Why the sirens?

Last Wednesday afternoon, the Muenster Fire Department sounded its emergency sirens. Most people think of a tornado warning when they hear this sound.

On Wednesday, skies were clear, so what could the sirens mean?

Muenster Volunteer Fire Department Incident Commander Herbie Knabe reported that it was to alert the firemen that they were needed at the fire station. There was a grass fire just west of Pond King and there was a problem notifying the area fire departments that they were needed.

Cooke County Fire Marshal/Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher contacted Knabe for assistance because he was unable to get in touch with fire departments. Pagers were not working and phone calls were not being answered.

"The next best thing is a siren and it worked," said Knabe. The firemen came to the fire station to see what was going

Knabe shared a notice from Fletcher. The notice said in part, "We are upgrading our infrastructure and it will require some flexibility and understanding on everyone's part."

Since the County will be working on the communication system until about mid July, Knabe said that they may have to use the sirens again to call the firemen into the station. "In a situation like that if our pagers are down, we're gonna blow it," he said.

Of the new upgrade, Knabe noted, "One of the things this new upgrade is going to do is when this all gets in and everything is set up right, the dispatcher will sit there and when the call comes in, whatever that address is will pop up what departments need to be called in right then." For instance at this time, three departments are called out on structure fires. The dispatcher had to call each department individually and give the information. With the new system, all will be toned at one time and the dispatcher will only have to give the information once. The response will be much quicker and be easier for the dispatcher.

Knabe explained that the siren is an emergency alert. "It's not for any one particular thing," he stressed. "If there is a tornado, the next best thing is to go to Channel 2 because if we're blowing the siren, we'll be on Channel 2."

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees met Wednesday, June 11 with an executive session on the agenda to discuss high school principal candidates

Current JH/HS Principal Jason Atcheson accepted a position with the Lubbock Cooper High School (5A school) to be one of three assistant principals. "I am from Lubbock so I could not turn down an opportunity to go home," said principal Atcheson. His last day at Muenster ISD will be Thursday, June 26.

Atcheson came to Muenster in 2008, serving as the head girls basketball coach/girls coordinator. He also taught World Geography, Government, and Economics. He became the assistant principal in June 2013 and then took over the duties of principal in January 2014.

Another passenger, who was six years old, was pronounced deceased at 5:59 p.m. at Cooks Children's Medical Center.

The incident is still under investigation.

On May 23, the 10th Annual Elementary Talent Show was held.

Principal Heers said that last year they met out in the road to see how long their kindness chain was. Each link of the chain represents an act of kindness. They estimated that last year's chain was about 50 yards or half of a football field. This year, the goal was to do the whole length of a football field. She noted, "It was a football field and a half (150 yards)."

Cheryl Presnall, 4th grade teacher, was voted by her peers as 2014 Elementary Teacher of the Year during the Teacher Appreciation Breakfast on June 4.

Principal Atcheson presented the STAAR scores for 7th and 8th grades and EOC for high school. The 7th grade scored 90% in Reading, 80% in Math, and 87% in Writing. "The 8th grade did very well with 100% on Math, Reading, and Writing," he explained. "Social Studies was at 74%, but that is up almost 30% from last year. Science was 91%.

"For our high school, Biology and Algebra I, which is our freshman kids, is 100%. Carolyn Lutkenhaus and Molly Sicking need to be commended because that's fantastic. We had one miss in U.S. History (96%) and then our English I (88%) and English II (83%) are still well above the state average. They are a little bit lower than we're used to. Probably the reason being that these are combined tests now this year. It is not English I Writing and English I Reading, it is English I Reading and Writing together, English II Reading and Writing together."

MISD hires teacher, talks 2014-15 budget

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees met for a called meeting on Wednesday, May 28. All members were present.

They approved a 10-month, one year probationary contract for Katie Thomas as a certified teacher for the 2014-15 vear.

Also, the Board clarified to change contracts from nine months to a 10-month, one year term contract for Martha Koesler and Joni Sturm as certified teachers at Muenster ISD for the 2014-15 school year.

Superintendent Clay Richerson summarized the 2014-15 budget. Topics addressed included instruction cut of \$300,000, leadership cut of approximately \$20,000, an increase in the cost of health insurance, and changes made to the food service.

According to Superintendent Richerson, Muenster ISD should have a balanced budget for the 2014-15 school year.

The Board entered executive session for about an hour to discuss personnel and superintendent duties. No action was taken.

Natural fertilizers loaded with nutrients and minerals

asts know a handful of items are essential to maintain a healthy landscape. Water, sunshine, and the proper nutrients all work in concert to promote a healthy lawn. Although nutritional material is inherent in the soil, many gardeners feel soil must be amended with some sort of fertilizer to give plants a healthy boost.

All-natural fertilizers are growing in popularity, and home gardeners have a variety of such products at their disposal. Ambitious homeowners can even create their own all-natural fertilizers from items around the house.

Bone meal

In order to store energy and reach maturity, plants need phosphate. This mineral is released over a long period of time from finely ground rock. However, a faster way to supply it to the landscape is through bone meal. Bone meal is a mixture of finely and coarsely ground animal bones that are a waste product from meat-processing plants. Adding bone meal to soil is one of the most effective ways to increase phosphorous levels.

The signed proclamation lists specific counties in state of disaster, including more than 170 of the 254 Texas counties.

Much of Texas has received little rain due to multi-year drought conditions. Reservoirs and aquifer levels are diminishing, affecting water supplies and delivery systems and posing an impending threat to public health, property, and the economy. Continued drought conditions also increases the risk of wildfire across much of the state.

Necessary resources will be made available to aid response efforts due to the ongoing strain on water resources.


