





Nearly all the grasses had made some seed but the amount of mature seed was too small to pay harvesting costs. The frost caught the Bluestem crop in all stages of development, but most of the seed heads had never made a good fill.

An inspection last Monday of several plantings of KR by Soil Conservation Service personnel at Muenster failed to find any plots worth harvesting. In the native grasses, Indian grass, Switch grass and Sideoats Grama produced the most mature seed, but even this was not considered heavy enough to harvest.

The early freeze wiped out a grass crop that was badly needed in this area for re-vegetation

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
