## CDA celebrates 100 years as service organization

For 10 decades, women from Sacred Heart Parish have served their community, state, and nation as members of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas (CDA) then known as Court Saint Mary, Number 249.

One hundred years ago on Dec. 6, 1914, CDA was organized. Twenty-nine members were enrolled with the national organization known as Daughters of Isabella. When the national group learned that another group by that name existed, they decided to change the organization's name to Catholic Daughters of the Americas. This name change took place in April 1921.

Sacred Heart Parish's CDA group now stands 129 women strong. It has remained an active group throughout its 100 years, a vital part of the local community.

In celebration of its 100th anniversary on Saturday, Dec. 6, CDA members attended the 5 p.m. Mass at Sacred Heart Catholic Church. A dinner followed in the Community Center.

Sacred Heart Pastor Rev. Ken Robinson offered the

invocation to open the celebration event. Regent Anna Braziel welcomed guests and members. Stella Hess presented a brief history of the organization.

Special pins were presented to lifetime members and 50 years members. Dorothy Fisher (75 years), Imelda Rohmer (66 years), John Ann Bezner (65), Alice Hennigan (60), Ginny Schneider (54), Betty Henscheid (54),

Mary Ann Fleitman (52), and Carolyn Bayer (51) received recognition as lifetime members.

Recognized as 50 years members were Alma Wolf, Gloria Becker, Betty Felderhoff, Jewel Otto, Eileen Fisher, Ruth Knabe, Betty Rose Walterscheid, Mary Ann Walterscheid, and Marcy Wilde.

Sr. Mary Clare Bezner served as guest speaker.

Special guests and dignitaries for the evening included Bishop Michael Olson of the Fort Worth Diocese, Rev. Ken Robinson, CDANational Director Carolyn Bachman, CDA State Regent Peggy Rosales, CDA Texas State Secretary Melodie Brunt, and Sr. Mary Clare Bezner.

Current CDA officers are Regent Anna Braziel, Vice-Regent Bobbie Hale, Treasurer Iva Walterscheid, Financial Secretary Dana

Fuhrmann, and Recording Secretary Leslie Schilling.

CDA and the Muenster Knights of Columbus work together on many projects and have done so since the beginning. The KCs were started just two years before the CDA organized. Their first joint effort was a play in 1915. They raised \$26.05.

Today, the Catholic Daughters are most known for the delicious meals they serve to

families after funeral services. This year alone, the CDA served 28 bereaved families for a total of 2,855 meals.

It is thanks to the CDA that Muenster has its local library. In September 1959, they organized a library for Muenster beginning with volunteers and a dozen books.

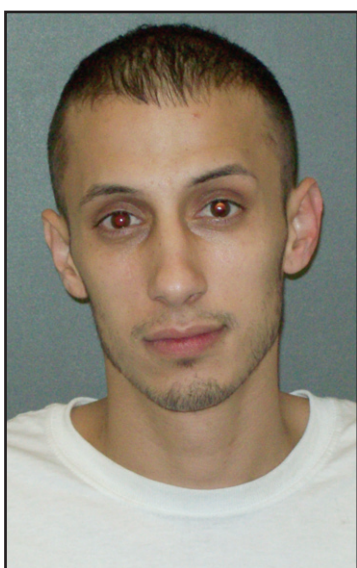

## Sheriff's deputies nab two burglary suspects

On Monday, Dec. 8, multiple units from the Cooke County Sheriff's Department were involved in a vehicle pursuit that ended in Grayson County near Tioga. The occupants of the vehicle were suspects in several home burglaries and attempted burglaries that occurred that morning in the southeast portion of Cooke County.

Cooke County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) received an on-line tip that the vehicle was possibly in the area of CR 232. Several units were converging on the area when the vehicle, a green Nissan Altima, was spotted traveling eastbound on CR 232. The vehicle refused to stop

for the Deputy and a pursuit followed.

At the intersection of CR 232 and CR 223, the vehicle spun off the roadway and in attempt to continue to flee, rammed the CCSO unit. The pursuit continued into Grayson County on FM 922 where the vehicle turned on Carl Road. At the dead end of Carl Road, suspects drove into a backyard of a residence where it collided with another CCSO unit that was attempting to block his exit from the yard.

Suspects were taken into custody at this time and identified as James Clyde Walton IV, approximately 25 years of age, and Tyler Joseph Rasica, approximately 20 years old.

Both were transported to the Cooke County Jail charged with multiple offenses including Aggravated Assault on a Peace Officer, Evading Arrest/Detention, Unlawful Possession of Firearm, Burglary of a Habitation, and Possession of Marijuana under two ounces. Walton was additionally wanted out of the Grayson County Sheriff's Office on a felony warrant for Theft.

The suspects are awaiting arraignment.

## Oak Ridge VFD disbands

As of Dec. 1, Cooke County will have one less volunteer fire department. When Cooke County Commissioners Court met on Monday, Dec. 8, County Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher informed them of Oak Ridge VFD's decision.

Fletcher explained that for the last couple of years the Oak Ridge VFD has had a distinct lack of community support financially and felt that they couldn't afford to keep manning and running the fire department providing that service.

"They did put in a good effort," noted Fletcher. "They had several fundraisers that were poorly attended and they just couldn't make it work. So, after 15 or 16 years, they ceased operation as of the first of December."

Fire Departments that adjoin the area covered by Oak Ridge are Indian Creek, Callisburg, and Gainesville. They met with Fletcher and worked out a plan to serve the areas that had been in Oak Ridge's jurisdiction. He showed a map that all three departments had agreed on, dividing the areas among those three departments.

Fletcher then urged County residents to do what they can to support their local fire departments. He said that

most are supported very well. The County does provide fire departments a base amount, \$9,500 this year, as well as pagers, dispatch, etc. "From the surveys that I've done with counties either just a little bigger or smaller than us, we are probably doing as well or better than anybody else," said Fletcher.

"But, those communities have the impact to decide how much better, how much bigger, how much more responsive they want their fire departments. This community-based volunteering is like many in the County that get out there and help them. Volunteer even if you can't be a firefighter, they still need bookkeepers. They still need people to work on their building, work on their vehicles, provide fuel, mechanical. There are all kinds of different things that you can do to help them. They do not just magically show up. There's a lot that goes into it. I encourage everybody out in the county to get in touch with their fire departments and help them if they can."

County Judge-elect Jason Brinkley asked the Court to consider creating a Cooke County tax abatement policy. There is not one in place at this time. "In order to do an abatement, you have to have general and broad procedures and guidelines" explained Brinkley. "This is

all in the Texas Tax Code, Chapter 312. This has to be renewed every two years, and based on my research, we don't have a current one. There's one done some years past, but that one has by statute lapsed."

Precinct #4 Commissioner Leon Klement noted that in the six years he's served, the County has not done an abatement other than doing one along with the City of Gainesville.

Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith said he felt it would be in the County's best interest to consult with an outside firm such as Allison, Bass. This firm already represents the County.

Commissioner Smith and Judge Brinkley agreed to contact Allison, Bass about the matter.

Nathan Vajdos of OWN Energy spoke again to the Court regarding the proposed Muenster Wind Farm Project. He wanted to update them on some stats.

He said that they have the project cited for 60 turbines, but are not sure of what size turbines they would be. Should they do the project, he feels it could be completed by the end of 2016.

Vajdos had requested earlier that the County consider giving the project a tax abatement. He had also approached the Muenster Hos-

## December Fire Chief's Report to City Council

Calls to Muenster VFD thus far this year as of Dec. 1: 56 calls, which is really light. Average is between 100-120. Medical assists helping EMS - 3. Total 62 hours spent responding to calls. Nine public serve calls, but many reports were not filled out for this type of call. Public service hour total - 130 hours; Car accidents responded to - 19, six of which required extrication. There were two deaths. Time logged on car accidents - 286 hours. Fire calls for structure, grass, control burn, etc. - 297 hours. Total drill hours - 672. Total hours - 1,452. That did not include the extra time put in by Chief Walterscheid or Herbie Knabe, or the hours spent getting trucks repaired.

There are 34 members of MVFD. Brent Hess retired as of Dec. 1. He served 27 years on the Fire Department.

There are issues with the tank truck. It has been worked on in Fort Worth twice. Both issues were under warranty and are now fixed.

Nine of the air packs being used by the MVFD are 27 years old and parts are no longer available. The air packs are \$6,000 each. They hope to receive grants to purchase 12 new air packs.

Theft and vandalism of county road signs is a problem for the MVFD and other first responders. Efforts are ongoing to discover who is guilty of the recent thefts. A \$1,500 reward has been offered. The MVFD has a good idea of who is involved and some of the kids are talking.

The Department is currently working on FRO (First Responder Orders). There are five members with EMT basics. It is the goal to have the FROs by March 1 and the Department can start responding to medical calls. Medic 4 (the ambulance located in western Cooke County near Muenster) is gone a lot and the ambulance from Gainesville must respond, which takes longer.

The Department went through CPR recertification on Dec. 4. In March, several of the firefighters will take a 40 hour class to get EMRs (Emergency Medical Responders). That is a notch under EMT.

Sheriff Gilbert shared these safety and crime prevention tips:

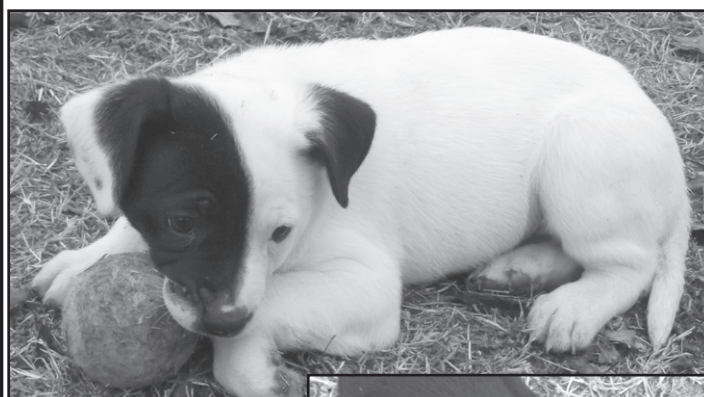
This time of year it is common for people to go shopping for all kinds of nice things for family and friends

# Railroad Commission adopts pipeline permit rule amendments

Texas Railroad Commissioners have unanimously adopted pipeline permit rule amendments designed to clarify how a pipeline operator may be classified by the Commission as a common carrier. Common carrier pipelines in Texas are pipelines which are contracted to carry crude petroleum, gas, or carbon dioxide for hire.

The rule amendments require pipeline operators to verify their claim to be a common carrier when applying for a T-4 Permit to Operate a pipeline or when renewing, amending, or cancelling an existing permit. Adoption of the rule amendments represents another step by the Commission to protect the public and responsibly regulate pipelines operating under the Commission's jurisdiction.

Chairman Christi Craddick said, "Pipelines are fundamental to the safe and timely transportation of our state's oil and gas resources. And regulation of the pipeline industry is one of the Commission's most important duties in ensuring the safety of our citizens and the industry's ability to keep pace with transporting our increasing supplies. The Commission's new permitting procedures for common carrier pipelines certifies a more vibrant, transparent permitting process for pipelines operating in the state of Texas."

Commissioner David Porter said, "The Commission has a duty to determine the proper classification of a pipeline and use that information to apply appropriate rules and regulations. These rule amendments improve our ability to determine which regulatory classification applies to a pipeline."

Commissioner Barry Smitherman said, "The Commission's T-4 Permit to Operate is a permit to operate a pipeline in Texas. It does not change the rights of a property owner nor does it grant eminent domain powers to a pipeline operator. Our new rules require an attestation from the operator of their knowledge of Texas eminent domain laws and the Texas Landowner's Bill of Rights."

The adopted rule amendments take effect on March 1, 2015, and include the following requirements:

- permit applications must now include additional information including requested classification and purpose of the pipeline or pipeline system as a common carrier, a gas utility, or private line operator;
- permit applications must include a sworn statement from the pipeline applicant providing the operator's factual basis supporting the classification and purpose being sought for the pipeline;
- if applicable, the pipeline operator must submit documentation such as a contract or tariff for third-party transportation in the case of a common carrier, along with any other information requested by the Commission;
- the pipeline T-4 permit, if granted, shall be revocable at any time after a hearing if the Commission finds that the pipeline is not being operated in accordance with state laws and Commission rules and regulations.
- the applicant must acknowledge the eminent domain provisions in the Texas Landowner's Bill of Rights.

pital Board and Muenster ISD Board of Trustees. Muenster ISD came to an agreement with OWN Energy, but the Hospital and County have not yet voted on an abatement for the project.

Vajdos met with Cooke County Chief Appraiser Doug Smithson and they spoke with Pritchard & Abbot, the firm Cooke County uses to do large ad valorem tax appraisals. The project could possibly be taxed at \$100 million dollars, said Vajdos.

"Hopefully we can be successful," remarked Vajdos. "Economics are trending in a direction that we do not like. But, we still think that the project can be done."

From the audience, Herbie Sicking inquired as to why Vajdos was using the price of natural gas to adjust the value of the wind turbines instead of using kilowatts. Vajdos explained that the price the electricity can be sold for per kilowatt is largely driven by the cost of natural gas.

County Judge John Roane encouraged anyone to come back when the Court is considering a vote on the requested abatement to voice their concerns or opinions.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Approved transfer of a 2006 Crown Victoria from the DA's Office to County non department inventory under the management of the County Judge's Office.
- With no County departments interested in acquiring it, a 1999 Ford Explorer from the IT Department was approved for auction.

Consent agenda items approved by the Court included:

- Accepting a donation from Friends of the Cooke County Library in the amount of \$5,000 for the Cooke County Library to provide the OneClickdigital downloadable audiobook service.
- Contract between Cooke County Library and Recorded Books LLC for their OneClickdigital downloadable audiobook service.
- Donation in the amount of \$20.35 to the Cooke County Library from anonymous donors and a donation in the amount of \$10 from Alison O'Leary for research.
- Three-year lease agreement between Cooke County Road and Bridge, Precinct #4 and RDO Equipment for the lease of a 2015 John Deere Motor Grader.
- Maintenance agreement between Cooke County and Computer Color Graphics for the copy machine located in the Cooke County Jail's Medical Department.
- Accepting an insurance settlement on a Xerox copier that was installed in the jail that was damaged due to a water pipe leaking.
- Accepting the proceeds from the TAC Healthy County rewards program in the amount of \$1,000.
- Extending the term of the Securus master service agreement for inmate telephone service.
- Jailer bonds for Ricky Kerr and Josh King.

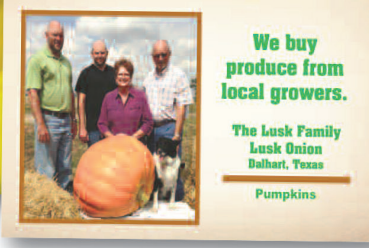

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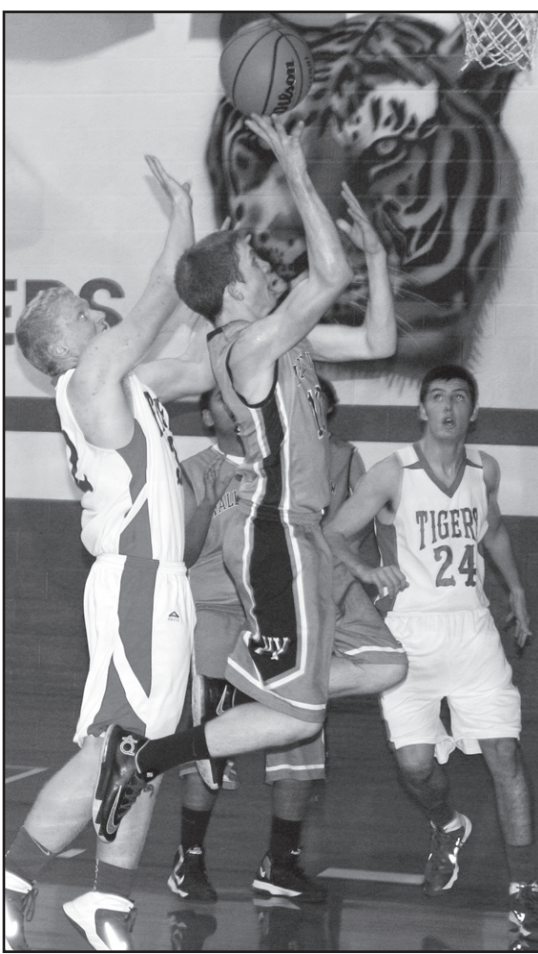

## Texas State Beef Checkoff program underway

Collections under Texas' new state beef checkoff program began Oct. 1, after Texas beef producers voted to establish a state-level beef checkoff program, which was approved by a wide margin of 66% of voters. The Texas Department of Agriculture conducted the referendum upon petition by cattle industry organizations under the authorities designated by the Texas Legislature.

The program is funded through a refundable \$1 per head assessment on cattle at each point of ownership transfer in Texas. The funds are managed in accordance with Texas law by the Beef Promotion Research Council of Texas (BPRCT). The BPRCT consists of 20 Texas cattle producers appointed



by the Texas commissioner of agriculture. All state beef checkoff programs are overseen by the BPRCT.

The BPRCT contracts with the Texas Beef Council to conduct demand-building programs in the areas of promotion, research, and education.

"I am confident in our new state beef checkoff program and proud of my fellow cattle-

men and women for standing up for our industry and recognizing the importance and need for this program," said Dave Edmiston, BPRCT chairman and cattle rancher from Brady. "As beef and dairy farmers and ranchers, every dollar we invest into the program goes to help increase profit opportunities by keeping beef top-of-mind with consumers and by working to ensure a wholesome, quality beef-eating experience every time. We are working to continue to grow beef demand by investing in program areas such as retail and foodservice, international export marketing, and digital consumer marketing."

The fiscal 2015 year began Oct. 1, for the BPRCT with a budget of \$5.67 million.

## Bumper year for Texas pecans

It's been a bumper year for pecans around East Texas as the trees are finally thriving since the 2011 drought, reports the *Tyler Morning Telegraph*. Pecan growers and residents alike are seeing high quantity and quality pecans.

"Pecans are the No. 1 fruit crop in Texas in terms of acreage," said Monte Nesbitt, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (AgriLife) pecan specialist.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) October report estimated Texas producers would harvest 60 million pounds of pecans this fall, which is slightly up from the 50 million pounds to 55 million pounds estimated by the AgriLife Extension after an April freeze was expected to damage spring flowers.

Texas pecan production is up from the 28 million pounds reported by the USDA for 2013 and the 55 million pounds in 2012.

## U.S. has global genetic influence

With the world's best genetic record basis and as a leader in efficiency, the U.S. has foreign cattle producers looking to them to improve the global cow herd.

Cattlemen from Australia and Asia to South America and the Middle East are looking to the U.S. to find genetics for their herds, according to

*Drovers CattleNetwork*. But those countries lack the data, specifically expected progeny differences.

Since the late 1980s, U.S. cattle producers have been able to submit collected data, such as birth weights and weaning weights, to their respective breed associations. It is then translated into usable and consistent information to more closely examine the animal's genetic stance.

"The power of information is the key to why the United States is the No. 1 genetic supplier for international markets," says ABS Global Inc. Beef Brand Manager Basco Neto.

## Increased wheat yields with fungicide, seed treatment, varieties

Early last summer, wheat yields for Northeast Texas farmers were the best of all-time—the result of timely rains, fewer losses to disease and pests, and better tools, such as fungicides and seed treatment and varieties, reports *Southwest Farm Press*.

One Grayson County farmer says an economical fungicide, tebuconazole, allows farmers to shift away from earlier varieties to later maturing wheat, which gives a longer grain-fill period and reduces potential freeze damage.

The fungicide increased yield potential from 50 to 60 bushels per acre and seed treatment improves plant health.

## TIPS TO PREVENT OAK WILT DISEASE

The Texas A&M Forest Service urges caution in gathering firewood to prevent the spread of oak wilt disease—the most destructive tree disease in the U.S.

Firewood is an important commodity to Texans, as it is used in barbecue pits and fireplaces. Now is the time to pay close attention to the firewood being picked up and stored for winter. Transporting and storing diseased wood can spread the devastating oak wilt fungus, according to Texas A&M Forest Service.



Follow these steps to prevent oak wilt disease:

- Select well-seasoned firewood. Wood that was cut before the summer and is dry with loose bark and cracked ends.
- Safely store unknown sources of firewood. Cover the woodpile with a clear piece of plastic. Burying the edges of the plastic will prevent the entry or exit of insects that might have been attracted to diseased wood and fungal mats.
- Destroy diseased red oaks. A knowledgeable arborist or forester should diagnose oak wilt in red oaks (i.e., Texas red, blackjack, or shumard oak) that die rapidly within 2-3 weeks or in groups of two or more trees over several years.
- Avoid wounding oaks during vulnerable seasons of February through June. The best times for pruning of oaks are during the heat of summer (minimal spore production) or the cold of winter (minimal insect activity).
- Paint all oak wounds including pruning cuts. Throughout the year, immediately apply a thin coat of latex or pruning paint to all fresh wounds and other injuries that expose the inner bark or sapwood of oaks. This prevents contaminated sap beetles from infecting the wound with oak wilt spores.

## USTR appeals WTO's COOL law

The U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) has officially decided to appeal this fall's World Trade Organization (WTO) ruling which found the United States' mandatory country-of-origin labeling (COOL) law not in compliance with WTO trade guidelines, reports Feedstuffs.

A USTR spokesperson said the U.S. appealed the compliance panel reports in the

COOL dispute.

"Among other findings, the U.S. appeal requests reversal of the panel findings that the amended COOL measure accords imported Canadian and Mexican livestock less favorable treatment than that received by U.S. livestock."

USTR said the parties are consulting with the Appellate Body on the schedule for this appeal, including the filing date for the U.S. appellant submission.

Bob McCann, president of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, said that an appeal brings the U.S. closer to retaliatory tariffs from Canada and Mexico, "a path that will damage our economy and our relationship with our largest trading partners."
