An inconspicuous news item this week suggests that communism itself, which has bragged loud and long about its schemes to help bring about the financial collapse of this country, may soon be encountering serious money problems of its own.

A Japanese traveler coming from Moscow says that the American dollar there is currently buying 20 to 25 rubles in the Russian black market, and that tourists are openly receiving 10 rubles for a dollar. That's quite a drastic drop in the value of money which is officially listed at an exchange rate of 4 for a dollar.

This doesn't mean, of course, that the big red model of economic stability is on the rocks, but it does show a weakness along with the important fact that in this phase of the cold war at least we seem to have the better weapon.

Another sign of Soviet trouble comes from the Baltic states, where anti communist sentiment is running so high that red bosses find it necessary to carry out wholesale deportations. Obviously they expect by this new reign of terror to prevent another version of the Hungarian upris-

As they know very well, a government founded on treachery and brutality can never relax. It must constantly apply the pressure if it is to remain in power. And it must live in constant fear, always aware that the memory of cruelty and injustice can spark a nation wide

#### Voters Here Favor Democrats, Oppose Here to Bulcher The Amendments

In sharp contrast with their strong turnout in the July Democratic primary, voters of Muens-ter made a feeble showing for Tuesday's general election. The total number of voters in both local boxes was only 399, about strength of the community. 341 of those voted at the north box, 58 at the south box.

Results here were about the same as in the county and the state as regards voting on candidates but differed in voting on the proposed constitutional amendments. The big majority voted a straight Democratic ticket, joining the county and state in giving long leads to the party nominees. However, as in the rest of the state there were dissenting votes, especially in the senatorial contest. Whittenburg received 81 as compared with Yarborough's 273.

On the amendments Muenster agreed with the state on only four issues and disagreed on the remaining five. They agreed in opposing propositions 1 and and again in favoring propositions 3 and 4. From there on they opposed every proposal

In muddy lots cattle use up energy that could have gone into extra weight gains. A concrete paved strip along side the feed bunk means more beef from each pound of feed, Purdue University agricultural researchers report.

Beef cattle kept out of the mud will gain extra pounds. When the cattle have a firm footing they put on more weight than when they have to wade around in muddy yards, say animal husbandry research men at Purdue University.


Dr. W. M. Beeson and Dr. T. W. Perry found out that even a small strip of concrete alongside a feed bunk will more than pay for itself in increased beef gains. In a research trial (using two lots of 14 steers confined for 112 days) the average gain per steer in the lot with a 16-ft. concrete strip on one side of the feed bunk was 95 pounds compared to only 62 pounds for each steer confined to the unpaved lot. Each steer on concrete gained 33 additional pounds. The steers in the unpaved lot ate less total feed, but each steer required 35 pounds more feed to make a pound of gain.
