#### Legislation Urged To Set Clear Creek

A special authority for de velopment and maintenance of soil and water resources in the Clear Creek Watershed is practically assured.

Copies of the proposed bill have been submitted to all of in the state legislature whose jurisdiction reaches the area concerned, and have received their endorsement.

Sponsors of the legislation are Senator Floyd Bradshaw, representing Montague, Wise and Denton counties, and Representative Alonzo Jamison of Denton County. The bill was drawn up under supervision of Clear Creek Watershed Association directors and submitted by J. M. Weinzapfel, president of the organization. Other legislators besides the sponsors who received copies are Senator Ray Roberts and Representatives Tony Korioth, Tony Fenoglio and James

The purpose of the authority, Weinzapfel explained, is to create a legal entity empowered to conduct surveys, develop plans, obtain easements, build and maintain structures and to have control over the water of Clear Creek watershed. It also has the power to create subordinate districts for special projects within its area. Its activity is financed through a tax of 5 cents per \$100 of assessed valuaton.
