People of Muenster voted with their state and nation Tuesday in giving President Eisenhower a sweeping victory over his opponent, Adlai Stevenson.

Grain and Grass Prospects Improve After 1.61 Soaker

The most cheering sight this community has seen in many months was the wonderful rain that fell Saturday and Sunday. Slow showers and drizzles spread over a period of about 24 hours combined to make a dandy 1.61 soaker. It was 100 per cent effective, very little if any running off the land.

As a result surface moisture conditions are ideal. Moderately warm weather is also helping along to give crops and pastures a timely nudge after some progress following October rains. weather moves in soon. The moisture is ample to sustain good growth for at least a few weeks.

However, the rain still cannot be regarded as a drought buster. It was not sufficient to provide that sub-soil supply on which plants can keep going after the top few inches dry out. The community is still looking for rains to meet that need. Meanwhile the general attitude is that all's well up to now.

Because of the very limited run-off pends and reservoirs, like the sub-soil, are still wait-

Combined with October rainfall of 2.40 the weekend's soaker raises the moisture measure to 4.01 in slightly more than a month. The year's total to date is 15.45 inches.

"I wish all Americans could have heard this litany of thanksgiving, could have seen one old lady letting the rice run through her fingers like a miser with his gold, or the smiles of the 95 year old couple anticipating a feast. That would have been some recompense for the dollars given, the hours of work that went into making this shipment of relief goods from America possible.'



W. F. Davidson has just completed over 8000 feet of channel type field terraces to give added protection to some 50 acres of sloping cropland. These terraces break the long slope into short slopes and move the water slowly to a wide strip of Bermuda grass which was sodded for that

Frank Bindel has finished building 1567 feet of field terraces on his farm northwest of Muenster to help protect a sloping field.

Andrew Fleitman is constructing some 7500 feet of broad, easy-to-farm channel type terraces on his farm six miles south of Muenster. These will outlet onto a King Ranch Bluestem waterway that was planted along a natural drain for an outlet

Emmett Sicking and Joe Lewter are using farm equipment to build terraces on their farms. They are using tractors and plows and the island method of construction for the broad, easyto-cross type of terraces. Both landowners have wide grassed waterways to provide safe outlets for the terrace water.


