His big boner, however, is going in cahoots with Russia to achieve that end. Red propaganda and intrigue have convinced him that this is the right course. Meanwhile red technicians and experts are helping with his military and economic program . . . but at the same time playing the typical Russian game of making Nasser helplessly dependent on Moscow.

When the time is ripe Nasser will suddenly discover that he is no longer the magnificent leader of a great Arab empire. He will have joined the other puppets who are forced to take orders from Moscow and the empire itself will have become another Soviet satellite.

The pattern is there plain for anyone to see, identical to that which has subjugated millions of people in Europe and Asia. Now the reds are firing an incessant propaganda barrage encouraging Arabs to break the ties of Western colonialism. Next the same people will be like the millions of others, subjects of Soviet imperialism.

That any person should be so naive as to fall for the same old worn out line of intrigue seems unbelievable. But here it is, happening all over again. Like
