

County changes method of closing county roads

Cooke County Commissioners Court voted in discord on a proposed revision in permanent road closing procedure at the regular Commissioners Court meeting held Monday, April 13. Commissioner Gary Hollowell had proposed the changes in the policy at the March 23 meeting and a decision was tabled. The County contacted Allison and Bass, the firm that handles most of the County's legalities in regard to roads. As of Monday's meeting, there had been no response.

Commissioner Leon Klement said that he didn't understand why changes were needed. He wanted to wait until Bass and the Cooke County Attorney's offices discussed the matter. "There has to be a reason to change it," stated Klement.

County Judge Jason Brinkley noted, "The situation was our permanent procedures for closing a road had additional steps that were not prescribed by statute and petition was lacking compared to what is attached to your agenda packet." He added that in the '70s it appears the County used something similar to what was being proposed. He was not sure when or why it changed.

Commissioner Al Smith expressed concern about not using a notary for the required signatures. He worried about the legalities and repercussions should someone falsify signatures.

Klement said, "Road closures are a serious matter, nothing to take lightly. Once you close it, it's gone."

During the discussion, Commissioner Hollowell said that this is a local issue and he didn't think they needed to bring Austin in on it. Smith answered, "This is not a local issue. This is a state issue. You are shutting down a road which, a) belongs to the state, and b) is part of the state infrastructure, part of the county infrastructure, part of the future infrastructure that may be affected by development. All kinds of financial considerations are built around roads. It's an incredibly important thing at the state level as well as the local level."

Following the meeting, Judge Brinkley explained, "Aside from smaller changes, the new procedure will eliminate the requirement that

the signatures on the petition be notarized, and the requirement to have a public hearing on the closing, neither of which is required by statute.

"The procedure still includes the requirement of eight signatures from landowners in the precinct, posting of the petition at two locations by the road to be considered for 20 days and at the Courthouse for 20 days, and unanimous vote by Commissioners Court to close a road.

"It is my hope that this new procedure will eliminate confusion by County staff and the public on what is required for closing a road and how our requirements conform with the statutory requirements."

When a vote was taken, Commissioners Hollowell and B.C. Lemons and Judge Brinkley voted in favor of the proposed revision in procedure. Commissioners Klement and Smith cast nay votes and the changes were approved 3-2.

April 2015 was declared as Child Abuse Awareness Month in Cooke County. Commissioners Court approved a proclamation that read in part, "Preventing child abuse and neglect is a community problem that depends upon education and involvement among people throughout every sector of the community.

"In 2014, every seven minutes a child in Texas was the subject of abuse or neglect; and 66,572 children in Texas, including 198 in Cooke County, were confirmed as victims of abuse or neglect. Sixty percent of those children were under the age of six years old. In 2014, there were 151 child abuse related fatalities in Texas; that is a child every 58 hours.

"In 2014, 46,823 children in Texas, including 149 in Cooke County, were in the care and custody of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services because of evidence of abuse and neglect.

"The impact of abuse and neglect has long-term personal, economic, and social costs."

Dennis and Kathy Hess both addressed the Court during the public comments portion of the agenda. They told of the condition of the road that they live on and gave reasons they feel it should be paved.

Dennis said he lives on the

east end of CR 388. "The first mile now serves 13 homes and one business," stated Hess. "The next mile and a half beyond that are an additional six homes. This creates a tremendous amount of traffic on the road that's clearly not constructed to handle that kind of traffic."

According to Hess, the road is graveled with crushed rock that is pulverized to powder in a few days after the road is graded. He said 15 years ago when they moved there, you would occasionally see people riding bikes or walking on the road, but that no longer is done because of the white powder from the road.

"Usually if you go down county roads, you could dodge and weave and miss the holes. But, with our road, there's so much traffic, all the dodging and weaving took place in a short period of time and there is just a checkerboard of holes from one side of the road to the other for a good section in that first mile."

With the price of oil down, Hess wondered if now might be a good time to pave the road. He felt that asphalt costs should be down now.

He concluded with the information that in the first mile of road, they are approaching \$3 million in values and are paying a good amount of taxes to the County.

Kathy Hess said she agreed with her husband and added, "We really feel like it is time to do something. It's really a problem." She said it has gotten progressively worse as more homes have been built along the road and the families have grown and have teenagers who also drive.

Following an executive session, the Court approved the hiring of outside counsel Bickerstaff Heath Delgado Acosta LLP to represent the County concerning possible upcoming litigation. The vote was 4-0-1; the abstention was Commissioner Smith.

In other business, Commissioners Court:

- Approved the transfer of a 2000 Chevy 1500 pickup from EMS to the County Maintenance Department.
- Proclaimed April 12-18 as National Library Week in Cooke County.

Consent agenda items approved by the Court included:

Germanfest marks 40th year

Muenster Chamber of Commerce Executive Director John Broyles remarked, "The Chamber is very proud to have the longest running festival in Cooke County for the past 40 years. We invite everyone to come out and enjoy our celebration and look forward to another 40."

It was in April of 1976 that Muenster first held the German Week Festival that is now known as Germanfest. It first took place as one of a series of celebrations and observances during the mid-1970s that paid tribute to the historical events leading up to the creation of the United States of America as an independent republic. Muenster's Bicentennial celebration embraced the community's German heritage.

In its infancy, Germanfest took place over most of a week. For the Bicentennial celebration, German Week kicked off with a historical pageant on Wednesday put on by students at Muenster ISD and supervised by the Muenster PTO.

Thursday was another

pageant - the Miss Muenster contest sponsored by the Muenster Hospital Auxiliary. Barbie Hess was selected from the 19 contestants as Queen of German Week that year.

Friday, Saturday, and Sunday had a dance each evening. They were sponsored by the KCs on Friday, the Sacred Heart Men's choir on Saturday, and Sunday was the Bicentennial Ball.

Events for German Week took place in the Community Center, a 60'x100' tent, the Sacred Heart Parish picnic site, and Muenster High Auditorium. The tent held concession booths, a registration table, and some activities.

The Muenster Knights of Columbus hosted a German Fun Run chaired by Dan Hamric. There were 251 participants in the 10 mile run.

German foods including sausages, German potato salad, and sauerkraut, and sweets were abundant.

It is estimated that 5,000 attended that first festival.

After about three years, the Miss Muenster Pageant was dropped and the celebration took place on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. It

took the name Germanfest.

The Germanfest was moved to the Muenster City Park and continued to grow in the number attending, what was offered for entertainment, and arts and crafts booths were added, more variety in foods became available, carnival rides were added. Entertainment ballooned into three stages - a Texas stage, the Tanze Halle stage, and a Children's stage. Big name entertainers were booked as the size of Germanfest expanded.

To mark its 40th year, the Muenster Chamber of Commerce will offer 40th commemorative steins at the Chamber of Commerce booth and there will be 40th anniversary T-shirts available at various places in the Park.

Besides the regular fare of German food, this year there will be a large outdoor grill, offering items such as chopped potatoes, Chinese food, and Indian tacos. Local booths slated to take part in the 'Fest are Bayer's, Fischer's, and Kountry Korner.

Anna Braziel will have Ana's Wurst Haus as a fundraising project for St. John Paul II

University Catholic Church. St. John Paul II serves TWU and UNT college campuses in Denton. A ground breaking took place on April 11 with Fr. Kyle Walterscheid and Bishop Michael Olson for construction of a new worship space and Catholic campus center there.
Response for this year's Germanfest has been very good according to Broyles. He said, "The BBQ Cook Off looks like it might be set to match or break a record. We're already at 65 entries and looking forward to getting more of those in." The largest number was 123 in 2013.
Entertainment for children includes Side Street Circus, Balonytik Betty, a climbing wall, arts and crafts, and rides for all ages.
Musicians slated for the anniversary festival include

John Conlee, Swansong, Hard Night's Day, Valina Polka - Das Ist Lustig, Alpenmusikanten, and many more.
Volunteers are still needed to work in some of the Muenster non-profit organizations' booths. These organizations rely on Germanfest for their funding, said Broyles. He encourages people to contact one of these groups and volunteer a little of their time to help them. Those organizations include Muenster Jaycees, Muenster Knights of Columbus, Sacred Heart Alumni and Supporters, Muenster Kiwanis, Muenster Public Library, Muenster Boy Scouts, Muenster Cheerleaders, and Muenster Historical Commission.
There will be free parking at Heritage Park. A shuttle bus will bring people from that location to the City

Park and back. TAPS will run shuttle buses from various locations in Muenster to Germanfest and back to those locations. The hours the shuttle service operates is on Friday from 5-10 p.m., Saturday from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The birth of the Republic of Texas is a tale that is stranger than fiction and thrills the heart of true Texans everywhere!

The newly launched Republic of Texas quaked following the extermination of its ranks in the Battle of Alamo. All was not lost, for Col. James Fannin still held a force of about 330 men. Those men were all that stood between Texans and whatever Santa Anna had in mind. General Sam Houston was recruiting in the field, Santa Anna was rumbling on, and Texans had to decide.

Three weeks after the fall of Alamo, Col. James Fannin surrendered to Santa Anna under promise his men would be treated as prisoners of war. Instead, they were marched to Goliad

where Santa Anna ordered the 330 men shot dead on Friday, March 27, 1836.

Terrified Texans quickly passed along word of Alamo and Goliad as they gathered what they could, burned what they left behind, and walked away from dreams of life in Texas. History refers to this as "The Runaway Scrape," as many escaped and warned new settlers to turn back.

Different emotions drove others to throw their lives

into the conflict. General Sam Houston continued to build an army of new recruits as they gathered.

March 2, Texas Independence Day, proves that one loss, maybe more, does not a failure make. Sam Houston and his brave volunteers inspire all to persevere and be prepared for the final victory! Texas declared itself a republic, March 2, 1836, true. Texas truly became a republic at San Jacinto, April 21, 1836!

Weather Whys - Comma clouds

Q: Sometimes you hear the term 'comma cloud.' What does it mean?

A: A comma cloud is a fairly common occurrence, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Comma clouds can only be seen at high altitudes by weather satellites," McRoberts explains. "They are named comma clouds because they look like a big comma on a map. They are usually associated with a low pressure system and they can be signals to some severe weather ahead."

Q: Does a comma cloud mean a storm is approaching?

A: Very often, that is the case, McRoberts adds. "Comma clouds can be in all sizes and shapes," he says. "They can range in size from small thunderstorms to large weather systems. As a system moves from west to east, it very often retains this comma shape. The head of the comma generally lies to the west of the maximum winds in the storm. It is not uncommon for heavy rain, hail and even snow showers to occur along the path of a comma cloud."

A district must permit a student to choose, at any time, to earn an endorsement other than the endorsement the student previously indicated working with the personal graduation plan of the student.

All parents and students of current 8th and 9th graders are encouraged to attend this meeting to better understand this new Founda-

tion High School Program and the Endorsement options available to students through Muenster High School.

Hey, EPA: Don't mess with my barbecue!

Backyard barbecues. EPA. Mix the two and what do you get? A pollution study with the potential to kill hot dog and hamburger cookouts. At least that's how I read it.

Sometimes those not involved in agriculture have a hard time understanding all the fuss Texas farmers and ranchers raise about the environmental agency. For example, a rule now being finalized by EPA could bring regulation of water down to bar ditches and fields—potentially affecting every management practice used by the farmer or rancher. It's a hard concept to grasp unless it affects you.

But everyone understands backyard barbecues. EPA announced it is funding a University of California project to limit emissions resulting from grease drippings from backyard cookers.

The school proposes two fixes. First, cut back on grease flare-ups by inserting a tray immediately prior to meat flipping and removing immediately after. According to the academics, the short contact time prevents the tray from overheating and volatilizing the collected grease.

But it doesn't stop there. Total capture isn't practical, so a filter and a fan are proposed for installation. The secondary filtration system is composed of a single-pipe duct system which contains a specialized filter, a metal fan blade, a driveshaft, and a power system with either an exterior electric motor with a chain-driven driveshaft spinning the fan, or a hand-powered crank.

What I see is my grill with \$5,000 worth of accessories and me so busy changing grease pans and cranking a fan that I burn my burgers. And my fingers.

I know this is just a study and nothing concrete is coming out of it. Yet. But it's typical of the overreach we're seeing from the regulatory juggernaut.

So back off EPA.

Don't mess with my barbecue grill. You will get burned.

- Extra Lean Ground Beef (96% lean, 4% fat)
- Bottom Round Steak (USDA Select grade)
- Sirloin Tip Steak (USDA Select grade)
- Top Sirloin Petite Roast, Boneless (USDA Select grade)
- Top Sirloin Strips (USDA Select grade)
- Top Sirloin Filet (USDA Select grade)
- Top Sirloin Kabob (USDA Select grade)
- Top Sirloin Steak, Boneless, Center Cut (USDA Select grade)

"The (Heart-Check) certification empowers customers to feel good about including beef in their diets," said Jo Stanko, vice chair of the Beef Checkoff nutrition and health subcommittee.

Texas Dept. of Ag Market Recap

For the week ending April 11, Texas auctions quoted feeder cattle prices mostly steady, ranging from \$2 to \$4 higher per hundredweight (cwt). Texas weekly direct feeder cattle sales were mostly steady to \$3 higher. Fed cattle weekly cash sales were \$2 higher at \$167 per cwt. Wholesale beef values were higher with Choice Grade gaining 9¢ to close at \$256.51 per cwt, but Select Grade lost 1¢ to close at \$249.91 per cwt. Net export sales for March 27-April 2 were up noticeably from the previous week. Export shipments were up 2% from the previous week.

Wheat cash prices gained 9¢ to close at \$5.22 per bushel. Conversely, wheat futures fell 2¢ to settle at \$5.59 per bushel. The USDA NASS Texas field office reported that 7% of Texas wheat was in the heading stage. Eighty-nine percent of the Texas Winter Wheat crop remains in fair-to-excellent condition. Fifty-four percent of the wheat crop is in excellent or good condition. Net export sales for wheat were up 97% from the previous week and 16% from the prior four-week average. Shipments were 11% higher than the previous week and 16% higher than the average.

Texas corn prices were lower with cash prices down to \$4 per bushel and futures prices falling to \$3.77 per bushel. The USDA NASS Texas field office reported that 37% of Texas corn acreage had been planted, up 17 percentage points from the previous week but down 13 percentage points from the same period last year. Eight percent of the Texas corn crop has emerged. Corn ex-

port sales were down 13% from the prior week and 29% from the four-week average. Export shipments were 54% higher than last week and 4% higher than the average.

Last week's U.S. Drought Monitor for Texas showed a slight improvement in drought conditions for the

state, with nearly 49% of the state still in some stage of drought intensity, down slightly from last week. Additionally, more than 25% of the state remains in severe, extreme, or exceptional drought, which is down from last week but up from three months ago.

Global food prices lowest in five years

Global food prices are the lowest in five years, reports *The Des Moines Register*.

The United Nations (U.N.) Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) said the food price index, which measures monthly price changes in cereal, dairy, meat, sugar, and oilseeds, fell 2.6 points in March to 173.8 points. This is the lowest since June 2010.

"Overall, except for a pause in October 2014, the index has been falling steadily since April 2014, on account of large global supplies for most commodities included in the index," the U.N. said in its monthly report.

Consumers will benefit from a surplus of commodities. World cereal production, which includes grains such as corn, rice, oats, and rye, should reach 2.804 billion tons, 2.2 million tons above the February forecast.

Last year, the U.S. corn and soybean crops were the largest ever. The U.S. Agriculture Department said farmers would sow 84.635 million acres of soybeans this year, up slightly from last year's record 83.7 million acres. Corn plantings are projected at 89.199 million acres—the lowest since 2010.

Photos from Texas worth 1,000 words and a million views

If a picture is worth a thousand words, a collection of them would be worth a million. And that appears to be the case for the unique photo collection of Texas A&M AgriLife taken by its news team.

The *AgriLife Today* collection of almost 5,000 photos surpassed 1 million views recently, according to Kathleen Phillips, *AgriLife Today* news manager in College Station.

The photos are the works of the *AgriLife Today* news team, with some from Texas A&M AgriLife Research scientists and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialists and agents. They represent programs and science conducted throughout Texas. The collection has appeared at <http://bit.ly/agrilifetodayphotos> since August

2010, Phillips said.

"The photos depict Texas as traditional as beef and as off-beat as buzzards," she said. "Our team is located around the state, so we've focused on snapping shots of all phases of agriculture production as well as gardening and lifestyle moments."

"And we continue to add to the collection, seeking photos to fill any areas we don't feel are adequately represented," she said. "Currently, we are working on depicting various fruit and vegetable crops at various stages in the growing cycle from planting to harvest this year, for example."

Because the photos are produced by a state agency, they are free for the news media and public for non-commercial uses. All are downloadable in high resolution formats, making them useful for online or printing purposes. All photos include a description of the shot.

Viewers are encouraged to follow the *AgriLife Today* photo collection in order to be notified when new pictures are uploaded.

USDA projects sorghum acres soar 11% in 2015

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) March 31 Prospective Plantings report, grain sorghum acres could soar 11% to 7.9 million acres in 2015, reports *Southwest Farm Press*.

The report projects lower planting acres, compared to 2014, of wheat by 3%, cotton by 13%, rice, 1%, and corn, 2%.

The soybean planted area for 2015 is estimated at a record high 84.6 million acres.

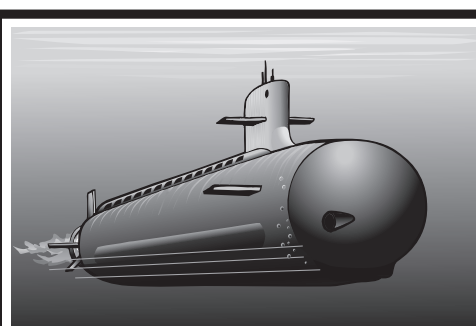
