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

Sheriff Gilbert reports on 2013 for his Department

Cooke County Sheriff Terry Gilbert briefed the Court on activities and changes to the Sheriff's Office in 2013. He would like to make the report annually or even every six months. He said he feels it is important for the Sheriff to keep Commissioners Court informed on what is going on and how the money budgeted to the Sheriff's Department is being spent.

Sheriff Gilbert began by giving the highlights of changes that have been made in the Sheriff's Department to make things operate more smoothly and efficiently and to save money.

Personnel changes consisted of adding a narcotics investigator, criminal investigator, a crime scene/evidence technician, and a patrol deputy by reorganization of current assets. Since January 2013, the current level of certifications in the Sheriff's Office are six

Master Level peace officers, seven Advanced Level peace officers, four Intermediate Level peace officers, and all remaining deputies possess a Basic Peace Officer License. In the past year, from the certifications listed, three Intermediate certifications, two Advanced and two Master certifications were achieved by deputies. Total training hours for 34 full-time and reserve deputies is 2,275.

The current budget allowed hiring additional investigators which allowed reorganization of the Criminal Investigation Division. Four units were created: Drug Enforcement to interview potential sources to determine the origin of drug activity and suppliers in Cooke County; Crimes Against Persons investigates assaults, sexual assaults, family violence, children crimes, deceased persons; Property Crimes takes care of robbery, burglary, forgery, criminal mischief, thefts, ID thefts;

Crime Scenes/Evidence does all crime scene processing, photography, fingerprinting, DNA collection, evidence collection, tagging, bagging, and chain of custody, court cases, evidence room organization and maintenance.

Sheriff Gilbert stated, "The three additional investigators have allowed us to specialize and assign more cases to the appropriate unit for a more thorough and detailed investigation. Creating these units within the Division has assured all cases have received the proper follow-up to bring criminals to justice and accountability in Cooke County."

A list of drugs seizures included \$25,647 in currency, 339 grams methamphetamine, 39 grams cocaine, five pounds marijuana, one gram heroin, 44 tablets Xanax, 1 gram MDMA, 900 grams GHB, 90 tablets oxycodone, 13 vehicles, 15 weapons, and 61 arrests.

How County voted

More Cooke County voters voted in the Republican Primary (5,169 voters) than in the Democratic Primary (282) voters. Only 5,451 (23.31%) of Cooke County's 23,382 registered voters cast votes in the Primary election.

In the Republican Primary, Cooke County voters supported the following:

United States Senator - John Cornyn 58.78% with Steve Stockman getting the next highest at 20.68%;

U.S. Representative District 13 - Mac Thornberry 68.16% followed by Elaine Hays 17.88%;

Governor - Greg Abbott

90.68% with Lisa Fritsch at a distant second with 5.96%;

Lieutenant Governor - Dan Patrick 37.96% followed by David Dewhurst 29.90%. This will be decided with a run-off;

Attorney General - Ken Paxton 54.27% followed by Dan Branch 29.38%;

Comptroller of Public Accounts - Glenn Hegar 49.21% followed by Harvey Hilderbran 25.55%

Commissioner of the General Land Office - George P. Bush 74.98% and David Watts 25.02%;

Commissioner of Agriculture - Sid Miller 28.91% and Eric Opiela 26.38%;

Railroad Commissioner - Wayne Christian 47.24%

Arrests made for counterfeiting

At the Monday, March 3 meeting of Muenster City Council, Muenster Police Chief Mark Blankenship gave a monthly police report that included information on a counterfeit operation. Counterfeit bills discovered by a local store and reported to the Muenster Police Department were what spurred the investigation.

Chief Blankenship said, "Several weeks ago, we initiated an investigation in counterfeiting. After a week or so of investigating, it was determined that the counterfeiting operation was located out of Muenster in Cooke County. The Sheriff's Office investigator was contacted and all information released to him. As a result, the suspects were arrested by deputies and a search warrant obtained resulting in the recovery of evidence linking the suspects to the offense."

"Copier machines were confiscated, as well as paper products used in the manufacture of counterfeit money and several hundred dollars worth of counterfeit money was seized. The officers who investigated did a good job of all agencies included. The Secret Service has been informed early on in the investigation."

According to Chief Blankenship, the counterfeiting had been going on for some time. Some bills were able to pass the "pen test."

Cooke County Sheriff Terry Gilbert reported that on Jan. 23, the Cooke County Sheriff's Office Property Crime En-

listed by numbers or hours. Gilbert updated the Court on equipment purchased, improved working relationships with other agencies, new uniforms, and changes at the Jail.

By comparison, in 2012, a total of 496 arrests were made by the CCOS and in 2013, a total of 1,009 arrests were made.

Commissioners Court declared March 2014 as American Red Cross Month in Cooke County. County Judge John Roane read a proclamation that stated in part, "a special time to recognize and thank our heroes - those who volunteer, donate blood, take life-saving courses, or provide financial donations to support an organization whose mission is to help those in need,

"We would like to remember those who help all of us here in Cooke County by giving their time to help their neighbor, and thank our heroes - our volunteers, blood donors, class takers, and financial supporters who help us assist those in need.

"In Cooke County, the Red Cross works tirelessly through its two employees and 300 volunteers to help when disaster strikes, when someone needs life-saving blood, or the comfort of a helping hand. It provides 24-hour support to members of the military, veterans and their families, and provides training in CPR, aquatics safety, and first aid."

The proclamation also noted that across the country, the American Red Cross responds to nearly 70,000 disasters a year, provides some 400,000 services to military members, veterans and civilians, collects and distributes about 40% of the nation's blood supply, and trains more than seven million people in first aid, water safety, and other life-saving skills every year.

The week of March 16-22 was declared Poison Prevention Week in Cooke County. Over the past 52 years, the nation has been observing Poison Prevention Week to call attention to these hazards and how proper handling and disposal of these substances and proper use of safety packaging can help eliminate them.

The efforts of community organizations, complemented by the efforts of the

North Texas Poison Center, have reduced childhood poisonings in Cooke County. North Texas Poison Center, a regional poison center, located at Parkland Health and Hospital System, provides the ultimate in human service programming, immediate, accessible emergency information to save lives of victims of poison-related emergencies.

Commissioners Court directed the appropriate agencies in local government to continue their cooperation with concerned citizens and community organizations, including our schools, to develop programs which will alert our people to the continued danger of misusing medicines and household products and to promote effective safeguards against accidental poisonings among young children.

A.J. Knabe of Muenster spoke during public comments. He said he was having trouble procuring materials from the Cooke County Library and wanted to inform them of three complaints.

Knabe said that he is being denied access to the County Library. He also stated that the County library director is not implementing the policy as sanctioned by the Court. He added, "The policy itself is a hindrance to my garnering materials that I want and I need." An example he gave of not following the policy is that the policy says you must be 16 years old to check out movies from the Library, but the library director has a sign up stating that you have to be 21 years old to check movies out. "That to me seems a little obtuse," Knabe continued. "You can be a 20 year-old combat marine and you can fight for our country, but you can't check out a movie at our local public library."

Approving a cell phone allowance for Deeann Black, computer service tech for the

IT Department was tabled. Commissioner Al Smith expressed concern about paying cell phone allowances for part-time employees. Did that mean they were on the clock when they were on the phone? Smith asked, "What are we really buying with the cell phone allowance here?" No action was taken on the item until the HR director could be consulted.

In other business, Commissioners Court approved the following Consent Agenda items:

- Accepting Warranty Deed from the GEDC and the City of Gainesville to relocate CR 444 in Precinct #4.
- Trade-in of a 2006 Ford Ambulance Chassis vin# 1FDWF36P8EB72606 to Frazer Built in the amount of \$400 toward the purchase of a new chassis and remount of current ambulance box.
- Accepting an insurance settlement in the amount of \$3,039.37 on a Sheriff's Office 2011 Ford Expedition that was involved in an accident.
- Accepted donation from the Friends of the Cooke County Library for two chairs from Otts Furniture and Appliances valued at \$950, donation in the amount of \$40 for research from Lora McVay, and donation in the amount of \$5.40 for anonymous donors.
- Capital Credits Application Letter to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts for unclaimed capital credits for 2012, and for unclaimed capital credits for 2013.

enforcement Unit (PCEU) assisted by Cooke County Sheriff's Office patrol, Gainesville Police Department (PD), and Muenster PD conducted a follow-up investigation of reported attempts to pass counterfeit bills at Fischer's Meat Market in Muenster, and also at the Era Corner Store in Era. Investigators were able to identify Bryce Scott Bennett, white male 35 years-of-age, and Ashley Lynn Sicking, white female 30 years-of-age, as suspects in the illegal passing of counterfeit U.S. currency in the Cooke County area.

Both persons were arrested on outstanding warrants. Bennet for Failure to Comply with Sex Offender Registra-

tion. Sicking for three warrants for Motion to Revoke Community Service.

Sheriff Gilbert's search warrant for a residence in the 1100 block of CR 345 was obtained and executed resulted in the seizure of several hundred dollars worth of \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20, and \$50 bills. Also seized were printers, ink, computers, paper, paper cutters, irons, and a rifle.

Bennett and Sicking were charged with three counts each of State Forgery Charges. The United States Secret Service and the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco Firearms and Explosives have been notified and are expected to provide a joint investigation in the case.

Charles "Doodle" Wimmer 1915 - 2014

Mass of Christian Burial for Charles Edward "Doodle" Wimmer, age 98 of Muenster, was held at 10 a.m., Monday, March 10 at Sacred Heart Catholic Church of Muenster with Rev. Ken Robinson officiating. Burial followed in Sacred Heart Cemetery under the direction of Scott Funeral Home of Muenster. The Knights of Columbus formed an honor guard for the services. A Rosary/Vigil was held at 6 p.m., Sunday, March 9 at the funeral home.

Mr. Wimmer died Thursday, March 6, 2014 at his home in Muenster.

Born Dec. 15, 1915 in Durant, OK, Charlie was the fifth of the 11 children of C.J. and Annie Seith Wimmer. At the age of three, the family moved to Muenster. They settled six miles east of Muenster on a dairy farm. Charlie attended Sacred Heart School and helped with the farm work.

Charlie, in 1939, moved to West Texas where he worked on a farm and ranch. He then was drafted into the service where he served 4½ years in both the Pacific and European wars. Following the wars, he returned to Muenster where he was employed by Cooke County Co-op. He worked there until retirement in 1981.

Charlie "Doodle" married Isabelle Neu on Sept. 21, 1946. He was transferred to Nocona as a serviceman for the Co-op. They were there for 18 months, then moved back to Muenster where they continued raising their family of two boys and three girls.

Charlie's first wife, Isabelle, died on July 6, 1969.

Five years later, he married Helen Hess. She also predeceased him on July 3, 1979. He has since lived by himself in Muenster.

Survivors are daughters and sons-in-law Sharlene and Duwayne Schilling of Muenster, Shari and David Sampson of Tyler, Sandra Wimmer and companion Norma Bayer of Muenster; sons and daughters-in-law Randy and Linda Wimmer of Muenster and Ricky Wimmer of Muenster; 15 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren, one great-great-grandchild; sisters Lucille Zimmerer of Muenster, Billie Reinart of Muenster, and Gracie and Paul Luke of Farmers Branch; and sister-in-law Cecilia Wimmer of Muenster.

He was preceded in death by wives Isabelle and Helen; sister Hattie Berend; brothers Tony, Andy, Jody, Lawrence, Johnny, and Ernest; and one grandchild.

Weather Whys- coldest

Texas is no stranger to below zero temperatures, said Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "There have been numerous times in the last 100 years when parts of the state have been below zero," he explains. "But one day stands out among all others. On Feb. 8, 1933, the temperature was minus-23 degrees in Seminole to set the state's all-time low. It should be noted that the elevation of Seminole is over 3,200 feet, which is no doubt one reason the temperature that day was a record."

In Arkansas, the all-time low temperature is minus-29 degrees (set in 1905), while in Oklahoma the record low is minus-27 set in 1930. "In Louisiana, the all-time low is minus-16 degrees set in 1899, and in New Mexico, it gets a lot colder than most people think," McRoberts adds. "In 1950 in the town of Gavilan, the temperature reached minus-50 degrees. The elevation of Gavilan is 7,350 feet, which means the mountain air got mighty cold that day."

On March 8, we observe International Women's Day, a celebration of women's economic, political, and social achievements. Yet women everywhere still face challenges — and here in the United States, one of their biggest challenges may be to gain the resources they need to enjoy a comfortable retirement. Your first move should be to recognize some of the potential barriers to attaining your financial freedom. First of all, a "wage gap" between women and men still exists: The median earnings of full-time female workers are 77% of the median earnings of full-time male workers, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Also, women drop out of the workforce for an average of 12 years to care for young children or aging parents, according to the Older Women's League, a research and advocacy group — and this time away from the workforce results in women receiving lower pensions or accumulating much less money in their employer-sponsored retirement plans.

To give yourself the opportunity to enjoy a comfortable retirement lifestyle, consider these suggestions:

Boost your retirement plan contributions. Each

year, put in as much as you can afford to your traditional or Roth IRA. A traditional IRA grows on a tax-deferred basis, while a Roth IRA can grow tax free provided you meet certain conditions. Also, take advantage of your employer-sponsored, tax-deferred retirement plan, such as a 401(k), 403(b),* or 457(b). At the very least, contribute as much to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered. And every year, if your salary increases, try to boost your contributions to your retirement plan.

Consider growth investments. Some evidence suggests that women may be more conservative investors than men — in other words, women may tend to take fewer risks and pursue "safer" investments. But to help build the resources you will need for a comfortable retirement, consider growth-oriented vehicles in your IRA, 401(k), and other investment accounts.

Talk to your spouse about Social Security. If your spouse starts collecting Social Security at 62 (the earliest age of eligibility), the monthly benefits will be reduced, perhaps by as much as 25%. This reduction could affect you if you ever become a widow, because once you reach your own "full" retirement age (which will likely be 66 or 67), you may qualify

for survivor benefits of 100% of what your deceased spouse had been receiving — and if that amount was reduced, that's what you'll get. Talk to your spouse about this issue well before it's time to receive Social Security. (You may also want to talk to a financial advisor for help in coordinating survivor benefits with your own Social Security retirement benefits).

Evaluate your need for life insurance benefits. Once their children are grown, some couples drop their life insurance. Yet, the death benefit from a life insurance policy can go a long way toward helping ensure your financial security. Again, talk to your spouse about whether to maintain life insurance, and for how much.

International Women's Day is a great occasion for commemorating women's accomplishments. And by making the right moves, you can eventually celebrate your own achievement of attaining the financial security you deserve.

Pro-vitamin A introduced in sorghum

DuPont announced an important step toward introducing pro-vitamin A (beta carotene) into sorghum. This new technology would improve the level of pro-vitamin A to levels that result in delivery of 100% of the daily vitamin A requirement in children from sorghum—a feat never achieved before. Another achievement would

be the dramatically improved stability of pro-vitamin A during storage. These research breakthroughs should help improve nutrition for the nearly 300 million people in Africa who depend on sorghum, but who do not have access to another staple that provides the essential nutrients that sorghum lacks.

DuPont Pioneer President

Paul Schickler noted vitamin A-enhanced sorghum can be harvested and saved for up to three months without losing its vitamin A, offering better nutrition to children in sub-Saharan Africa.

This innovation will enhance the absorption potential of protein and improved protein quality of sorghum after cooking. Cooking reduces sorghum protein digestibility, which decreases the bioavailability of the building blocks of protein, especially for young children who have the greatest demand for protein precursors during early stages of growth.

Cash cattle markets are supported by higher-trending boxed beef values that suggest consumers have not been driven away by higher retail beef prices.

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Net farm income forecast to fall in 2014

Although the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) latest projections indicate an overall decline in net farm income of about 26.6% in 2014, livestock receipts are expected to be up marginally.

Net farm income is forecast to be \$95.8 billion, the lowest since 2010, and net cash income is projected to be \$101.9 billion, down 22% from 2013.

According to *Drovers CattleNetwork*, a 0.7% increase is expected for livestock receipts. Due to lower production levels, steady receipts are expected for cattle and calves.

For the second time in the last 10 years, USDA also expects a decline of \$3.9 billion in production expenses. Feed expenses are forecast to decline by 11.3% - \$6.6 billion.

Record ag exports expected for 2014

After the February Agricultural Trade Outlook report was published, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) boosted its projections for U.S. agricultural exports for fiscal year 2014 to a record \$142.6 billion.

Demand for U.S. agricultural products is expected to rise with the growing global demand. Although beef and dairy are forecast to increase, exports of livestock, poultry, and dairy products are projected to be down \$200 mil-

lion to \$31.6 billion.

The report projects corn exports to increase by \$1.2 billion with strong import demand from Mexico and wheat exports to increase \$600 million.

Another competitor arrives as beef prices rise

As the price of beef continues to rise, bison—which is even more expensive—looks less exorbitant.

The lean meat fits into a growing diet trend, Paleo, which emphasizes pasture-raised meat. According to CNBC, customers who purchase bison are looking for a healthy product that has a unique flavor, but the supply is not large enough to create a market to affordably put bison on menus nationwide.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) considers bison a "nonamenable species," meaning it does not require the meat be inspected before sale. However, the agency is preparing to conduct its first survey of the nation's commercial bison herd, determining its size, health, and production issues.

Mumford took a 46-38 advantage to the fourth quarter, and grew their lead to 57-46 with just over a minute remaining.



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


“A credit to Muenster for packing it in and forcing us to hit some outside shots, and we just weren’t able to.”
