

Crash injures five Muenster girls

According to a report from Trooper Mark Tackett of the Texas Highway Patrol, at 7:09 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 16, DPS troopers responded to a major crash on CR 428. Five high school students from Muenster were westbound in a 1998 Ford passenger car. The vehicle went airborne as it topped a hill and the driver lost control. The vehicle rolled at least five times before landing in a baseball field. Two passengers were ejected.

All five female passengers were transported to local and Metroplex hospitals listed in serious to critical conditions. Responding to the accident besides the Highway Patrol were Muenster VFD, Cooke County EMS, and CareFlite.

Muenster welcomes new police officer

Muenster's newest police officer is Laura Brock of Saint Jo. She was hired by Muenster Police Chief Mark Blankenship to replace Officer Justin Stamps who resigned to accept a job with the Cooke County Sheriff's Department.

In 1998, Brock went through the Police Academy at Weatherford College. Her first job after graduation was with the Hood County Sheriff's Office in Granbury. She worked there until April of 2011. During that time, she served as patrol deputy, patrol sergeant, investigator, and school resource officer. Being a little burned out on police work in 2011, Laura took a job with Granbury Live. Then in January 2013, she was hired as Saint Jo's police chief. For the last eight months, Laura has worked for the Montague Sheriff's Office.

Then when she was 28 years old, she decided it was time to do something for herself. She talked to her husband and oldest daughter about it. With their approval and support, she put herself through the Police Academy.

Of law enforcement, Laura said, "I believe we have a lot of discretion. And though, some laws are black and white, you do have officer discretion. You have to look at all extenuating circumstances and take those into account."

Brock said that she moved to Granbury to be in a small town. It grew and is no longer a small town and it continues to grow to. Thus, she moved to this area to reconnect with a small town atmosphere. "I love the small town atmosphere and most everyone that I've met so far has been very receiving and cordial and friendly," commented Officer Brock. She said that they are looking for property in Cooke County hoping to move here.

Some activities that Laura enjoys include crafts, fishing, and horses. Her youngest daughter is involved with the Saint Jo Riding Club. "I love to draw. I can sit and doodle for hours," Laura admitted.

"I appreciate the way everyone has welcomed me and I look forward to being able to serve the citizens of the community," said Officer Brock. "If I can ever be of any assistance to anyone, just let me know."

Laura is engaged to Darrell Brackeen. She has a 23-year-old daughter who attends college at University Central Oklahoma and an eight-year-old daughter.

Filing deadline nears

Friday, Feb. 28 is the last day to file as a candidate in any of the local elections. Elections may be cancelled if there are no contested positions. If an election is to be held, it will be on Saturday, May 10. Muenster entities with terms that expire in May are the City Council, Muenster ISD, and Muenster Hospital District.

On the City Council, those are Place 1 held by Jewel Otto, Place 2 held by Greg Bohl, and Place 4 held by Pat Stelzer. All three have filed for another term. At this time, none have an opponent. Anyone wishing to file as a candidate to one of these positions may do so at City Hall between 8 a.m. and noon and 1-5 p.m.

Muenster Hospital Board has three at-large seats open. They are now held by Jon Reed, Don Richardson, and Danny Walterscheid. Reed and Richardson are the only two candidates for those seats as of press time. Those who would like to seek election to the Hospital Board should file their

Three seek Republican nomination for Cooke County Judge

Since County Judge John Roane is not seeking another term of office, there is no incumbent in this race. The three County Judge hopefuls seeking nomination to the Republican ticket are Byron Berry, Jason Brinkley, and Aaron Smith. Since there is not a candidate on the Democratic ticket for this position, the person who wins the Republican nomination will serve the next term as County Judge.

Byron Berry and his wife Reanae reside on a the family ranch near Rosston. He is a fifth generation Cooke County resident. He has three children - Colby Berry, Colton Berry, and Ashleigh Berry. Berry graduated from Gainesville High School in 1973. He attended Texas Tech University, graduating with a BBA with degree in Accounting and South Texas College of Law, Doctor of Jurisprudence in 1982. Berry is a shareholder in the law firm of Hayes Berry White & Vanzant, LP and is a rancher.

Jason Brinkley and his wife Katie are residents of the Mt. Springs Community (east of Valley View). He is a graduate of Valley View ISD. Brinkley earned his Bachelor's degree from Texas A&M in Political Science with a minor in Economics, and a Law Degree from Oklahoma City University School of Law. He serves as Justice of the Peace for the southern part of Cooke County (Pct. 4) and is a licensed attorney with a part-time law practice in Gainesville.

Aaron Smith lives in Gainesville with his wife Sydne and their two children Teddy and Izzie. He holds an Agriculture degree in Animal Science from Texas A&M University in College Station and Business Foundations Certification from the University of Texas College of Business in Austin. He gives his occupation as businessman.

Each candidate was presented with a set of identical questions. The questions and their responses follow.

Describe how you perceive the role of County Judge as a member of the five-member Commissioners Court - leadership or partnership?

Berry - The County Judge should work in partnership with the County Commissioners but take a leadership role in two of the projects I wish to implement - long range plan-

ning and a thoroughfare plan. The County Judge does preside over the Commissioner's Court but action is taken only upon majority vote of a quorum. Over the years, my firm has represented numerous governmental entities including Gainesville, Celina, Hickory Creek, and various school districts. In observing their meetings and the roles played by the mayors and presidents, I have noticed that those who try to enforce their will upon the other members, tend to alienate themselves and get nothing done. I intend to lead by building a consensus on various issues with the Commissioners, not by forcing my ideas upon them.

Brinkley - Both. The County Judge is first among equals. As the presiding officer of the Court, the County Judge must maintain proper order during the meetings, and it is his responsibility to make sure the meetings are run effectively. However, in order for any item of business to be approved it requires at least three votes on the Court. This require-

ment means that the County Judge must work in partnership with Commissioners to find support on any particular item.

Smith - The Cooke County judge is a servant to the people. He works with the commissioners. The Judge is one of five members on a team - the Commissioners Court. His job is to preside over the Commissioners Court. The judge and the four commissioners should do their best to work for the people of Cooke County in order to provide residents with the best return on their tax dollars. The Judge oversees the budgets for all county entities. The judge's job is to take that budget and sit down with the county auditor and go through it. And decide if taxpayers have enough money to pay for it, the things that are in the budget. So his job is to be an advocate for the citizens of Cooke County. When he looks at that budget, well what I would do as a fiscal conservative, is to decide what's necessary and what's not.

I've knocked on over a thousand doors already and I've talked to a lot of people, and taxpayers understand that they need certain things. They understand that they need a certain quality in their ambulance and in the people that are going to take them to the Care-Flite helicopter. They understand that they need good sheriff's deputies out there patrolling and keeping the bad guys on the run. What they want is efficiency.

If elected, how do you plan to help keep the County's AAA credit rating and how do you feel this rating impacts the County? (Note - AAA is a

Homeowners encouraged to take advantage of Homestead Exemptions

One of the easiest ways a homeowner can lower his or her property tax bill in 2014 is to file a homestead exemption. A homestead is generally the house and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year.

Homestead exemptions reduce the appraised value of your home and, as a result, lower your property taxes. To apply for an exemption on your residence homestead, contact Cooke County Appraisal District.

Available homestead exemptions include:

- School taxes: All homeowners may receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption for school taxes.
- County taxes: if a county collects a special tax for farm-to-market roads or flood control, a homeowner may receive a \$3,000 homestead exemption for this tax.
- Age and disability exemptions: Individuals 65 or older or disabled as defined by law may qualify for a \$10,000 homestead exemption for school taxes, in addition to the \$15,000 exemption available to all homeowners. Also, any taxing unit may offer a local optional exemption of at least \$3,000 for taxpayers age 65 or older and/or disabled. Older or disabled homeowners do not need to own their homes on Jan. 1 to qualify for the \$10,000 homestead exemption. They qualify as soon as they turn 65 or become disabled.
- Taxing units may offer a local option exemption based on a percentage of a home's appraised value. Any taxing unit can exempt up to 20% of the value of each qualified homestead. No matter what percentage of value the taxing unit adopts, the dollar value of the exemption must be at least \$5,000.
- Partial disabled veteran exemption: Texas law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by veterans who are disabled, spouses and survivors of deceased disabled veterans. This includes homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations

at no cost to the disabled veterans. The amount of exemptions is determined according to the percentage of service-connected disability.

- 100 Percent Residence Homestead Exemption for Disabled Veterans: A disabled veteran who receives from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (1) 100% compensation due to a service-connected disability; and (2) a rating of 100% disabled or individual unemployability is entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of the veteran's residences homestead. Surviving spouses are also eligible upon the veteran's death with certain restrictions. The residence homestead application must be filed if this exemption is claimed.
- Surviving Spouses of Members of the U.S. Armed Services Killed in Action: The surviving spouse of a member of the U.S. armed services who is killed in action is allowed a total (100%) property tax exemption on his or her residence homestead if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the armed services member.

County makes drug arrests

In the continuing efforts of the Cooke County Sheriff's Office to combat illegal drugs in the County, the following arrests have been made.

On Saturday, Feb. 8, investigators with the Cooke County Sheriff's Office Drug Enforcement Unit, assisted by CID and patrol, dismantled a large-scale methamphetamine distribution operation in the 2000 block of Hockley Creek Road near Valley View. Deputies executed a search and arrest warrant on the residence after establishing that methamphetamine had and was currently being distributed from this location.

Deputies seized approximately 40 grams of methamphetamine with a estimated street value of \$4,000, multiple types of prescription pills, a small amount of marijuana, a small quantity of heroin, and a Ford pickup truck.

typo, but that is how it was given to the candidates)

Berry - This is an important issue which has not been discussed so far in the campaign forums. Simply put, the better the credit rating, the lower interest rate that the County is charged on its indebtedness. I will seek to have the lowest tax rate possible to deliver the services the citizens need. The County's credit rating could be extremely important in saving or costing the taxpayers money. For example, the \$10 million dollar bond Gainesville is working on is estimated to add another 7 cents to the tax rate. If the city had a poor rating, they would have to pay higher interest rates which could drive the cost to 8 cents. Now you can scrimp and cut services all day long and not move the tax rate an extra cent and that's why this is so important to the taxpayers.

This is the important part that I hope the taxpayers will take notice. The bond rating companies look at several points to rate an entity. Two of the big items are (1) BUSINESS leadership shown by management and (2) long-range strategic planning abilities. These are the two characteristics which I bring to the table and my opponents do not. I have the business background and ability to form long-range economic plans for the County.

My guess is that right now the county has such a good rating because it keeps such a large amount of cash on hand and has relatively small debt to service. I think if elected to the position of County Judge, we can put the cash to good use and still keep our high rating.

Brinkley - Actually according to the last analysis of Cooke County by Standard & Poor's from February 2012, Cooke County has an AA credit rating. I believe the County should set a goal to obtain an AAA credit rating by 2016, which is the next time Standard & Poor's is expected to review the rating.

I believe a rating of AAA can be accomplished by being fiscally conservative and developing long term budgeting practices. I would work to implement a formal general fund balance policy and a rolling five year projected budget for long term planning. I believe the County should focus on having a broad and diverse tax base to keep taxes low and to help weather future economic storms. I would work to maintain established business relationships that I already have with several local businesses and work hard to foster new ones. I believe that having strong local businesses is the cornerstone to having a strong Cooke County.

Having a good credit rating means that the County will have better interest rates for any future debt obligations, which correlates to less taxpayer money going to pay interest payments. A good credit rating shows our businesses and prospective businesses that our county government is fiscally responsible and a good, stable community. A good credit rating shows our taxpayers that the county is doing a good job of managing their tax dollars.

Smith - By only spending WITHIN our means. I would be a fiscal conservative and what I mean by that is that in my own life, I know need and the difference between what I want and what I need. Cooke County residents, they need certain things but they don't want things they don't need. For example, I have an artificial leg. I need a certain level of function as an above-the-knee amputee to be able to walk. I need that, otherwise I can't function. But if I buy Oakley Sunglasses, all of a sudden I'm buying something that's nice but I don't need that. The taxpayers, they want to make sure that they are having their money spent on things that they need, so my job as county judge would be to do my best to keep the budget manageable.

The County has been moving toward upgrading its technology in preparation of the upcoming e-filing requirement. What other areas do you feel that the County needs to look to improve in the future?

Berry - There are two areas that I feel need improvement. First, the County needs to change the perception that it doesn't care about bringing business to

the County or the wishes of our existing businesses. I have worked for over 30 years in the business sector and understand what it takes to bring in a new business client and to deal with employee needs. Neither of my opponents have had to make a payroll. My opponent Jason Brinkley has even promoted the fact that he is a County employee as if that were a positive. As County Judge, I will work with all the City Managers in the County and with the Gainesville Economic Development Corporation as well as the local Chamber of Commerce to promote the county as taking the lead in bringing in new business and taking care of the folks already here.

Brinkley - Upgrading technology should be a major focus, not just because of e-filing, but because it can help make the County more efficient and provide quicker and better services to our residents for the same or possibly less burden on taxpayers. As I mentioned earlier, one area the County needs to improve on is long-term budget management. Additionally, the County needs to focus on improving its relations with the other entities, agencies, and businesses in our county. As Justice of the Peace, I have worked with all local entities, including the cities of Muenster, Lindsay, Valley View, and our volunteer fire departments. If elected County Judge, I plan to meet with these entities on a regular basis to look for areas where cooperation might lead to better services for our residents. I also plan to meet with our local agencies and businesses to make sure their needs and concerns are being addressed.

Smith - Right now, I think that there could be improvements made in finding common ground and getting along by focusing on the people of Cooke County, a little more. Not to say that they are not doing that, but I feel that Washington politics can sometimes play a role in the courtroom and create disagreement which can lead to a lack of focus on the people of Cooke County and their real world needs right here and right now. We have a tax rate in Cooke County that rose last year from 45.2 cents per \$100 value to 47.5 per \$100 value. That's a 2.3 cent tax rise. That means that someone who owns a \$100,000 home will now have to pay \$23 more than they had to pay last year. From \$452 to \$475 per year in just one year. As a fiscal conservative, my focus would be on the budget. That's the biggest issue that the county judge and the commissioners have to work on together. And I would do everything in my power to keep the budget manageable, and a 2.3 cent tax hike in one year just seems high to me. I would do my best to keep the budget manageable.

How do you see the County Judge's role in representing the citizens of Cooke Co. in Austin?

Berry - The County Judge is the only member of the Commissioner's Court elected by the entire county and as such should be the voice of the county in dealing with issues flowing into and out of Austin. This requires a working relationship with all representatives in the North Central Texas area but especially Representative Drew Springer and Senator Craig Estes. My firm has dealt with Mr. Estes many times over the years and I openly campaigned for Drew Springer and contributed to his campaign. I also have been involved in local politics for years, having worked

on Tom Haywood and Kay Hutchison campaigns and also serving as Chairman of the Cooke County Republican Party. I don't believe either of my opponents have the political experience needed to work with Austin. To my knowledge, Aaron Smith has never been involved in any campaign. Jason Brinkley campaigned AGAINST Drew Springer, so I would think their working relationship would be strained at best.

Brinkley - One of the primary roles of the County Judge is representing the county, not only inside the county, but to other entities throughout the state of Texas. If elected County Judge, I will be actively involved during the legislative session in Austin. I plan to be actively involved with Texas Association of Counties and Texoma Council of Government to make sure our interests as a rural North Texas county are being addressed. We are very fortunate to have a state representative from Cooke County in Drew Springer. Mr. Springer's district covers 22 counties, and the main point of contact that he has with each county is the County Judge. If elected, I plan to work closely with Mr. Springer to ensure Cooke County's voice is being heard in Austin.

Smith - Fortunately our State Representative Drew Springer lives right here in Cooke County. I like Drew very much. My values line up with his very well and I'd love to be on his team to advocate for the people of Cooke County in Austin. His wife is particularly inspiring to me. I didn't know if I'd ever walk again when I lost my leg above the knee and she was one of the people in Cooke County who I looked to for inspiration. I believe she's inspiring for all people because she takes the word "impossible" out of her dictionary and turns it into "I'm possible".... Cooke County needs to have a voice in Austin and I did live in Austin for a while in college. I actually got to know Rick Perry personally because we sometimes worked out together in the University of Texas Athletic weight room. At times, it was just me and him and his two security guards working out together. We had some very good conversations about what it takes to be a successful Republican in Austin and I took what he said to heart.

What best qualifies you for this position?

Berry - If you assume that the County Judge should (1)

be responsible for presiding over the Commissioner's Court, (2) guide the budgetary process, and (3) market the county both in the business community and in Austin, then I am not only the best qualified but in some instances the only candidate with qualities needed.

(1) As mentioned earlier, my firm has represented more than 20 taxing entities over the years. Large ones like the City of Irving all the way down to small ones like Tioga, and that equates to a lot of meetings attended. Neither of my opponents have represented or served on a board of a taxing jurisdiction.

(2) As a CPA and former auditor, I have a unique view of the budgetary process not shared by my opponents. Mr. Brinkley has worked for the County since he graduated from law school a few years ago and I'm not sure what Mr. Smith's job is but I am quite certain neither has a payroll to make. With that in mind, I don't see how either is equipped to deal with the process.

(3) I have been a businessman for over 30 years. I started with my accounting degree and CPA license and worked as a corporate auditor, a tax specialist for a Big 8 Accounting firm and am a partner in one of the largest firms in North Central Texas. I have dealt with the Type A personalities that most successful businessmen are and understand their world

and what it takes to get their business. Mr. Brinkley as Justice of the Peace has dealt with anything but the business sector and again I am not sure what Mr. Smith does.

Brinkley - I believe three things qualify me to be County Judge. First, having spent the past five years as the Justice of the Peace for Cooke County, I am the only candidate with county government experience. I have a comprehensive knowledge of how county government functions and what roles each elected official plays in our system. I have been responsible for setting and following a budget with the Justice of the Peace office, and each year I have come in under budget. As Justice of the Peace, I have worked closely with county officials, as well as officials from all levels of government. I have worked with DPS, the Sheriff's office, all local police agencies, and the volunteer fire departments. I am the only candidate with a proven track record of working with agencies at all levels of government. Second, I am a licensed attorney. Being an attorney, I am in a better position to understand the laws and rules handed down from the state legislature every other year. As an attorney, I understand how to handle complex issues regarding many parties and working to find a solution. Third, I am involved in our community. I currently

serve on the Board of Directors for Abigail's Arms and CASA, as well as serve on the United Way Allocations Committee. Through this involvement, I understand the needs of our community. This understanding is essential, because one of the main roles of the County Judge is to be a representative for the people both inside Cooke County and across the state.

Smith - Voters asked me to run and I want to serve the people of Cooke County. I'm the only candidate who did not spend \$750 on a filing fee. I easily, with a minimal amount of effort, accumulated over 300 signatures by petition. I only needed about 180 to run.

I'm president of the Downard-Fairplains Community, secretary of the Gainesville Knights of Columbus, a board member for the Red River Angus Association, and a mentor for the Challenged Athletes Foundation. We teach kids and adults without legs to run. I'm also a mentor for the Amputee Coalition of America and an ambassador for OSSUR America. That's the Iceland-based company that I work with to design and build artificial running legs. I have helped them create new running leg technology that didn't exist before I came along, and now that new technology that I helped create is helping amputees all over the world to run when they never could before.

With heavy hearts and an emotionally filled gymnasium Tuesday night, the Muenster Lady Hornets tried to put away the events from Sunday for a few moments as they took on Sam Rayburn in the Regional Quarterfinal at Pottsboro.

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Agriculture Market Summary



TAHC adopts cattle rules for Animal Disease Traceability, Trichomoniasis, and Fever Tick programs

The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) recently held a regularly scheduled Commission meeting on Jan. 14 at its Austin office.

The following cattle rules were adopted during the Commission meeting and went into effect on Feb. 4:

Chapter 50, Animal Disease Traceability, Cattle Identification: This amendment establishes identification requirements for adult cattle being sold within the state of Texas. The rule states that all adult breeding cattle, except cattle going directly to slaughter, shall be permanently identified within seven days of change of ownership. Untagged adult cattle have seven days after purchase to be delivered to a slaughter facility, resold through

a livestock market, or have acceptable permanent official identification applied. Slaughter type cattle that will be put on feed prior to slaughter shall also be permanently identified within seven days of purchase.

Chapter 38, Trichomoniasis, Test Exceptions: This rule allows untested adult bulls to be purchased without a current Trich test, if moved under TAHC permit with official permanent identification. TAHC inspectors will permit untested bulls from a market to either a feeding facility, another sale barn (if the intent is to resell it), or to another physical location given by the buyer. The permit will expire seven days from the date of issuance. The bull cannot be commingled with female cattle during the seven days. At

the end of the seven days the buyer must agree to have the bull tested, resold through a livestock market, or deliver it to a slaughter facility.

Chapter 41, Fever Ticks, New Authorized Treatments: These amendments add new treatment options for the cattle fever tick and expands the TAHC's authority to inspect and treat deer on premises adjacent to infected pastures.

Chapter 51, Entry Requirements, Trichomoniasis: The rule changes the Trich entry requirements to allow Texas bulls participating in out of state "bull station feeding trials" to return to their Texas farm of origin without a Trich test, if they were maintained in a controlled environment without any contact with female cattle

while out of state.

Other rules that were adopted were:

Chapter 47, Authorized Personnel: This new chapter sets the standards for personnel who perform work in any TAHC regulatory program. It will require a person (both veterinarians and non-veterinarians) to be authorized by the Commission in order to engage in an activity that is part of a state or federal disease control or eradication program for animals.

Chapter 57, Poultry, Indemnity: This rule authorizes the TAHC to depopulate diseased poultry if necessary, and to compensate the poultry owners when applicable.

For the week ending Feb. 8, Texas feeder cattle auctions reported prices \$4 lower to \$7 higher per hundredweight (cwt). Many locations had very light receipts due to cold temperatures and icy roads that limited cattle movement. Texas direct feeder cattle prices were \$2 to \$4 lower. Fed cattle cash prices declined \$3.60 per cwt in very light trade, with only 228 head confirmed by USDA at \$141.

Wholesale beef values were sharply lower, with Choice-grade offerings down \$22.72 (10%) for the week as retailers caught up on purchases and returned to more normal buying patterns. Those lower prices also pulled fed cattle and feeders lower. However, prices across the cattle sector remain at historically high levels as tight supplies continue to support the market. Weekly beef export sales totaling 8,100 metric tons (MT) were down 19% from a week ago and 21% below the prior four-week average. Hong Kong, Japan, and Taiwan were the leading

buyers. Shipments of 12,300 MT were up 1% from a week earlier and up 9% from the average.

Corn and grain sorghum prices were higher because of hot, dry conditions in South America and support from higher soybean prices. Corn export sales totaled 1.7 million MT, down 8% from the previous week, but nearly double the prior four-week average. Japan, Spain, and Vietnam were the leading buyers. Exports of 747,300 MT were down 26% from a week earlier and 3% lower than the average.

Wheat prices were higher due to a decline in crop conditions and concerns about possible winter-kill on the U.S. Plains and in the Black Sea region. Wheat export sales totaled 733,600 MT for the week, down 15% from the previous week, but up 62% from the average. Guatemala, Japan, and Brazil were the leading buyers. Shipments of 367,900 MT were 2% lower than a week earlier, and 18% below the prior four-week average.



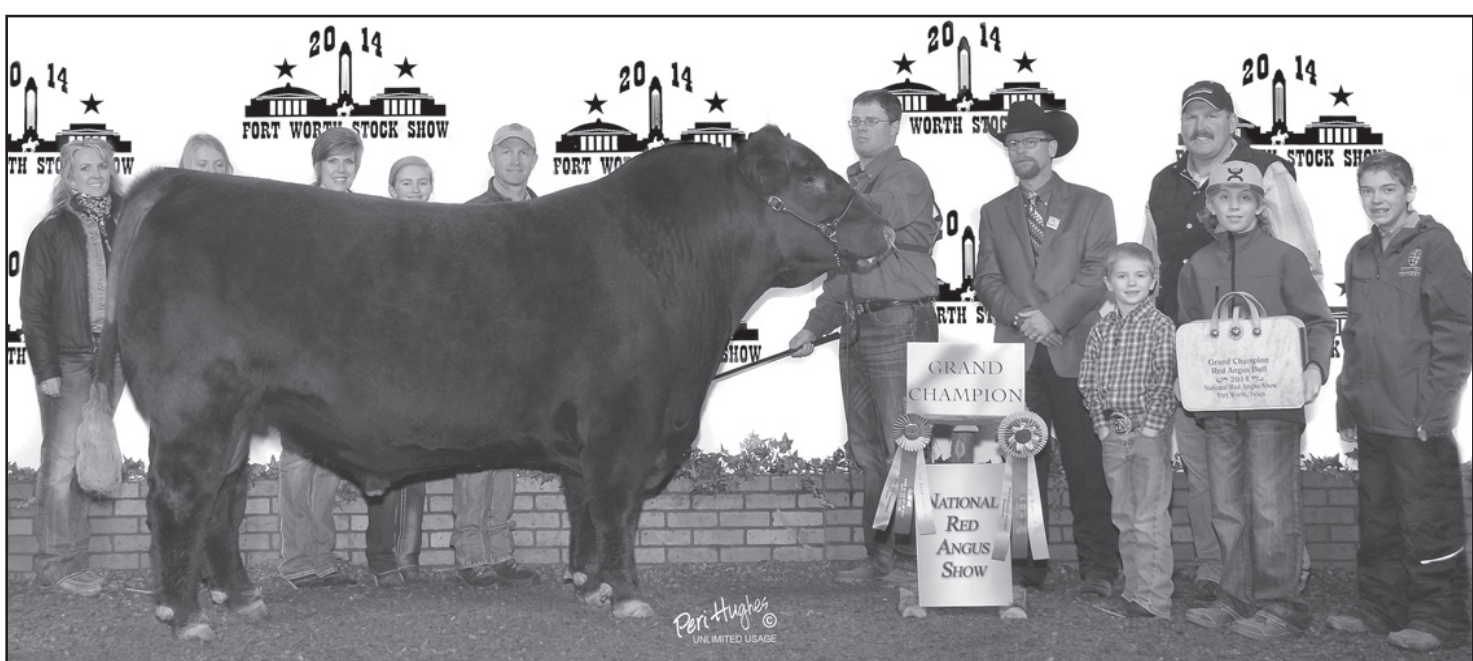

Chloe Tolar also exhibited a Reserve Division female in the National Junior Show on Feb. 1 and with the same female was named Division Champion in the National Red Angus Show.

Final rule on imports and BSE takes effect March 4

Federal rules of beef imported into the U.S. will change beginning March 4 under the new rule published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) regarding bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE), the fatal disease in cattle more commonly known as mad cow disease.

The new rule, which goes into effect March 4, revises the conditions for importation of bovine products. It uses a science-based classification system that is consistent with the World Trade Organization for Animal Health, bringing the U.S. guidelines for imports in line with international standards.

The rule sets the conditions under which certain commodities may be imported into the U.S. from regions that have been designated as having negligible, controlled, or undetermined risk for disease, according to *Agri-Pulse*.

USDA also will remove the BSE-related import restrictions on meat from deer, elk, llamas, and other cervid and camelid species.
