list. He wants to continue working with the schools.

"One of my goals is to keep all our firemen safe and make sure everyone comes home," Walterscheid shared. "We've been blessed with the equipment we've got and the community support we've had. We are very blessed and I just hope that the support keeps on going."

"We are fortunate that Herbie stayed in there as long as he did. I remember when we just had two trucks. Going from what we were then to what we are now is unbelievable." There are now seven trucks and the fire chief's car.

Walterscheid said that is the goal of himself and the training officers is to get more of the firemen certified this year. "That helps keep our key rate down. That is one reason our key rate was so good. Plus, our water system was good too and our fire department was an asset on that deal." He added

that there are several other firefighters who will likely be retiring from the department in the next few years. They need to get more firefighters certified.

"We've got a good group of guys," praised Walterscheid. "It's our department. It's every member's department and this community's department. We've got really a good group of guys."

About the retiring fire chief Walterscheid remarked, "He was invaluable. He did a good job. It's going to be hard to fill his shoes, but that's the way things go. All good things must come to an end."

A piece of advice from Walterscheid is for people to notify 9-1-1 addressing if they change the entry to their property. When responding to a call, the MVD is going by the County's directions which are determined by the 9-1-1 address. This causes delays in response. "If your 9-1-1 address doesn't match your physical address and your entry to your property, if you are in a remote area, please contact Ray Fletcher because that's very important." He also said that people should put up large enough numbers on their mailboxes or where they turn into their lane. At night it is difficult to see the numbers, and road signs are often down due to vandalism.

In conclusion Chief Walterscheid said, "All in all, we are going to move on and serve the citizens of Muenster and the surrounding community the best we can. We've got one of the fastest response times in the County."

you will encounter the Lord in the lives of the people you serve."

The 28-county diocese has been without a leader since Fort Worth's third bishop, Kevin W. Vann left to become the Bishop of Orange, California, in December 2011. Newly ordained Bishop Michael Olson now leads the fast, rapidly growing diocese which has an estimated 710,000 Catholics, 90 parishes, and 22 schools. A native of Illinois, he is the first priest ordained in the Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth to be named a bishop. Another diocesan priest, Monsignor Stephen J. Berg, who has served as diocesan administrator until the ordination of Bishop Olson, was appointed to become bishop of Pueblo, Colorado on Jan. 15. His ordination is set for Feb. 27.

Prior to becoming Bishop-elect, Monsignor Michael Olson served as rector of Holy Trinity Seminary in Irving where he is credited with boosting enrollment and improving the quality of priestly formation provided there. Seminarians from Holy Trinity and several other seminaries were invited to participate in the procession that included 43 bishops, approximately 230 priests, and 60 deacons.

"Serving at today's ordination is an honor," said Jason Allan, a second-year student at Holy Trinity. "We're all going to miss him at Holy Trinity, but I'm glad he's now our bishop."

Bishop Vann and Archbishop Emeritus Joseph A. Fiorenza of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston served as principal co-consecrators. Apostolic Nuncio to the United States, Archbishop Carlo Maria Viganò, read the Apostolic Mandate from His Holiness Pope Francis naming Monsignor Olson to the fullness of the priesthood as Bishop of Fort Worth.

He reminded the bishop-elect that in the recent Apostolic exhortation Evangelii Gaudium, Pope Francis highlighted what he considered the outstanding responsibilities of a bishop and asked each one to foster a diocesan church that is dynamic, open, and missionary in purpose like the first Christian communities.

"As you faithfully teach, govern, and sanctify in the name of the Good Shepherd, we are confident that you will bring the joy of the Gos-

pel both to the flock entrusted to you as well as the community at large," Archbishop Viganò said.

Before the ordination Mass concluded, Bishop Olson addressed the crowd from the flower-decorated altar which featured an 18-foot crucifix loaned by the Discalced Carmelite Monastery in Arlington.

He thanked clergy for their presence and his family for "giving me the gift of life and the gift of faith," then asked the congregation to respond to Pope Francis' call for a missionary conversion and a return to the basics of discipleship — The Beatitudes, the Ten Commandments, the Gospel, and the Mystery of the Cross.

"Fear has no place in the life of a disciple," Bishop Olson asserted. "Conversion is not a matter of climbing the rough staircase of fear, but of being raised up to God by the gift of love."

There will be a dinner and dance on Saturday, Feb. 15 to mark the milestone and everyone is invited to attend.

Otto acknowledged the Hospital and expressed appreciation for all it has done for the City and the entire area over the last 50 years. She said the City wishes them many more years of success.

Pat Dillon, grant consultant, attended the meeting to assist with awarding the construction contract for the City's sewer system improvement project. The project is for the sewer system located by Weinzapfel Lake dam, a portion of Sixth Street from the west side of Weinzapfel Lake to the east side between two man holes, and just before Cherry Lane where they plan to replace some old sewer line.

Dillon stated, "We are going to try to get it out of the dam and we're going to go around it to make sure that that area is protected from now on and you don't have that potential for a really big problem there."

Bids were received from five contractors. The sealed bids were opened on Jan. 14. Vessels Construction, Inc. from Sherman submitted the low bid of \$129,058.86.

The bids ranged from that amount up to over \$300,000, said Dillon. Even the low bid is over budget by \$18,092.86. "That will have to come out of the local funds," Dillon said. He expects pre-construction to begin in about 30 days. The job is expected to take about four months. It should be completed in June or July.

City Administrator Stan Endres said the City was awarded a \$125,000 grant and must pay for the engineering and the consultant fee. It was estimated that would be about \$150,000. The actual cost is \$168,000, he said.

The Council voted to award the construction contract to Vessels Construction.

Administrator Endres reported that a representative from the Texas Water Development Board was in town on Jan. 14. He measured the water levels in City water wells #5, #6, and #4. The water levels in #4 and #5 had a slight increase, but #6 showed a huge drop. About 10 days later, the wells were again measured by Leo Lutkenhaus and Milton Knauf for the City using the same method. This time, Well #6 showed a very large increase while #4 and #5 had small decreases. The cause for this discrepancy is unknown.

Endres said that they would continue to monitor the well levels to see what happens.

Endres attended the Small Cities Workshop in Sherman on Jan. 29. He said that there are changes coming in the Texas Community Development Block Grant program. The Council of Governments (COG) was given the right to assist the cities with their grant applications. This had not been allowed in the past. Grant applications will no longer be scored locally, but will be done by a COG in another part of the State. This could possibly affect Muenster's chances for receiving grant awards.

New street signs for Muenster ISD have arrived and will soon be placed.

The sewer line replacement project by Schilling Tire is proceeding well and should be completed soon, said Endres.

In other business, the City Council:

- Reappointed Milton Knauf, Nick Walterscheid, and Tim Schneider to another two-year term on the Muenster Water District Board of Directors.
- Heard January police activity report from Police Chief Mark Blankenship.
- Approved payment of bills totaling \$129,604.70.

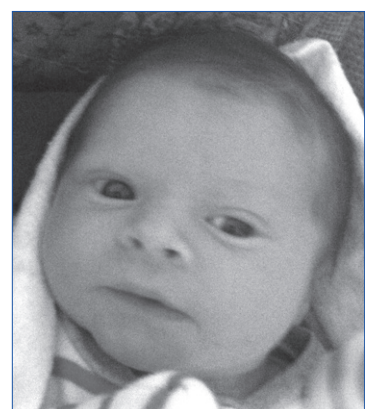

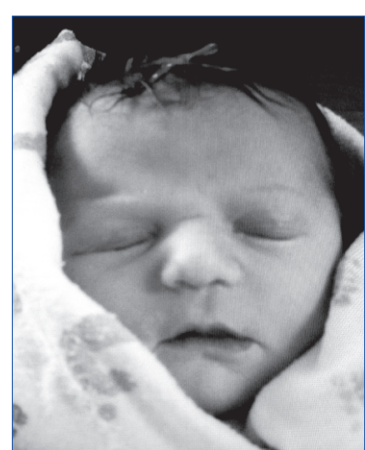

## Weather Whys - Cold Fronts

Q: How fast can the temperature drop when a cold front arrives?

A: Sometimes amazingly fast, Brent McRoberts adds. It is not uncommon for the temperature to drop 15 degrees or more in just one hour after a cold front arrives. "There are some incredible stories about

temperature changes, with one in particular that stands out," he adds. "On Jan. 22, 1943, the town of Spearfish, SD was sitting on the edge of an arctic air mass and recorded a temperature of -4 degrees at 7:30 in the morning. Within two minutes, the thermometer shot up to 45 degrees because of strong 'Chi-

nook' winds descending down a nearby mountain peak. By 9 a.m. the temperature was up to 54 degrees, but as the winds died down and the cold air mass settled in, the temperature fell to -4 degrees within 27 minutes, a 58-degree temperature drop that is still believed to be a record."

## Property taxes on farms and ranches could be reduced with productivity appraisal

Texas farmers and ranchers can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to the Cooke County Appraisal District for agricultural productivity appraisal and for a lower appraisal of their land based on how much they produce, versus what their land would sell for in the open market. The Texas Constitution authorizes two types of agricultural productivity appraisals, 1-d-1 and 1-d, named after the section in which they were authorized. Only 1-d-1 agricultural productivity appraisal type is available in Cooke County. For 1-d-1 appraisal, property owners must use the land for agriculture or timber but the lands use must meet the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area. Owners must also show that the land is being used for at least five of the preceding seven years.

1-d-1 appraisal does not restrict ownership to individuals and does not require agriculture to be the owner's primary business. Penalties in the form of rollback tax, or the difference between the taxes paid under productivity appraisal and the taxes that would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value, will be imposed if qualified land is taken out of agriculture or timber production. A rollback tax occurs when a land owner switches the land's use to non-agricultural. These rollback taxes under 1-d-1 are based on the five tax years preceding the year of change. Texas law also allows farmers and ranchers to use land for wildlife management and still receive the special appraisal, but the land must be qualified for agriculture use

in the preceding year. Land under wildlife management must also meet acreage size requirements and special use qualifications. The deadline to apply for productivity appraisal is April 30. If the last day for the performance of an act is on Saturday, Sunday, or legal state or national holiday, the act is timely performed on the next regular business day. Owners of land qualified as 1-d-1 need not file again in later years unless the chief appraiser requests a new application. ## Texas Agricultural Market Summary

For the week ending Feb. 1, Texas feeder cattle auctions reported prices \$4 lower to \$8 higher per hundredweight (cwt). Texas direct feeder cattle prices were steady to \$3 lower. Fed cattle cash prices declined \$2.50 from the previous week's record-high, averaging \$144.62 on a light sales volume. Wholesale beef values were sharply lower, with Choice-grade offerings down \$6.50 from the record high set the previous Wednesday. Prices across the cattle-beef complex remain at historically high levels as tight supplies continue to support the market. Beef export sales totaled 10,600 metric tons (MT) last week, down 26% from the previous week and down 39% from the prior four-week average. Japan, Canada, and Mexico were the leading buyers. Shipments of 12,700 MT were up 5% from a week earlier and 13% above the average. South Korea, Japan, and Mexico were the top destinations.

Corn and grain sorghum prices were higher as solid export data continued to support the market. Corn export sales totaled 1.8 million MT last week, 2.5 times higher than the previous week and more than four times higher than the four-week average. Japan accounted for nearly half the purchases. Shipments of 1 million MT were up 26% from the week earlier and up 38% from the average. Japan, Mexico, and Columbia were the leading destinations. Grain sorghum sales and shipments also were up sharply from both the previous week and the average. Wheat prices were lower as large world supplies continue to pressure the market and in spite of strong export sales and concerns about freeze damage. Wheat export sales for the week were 794,900 MT, nearly double the previous week and nearly three times higher than the average.

## Pig virus cases see biggest weekly rise

Confirmed cases of a deadly pig virus spreading across the U.S. Hog Belt jumped by 215, its highest weekly increase since it was discovered in the United States in April 2013, according to the USDA's National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN). Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus (PEDv), which causes diarrhea, vomiting, and severe dehydration is transmitted orally and through pig faeces. While older pigs have a chance of survival, the virus kills 80 to 100% of piglets that contract it. The total number of confirmed cases has increased to 2,692 in 23 states as of the week ended Jan. 25. Nearly 4% of the cases, 1,006, were confirmed in Iowa, the top U.S. pork producing state.
