Once upon a time, on a cold winter evening long ago, a young priest in Austrian Tyrol was sitting quietly by the fireside of his parish house, writing out his Christmas sermon, when there suddenly came a knock at the door. "Will you come, Father?" the messenger said. "Yes." Father Josef Mohr replied quickly, as he drew on a heavy cloak. In the peasant's hut where the messenger led him, Father Mohr found a beautiful infant, cradled in the arms of a radiant young mother. It was only two days before Christmas, and as he gazed at the sleeping child and proud mother, Father Mohr could not help being reminded of the Holy Infant and the Virgin Mary.

As he trudged home through the deep snow, later that night, Father Mohr looked up at the stars shinging brightly down on the sleeping village of Oberndorf and he was awed by the majestic stillness of the night. Good Crops, High Livestock Prices Regarded as Basis For Area Prosperity in '58

Exceptionally good crops, continued growth and improvement, and a sudden interest in foreign travel are the outstanding facts in this year's news review.

Crop-wise the community hit the jackpot. Compensating to a degree for excessive rain last year and the long drought prior to that, the weather was at its best, giving farmers the finest harvest they have known in years. The lucky breaks started early in the year as crops got a good start and continued through the harvest of hay and grain and later of corn. Meanwhile grazing too was fine on the local ranges.

Along with the good crops, which put feed in the barn as well as money in the bank, farmers got another nice break in the livestock market. Prices have been good for months.

These conditions are reflected to a great extent in growing deposits at the bank. Since January 1 the deposit figure has increased by about \$385,000. Other good news from the bank is a growth in savings accounts and the payment of the customary 6 per cent dividend to stockholders.

As regards improvements and growth the city continues its good record. Bulding permits were just under \$90,000, the town gained by more than 2 to 1 in its ratio of incoming and outgoing citizens, and birth, as usual, ran far ahead of deaths. Building projects consisted of three new homes and three non-residential jobs in the city along with several new homes and barns in the rural area. In addition there were many repair and remodeling

The year set a new record for foreign travel as seven persons flew to Europe, two flew to Hawaii and one to Puerto Rico, besides the several who visited in Canada and Mexico.
