County Has 5950 Voters on Record

Cooke County's recorded voting strength this year is slightly higher than it was in 1957, the last political off-year. An unofficial report from the Cooke County tax office Monday gives

The exact figure was not available then because poll tax receipts were still being written from applications received in the mail. Also there had been no count made of the receipts that were voided because of mistakes. Allowing for those factors the number of poll tax receipts was estimated at 4310 and the number of exemptions at 1640.

Two years ago there were more poll taxes and fewer exemptions, 4353 and 1569 respectively, for a total recorded voting strength of 5920.

For the regular elections last year the county had 7045 regpayers and 1922 exemptions.

Actual voting strength is considerably higher than that shown by poll tax and exemption records. That is because hundreds of over-age persons, all living outside the city of Gainesville, can vote without securing an exemption certificate.
