The course of action to be taken here regarding legalized sales of alcoholic drinks is known, but the date for getting it in motion still is not known.

Mayor Herbert Meurer made inquiries Monday and learned that a final ruling on the legality of a wet city or precinct in a dry county is being delayed. According to his information, dry interests have asked for a rehearing on the state supreme court's ruling which was handed down early in June. Until the matter is re-considered, and the former decision is either affirmed vited to "come out anyway, and or reversed, no legal action can be taken. It is believed that the final ruling will be announced in the next few weeks.

Assuming the former decision is affirmed, the residents of Muenster will be free to proceed with their local option election plans. The first step is to prepare a petition asking for the election and bearing signatures of at least 25 per cent of the number of the city's qualified voters in the last general election. The petition is to be submitted to the county judge, who will order the election.

Mayor Meurer said present sentiment seems to favor beer sales in all forms and liquor sales in package stores.
