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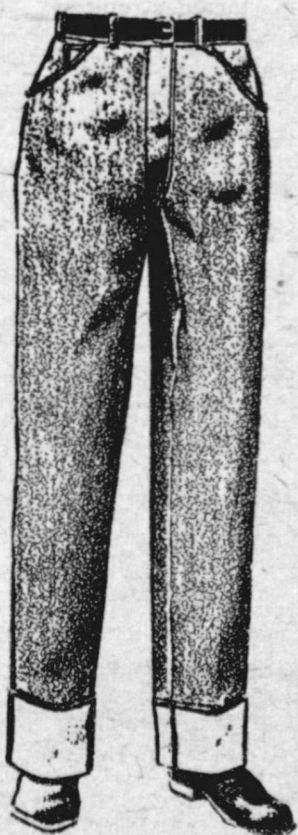

## The American Way

### MURDER WILL OUT

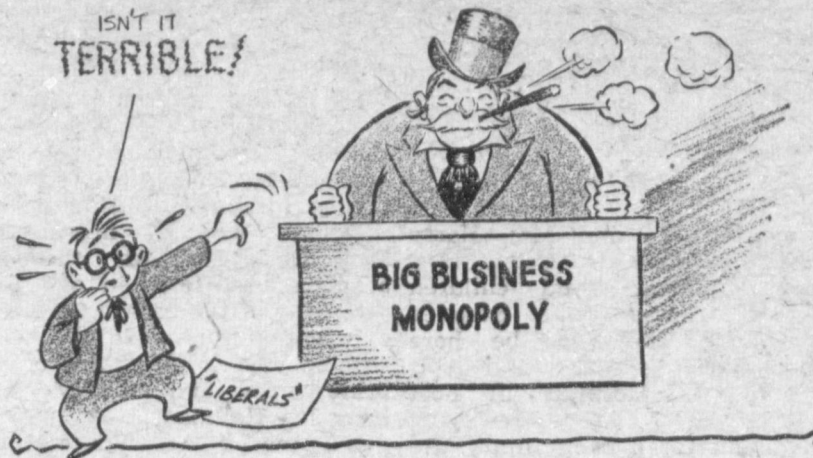
There is an old saying that "murder will out." And here is an extraordinary instance to support that ancient adage.

It is no longer news when a Commie turns up in our Treasury or State Department, our magazines or, for that matter, in a Christian pulpit. One would suppose, however, that the most dangerous spot for a Red spy would be in our secret Army installations. Yet during World War II some thirty disloyal Americans friendly to Red Russia managed to insert themselves in one of the most secret laboratories of the Army — not just one, but 30. They wormed their way into the laboratories at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, where Army technicians were working on the development of radar. This is a process by which it is possible to detect the approach of enemy planes or vessels be-

fore they can attack. These laboratories were second in importance only to those developing the atomic bomb. It will be recalled that Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, identified as Red spies in the atomic research laboratories, were tried, convicted and electrocuted. The FBI had discovered that these 30 or more Reds had swarmed safely into the radar laboratories at Fort Monmouth.

On receiving this startling information, General Lawton, in command at the Fort, promptly suspended each of these cases. The loyalty board at Fort Monmouth upheld his order. But the Reds appealed to the superior loyalty board at the Pentagon. And — believe it or not — that queer collection of Army politicians cleared all the infiltrators but two. A Senate sub-committee, learning of this, summoned one of the acquitted technicians. When he was sworn and asked if he was a Communist he refused to answer on the ground he might incriminate himself.

At this point the Army politicians killed the sub-committee's investigation and turned it into an investigation of the Senator who directed the exposure of these birds. Instantly that busy collection of newspapers and organizations which always jump on Americans who attack Communists, joined in the assault on

the investigating sub-committee. Fortunately our American press as a whole is not poisoned by this curious virus which stimulates some of our powerful Eastern dailies and some of our strange American senators.

The Democrats, when they captured the Senate, took over control of the Senate Internal Security Committee. Senator Eastland, a Democrat, became its new chairman and, to his everlasting credit, he continued the investigation of subversives and pressed it with vigor. In the course of these investigations, almost by chance, a new and astonishing witness appeared. He is a former Russian Army officer who escaped from his country and its ruthless autocrats. He swore that he was employed in the Military Research Institute in Moscow. He testified that ninety percent of the documents he examined in Moscow had been stolen from top-secret American sources. He swore that a large part of these documents had to do with radar research. They included photographs, blueprints, secret formulas and were marked "Top Secret." And the witness identified them as coming from Fort Monmouth, New Jersey!

Who made it possible for these secret blueprints, photographs and formulas taken from Fort Monmouth to appear in the Military Research Institute of Communist Russia? Do not forget that an American senator discovered the possibility of such thefts, that Senate committee identified 30 persons in Fort Monmouth as Communists, that the commanding officer there

fired them all and that an odd collection of Army politicians turned nearly all of them loose. Do not forget that an American senator ferreted out this evil gang and identified them. For his pains, a large batch of them were reinstated and the investigation in the Senate was turned upon the Senator who exposed this infamy. The usual collection of newspapers which always denounce communism but almost always defend Communists, poured on the hapless head of this courageous senator the vials of their wrath. That senator, you will remember, was Senator Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin. But now, at long last, following the disclosures of this recent witness, Senator Eastland, Democrat and chairman of the Senate Internal Security Committee, and Senator Jenner, ranking Republican member, have joined in vindicating Senator McCarthy and his investigation of Fort Monmouth.



### Texas Schools Get 22% Increase in USDA Lunch Funds

COLLEGE STATION — Texas public schools will get about 22 percent more funds from the U. S. Department of Agriculture than last year to serve noon-day meals under the National School Lunch Program.

The increase of \$853,453 brings the total to \$4,686,808 for the coming school year.

This announcement was received by Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, Texas Educational Agency.

First quarter allocation of this money will be made to Texas this month, according to John J. Slaughter, chief, southwest food distribution division, Dallas.

This office of the Agriculture Marketing Service deals with the states in this region on the National School Lunch Program.

Slaughter explained that the 22 percent increase in the Texas allotment was the result of an increase of \$16,700,000 over last year's appropriation by Congress.

Federal funds are shared by the states on the basis of the number of children between the

ages of 5 and 17, inclusive, and the need for assistance in the state as indicated by the relation of the per capita income of the United States to that of the state.

Slaughter praised the Texas Educational Agency for the way it has developed and administered the school lunch program.

### Migration Habits Of Flies Revealed In Tests on Border

AUSTIN — In case there are really serious doubts about it, an international team of fly specialists has proved conclusively that flies don't give a fig about immigration restrictions along the U.S.-Mexico border.

The question as to how readily Mexican and Texas flies migrate has been unanswered for a long time. Do they brave the perils of crossing the Rio Grande in numbers? Or, do just a few of the sturdier ones dare the trip in favor of better pickings on the other side?

Or do Mexican flies stay in Mexico, while Texas flies stick to this side of the river?

The answer is important because of the tremendous disease spreading potential a single fly represents.

Last week the answer was made crystal clear. They cross, in number, any time the notion strikes them.

The proof came through the combined efforts of health workers from the U.S. Public Health Service, the State Department of Health, and local health departments in Laredo and Nuevo Laredo.

The Laredo-Webb County Health Department's interest in the subject is obvious: the city has suffered 27,200 cases of dysentery and 116 deaths since 1947. During an average year the border city reports 5,000 cases and some 25 deaths from the enervating disease.

Proof of fly immigrations came about like this:

Some 25,000 flies were captured from two hog feeding in-

stallations in Laredo, and an additional 30,000 from a couple of dairies in Nuevo Laredo. Texas flies were dyed red and Mexican flies green to mark their point of origin.

Meanwhile, 26 baited traps were scattered around in Nuevo Laredo, and 24 in Laredo.

That evening between 7:30 and 10 o'clock, the flies were released — half from four points on the Texas side of the border and half from sites in Mexico.

During the following two days, flies which had been released in Mexico were recaptured in three traps in Texas. Their tattle-tale green coloring gave them away. Texas flies were recovered

from five traps in Nuevo Laredo. One recovery site on each side was over a mile from the border.

"It proves," said the team leader, "that fly control programs on one side are practically useless unless the other side undertakes simultaneous programs."

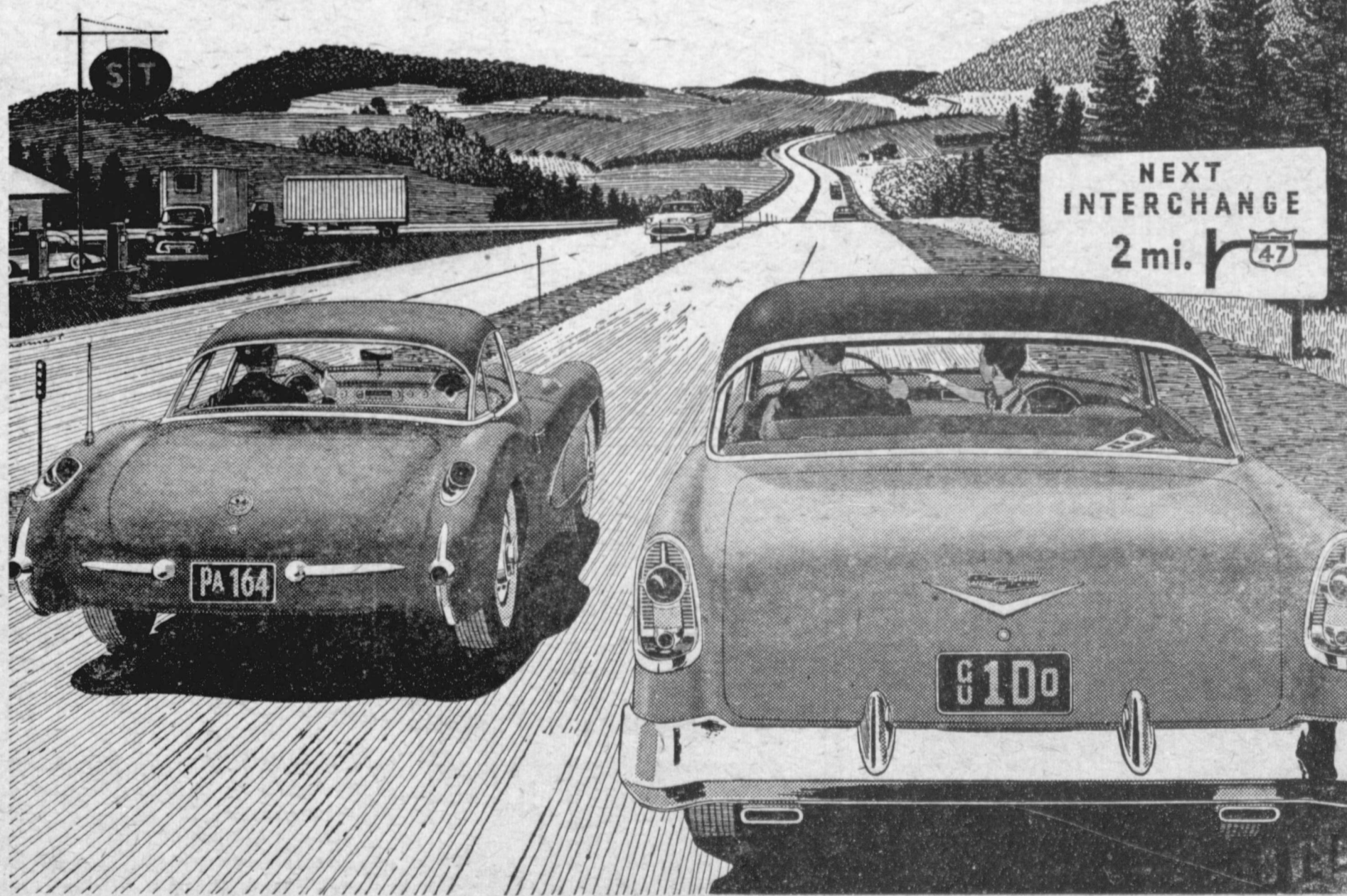

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



"You never miss the water until the well goes dry" is an old adage that is cropping up as a critical problem in the Muenster-Saint Jo area. Only in this case it applies mostly to ponds for livestock water, creeks and springs.

As the drought lingers on numerous ponds are drying up. Springs, which never failed before have quit running and most creek water has become just a pleasant memory in the cattleman's mind.

Some land owners are taking the opportunity to clean out and deepen ponds that have dried up. These deepened ponds will give better water in future years. J. W. Hess is renovating two of his old ponds so they will have more and better supply of water for livestock. Gary Hess has cleaned out his pond and Hubert Felderhoff is cleaning out two ponds on the army camp ranch to give more water storage.

A number of land owners cooperating with the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation district by applying a complete soil, water and plant conservation plan to their farms are constructing new tanks to assure plenty of water in the future. 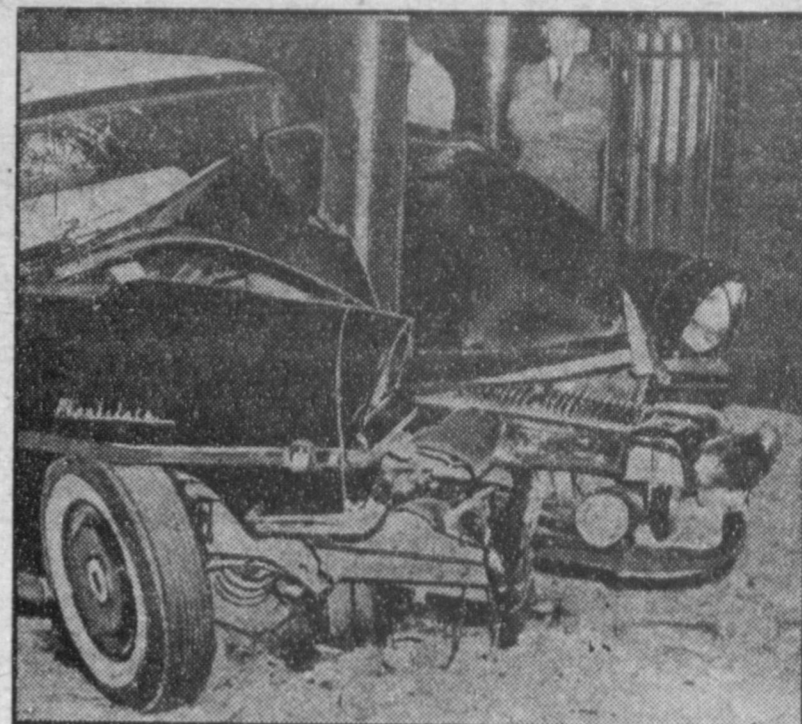

**RIVER OF HEALTH**  
There seems to be some historical question as to whether Christopher Columbus, Lief Erickson, John Cabot, or perhaps still another sea-rover actually discovered the Western Hemisphere. But it is pretty well established that Columbus, on his second voyage to the Caribbean in 1495, brought the first milk cows to this half of the world. And look what's happened since!

Pasteur invented pasteurizing. Delaval invented the cream separator. Thatcher invented the milk bottle. Last year US families alone produced a record crop of 3,100,000 offspring, and according to the Milk Industry Foundation, US dairy farmers produced a river of milk which, if not employed otherwise, would have been 3,286 miles long, 40 feet wide and three feet deep. And if you want your river deeper, you have the choice of making it shorter or narrower—but it still accounts for 56 billion quarts representing the best efforts of 22,406,000 milk cows valued at \$3,252,510,000.

Nearly half of this river is swallowed in fresh, fluid form by young and old. But, according to nutritionists in and out of the US Department of Agriculture, this is not nearly enough to meet minimum dietary standards. Even though per capita consumption is about 12 percent higher than before World War II, it still amounts to less than a pint a day, when it should average a pint-and-a-half to a quart a day for good health.

There is still no chance, however, for you to take a milk bath in that river, since the so-called "milk surplus" is a mere trickle. If a quarter of us drank as

much more milk as the experts say we should, or if all of us drank less than two ounces more of it a day, there would be a shortage... and we might have to call out the National Guard to prevent milk looting.

### New Katy Train - - -

technically identified as RDC-3. It includes a passenger compartment, a mail compartment and a baggage and express compartment with the power unit.

The new car streamlines Katy service to fit the requirements of the Denison-Wichita run. In normal times it is more than adequate for the business that used to be handled by the diesel locomotive and two regular coaches. In the event it is not adequate for rush seasons Katy plans to increase its facilities temporarily, either adding a coach or putting the old train back in service.

Operational cost is the big reason for the change. The RDC-3 uses much less fuel and also requires 2 less men on the crew. An engineer and a conductor handle this job whereas the regular train had a fireman and brakeman also. Besides, the cost of this complete train is about the same as that of a single diesel-electric locomotive.

The RDC-3 is 85 feet long and is powered by two 275 HP diesel engines mounted under the floor. It can be operated from either end of the car. Its design includes such modern features as automatic transmission, disc brakes and refrigerated air conditioning in the passenger compartment. It will accommodate 49 passengers. The baggage section is 17 feet long and the mail section 15 feet long.

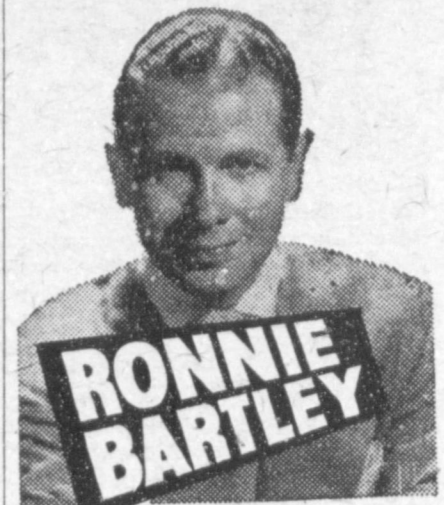

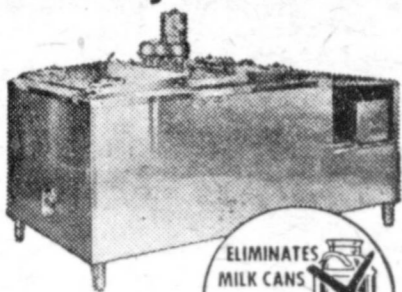
