Besides the damages to buildings, trees and tree limbs got their usual quota of punishment. At Joe Russell's a broken tree fell toward the family car, the limbs crashing the windshield and caving in the hood.

One of the hardest hit was Norbert Klement. His windmill and poultry house were knocked down and pieces from the roof of another building crashed into his dairy barn.

Other larger losses included a barn at Danglmayr's a brooder house for J. W. Fleitman, a poultry house for Victor Sicking, a garage for Tom Sicking, a barn roof for Tony Trubenbach Jr., and damages to the house and the barn of W. H. Endres.

Paul Sicking, whose barn and 5000 bales of hay had been struck by lightning three nights earlier, had the doors blown off another building. There were many other reports over the area of lesser damages such as broken doors and windows or minor damage to buildings.

The 1.53 inch of rain brings this month's measure so far to 3.02 and the year's total to 38.13, just barely more than twice as much as the 19.06 which was recorded here for all of last year.

New Army Missile Will Show at Fair The first public showing of the

Army's new Nike Hercules antiaircraft missile will be during the 1957 State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 5-20.

The Hercules is the latest air defense weapon which the Army says can fly farther, faster and higher than any other such missile and can carry an atomic warhead.

Also to be exhibited at the Fair is the Nike Ajax, which the Hercules will supplement. A full crew of men will go through a realistic drill to demonstrate how the Ajax is loaded onto the rocket-launching apparatus, and how it is aimed and fired. The simulated firing demonstration will be accompanied by the sound of recordings of an actual blast-

The deadly Nike missle is designed to track down and destroy enemy aircraft. It blasts up higher than its prey and then swoops down on its target.

Red fuming nitric acid is the Nike's fuel, with a booster of solid propellent, something like gun powder that kicks the missile past the speed of sound in two seconds. When partially treated domestic sewage is discharged into shallow ponds, algae — a type of tiny vegetable growth — will flourish in the water. In the presence of sunshine, the algae releases oxygen into the water. The oxygen acts to convert organic matter in the sewage to carbon dioxide, which in turn is used by the algae in its growth
