

AQUATIC SLINGSHOT-The Navy has a new-method slingshot device, which drags soggy frogmen from the water into fast-moving boats. The secret of the swimmer pick-up assembly is a spring-loaded bungee cord, attached to a boat boom suspended over a rubber boat. As the boat races by, the swimmer grabs onto a spare at the other end of the tensioned cord. The acceleration, stretching the cord, pulls the swimmer into the boat, above. Frogmen can be pulled in at the rate of 25 per minute-2.4 seconds per man: Designed by All American Engineering Co., in cooperation with the Office of Naval Research, the assembly is said to be safer and faster than other methods of retrieving men from the water.



It was not until late in the 19th century that a preventive measure was developed. At first, this protection against lockjaw was given separately. As years passed and research continued, doctors perfected a vaccine or preventive measure to protect the person early in life.

Now this protection is given at the same time that immunization is given for diphtheria and whooping cough, and the combination is known as the "triple vaccine." It is given to a child in the last half of its first year of life, or earlier. Booster doses should be given at intervals to keep up the protection and especially after any puncture







Prescher Cows Lead County DHIA Herds For Honors in June

Peter Prescher's Holsteins were out in front for milk and butterfat production when averages for

The cows averaged 1100 pounds

Frazer's cows were second in milk production with 980 pounds and the Hoedebeck and Myers herd was third in butterfat with 35 pounds. Hi-Lo and Richard Frasher's cows tied for third place in milk production with a 930 pound average.

The June report compiled by DHIA Supervisors Carl Kemplin and Bob Fuhrmann shows that the average butterfat production in the association for the month was 29 pounds per cow and the average milk production was 760 pounds.

Twenty-three herds were tested, there were 539 cows in milk, and 106 cows produced 45 pounds or more of butterfat.

Listed among the high producing herds were those of Paul Fisher, John Knabe, Martin Bayer and Alfred Bayer.

Cooke DHIA Is On Top for Milk, 2nd In BF During May

Cooke County Dairy Herd Improvement association again came up in first place in the state, tieing with Mission county, for milk production during May, aecording to the state summary for that month. Both groups posted an average of 870 pounds of milk for the honor.

Cooke and Dallas counties tied for second spot in butterfat production with 33 pounds, being outdone by Mission and Parker counties who were one point ahead. Wichita Valley was second in milk production with 830 pounds. There are 24 counties in the Texas association.

OPEN SEASON ON "SITTING DUCKS"

Come January first, New York State will put into effect new regulations for commercial vehicle lighting that will bring Empire State requirements for truck stafety equipment from below the national average to a new high for all the states to emulate.

But a New Jersey act, approved May 8th and effective immediately, already points up what is perhaps the single weakness of the New York regulations. Patterned generally on the recommendations of the American Trucking Associations, New York will require turn signals on all trucks, large or small, new or old. But New Jersey goes one step further and suggests that turn signals be so wired that they may be switched on to flash simultaneously when the truck is disabled on the road. Such a traffic hazard is known to the truckers as a "sitting duck," and unless and until all'vehicles have the protection authorized by New Jersey, the pile-ups they cause are bound to increase - with a mounting toll of fatalities, bloodshed and property damage. Last year there were 1,280 "sitting duck" deaths and 151,060 were injured in rear-end crashes. This year, these figures are bound to be larger.

But, as the new low in Jersey indicates, something can be done about it - and right now. In fact, nearly a million vehicles, both commercial and private, are now equipped with a special switch that converts the standard turn lights into four blazing disablement flares that flash their warning unmistakably by day or night. If your car has turn lights, any competent mechanic can install a switch for about the cost of a tank of gas. Or, if you like that kind of recreation, you can buy a disabled vehicle warning switch for yourself and install it Saturday instead of watching the ball game. Maybe it will only take you a couple

At least this will provide food for thought next time you have to change a left side tire on a busy highway at night.



In the event, however, that another prolonged drought comes along the law can provide for the city's needs simply by stipulating that the farmer must quit irrigating as soon as the city quits. Let's share evenly in rights and responsibilities, applying the principle that a farmer has as much right to water his crop as city people have to water their yards . . . that rationing, if and when it becomes necessary, will be shared alike by farmers and city folks.

That kind of adjustment in the

law will be fair to everyone concerned. What's more, it will be pleasing to everyone as soon as we get out of the strain of the present drought. As a matter of fact Big D's trouble right now isn't so much the drought as the fact that its present reservoir was not built in time. If it had been there to hold some of the surplus that used to gush over the Lake Dallas spillway and roar down the Trinity the town would not be hurting today, nor bothering about H. D. Fields' irrigation ideas. The attitude will change after a few old time

Another point those Dallas guys might consider is that they are beneficiaries in a big way of the many detention dams built in these parts. Flood control here will stop most and perhaps all of the devastating damage they used to get from the rampaging Trinity. Likewise it stops the silt damage which had a disastrous effect on Lake Dallas.

The men up here who signed easements for reservoir construction are Big D's benefactors, and they deserve consideration from Big R. Now that the city has prevented Fields from taking critically needed water it could


