Monday night's rain, measuring 1.06 inch, was about the lightest in Cooke County. Reports every direction from here were higher, most of them ranging from 1.5 to 2 inches.

In this area there were three rains, first scattered showers which by-passed Muenster late Monday afternoon. South of town, in a strip about a mile wide and several miles long, that rain was accompained by hail which dealt roughly with small grain fields. Estimates of the damage run at about 50 per cent.
