Bank Growth Here Leads the County During Past Year

| Muenster State Bank led the county in growth of both deposits and loans during the past year, according to figures revealed Tuesday in accordance with a bank call issued by the state banking department. <br> The call, effective at the close of business on March 12, shows the Muenster bank with deposits of $\$ 2.526,099$, an increase of $\$ 530,134$ over that of the official call date of March 4 last year L.kewlise loans have grown $\$ 267,815$ to the present $\$ 1,289,900$ <br> In each case this represents an increase of about 21 per cent, as compared with a county increase of just under 10 per cent in deposits and under 9 per cent in loans. Combined deposits in the four county banks were \$1,779.017. Combined loans in the county banks were $\$ 7,124,434$, an increase of $\$ 560,198$ for the year. <br> All four banks grew in deposits but only two , Muenster State and First State of Gaines- ville, increased their loans. |
