The appalling extent of our apathy shows up in comparisons with peoples who have recently recovered their freedom. Those people treasure their vote and turn out in big percentages for For Congress 13th District an election. We Americans, with a long heritage of liberty, muster about half of our voting Fcr Governor

This year, for instance, the State of Texas boasts a record number of qualified voters. Paid poll taxes and exemptions add to 2,410,188, which actually is many thousand short of the state's real voting strength. Over age citizens in towns under For Lieutenant Governor population are not required to get exemption certificates, hence are not listed on the poll records. Very likely that group adds as many as 10 per cent to the recorded total.

But what is that out of a population of more than 8 million, which probably includes more than 5 million adults? A hasty estimate indicates that about half of our residents have decided to be citizens.

As regards the turnout of qualified voters, the state does somewhat better. Records show that the 1952 general election polled 2,075,946, an 87 per cent turnout of the number of qualified voters on record. Again figuring in the non-recorded exemptions, the actual percentage of turnout shrinks considerably.

State records reveal also that primary elections have considerably smaller turnouts. Not since the Ferguson Era has the percentage run over 80 per cent. The reason given is that Republicans do not vote in the Democratic primary.

That statement indicates an attitude that should be revised out of consideration of individual rights as well as the public good. With the Democratic Party in control of state and county offices, as it is in Texas, the primary is, in effect, the state's general election. We take it for granted that the men nominated then will be the office holders. A few of them have been upset in the general election, but very

Since that is the case, it is only reasonable that a Republican is entitled to a vote in the Democratic primary. He has no other opportunity of sharing in the selection of men to local and state offices.

According to the code of the Democratic Party, as expressed in the pledge on Primary ballots, the voter of Texas is a political slave. If he participates in a local election he presumably pledges himself to vote Demo- NO. 1 cratic in the general election.
