Muenster Schools Gain 6; Combined

With a gain of six over the opening enrollment of last year, the downward trend that was noted for the past three schotwo institutions Wednesday show a total of 675.

This represents a gain of 1 over last year's revised count of 8 p.m., immediately after the 674, following five late registrations. Indications are that this year's total will also be raised as expected late arrivals sign in

at both places.

In general however the figure remains fairly constant since 1953 when the total was 682. Starting counts for the years since then have been 675 in '54, 683 in '55, 672 in '56, and 669 in '57. Sharpest gains were seen Sharing the program with him in the two years following 1951, which had only 612. There were 654 in '52 and 682 in '53.

A break down of the current enrollment shows 391 in Sacred Heart Elementary and 103 in Sacred Heart High for a total of 494. Muenster Public School has 90 in the grades and 91 in the high school.

A comparison with last year's figures reveals that Sacred Heart gained 18 while the public school lost 12 for the net gain of 6. Enrollments for 1957 were 384 elementary and 92 high school at Sacred Heart, and 107 elementary and 86 high school at the public school.

Another analysis shows that elementary enrollment here has declined from 491 to 481 while high school enrollment has increased from 178 to 194. The public school lost 17 grade schoolers while the parochial school gained 7. In high school Sacred Heart gained 11 and the public school gained 5.
