Community Gives \$402 for Cemetery

Donations for Sacred Heart cemetery on All Saints Day amount to \$402.18, and according to the cemetery committee should carry on maintenance until the spring collection next May.

Loretta Mages Will Reign as Queen at SH Homecoming

Loretta Mages has won the coveted queen's crown in the contest at Sacred Heart High and will reign as the Tiger Queen over the school's annual homecoming events.

The pre-game coronation ceremony, preceded by a pep rally and parade, will start the evening's program on a festive note. An exhibition by the pep squad at half-time, the football game between the Tigers and the Buckner Hornets and a dance in the parish hall are scheduled events for the homecoming.

Queen Loretta, a senior, vied with three other class favorites in a hotly contested race to determine who would wear the crown. The others are Ruth Endres, a junior, Carolyn Swirczynski, a sophomore, and Margie Schoech, a freshman. They will be princesses in the royal court and will participate in the ceremonies by presenting the queen's crown, her bouquet and the football for the game. Tiger co-captains Howard Mollenkopf and Sonny Walterscheid will escort Her Majesty and share honors of the formal coronation.

The program will begin at about 7 o'clock with the pep rally and a parade up Main Street, the queen and her attendants riding in new 1958 automobiles. The parade will form at Main and Second Streets.

After the coronation Queen Loretta will reign over homecoming festivities. She is the daughter of Joe Mages, 17, and a vivacious brunette.

Mighty Micks of Cowtown Wallop Sacred Heart 38-6

The always rugged Laneri Micks, specially fired up for their homecoming, thundered over the Sacred Heart Tigers 38-6 Saturday night on the Handley High field.

The loss leaves Sacred Heart at the bottom of the 3-team district race of the Southwest Academic League with a record of two losses. Laneri and Waco Catholic High will decide the title when they meet.

From the beginning of the game the outclassed Tigers seemed doomed to defeat. However their determination held through the first half and they limited the Cowtown boys to two touchdowns. Then, starting the third period with two tough breaks, the Tiger resistance seemed to snap and Laneri rushed over four TDs before the quarter ended.

Starting the game Laneri advanced to midfield and kicked. Sacred Heart made a first down and also kicked and the Micks headed goalward from their 49. The scoring play was a 12 yard pass from Keyer to Goodman.

For the rest of the period and into the second Sacred Heart moved to Laneri's 23 but, after a few smeared attempts, lost the ball back on the 37. Two plays later Laneri fumbled and the Tigers were back in business on the 22 only to fumble away their opportunity on the first play.

From that point the Micks moved relentlessly to their second score. Ten plays reached the Tiger 31 and a clipping penalty moved the ball back to the 46, where Goodman got loose for his second scoring scamper. Half (Continued on Page 2)

Light Voting Here Favors Amendments

Muenster was in line with the rest of the county and state Tuesday in polling an exceptionally light vote on the three proposed amendments to the state constitution. It also agreed with the county and state in giving substantial majorities in favor of all proposals.

The total number of votes here was 44, 35 in the north box and 9 in the south box. Local results were 25-18 in favor of state employee benefits, 26-17 in favor of increased pensions and 33-10 in favor of the water control plan. County results were 466-259 for the first proposal, 645-105 for the second proposal and 515-214 for the third proposal.

3 Towns Submit Bridge Proposal At Austin Meeting

Possibilities of a Red River crossing somewhere between Gainesville and Ringgold were vastly improved Thursday of last week when delegations from Muenster, Saint Jo and Nocona appeared jointly at a hearing conducted by the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

The group was assured that the highway department will conduct a survey and also consult with engineers of the Oklahoma highway department to determine the best location for a bridge.

The state's favorable action resulted from a decision by the three towns to start pulling together rather than apart. Heretofore each had its favorite spot for a bridge and promoted its own pet project. Highway officials advised that they will not build three bridges and suggested that the towns get together and agree on a site. Instead the persons concerned decided to let highway engineers of the two states decide on the best location.

The spotlight of District 10-B will again be directed at Muenster this week as the Hornets entertain the loop leading Saint Jo Panthers in the featured event of the MHS Homecoming program Saturday night. The game is due to start at 7:30.

For Saint Jo the game is the most serious challenge to date in the team's 10-B title hopes for 1957. The Panthers have maintained a perfect record through their four games to date, however the opponents still on schedule are Valley View and Muenster, either of which could become a title contender by dumping Saint Jo.

Tigers Will Meet Buckner Friday in Homecoming Tilt

Another rugged game is on schedule for the Sacred Heart Tigers Friday night when they take on the Buckner Hornets before the Sacred Heart homecoming crowd.

Kickoff time will be about 7:30 o'clock . . . after the parade and crowning ceremony which will begin at 7.

Advance dope on this game clearly marks the visiting Big D boys as the likely winners. Buckner's record to date is 3-2 and includes a comparatively close 20-6 loss to St. Mark's which rolled to an easy win over Sacred Heart.

Reserve strength also shows up definitely in favor of the visiting boys. It includes about a dozen more than the Muenster list, and a clear weight superiority. Starting lineups are about evenly matched.

Buckner is a rival of several years in the Southwest Academic League but is not competing in the loop this season. It has recently been admitted into the Interscholastic League, effective in 1958.

In the last year's game at Dallas the Tigers overcame a two touchdown lead and slipped past Buckner 19-12.

Rain Measures 5.62; 48.50 Total Tops Old Annual Record

Rainfall this week, adding to 5.62 up to 7 a.m. Thursday, has passed all annual rainfall records at Muenster as far back as permanent records are available and dependable.

The present measure for the year is 48.50 . . . far ahead of 1950's 43.53 and very likely to go well over 50 inches before the end of the year.

Steve Moster, who makes the official readings and keeps the record, said that this year's moisture seems to be more than any shown on old records with the possible exception of 1941.

At that time the record consisted of a duplicate report, the original of which was sent in and the carbon copy remained in the book. According to one of those old books, Moster said, 1941 appeared to have very heavy rainfall but the carbon used for the duplicate sheet at that time must have been badly worn and many figures are not legible. According to his guesses of the doubtful figures that year's total moisture was over 50 inches.

Muenster to Have Event or Display For Yule Welcome

Muenster will have some sort of event or display, or possibly both, to welcome this year's Christmas season, but its nature is not decided up to now.

In a discussion at the Lions Club meeting Tuesday noon the point most generally agreed upon is that the community does not want a parade this year. Too many of the former participants seem to be of the opinion that the time and expense to make a display float is not justified by the few minutes it is seen in a parade.

Recommended as a substitute is an elaborate scene, preferably a nativity scene, sponsored as a community project. It would stand as a season-long display rather than appear for just a few minutes in a parade.

Another proposal is to sponsor some sort of event in order to bring a large crowd together at a specific time.

Lions were urged to give both proposals their attention and also to discuss them with people around town, then be prepared to make definite plans at their next meeting, on Nov. 19.

Rugged Rowdies Of Wichita Falls Lick Hornets 32-14

Even though the score was a top heavy 32-14 the game was much closer and the Hornets made a fine showing against the big and powerful Rowdies of Wichita Falls.

Never in the history of the Muenster school did one of its teams face a more formidable foe. Fifty trim and husky lads, more than the total number of boys at MHS, spread over the field in the pre-game warm-up. They were the pick of some 130 youngsters who originally started on the Rowdy squad this year . . . all sophomores with an ambition to work their way up to the mighty 4-A Coyote team.

The game, not originally on the Hornet schedule was an eleventh hour fill-in for the gap created by Marietta's cancellation the day before. Like many other teams this season, the Indians were knocked out by influenza.

As the game started it seemed as though the Hornets would be trampled by their oversize foes. On the first play from scrimmage Glenn blasted through the line and charged 47 yards to the Hornet 10 before Wolf hauled (Continued on Page 2)

In other 10-B games Valley View is a strong favorite to take Era and Alvord is expected to keep Sanger in the winless column. Callisburg has an open date.

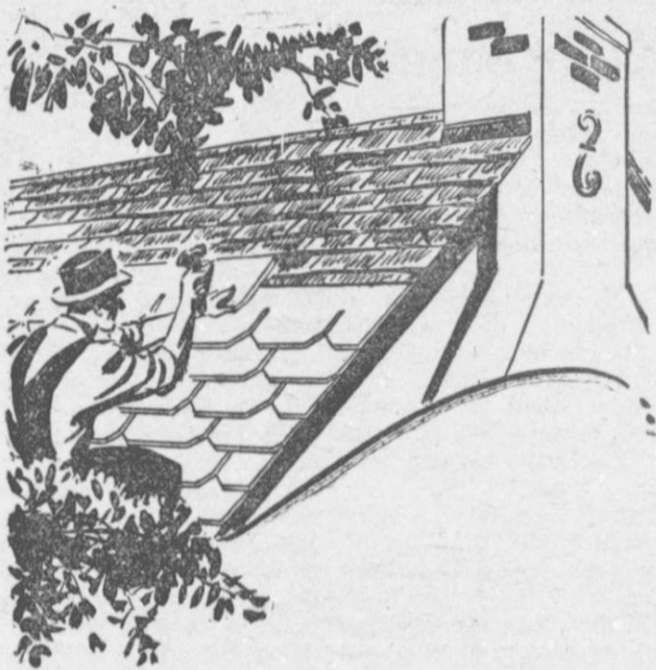

PRACTICAL THANKS-GIVING

On the anniversary of the tragic Hungarian uprising, Catholic Relief Services — NCWC announced that "Operation Clothes-Closet," the ninth annual Catholic Bishops' Thanksgiving Clothing Appeal — to be conducted in the 16,200 parishes throughout the nation from November 24th to 30th — must equal the record-breaking collection of last year. Msgr. Edward E. Swanson, executive director, reported that the vast CRS warehouses are now bare — stripped of the 16,592,883 pounds of clothing, shoes and blankets (valued at \$23,603,666) contributed a year ago.

On December 10, the first shipment of the collection, \$625,000 worth went to Austria to clothe the ragged freedom fighters and other refugees that were streaming out of Budapest by the

thousands. And on September fifth, the last of these garments and shoes and blankets — \$363,187 worth — was dispatched to Poland. This clothing, together with \$70,000 worth of medical supplies flown in earlier to Polish Cardinal Stefan Wyszynski, constituted the first relief shipment to this unhappy country since 1950. In all, a total of 152,558 bales, boxes and bags of clothing and shoes was shipped to 34 countries around the globe. As in the past, shipments for the Orient were processed at the depots of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul of Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles, while trans-Atlantic shipments were readied at the Catholic Relief Services — NCWC depot in New York.

Msgr. Swanson called on Americans of all faiths to help their Catholic friends help those

in desperate need throughout the world. He recalled the suddenness with which the Hungarian revolt burst into flame and the tremendous refugee problem mushroomed — and the fact that no one knows what may happen, or when, in the many trouble spots over the globe. With or without emergencies, there is misery enough to require all we can give, he said, and the likelihood of more crisis fore-shadows a graver need than ever in the year ahead.

In most every home in this favored land, there are serviceable clothes and shoes which will never be worn again and taking up good closet space. Stowed away in linen closets are thousands of worn sheets and blankets that are being kept for no good reason. These things can be comforts beyond price to those in need. These things can, and do, save human lives. Men and women of good will — and regardless of religious faith — will want to go through their closets at Thanksgiving time, cull out the usable things they do not need and leave them at the local Catholic Church.

"Operation Clothes-Closet" should remind us of the things we have to be thankful for.

IN THE INTEREST OF LABOR

Senator Knowland of California, the present minority leader, has announced his candidacy for the governorship of his state, and has started his campaign. With high political courage, he has strongly endorsed a state right-to-work law — the law which provides that a man can join or not join a union, as he desires, and that he will have the right to work at his trade in either case.

Senator Knowland also has a program of federal labor legislation which he will work for when the next session of Congress convenes this coming January. Points in this program include: Right of union members to elect their officers by secret ballot; provision for recall of officers by secret ballot; requirement that strikes be called only by vote of the members, through a secret ballot; legal protection of union welfare and other funds; adoption of what amounts to an initiative and referendum

system whereby union members can override actions of their officers.

Needless to say, the Senator will be denounced as "anti-labor" because of his position on these matters. The fact is that his proposals, if enacted, would be a boon to all labor and the country as well. Unions would get their membership on the basis of service — not by coercion, intimidation, and unbridled monopoly power. This would inevitably make for better and more effective unions. And the Senator's other proposed protections would give union members a vitally-needed means of getting rid of the racketeer, the goon, the crook, and the dictator. Can any honest man doubt the necessity for that after the facts produced by the McClellan committee?

POOR AMERICAN PEOPLE

Back in the year 1758, Benjamin Franklin in one of his "Poor Richard's Almanacs," among a wealth of other sage counsel and observations, wrote the following:

"It would be thought a hard Government that should tax its people one-tenth Part of their Time, to be employed in its Service."

Wise old Ben undoubtedly thought that he was making a more than liberal allowance for the necessary expenses of government. One can not help wondering what Franklin would think today if he could see the burdens of Federal, State and local taxation constantly mounting, while spending increases even more rapidly.

Our thought is that he would be horrified to see the Federal Government alone taking as high as 91 percent of the incomes of the wealthy and over 20 percent from just us ordinary folks. "Poor Richard" would shake his head in pity, muttering the while: "Poor American People."

HOW OLD ARE THE GOSPELS?

By Rev. Edmond D. Benard, Ph.D., Catholic University of America

When we open the New Testament, we are more certain that we hold in our hands the history of Christ as it was originally written — than we are in the case of any other figure in ancient history.

OUR MAIN historical sources for the life of Christ are the four Gospels. They are by no means the only sources, but they are the principal ones. And here is what the historian has to work with when he inquires into the life of Christ.

There are more than 2,600 Greek manuscripts of the Gospels going back to about the year 350 A.D.

THE OLDEST Gospel text in scholars' possession is a papyrus fragment from St. John's Gospel (Chapter 18, verses 31-33 and 37-38). Written in Greek, it was found in the early part of this century in middle Egypt. The experts on ancient writings say that the text was written: about 150 A.D.

And in 1956, 108 pages of a well preserved Greek manuscript were found in Egypt containing fourteen of the twenty-one chapters of the Book of John. Experts estimate that this portion of manuscript could date as early as the middle of the second century.

WE HAVE fifteen different translations of the Gospels into ancient languages—translations made from manuscripts in the original Greek even older than the Greek manuscripts that have survived. The Gospels were translated into Syriac and Latin, for instance, around the year 150 A.D.; and into Egyptian only fifty years later.

And if all the manuscripts and translations of the Gospels had been lost, we could still reconstruct the Gospels simply out of the thousands of quotations in the works of the early Christian writers.

A GERMAN scholar was able to reconstruct the New Testament from the Gospel texts contained in the writings of Tertullian (born 160 A.D.). And there are more than 29,000 texts from the New Testament in the works of St. Augustine (born 354 A.D.).

The Gospel record has constantly been checked against, and constantly confirmed by, archeological discoveries. It has been carefully compared with the other records we have of the general history of the times, and found to be in complete accord with it.

AS A RESULT of this overpowering mass of material, worked over by scholars for centuries, we can be sure that our documents on the life and teachings of Christ carry us back to those years of the first century—shortly after the death of Christ—when His life was first written.

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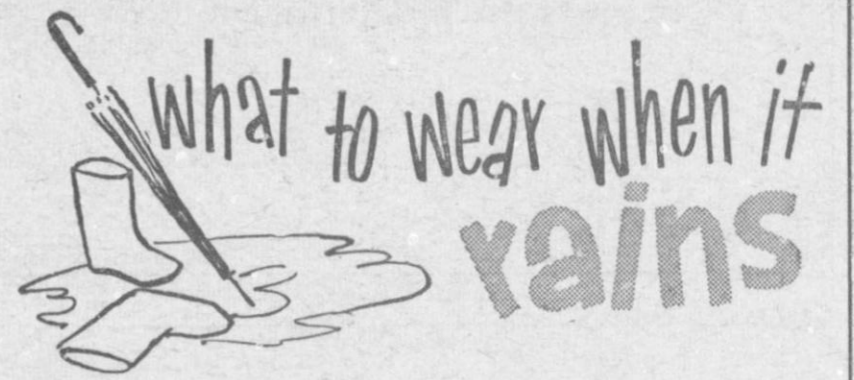

A New Kind Of Inflation

Some of the labor unions — led by the United Auto Workers — have as their next major goal a shorter work week without any reduction in pay. The head of one of the major farm equipment companies, speaking at a meeting of the Farm Equipment Institute in Chicago, discussed this idea in forthright terms. It is of great importance to the equipment makers, in that they are organized by the UAW — and so it

is also of great importance to their customers.

The spokesman said that the shorter-work-week idea "ignores the economic facts of life," and that it amounts to demanding much more money for much less productive time. That, obviously, can lead only to renewed and stimulated price inflation.

He then turned to escalator clauses, which tie wage adjustments to the government's Bureau of Labor Statistics cost-of-living index, and which are a feature of union contracts in a wide range of industries. These clauses, he said, bring about a "new kind of inflation." He added: "It starts with inflation, which turns into cost inflation and ends in price inflation. The resulting price inflation in turn raises the B.L.S. cost-of-living index and automatically —

through operation of contract escalator clauses — triggers another round of wage increases which continues through the cycle and becomes a self-feeding spiral." It is certainly time the unions practiced a reasonable amount of restraint in their policies and demands. If inflation should get out of hand — a danger which certainly exists today — no group will be hit harder than labor.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Farmers in the Muenster-Saint Jo area received fingerling Bluegill this week Thursday to stock new ponds or to replace fish in ponds that dried up during the drought.

A specially equipped truck from the Fish and Wildlife Service drove into Muenster at about 8:30 a.m. and parked north of the Post Office. After making deliveries here to pond owners the truck went to Saint Jo and located near the Post Office for deliveries there.

While most of the farmers received Bluegill, some stocked ponds with Channel Catfish. Those who took out Bluegill this week will receive Black Bass in the spring delivery.

For ponds with less than one surface acre, proper stocking in this area consists of Bass and Bluegill together or Channel Cat alone. For more than one surface acre all three species are furnished. All fish are delivered without cost to the pond owners.

Proper stocking and manage-

ment help to insure good fishing in ponds. Fertilization increases fish production. High nitrogen fertilizer such as 8-8-4 or its equivalent is recommended for fish ponds. Apply about 100 pounds per surface acre. Begin fertilizing in early April and continue at approximately four week intervals. Do this through middle of the summer months, is advised by technicians of the local Soil Conservation Service office.

MEN ARE FIRST

Even when they stay home where they ought to be safe, men get themselves killed off twice as fast as women. In a recent 16-state survey, the National Safety Council found more than 1,000 men died in home accidents in one year, compared to fewer than 600 women.

The men climb up on roofs and ladders and fall off, they get tangled up in power tools, they fool around with guns they thought weren't loaded. It's partly due to misguided gallantry, the Safety Council says. If there's a risky job around the house to be done, like fixing the TV aerial, the man does it.

The moral, of course, is not that he ought to send his wife up on the roof instead. He ought to turn the job over to some other male who's trained to do such work without getting a broken neck. —Asheville (N.C.) Citizen-Times.

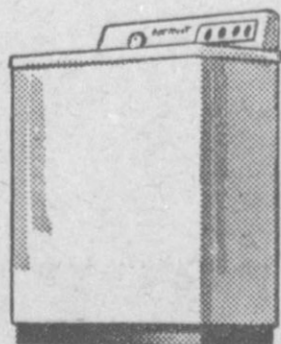

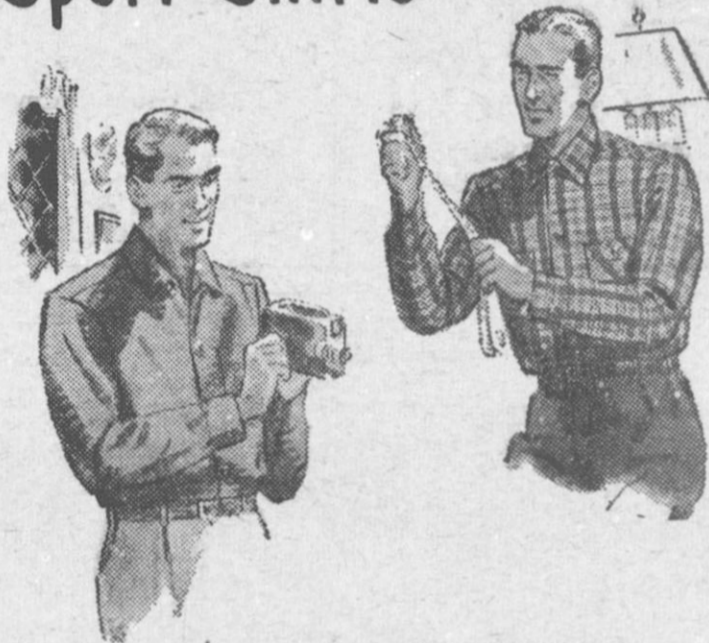
