Proposed legislation periaining to the Texas public school system is coming to the front as a topic for consideration in Muenster. Superintendent Homsley explained it at the Lions club meeting Tuesday and Superintendent Lassiter of Callisburg will discuss it at the PTA meeting next Tuesday night.

Homsley urged the Lions to study the possible effects on the Muenster district if the legislation should pass, also to consider possible courses of action that might best serve the community's interests.

Listed as possible were: (1) a law to discontinue per capita payments on the basis of scholastic population and base the state aid strictly on average attendance. (2) A law to discontinue common school districts, the office of county superintendent and the county school board, and annex the small districts to larger districts. (3) A law requiring a 12 grade accredited school with average attendance of at least 500 to qualify as an active district, and annexing districts which fail to meet districts.
