If you've seen "Mac" Johnson this week, chances are he's told you his waitress story. For those who haven't heard:



the while the stream is well within the channel's capacity. The flood prevention program along Big Elm is well advanced. Ten sites are either complete or under construction. Three have just been contracted and two more will be submitted for bids

Those dams control the main channels and tributaries to the confluence of Big and Brushy Elm creeks. From there on other reservoirs will check the tributaries along the creek all the way to Lake Dallas.

Though initial construction was delayed until only a year ago, the Elm watershed project is one of the oldest on the Agriculture Department's records. It originated shortly after the department started its flood prevention work. As one of the early applicants it came under the provision which allows 100 per cent appropriations. Had its appropriation not been made promptly it would have come

under the later provision which requires that 10 per cent of the cost be absorbed by the area concerned.
