



Why the sirens? *Digging down before building up*

Last Wednesday afternoon, the Muenster Fire Department sounded its emergency sirens. Most people think of a tornado warning when they hear this sound.

On Wednesday, skies were clear, so what could the sirens mean?

Muenster Volunteer Fire Department Incident Commander Herbie Knabe reported that it was to alert the firemen that they were needed at the fire station. There was a grass fire just west of Pond King and there was a problem notifying the area fire departments that they were needed.

Cooke County Fire Marshal/Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher contacted Knabe for assistance because he was unable to get in touch with fire departments. Pagers were not working and phone calls were not being answered.

"The next best thing is a siren and it worked," said Knabe. The firemen came to the fire station to see what was going on.

Knabe shared a notice from Fletcher. The notice said in part, "We are upgrading our infrastructure and it will require some flexibility and understanding on everyone's part."

Since the County will be working on the communication system until about mid July, Knabe said that they may have to use the sirens again to call the firemen into the station. "In a situation like that if our pagers are down, we're gonna blow it," he said.

Of the new upgrade, Knabe noted, "One of the things this new upgrade is going to do is when this all gets in and everything is set up right, the dispatcher will sit there and when the call comes in, whatever that address is will pop up what departments need to be called in right then." For instance at this time, three departments are called out on structure fires. The dispatcher had to call each department individually and give the information. With the new system, all will be toned at one time and the dispatcher will only have to give the information once. The response will be much quicker and be easier for the dispatcher.

Knabe explained that the siren is an emergency alert. "It's not for any one particular thing," he stressed. "If there is a tornado, the next best thing is to go to Channel 2 because if we're blowing the siren, we'll be on Channel 2."

College narrows presidential search

The Presidential Search Committee at North Central Texas College (NCTC) met June 12 and announced the two candidates that will be presented to the Board of Regents for interviews.

Current NCTC President Dr. Eddie Hadlock announced his retirement on March 24 effective at the end of August. He has been at the College for 40 years, including the past 10 as president.

The committee initially narrowed the field of 30 candidates to four on May 28. All four were interviewed by the committee, who made their recommendation to narrow it to two. The two candidates are Dr. Brent Wallace and Dr. Steve Rook.

Each candidate will participate in an open forum for all faculty, staff, and community members on both the Gainesville and Corinth campuses. Dr. Wallace's open forum will be on June 24 from 9 to 11 a.m. at the First State Bank Center for the Performing Arts on the Gainesville campus, and from 1 to 3 p.m. in Room 314 on the Corinth campus. Dr. Rook's open forum will be on June 25 at the same times and locations.

All four forums will also be streamed live online. Links to the broadcasts will be available on the front page of the NCTC

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Principal sought by Muenster ISD

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees met Wednesday, June 11 with an executive session on the agenda to discuss high school principal candidates.

Current JH/HS Principal Jason Atcheson accepted a position with the Lubbock Cooper High School (5A school) to be one of three assistant principals. "I am from Lubbock so I could not turn down an opportunity to go home," said principal Atcheson. His last day at Muenster ISD will be Thursday, June 26.

Atcheson came to Muenster in 2008, serving as the head girls basketball coach/girls coordinator. He also taught World Geography, Government, and Economics. He became the assistant principal in June 2013 and then took over the duties of principal in January 2014.

Principal Atcheson remarked, "I love and will always love

Muenster. It will always hold a special place in my heart. It is the best place I have ever worked. It has been an honor to be called the coach of the Lady Hornets, the assistant principal, and finally the principal. I want to thank the school board, all administrators, teachers, and parents for their support over the years. Most importantly, I want thank the students at MISD. They are the reason we all get up and come to work everyday. Muenster kids are the best in the state and I am really going to miss seeing them everyday."

No action was taken at this meeting in regard to the principal candidates.

Elementary Principal Lou Heers updated the Board on recent activities and upcoming events. She told of the success of Coins for Claude. This fundraiser was a dream of Bailey Klement, a freshman, to do a simple act of kindness for her uncle Claude Klement who is undergoing treatment for cancer. Bailey wanted to make it an elementary school project with the goal of raising \$1,000 by collecting and donating spare change from around the house. "We brought in \$5,347.62," reported principal Heers. "We were able to present him with this check at our End-Of-Year Awards Ceremony on May 20. He was able to speak with them. That was really cool."

The Morris Brothers held two anti-bullying performances on May 19 to students Pre-K through 8th.

On May 23, the 10th Annual Elementary Talent Show was held.

Principal Heers said that last year they met out in the road to see how long their kindness chain was. Each link of the chain represents an act of kindness. They estimated that last year's chain was about 50 yards or half of a football field. This year, the goal was to do the whole length of a football field. She noted, "It was a football field and a half (150 yards)."

Cheryl Presnall, 4th grade teacher, was voted by her peers as 2014 Elementary Teacher of the Year during the Teacher Appreciation Breakfast on June 4.

Principal Atcheson presented the STAAR scores for 7th and 8th grades and EOC for high school. The 7th grade scored 90% in Reading, 80% in Math, and 87% in Writing. "The 8th grade did very well with 100% on Math, Reading, and Writing," he explained. "Social Studies was at 74%, but that is up almost 30% from last year. Science was 91%."

"For our high school, Biology and Algebra I, which is our freshman kids, is 100%. Carolyn Lutkenhaus and Molly Sicking need to be commended because that's fantastic. We had one miss in U.S. History (96%) and then our English I (88%) and English II (83%) are still well above the state average. They are a little bit lower than we're used to. Probably the reason being that these are combined tests now this year. It is not English I Writing and English I Reading, it is English I Reading and Writing together, English II Reading and Writing together."

Technology Director Jeff Presnall reported that the elementary intercom issue had been resolved by Four Feath-

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Crash fatal to 3

On Sunday, June 15 at approximately 3 p.m., DPS troopers were dispatched to a major crash on FM 51 in Cooke County just south of Era. Thomas Black, 51 year-old resident of Springtown was driving a 2010 Hyundai SUV north on FM 51. James Burkhart, 45 year-old resident of Weatherford, was driving a 2010 Nissan Altima south on FM 51 with three passengers. Black fell asleep and drifted into the oncoming lane. The vehicles collided head on in the southbound lane causing major damage.

Black was taken to North Texas Medical Center for treatment and later released.

Burkhart was taken to Harris Methodist Hospital in Fort Worth and is listed in critical condition. Atojan Burkhart, age 43, and a three-year-old passenger were pronounced deceased at the scene by Judge Dorothy Lewis. Another passenger, who was six years old, was pronounced deceased at 5:59 p.m. at Cooks Children's Medical Center.

The incident is still under investigation.

MISD hires teacher, talks 2014-15 budget

Muenster ISD's Board of Trustees met for a called meeting on Wednesday, May 28. All members were present.

They approved a 10-month, one year probationary contract for Katie Thomas as a certified teacher for the 2014-15 year.

Also, the Board clarified to change contracts from nine months to a 10-month, one year term contract for Martha Koesler and Joni Sturm as certified teachers at Muenster ISD for the 2014-15 school year.

Superintendent Clay Richerson summarized the 2014-15 budget. Topics addressed included instruction cut of \$300,000, leadership cut of approximately \$20,000, an increase in the cost of health insurance, and changes made to the food service.

According to Superintendent Richerson, Muenster ISD should have a balanced budget for the 2014-15 school year.

The Board entered executive session for about an hour to discuss personnel and superintendent duties. No action was taken.

ers. That company is also providing training on use of the elementary security camera system.

Six weeks and semester grades assistance was provided to teachers and office personnel. Plans are underway for more digital input of student data on both the school's end and the parents' end. Online registration forms will be available for parents to update basic data like address, email address, phone numbers, etc.

Acheson informed the Board that Martha Koesler had officially retired. Trustee Kim Hess expressed concern. She inquired about the plans for AP English with Koesler retiring. He said that he was unsure what Richerson's plans were for that position. "I don't know if we are going to do the AP or if we're going to do NCTC," answered Acheson.

Hess commented, "I've had people call me concerned that we might lose

our AP program. We say in our mission statement that we have the highest academic standards. AP classes really are the highest academic standards. I would like to think that we've exhausted all efforts before we would abandon the program. That's really been the root of a lot of our successes of our kids in college. I have great concerns about rethinking the curriculum and stepping away from something that has been proven to yield success for our students in the future."

Trustee Neal Flusche asked Principal Heers about the security system in the elementary school. "That's one thing I know we have to bid on for the other two buildings," he noted. She reported that it was working well and had no complaints.

No action was taken on security cameras.

A short recess took place while the Board members went outside to examine curbing west of the Administration building that is in need of repair or replace-

ment.

Since curbing belongs to the City after it is put in, Trustee Neal Flusche approached City Administrator Stan Endres to see if there might be some financial help with repairs to curbing at the school. Endres and Leo Lutkenhaus, City work director, looked at the curbing and said it definitely needed to be replaced. The City fiscal year begins on Oct. 1 and the budget for street repairs has been expended.

Flusche was told that if somebody from Muenster ISD came to a City Council meeting and asked, it is a possibility that the Council might approve the replacement of the curbing and amend the budget to pay for it. There is no guarantee that the Council would approve the request.

President Trubebach made a motion that Flusche be appointed to attend the next City Council meeting to make the request that the City replace the roughly 200 feet of curb. The motion passed 6-0-1 with Flusche

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abstaining. Two bids received on curbing were discussed, but no further action taken.

In the absence of Superintendent Clay Richerson, the Board did not discuss two agenda items - Legislative updates and a change in food service. Superintendent Richerson had placed those two items on the agenda, but he was out of town and his return flight was delayed.

The Board heard that delinquent taxes collected in May totaled \$2,118.12

for his entire family.

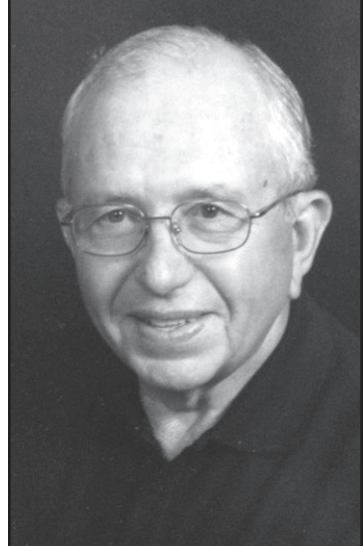
James died June 13, 2014 in Denton.

Natural fertilizers loaded with nutrients and minerals

Lawn and garden enthusiasts know a handful of items are essential to maintain a healthy landscape. Water, sunshine, and the proper nutrients all work in concert to promote a healthy lawn. Although nutritional material is inherent in the soil, many gardeners feel soil must be amended with some sort of fertilizer to give plants a healthy boost.

All-natural fertilizers are growing in popularity, and home gardeners have a variety of such products at their disposal. Ambitious homeowners can even create their own all-natural fertilizers from items around the house.

Bone meal

In order to store energy and reach maturity, plants need phosphate. This mineral is released over a long period of time from finely ground rock. However, a faster way to supply it to the landscape is through bone meal. Bone meal is a mixture of finely and coarsely ground animal bones that are a waste product from meat-processing plants. Adding bone meal to soil is one of the most effective ways to increase phosphorous levels.

Manure

The waste from herbivores (animals that feed on grass),

including rabbits, horses, and cows, can make super fertilizers. Some gardeners shy away from manure because they believe it to be an odoriferous, dirty product. The best produced manures are allowed to compost for at least nine months and are mixed with hay or straw. They should not produce an offensive odor and will provide plants with a host of nutrients. Never use manures from meat-eating animals, like dogs, cats, or humans. Feces can harbor a lot of bacteria, which can be transferred to the garden soil.

Fish and seaweed

Improving soil nutrients may be as simple as looking to the ocean or other bodies of water. Fish emulsion, a mixture of ground fish and water, is a good nitrogen source. Nitrogen gives plants the energy to grow. Seaweed, which is actually a type of algae, contains the primary nutrients that plants need in order to thrive, including phosphorous, nitrogen, and potassium. It also serves as a food for natural bacteria that break down nutrients into the soil, making them easier for plants to absorb.

Worms

Earthworms are vital to soil health. They burrow and wiggle around in the dirt,

helping to aerate the soil. But the castings, or waste, of the worms also provide valuable nutrients to the soil. The castings contain beneficial microorganisms from the worms' digestive system that help break down organic matter into a form that plant roots can use. Many gardeners participate in vermicomposting, or farming worms, in order to use their castings as fertilizer.

Compost

Compost can also be used as fertilizer. Gardeners can make their own compost from discarded materials. Compost is one of the most widely used soil amendments in vegetable gardens. Yard refuse, fruit and vegetable peelings, eggshells, coffee grounds, and other items can be added to a compost pile. Natural bacteria will slowly break down these materials into a product dubbed "black gold." Compost can be mixed into soil before planting and used as a dressing after plants have been established.

Gardeners can experiment with different ratios of fertilizer to create a mix that enhances the soil. Test the soil to determine which, if any, nutrients the soil is lacking so the fertilizer can be adjusted accordingly.

FSA asks that you do not provide any personal or financial information to the caller, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Perry renews Emergency Disaster Proclamation

Gov. Rick Perry recently renewed the July 5, 2011 Emergency Disaster Proclamation, certifying exceptional drought conditions in specified counties in Texas.

The signed proclamation lists specific counties in state of disaster, including more than 170 of the 254 Texas counties.

Much of Texas has received little rain due to multi-year drought conditions. Reservoirs and aquifer levels are diminishing, affecting water supplies and delivery systems and posing an impending threat to public health, property, and the economy. Continued drought conditions also increases the risk of wildfire across much of the state.

Necessary resources will be made available to aid response efforts due to the ongoing strain on water resources.

AFBF supports extension of clean water rule comment period

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has extended the comment period on the new clean water rules. The latest rule broadly expands federal jurisdiction and threatens local land-use and zoning authority.

"The American Farm Bureau Federation is pleased the EPA has extended the time available to comment on new and highly burdensome clean water rules. This

is a victory for farming families and a clear signal that America's farmers know how to stand up and be counted," American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) President Bob Stallman said in a statement.

"EPA has misled the regulated community about the rule's impacts on land use. If more people knew how regulators want to require permits for common activities

on dry land, or penalize landowners for not getting them, they would be outraged," said Stallman.

Farmers have until Oct. 20 to comment on the Waters of the United States rule, and until July 7 to comment on the accompanying interpretive rule. Stallman encourages farmers to use this time to its best advantage and "we will ditch this rule."
